



A player who keeps finding the net can be worth his weight in gold to a side—and that's just what Tony Field was to Barrow last season when promotion was achieved.

The dozen goals he scored, from only 22 appearances, were all important ones and now he must be riding on the crest of a wave, yet twelve months ago his footballing future looked far from bright.

Rejected by Halifax after three seasons with them, he only came to Barrow on a month's trial, had it extended another four weeks, and was later signed on as a full-timer.

And his goal-scoring feats last season were no surprise really, for he has shown his "golden" touch in the past.

In fact when he played for Illingworth United in the Halifax Under-16 League, he notched 75 goals from only 25 games.

This was noted by officials at The Shay and the former Halifax Boys' forward was offered professional terms when he was 17. He showed his form in the Reserves with 22 goals in his first season to be top scorer in the highly competetive North Regional League.

However, in the following two years he was in and out more out than in—of the Halifax League side and their pattern of play didn't present him with many goalscoring chances. They probably assumed his "touch" had gone, and their loss has certainly been Barrow's gain.

Now aged 21 and standing 5 ft. 8½ ins. (he's particular about that half inch), Tony's main interest outside football is golf, but he had an unusual hobby when on Halifax's books—he worked at times as a hairdresser's model.

ON THE FACE OF IT!

On the face of it, the magazine proprietor offering £1,000 to the player who breaks Dixie Dean's record 60 League goals in a season is doing football a good turn. The more goals, the better the game.

But League football is essentially a team game and no matter how talented an individual his

success is built on the efforts of ten team mates.

It is this obstacle which is a primary reason why sponsorship still has not arrived on the contemporary football scene, even though cricket, swimming, golf, show jumping and many other top sports events are virtually subsidised by large advertising interests.

Obviously many people in the advertising world cast envious eyes at the lucrative football world. Tentative approaches have already been made to the Football Association and the Foot-

ball League. But little progress has been made.

The problem is that sponsorship often means the promotion of individual rewards rather than the promotion of the game as a whole. The Football League is keen to discover a way of sponsorship which will help its clubs, particularly the smaller clubs, rather than individuals. No way round this difficulty has yet been sugested to them.

Sports which have acceded to the glittering promises of sponsorship have discovered that control of their own affairs has been gradually whittled away by agents handling what seems to be

an advertising rather than a sponsorship medium.

League football, as well as the game as a whole, has to be extra careful that in return for the dubious financial benefits that advertising interests would bestow, it would not lose its birth-

right.

Nevertheless, the League Management Committee is prepared, even anxious, to listen to any approach which would bring sponsorship without advertising ties for the benefit of the League's 92 clubs. If they were satisfied that a workable idea had been presented they would be quite happy to confer with the Football Association.

It is even now prepared to discuss with any large concern the promotion of a substantial cash prize for the best behaved set of League club supporters in the land. Obviously the award of, say, a £10,000 prize for ground and supporter amenities, could have some significance in relation

to the problems of hooliganism.

Already a firm of sportswear manufacturers is using Football League Review, the League's

official journal, to promote a team of the Week award to local amateur clubs.

The firm reports double sales since their campaign began. It is on these lines that the pos-

sibility of sponsorship in League Football seems, at the moment, likely to take shape.

News that a Third Division club chairman is seeking the support of other Third and Fourth Division clubs in a move against the League's £500 signing-on levy for free transfers and first-time signings comes as a surprise. It was to help the smaller clubs that the rule was introduced last Spring.

And it came into being in place of the signing-on fee which clubs large and small alleged was

cripling the game.

The signing-on fee hit the small clubs hard. In the three close seasons months of May, June and July, 1965, for example, it cost the clubs in the lower divisions more than it did those in Divisions One and Two. Here are the facts:

A total of £86,203 was paid out. And every penny went out of football—to the players.

and their supporting organisations.

Some clubs in the lower divisions are said to feel that the fee is forcing talent out of the game because they cannot afford to pay it. They are also alleging that non-League clubs are snapping up talent because League clubs cannot pay signing-on bonuses. Surely they cannot have it both ways, If they cannot afford to pay the ± 500 levy they cannot pay signing-on fees to players.

Nor is it fair to suggest that the Provident Fund is not now necessary. This provides players with ten per cent of their wages every year as a post-career pick-up. The percentage was increased this year as part of a bargain between League and P.F.A. when the signing-on bonus was scrapped. Remember this. In the main it is the players of the Third and Fourth Division clubs who benefit most from the Provident Fund.

The payment of £500 fees to former apprentices and new players may well be a burden to some clubs. What the League feel is that the burden of signing-on fees, with its attendant incentive to disloyal players, was an even greater encumbrance.
