



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MANAGER'S NOTES



Good Afternoon Ladies and Gentlemen.

Since my previous notes we have gained four more points from two victories, to bring us into second place in Division Three, and so enhance our promotion prospects to the Second Division. Both victories were well deserved, and the team on the whole is playing well, and it is well within their capabilities for them not only to gain promotion but to win the Championship. If we can avoid injuries, I sincerely hope the players gain the prize they so richly deserve.

It was also very pleasing to everyone connected with the Club to see the big improvement in the gates, moreso in the match against Northampton Town, and I cannot stress too much the encouragement which could be forthcoming from

the supporters to spur the lads on in their final efforts during the next few games. I can assure you I speak from experience when I tell you it is a great source of encouragement to any player during any match in which he plays.

I feel that the Easter programme will eventually sort out the most likely ones to be in the running with three matches in five days; it is always a stiff period, and we ourselves have to play two out of three away from home, with Shrewsbury having to play Bury twice. I know everybody will be interested in the outcome of these games.

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
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Today we welcome our friends and opponents from Swindon Town, who are themselves still not out of the promotion race, and it should prove an interesting battle for the boys. I am confident our team is capable of taking two points today if we play up to form, but it must be remembered that we have not beaten Swindon since we have been in Division Three. Last season's game resulted in a draw at the Manor Ground and the previous year we were beaten by them, so may be third time lucky for us. Although their away form has followed the same pattern as our own over the season, they could still come in with a strong challenge no matter who they have to play. The return game will be on Easter Tuesday at Swindon with a 7.30 kick-off.

Our Reserve team on Saturday last gained a very good point from Bristol City Reserves, and with three young amateurs in the side from the South-East Counties League, this was a very creditable performance, as they are far the most experienced team in the Combination and this is the first point we have taken from them in four games we have played this season. I may add that the Reserve game with Brighton which should have been played tomorrow at the Manor Ground has now been cancelled at the request of our opponents, and has now been re-arranged for Monday, 29 April.

It was also pleasing to see our Youth Team gain a 5-1 away win at Bexley and in view of the fact that several of our Youth players were either injured or playing with the Reserves, it was a much better performance than I had expected.

With a view to strengthening our Youth Team for next season, a trial game was held at the Manor Ground on Sunday last and two or three of the trialists came through with very promising performances, and I am always grateful for any recommendations I receive of any young players or schoolboys that anyone may see on their travels around the districts, and I will only be too delighted to follow up on such recommendations.

Following up on the notes in a couple of National newspapers at the weekend re certain of our players, this is not true, and we have no intention at the present time of releasing either Brian Sherratt or Mick Kearns. We require these players for our own future.

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OUR VISITORS

SWINDON TOWN

Today's game is the first of two very vital Easter engagements with Swindon Town, who, like ourselves, hope to achieve promotion when the final reckoning is made. The Wiltshire club, of course, are no strangers to Second Division football, though their initial venture in the higher sphere was short-lived. After winning promotion in 1962-63, as runners-up to Northampton Town, they finished their first season in Division Two in fourteenth position, but slumped the following season to twenty-first, mainly due to their poor away record. That season they took only six points from away engagements, the lowest return of any club in all four divisions. Yet, when the season concluded they were only one point 'light'. As things turned out, if they had won their concluding home game they would have been safe. Instead, they were held to a 2-2 draw by Preston North End, and with two subsequent away games being lost, Swindon's brief association with the

Second Division unfortunately came to an end. In the two subsequent campaigns they have finished seventh and eighth in their present company. What the current season holds for them remains to be seen, but we hope to take two points from them this afternoon, and our players will be all out to gain something also from the visit to the Wiltshire club's ground next Tuesday.

Swindon's away record this season is somewhat similar to our own, with a preponderance of draws. Their two victories have been at Oldham (2-0) and Shrewsbury (1-0), with draws at Barrow, Orient, Bury, Mansfield, Southport, Brighton, Torquay and Peterborough.

Of their nine away defeats, the heaviest have been by only a two-goal margin, when losing 1—3 at Gillingham and 0—2 at Stockport, Northampton and Watford. The others have been by 1—2 at Reading, Colchester, and Bournemouth, and 2—3 at Walsall and Tranmere.

The Wiltshire club has made comparatively few changes in personnel this season, and of the nineteen players utilized, four have made only nine League appearances between them. Peter Downsborough, formerly of Halifax, has been the most frequent choice in goal, though Bob Jones has been there in recent games, while Rodney Thomas and Norman Trollope have rarely been separated in the full-back berths. Trollope's record since making his debut for the Wiltshire club in August 1960, just after his seventeenth birth-

day, is amazing. He missed two games that season, then returned an everpresent record in each of the following six campaigns, and is still, at the time of writing, adding another ever-present certificate to this. He played his 300th consecutive League game last December, and today is on the verge of 350 League outings, a splendid achievement for a player who is still some months short of his twenty-fifth birthday. It is a tribute alike to his ability, consistency, and also his good fortune in escaping injury.

The half-back line of Joe Butler (ex-Newcastle United), Welsh international Mel Nurse, formerly of Swansea and Middlesbrough, and Liverpoolborn Stan Harland, whose career has embraced Everton, Bradford City and Carlisle, is a sound and competent one, as good as any in the Division.

The outside-right position is the only one where there have been changes

of any real frequency. Here five players have donned the No. 7 shirt this season, the most frequent choice being newcomer Don Heath, who was signed from Norwich City last September. His inside-right partner, Peter Noble, is also a newcomer this season, signed from Newcastle United in January, prior to which this berth was occupied by Willie Penman, also ex-Newcastle. Centre-forward Pat Terry is a much-travelled player whose past service has been at Charlton, Newport, Gillingham, Northampton, Millwall and Reading, from whom he was signed in March last year. Roger Smart was regular choice at inside-left until dropping out through injury early last month. He resumed on 30 March, after Butler and Owen Dawson had temporarily filled the breach. At outside-left is the brilliant England 'Under-23' player Don Rogers, a local product who has been a most prolific scorer in recent seasons, being top marksman last season with 25 League goals.

Swindon's scorers are Rogers, who has netted 20 goals in League matches and three in Cup-ties, and Pat Terry, whose 18 comprise 15 in the League and 3 in the F.A. Cup. Nobody else is anywhere near double figures, Harland and Butler being nearest with 4 each, then Smart (3) and Trollope (2).

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Smallest post-war debit. Manchester City have only to maintain their current good defensive record to finish with the lowest total of 'goals against' in any post-war First Division season. So far their lowest in a senior campaign over the last twenty-two years was when conceding 47 exactly twenty years ago, finishing only tenth because the attack could muster no more than 52.

Marked contrast. The difference in scoring between Birmingham's right and left wingers has been most marked. Barry Bridges, their No. 7, has netted 25 times in League and Cup matches up to last week, against 3 from players figuring in the No. 11 berth.

* * * * *

All iterative marksmen. Sharkey, Stringfellow, Sjoberg, Sinclair, Svarc, and even goalkeeper Shilton have all scored for Leicester City this season. Torquay's marksmen include Bond, Baxter, Benson, Brown, Binney and Barnes.

Long service. Not many Fourth Division players can boast a one-club career lasting as long as that of Exeter City centre-half Keith Harvey. Now on the eve of completing sixteen years as a professional with Exeter, Harvey has just passed the 450 mark in League appearances alone.

* * * * *

Contrasting spells. No player has such contrasting fortunes as a marksman this season as Walsall outside-left Colin Taylor. He scored 11 goals in the Sadlers' first fifteen League matches, then drew a blank in his next twenty-one outings, though he scored once in a Cup-tie.

* * * * *

Coventry contrast. Coventry City prevented their opponents from scoring in only one of their first twenty-six League matches. Since then they have kept a clean sheet in four of their last nine games.

* * * * *

Chesterfield's decline. In mid-December Chesterfield headed the Fourth Division with four points in hand over their nearest rivals. But what a change has come over the season since. The Derbyshire club has averaged well under a point a game from their last sixteen fixtures.

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The above has been quoted in answer to many enquiries should the club be fortunate enough to conclude the season as champions, but having satisfied this curiosity, let's get there, please.

Quote from a Wiltshire newspaper dated 1904, retrieved from the back of a picture frame. 'Although total abstinence is practised nowadays in almost every football team by one or more members, it is seldom one comes across a club, the players in which are all teetotallers. The Directors of West Ham United, however, believe in teetotalism to such an extent that one of the conditions of the agreement drawn up with their players is that the latter shall be total abstainers.' Passed to the West Ham club for its attention.
