Bush Telegraph

BY THE EDITOR

These notes had necessarily to be written before Saturday's match, but whatever happened against Portsmouth, with victory in the two previous games — away to Barnsley and Reading — our players more than lived down that 3—6 home defeat inflicted in the first "leg" against Reading.

We welcome Swindon Town tonight with one thought very clearly in mind. On the eve of this new and vital season, it did look as if the Third Division was going to produce a really hot contest — and this has in fact been borne out in the first fortnight.

Manager Alec Stock told me before Saturday's game: "In every match of ours so far there has been football of a high standard. There are so many good sides in the section now that I would, even at this early stage, make the guess that the Third Division will this season reach its highest standard since the war."

Determination Did It

In both those victories at Barnsley and Reading we showed the determination to succeed under difficulties. Against Barnsley — incidentally, theirs is one of the best pitches we can expect to play on all season — we won 4—2 after **twice** being a goal down, and at Reading last Wednesday our ten men not only held, but added to, our lead after the sending-off of Mark Lazarus.

Towers "Special"

Jim Towers chose this match to achieve his first "twosome" in our colours. The second goal was of rare significance — his first header to find the net since 1958. Don't make it so long again before the next one, Jim!

A Little Adjustment

With Roy Bentley moving across to right-back and Keith Rutter coming back into the side at centrehalf, our defence quickly settled down again after those six goals conceded here against Reading.

Leaving Keith out of the opening matches after two ever-present seasons not unexpectedly aroused comment. We think it should be known that there was never any intention of Rutter being kept indefinitely in reserve football.

The same goes for George Francis. Here is another player too good not to be in the first team — yet there are only eleven places.

At the same time, to be successful a club cannot survive on only eleven good players. Certainly, it makes life a little awkward when there are "too many players going for too few places"... but not half as awkward as the reverse situation faced by the manager who needs to make changes but hasn't the necessary replacements to call on.

I Hear That . . .

Jim Towers and George Francis combined well in "push and run" moves when they lined up together in a private practice the other day.

When George Bristow reported fit again last week after slight Achilles trouble, trainer Alec Farmer found himself in the happy position at this busy stage of the season of having no injuries to worry him.

Our Juniors, who beat Hounslow West Youth Club here last Tuesday by 12—2 in the preliminary round of the F.A. Youth Cup, are drawn away to Arsenal or Norwich City in the first round proper.

Manager Alec Stock, who reckoned he was half a stone too heavy anyway, has shed nine pounds in the last few weeks. Special diet? Nothing of the sort. He did it the hard way — knocking the garden into shape at his new house at Epsom.

Crystal Palace - Twice

Two matches against our old friends and London rivals Crystal Palace are on the near horizon. On Saturday, we visit them in the Football League. Four days later — Wednesday, September 13, kick-off 7.30 — they are here in the first round of the Football League Cup. Centre stand tickets, price 6/6d., are available in advance for this match.

Maurice Owen (Centre-half): Club captain and Swindon's senior player. Originally a centre-forward, he has in recent years served the club splendidly in the half-back line. 5ft. 10in., 11st. 3lb. Born Abingdon.

John Bell (Left-half): Swindon's only Scot, signed from Stirling Albion last summer. Established himself midway through the season. 5ft. 11in., 11st. 5lb. Born Glasgow.

David Corbett (Outside-right): Product of the club's youth scheme, and a part-

time player until recently. 5ft. 8in., 11st. 3lb. Born Marshfield.

Ernie Hunt (Inside-right): Went into the League side when 16 two years ago, and was the Club's top League marksman last season with 14 goals. Swindon have turned down several good offers for this former ground-staff boy, who unluckily suffered a knee injury in this season's third match. 5ft. 9in., 11st. Born Swindon.

Mike Summerbee (Centre - forward):
Champions Spurs were among a whole string of First Division clubs who showed keen interest in this 17-year-old last season when he played outsideright. Has now returned to his original position in the middle. 5ft. 10in., 11st. 6lb. Born Preston.

Ralph Hunt (Inside-left): Swindon signed him from Grimsby Town during the close season to add experience and goalscoring ability to their attack. Previous clubs: Portsmouth, Derby County and Norwich. 5ft. 10½in., 12st. Born Portsmouth.

Arnold Darcy (Outside-left): Completes five years with Swindon in November, having joined them from Wigan Athletic. 5ft. 8in., 11st. Born Blackburn.


