BLUES NEWS

Tonight we extend greetings to Swindon Town, who come to Priestfield as divisional leaders and League Cup finalists at Wembley in 10 days' time. Our trip to the County Ground last Tuesday will long remain in the memory of the Gillingham players and the tiny band of supporters who travelled to Wiltshire. It must be said that the Swindon side conducted themselves perfectly throughout the gruelling 99 minutes. They played with a confidence born of success, but at no time did they become arrogant, nor did they commit breaches of the written or unwritten code.

History shows (with one notable exception) that 40 points is sufficient for safety in Division III, and with the dropped home point last Saturday, we fell slightly behind schedule. The tension reveals itself in the plague of injuries and other misfortunes which have come our way during the past few weeks. The top sides go gaily on, week after week, using a squad of 12 or 13 players, avoiding all the hazards that regularly befall the the lesser mortals like ourselves.

Since the war we have won 10 and drawn one of the 11 encounters at Priestfield, scoring 23 goals and conceding only four. We can ill afford to spoil our fine record this evening.

SPOTLIGHT ON . . .

KEN OSBORN

A former apprentice-professional with Queens Park Rangers, Ken joined the playing staff at the Stadium in June, 1966 as a full-timer. He made a few appearances with the Youth side in his first season and scored a hat trick from inside forward in one of his first games, a Cup match at the Stadium. Since then Ken has made the reserve no. 7 shirt his own, having played on the right wing 75 times in his two and a half seasons in the second team. His wing play has made him a feared goal-maker, although he's only been able to notch two himself.

Ken is a Bethnal Green lad, born there on 23rd November, 1948, and was educated at Daneford School, where he started his football career, playing for the school juniors and representing East London Schools at centre-forward. In his last school year he was elected for Middlesex and London Boys at outside-right.

A disappointment to one or two "Gills" fans is news that Ken is engaged to marry a Bethnal Green girl, in a year or so.

Ken's favourite team is West Ham United and says "they've improved a lot since they bought Alan Stephenson from Palace". Likes the set-up at Gillingham and his ambition is to win a regular first team place here.

TALKING ABOUT SWINDON...

Swindon Town were formed in 1881 by the Reverend W. Pitt, as an amateur organisation, but turned professional in 1894. The club was a founder member of the Southern League, taking the championship in 1911 and 1914. They used the Croft as their home ground until 1896, when they moved to their present headquarters at the County Ground, which held a record 28,582 for the visit of West Ham United in 1967.

Special mention must be made of the Robins' fantastic performances in the Cup competitions. On Saturday week, of course, they meet Arsenal, at Wembley in the Final of the Football League Cup, having conquered Torquay, Bradford City, Blackburn, Coventry, Derby and Burnley. The "Moonrakers", as they are also known hit the headlines in 1966-67 with their F.A. Cup victory over West Ham and then twice holding Nottingham Forest to a draw. Twice, in 1910 and 1912 the Town, as a Southern League side reached the semi-finals before being dismissed. Their impressive list of victories over First Division sides include: Manchester United (twice), Tottenham, Everton, Arsenal, Burnley (twice), Stoke, Sheffield United (twice), and Newcastle.

Manager Danny Williams has his eyes set on a "Queens Park Rangers" double, and it can be argued that their lengthy interest in the Cups during recent years has cost them promotion.

However in the F.A. Cup this term, after narrow victories over Canterbury City and Grantham, Swindon were surprisingly beaten at home by the goal happy men from Southend.

Elected to the Third Division (South) on its formation in 1920, they won their first fixture 9-1 at home to Luton. The Town were also founder members of the new Division Three in 1958 and gained promotion by finishing runners-up to Northampton in 1962-63, but were relegated after only two seasons. Again on the more dismal side, Swindon were forced to go cap in hand and seek re-election in 1933, 1956 and 1957.

Rod Thomas is the only member of the present playing staff with a full international cap, but all four home countries have previously been represented by Swindon players. Grenville Morris gained 21 caps for Wales, Harold Fleming nine for England and John Walker and Norman Uprichard played for Scotland and Wales respectively.
