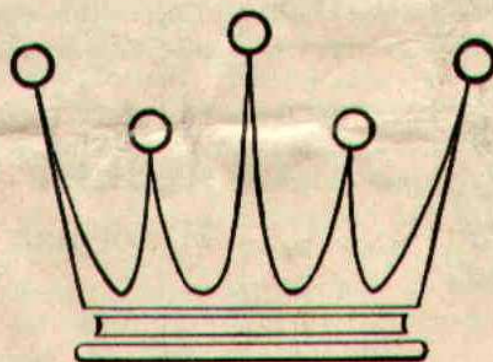

COUNTY CHATTER

CHIEFLY as the result of the 100 per cent. home record—the only remaining side in the Third Division with such an unbeaten certificate—we are still handily placed in the table.

Swindon Town, whom we welcome to Meadow Lane today, are the latest challengers to this sequence, and in view of their impressive form lately, this is a match of great attraction, which our lads will be warned not to treat lightly.

Indeed, it has swiftly been learned that points-harvesting in Division Three is not an easy business.

Some people have expressed complaints over the standard of football seen in our last home match, against Bristol City, but are these grumbles justified?

We took an early lead, but this merely shook the visitors out of their lethargy and not out of their confidence. Bristol played considerably better football than when we lost on their ground, and our defence earned credit for some do-or-die tactics.

It was the first time this season we had kept a clean defensive sheet,

and despite Bristol's bright attacking football the cover for George Smith was better than in other matches. The team drew inspiration from this greater solidarity, and nobody could surely complain over two beautiful goals in the dying stages.

Our manager, Mr. Frank Hill, was sufficiently satisfied to leave the team unaltered for the visit to Grimsby two days later. This was reckoned our toughest assignment yet with Grimsby on top of the table and playing impressively at home.

Once again, our defence proved that the splendid form against Bristol was no fluke, and they were very unlucky to concede a goal, which cost a point. This has been credited against John Butler as an own-goal, but it was a case of "hard luck, John," for the ball struck him in flight to be deflected into the net, and was not an avoidable error.

After this, it was for the forwards to put us back in the game, which Tony Hateley did, and only steadiness in front of the posts cost a point.

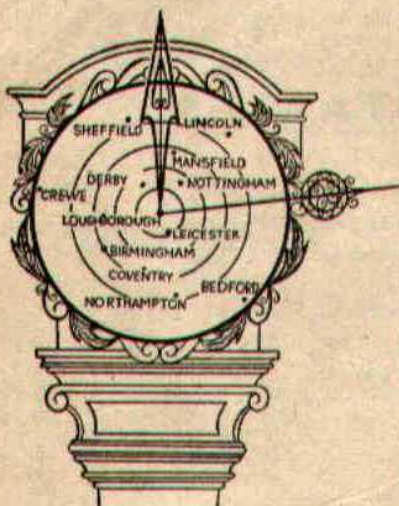

SAM BURTON (Goalkeeper). A product of local football who first joined Swindon in 1945. Longest-serving member of the side, but still as efficient as in the days when he played for the Wiltshire junior eleven which reached the final of the Counties' tournament.

JOHN HIGGINS (Right-back). In his first spell of English League football, after a distinguished spell in Scottish circles. Born in Kilmarnock, he first came to prominence with St. Mirren and was later with Hibernian. Moved to Swindon in the close season.

DAVID RICHARDSON (Left-back). Another whom Town signed in the summer. Hails from Billington, County Durham, and went to Swindon from Grimsby Town, after some seasons with Leicester City.

KEITH MORGAN (Right-half). One of the club's many teenage products, he graduated through the junior sides and is a former County youth player. Made his League debut two seasons ago.

MAURICE OWEN (Centre-half). Used to be a wing-half but now the number one choice for the pivotal position. Signed for Swindon in 1947, and soon the target for big clubs, offers from Wolves and Arsenal being refused.

JOHN BELL (Left-half). Has also swapped positions before settling here, for he used to be a centre-half or full-back. Signed last close season from Stirling Albion and soon settled in English League football. A native of Edinburgh.

MIKE SUMMERBEE (Outside-right). Much-coveted winger, and can also play at centre-forward. A native of Cheltenham, he signed professional forms for Swindon on his 17th birthday and made his League baptism last season.

ERNIE HUNT (Inside-right). Also made his debut last season. Is another teenage prospect of great promise who was on the ground staff before signing professional forms. Hails from Swindon.

BOB WOODRUFF (Centre-forward). Called up recently from the half-back line to put more punch into the forward line, and obliged with three goals against Port Vale! A local who caught the eye in the Swindon schoolboy team that did so well in the National Schoolboys' Cup competition.

CLIFFORD JACKSON (Inside-left). Yet another teenager, he made his debut two seasons ago while still on the ground staff. Swindon is his home town, and he joined the club straight from school.

DAVID CORBETT (Outside-left). Can operate on either flank, and another protege of Swindon's exceptional "catch 'em young" policy. A County youth player he made his debut two seasons ago.

Recorded History—Swindon Town

Now in their 79th year, Swindon are remembered by old timers for their great amateur inside-right, Harold Fleming, who did more than any one player to take the Wiltshire side to the F.A. Cup semi-final twice in three seasons—1910 and 1912. They were first beaten by Newcastle United and then by Burnley and both these clubs went on to win the trophy.

Fleming played for England, but at the same time Swindon had other top-rate forwards in Jefferson, Wheatcroft, Bown and Lamb, and at full-back Scottish international John Walker.

The glory of Swindon departed when the best players had to be sold to enable the club, started first by the Rev. William Pitt and then carried on by the railway workers of the town, to balance their books.

Managed at one period by Welsh international outside-left Ted Vizard, Swindon also had another left-winger as team boss in Louis Page.

One of the best servants of recent years to the "Robins" has been Maurice Owen, a real utility man.

Swindon sold Irish international goalkeeper Norman Uprichard to Portsmouth and at the present time have a number of teenagers in their senior side who have been attracting considerable attention, among them being the promising right-winger Mike Summerbee.

Although they have never reached the Second Division, Swindon have often looked like gaining promotion but have fallen short of the target.

After finishing fourth in the table in season 1958-9, they slumped to below half-way last season, but are doing well again this term.

Their present manager is Mr. Bert Head.

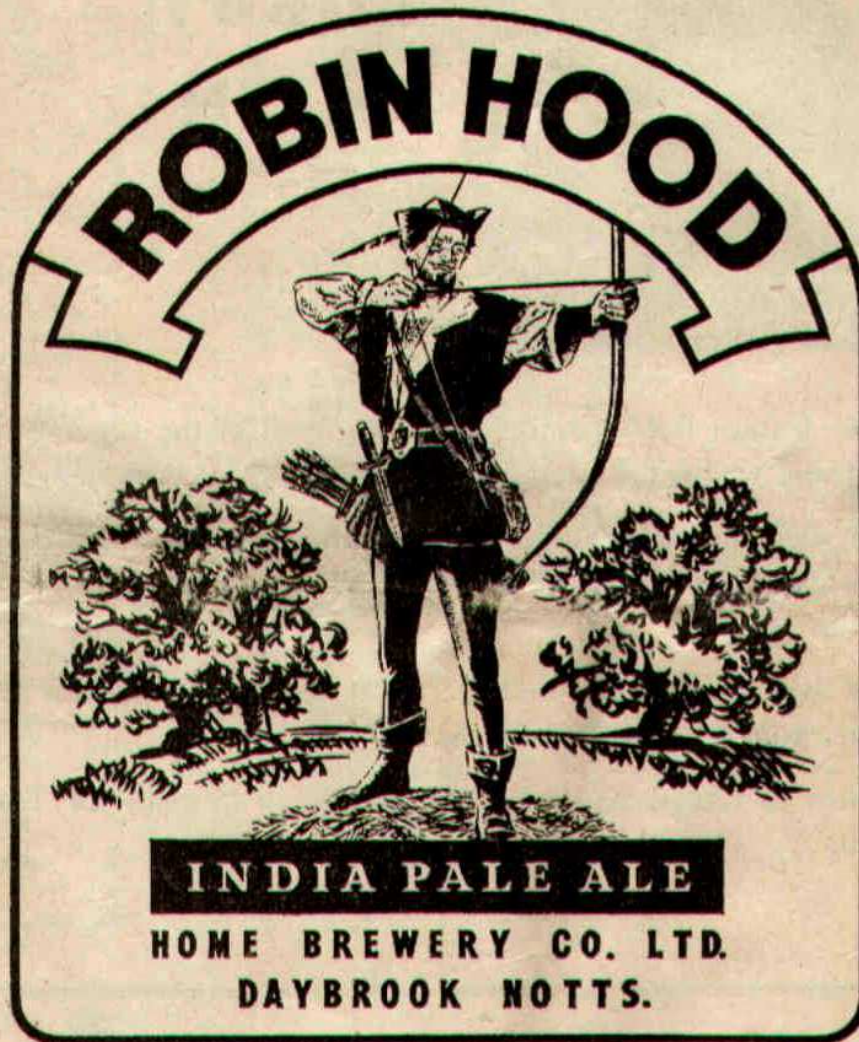
