Let's not forget those regular soccer followers who watch our Central League side, come rain or shine.

TRUE SPORTSMANSHIP

They showed their true sportsmanship when Chesterfield were the visitors to Oakwell on Saturday last. The crowd offered applause of encouragement to our two newcomers, Alan Hopper and Barrie Wood, who were playing their first match at Oakwell.

These two players turned in promising shows and at the end of the match there was another bout of applause for them for their performances.

That's the sort of thing that will help Alan and Barrie to settle down with us.

SPLENDID RESERVES HELP

And while on the topic of the reserve players we must mention the wonderful way in which they have come through for first team duty.

WELCOME TO

SWINDON TOWN

Ground : County Ground, Swindon.

Manager : Mr. Bert Head.

Our visitors this afternoon, Swindon Town, were founded in 1881 by the Rev. W. Pitt. They were an amateur organisation at first but then they adopted professionalism in 1894 when they joined the Southern League.

RISE TO FAME

It was not until the 1907-08 season that Swindon first started their rise to fame. They competed in the F.A. Cup for the first time and reached the third round before being knocked out. Three years later they got through to the semi-final before they were defeated by Newcastle United.

Swindon won the Southern League Championship in 1911 and again in 1914. And during the seven year period from 1907-14 they never finished lower than fifth in the table.

FOURTH PLACE

In 1920 Swindon joined the Third Division of the Football League, and in their first season they finished in fourth place. They finished in fourth place in three seasons, 1924-25, 1946-47 and 1948-49 seasons.

Many outstanding players have been on Swindon's books over the years.

On of the greatest was John Walker a full back who was capped for Scotland on nine occasions. Another player of outstanding ability who served The Robins well was H. J. Fleming who was also capped on nine occasions.

RECORD ATTENDANCE

The record attendance at the County Ground is 28,400 against Stoke City in an F.A. Cup Game in 1952. The best receipts at Swindon came in 1930 when they met Manchester City in a Cup game. On that occasion the spectators paid £2,787 at the turnstiles.

Last season Swindon finished one place above ourselves in the Third Division with an equal number of points.

SAM BURTON, goalkeeper, is a local born player. He joined the club in 1945. He previously played for the Wilts. Junior side. He stands 6ft. and weighs 13½ stone.

Last season's Result: Barnsley 0, Swindon 3

Colours : Red Shirts, White shorts.

KEN JONES, right back, stands 5ft. 11 ins., weighs 11 stone 5 lb. Ken, who was born at Wrexham, played for the Welsh club before joining The Robins from Crystal Palace recently.

JOHN TROLLOPE, left back, is another local born player. John figured prominently in the Swindon youth side which a few seasons back did so well in the National Competition.

KEITH MORGAN, right half, came up through The Robins youth teams. Keith made his debut in the 1958-59 season. He stands 6 ft. 1 ins. and weighs 12½ stone. A former County youth player.

MAURICE OWEN, centre half, signed as a professional in 1947 for Swindon and was the target for many First Division clubs. Two of the clubs were Arsenal and Wolves. Stands 5 ft. 11 ins. and weighs 11 stone.

JOHN BELL, left half, was born in Edinburgh and joined the Swindon club from the Scottish Club, Stirling Albion. This Scot, stands 5 ft. 10 ins. and weighs 12 stone.

DAVID CORBETT, outside right, another County Youth player who made his debut in the 1958-59 season. Graduated through the Swindon youth teams. He stands 5 ft. 8 ins., weighs 10½ stone.

ERNIE HUNT, inside right, a former groundstaff boy who made his debut last season, turning professional on his seventeenth birthday last year. Another local boy he stands 5ft. 9 ins. and weighs 10½ st.

MICHAEL SUMMERBEE, centre forward, was born in Cheltenham and a former groundstaff boy before signing professional on his seventeenth birthday. Mike made his debut last year. He stands 5 ft. 10ins. and weighs 11 st.

BOB WOODRUFF, inside left, joined his present club straight from school, where he was a member of the Swindon Boy's team that did so well in the English Schools Shield a few years ago. He stands 5 ft. 11 ins. and weighs 11 st.

ARNOLD DARCY, outside left, a native of Blackburn who joined The Robins from Wigan. Previously an amateur with Accrington Stanley. He stands 5 ft. 8 ins. and weighs 10½ st.
