MANAGER'S COMMENTS

Good afternoon Ladies and Gentlemen. I suppose even the most optimistic of Lions Supporters could not have forseen that we would be sitting top of the table with a three point lead after only 11 games. Without doubt our success has caused a few eye brows to be raised. Certain critics amongst our own Supporters have complained about some of our players ever since I arrived at Millwall. Surely, however, what has been achieved will at least keep the few moaners quiet. No team, whatever division they are in, can go thirty matches and lose only one, and have "useless" players in their side. On the contrary I would be inclined to think we must have some more than useful players in the side. With real backing from you the Spectators, there is no doubt that this team can prove they can achieve what many people thought was impossible - i.e. PROMOTION. Whilst it is a good thing to have some star players with great ability in the side, football over all is a team game. No doubt we would all like to see star players in our side, but we can honestly say that the present side are playing for each other. That is why I think we have obtained our success so far. Let us hope this will continue for the future.

Regarding the games played since we last wrote, three have been played, one at home and two away, and all three won. In each of these three games we have scored two goals. It seems to be a pattern of things lately that we are scoring our goals in the first half and managing to defend for the remainder of the game. Most of you saw the game here against Queens Park Rangers, so we shall not dwell on this particular match. Having had a good match against Exeter at The Den early on, we knew we would have a hard time at Exeter and be happy to secure at least a point. While the Exeter side did not play quite so well as they did at The Den, they did play much harder, and as a result we finished with three casualties. Luckily none of these were of a very bad nature, merely what one associates with the game itself, and all three players were more or less fit to resume for the game at Southend two days later. Here again we expected a rare tussle, especially after the seasiders had thrashed York City at York in their previous game. However, the pattern repeated itself in as much as we got two early goals in the first half. Southend did try to penetrate us in the second half, but at no time did they look like scoring. Whatever the defence missed, there was always the capable hands of Alex Stepney to deal with the danger. Alex at the moment is playing as well as anyone in the country. Recently much has been written in the Press regarding Alex Stepney and ourselves. It would seem that the Press know a great deal more than we do ourselves. As yet we have not been approached for Alex, and even if we were, we would not at this time dream of parting with him. We are only interested in buying good players, not selling. Should the opportunity arise whereby we can improve the side with a player at a reasonable price, this shall be done, but until such time as the player we require is available, then we shall hold our horses.

BEHAVIOUR OF SPECTATORS

We are very much concerned about the behaviour of the Boys and Youthful element. After our London Challenge Cup-Tie with Arsenal at The Den a week ago last Monday a large number of youngsters invaded the pitch, threw corner flags away and hung on the goal nets doing much damage. We like to see the youngsters enjoy themselevs, but we will not tolerate at any price the sheer hooliganism as displayd on this occasion. This is not the first time we have had to speak about the behaviour of the youngsters. AND THIS IS OUR LAST WARNING. AT NO TIME, BEFORE, DURING OR AFTER A GAME MUST BOYS ENCROACH ON THE PITCH. IF IT HAPPENS AGAIN, THEN WE SHALL CHARGE FULL PRICE FOR ADMISSION TO ALL BOYS. MORE-OVER, THE POLICE HAVE INSTRUCTIONS TO ESCORT ANY CUL-PRIT FROM THE GROUND. WE APPEAL TO THE ADULT SPEC-TATORS TO RESTRAIN ANY BOYS WHO MAKE ANY ATTEMPT TO GET ON THE PITCH. REMEMBER THIS IS OUR LAST WARNING.
