
WELCOME & CONGRATULATIONS

TO-DAY'S VISITORS

What a splendid finale to our home programme this season to welcome to Fellows Park Swindon Town, who when really "on their game" are surely the best Division III side of all time. There have been "giant-killers" before, but no other team has "slain" teams of the calibre of Coventry, Derby, Burnley and Arsenal in one and the same competition. This is what our visitors did on their way to taking this season's League Cup and did it moreover by sheer quality football. They are, of course, also in the thick of the promotion struggle and we wish them well in their quest of a rare "double."

HISTORY

Founded in 1881, they adopted professionalism and joined the Southern League in 1894. They became founder members of Division III (South) in 1920 and survived three re-election applications between the wars. They were drafted into Division III in the re-organisation in 1958 and promotion came at the end of 1962/3 when they

finished runners-up to Northampton Town. Two years later they were relegated alongside Swansea Town, but since then they have been looking more and more like having the best results in the history of the club and this season they have certainly "arrived."

HERE TODAY

Manager DANNY WILLIAMS is, of course, the former stalwart Rotherham defender, and he has certainly been a worthy successor to Bert Head, now with Crystal Palace. Both have been firm believers in a youth policy as the basis of ultimate success and it is good to see a handsome dividend being paid.

Goalkeeper Peter DOWNSBOROUGH,
who gave a world-beating display in the
League Cup final came from Halifax in
1965. At full-back choice rests between
Youth International from Portsmouth
Owen DAWSON, Welsh International
Rod THOMAS and loyal clubman John
TROLLOPE (over 350 appearances in 9
seasons).

The usual sheet-anchor of the defence is Scotsman Frank BURROWS, who came from Scunthorpe after previous service with Raith Rovers. Another man



Walsall v. Swindon

Honours have been fairly even in our post-war meetings with Swindon Town holding a slight advantage before today's game. Of the 33 games played, they have won 14 to our 11 with 8 drawn and they have scored 45 goals to our 43. There have been some splendidly fought games, as the following reminders indicate.

1955-56

This was the season in which we got back into our stride after 4 consecutive re-election applications. In September, we won at the County Ground in a game made remarkable by the fact that all three goals came in a 3-minute flurry. After an hour's play Dave Walsh gave us the lead and after Gibson had equalised almost immediately Dave restored our lead two minutes later. On a veritable Fellows Park gluepot in the following January we completed the double with a 4—0 win. Tony Richards netted in the first half and Dave Walsh (2) and Brian Taylor after the break.

1957-58

This was the last season of the old Third (South) and here in November Bob Edwards gave Town a 30-second lead. Ken Hodgkisson equalised near half-time and there was no further scoring. In the return match the following March our lads gave one of the most courageous displays in the club's history. At the time Swindon had gone 26 home games without defeat. John Richards gave them the lead and after Roy Faulkner had equalised Bob Edwards made it 2—1 at half-time. Again we equalised when Brian Taylor smashed the ball in off a defender. Then with 15 minutes to go spectators were amazed to see our giant goalkeeper John Savage ordered off after a collision with John Richards, and a penalty awarded. Amazingly Tony Richards, who had taken big John's jersey, dived full length to make a remarkable save and in a fantastic ending Brian Taylor robbed a defender and went on to score the decider and give us a 3-2 win.

1960-61

This proved ultimately to be our promotion year, but we suffered the season's firstd efeat when Cliff Jackson scored the only goal of the game at Swindon on September 3. The return game in

January was abandoned through fog with us leading 3—0 and when the game was rearranged 2 goals by Tony Richards in reply to one by Bobby Woodruffe gave us a priceless 2 points. John Trollope is the only survivor of that team in today's Town side and he was playing alongside Ernie Hunt, Mike Summerbee and Bobby Woodruff. In the following week's programme Jim Tatler wrote "More will be heard of these lads as they gain experience!"

1965-66

After a goalless draw at Swindon in the September. Town came here in February, the week after our unlucky defeat in a great Cup-tie at Norwich. Our lads showed no sign of hangover as Ken Satchwell steered home a through ball after 25 seconds. Taylor netted from an acute angle, and Riley went past three defenders to slam home a third by half-time. Further goals by Riley and Taylor completed the 5—0 rout. From the following teams who played that day it will be seen how much less Swindon's personnel has changed than our own.

Walsall: Carling; Gregg, Harris; Sissons, Bennett, Atthey; Riley, Summers, Satchwell, Kirby, Taylor.

Swindon: Downsbrough; Dawson, Trollope; Morgan, Nurse, Richards; Henderson, Smart, East, Rogers, Weaver.

1967-68

Both teams were at their best in the September game here and all-out attack seemed to be the motive of both sides. We scored 2 splendid goals in 20 mins. Jimmy Murray cracked home a 25-yarder from Jimmly McMorran and then laid on a second for Colin Taylor. After the interval Swindon came back with a bang and after Stan Harland had slipped through an offside trap to make it 2—1 Don Rogers cracked home a 30-yarder. We seemed to be having a struggle to hold on to a point, but against the run of play somewhat Jimmy Murray nodded the winner.




