

Pride of the West Country

FOOTBALL history is indeed being made today, by the first-ever appearance of Swindon Town's senior side at Filbert Street. Neither in League nor Cup have the clubs' paths crossed at this ground until now.

The new chapter was opened at Swindon last September, when we gathered our 14th point of the season at the County Ground. Peter Noble, Town's leading marksman, scored following a corner kick in the 49th minute and the Leicester equaliser came, with ten minutes to spare, from Len Glover, taking on Paul Matthews' pass.

Swindon are the outstanding example of the new order in League football, the levelling in standards to which our manager, Frank O'Farrell, has often referred.

From a settled existence in the Third Division, they have sprung into the forefront of the game, showing the capacity to beat supposedly higher class teams by football ability.

The Cup Trail

This Swindon flair swept them to the final of the League Cup last season, and here is a reminder of the route they followed: First round, Torquay United (home) 2—1; second round, Bradford City (away) 1—1, replay 4—3; third round, Blackburn (home) 1—0; fourth round, Coventry City (away) 2—2, replay 3—0; quarter final, Derby County (away) 0—0, replay 1—0; semi-final, Burnley, first leg (away) 2—1, second leg 1—2, replay at West Bromwich, 3—2; Final, at Wembley, Swindon 3 (Rogers 2, Smart), Arsenal 1 (Gould).

Most of those Finalists will be on view here, the Wembley line-up being: Downsborough; Thomas, Trollope; Butler, Burrows, Harland; Heath, Smart, Smith, Noble, Rogers. Sub. Penman.

The season ended with Swindon gaining the expected rise to Division Two — they were previously in this section for two seasons, 1963-64-65 — and thereby giving soccer in the west country a double fillip.

Reserves have the record-breaking look . .

It is sometimes said that reserve football holds little incentive, especially for the older player. Our Reserves are giving the lie to this, with a string of fine displays during which they may well have established a record. Anyway, eight wins off the reel sounds very much like a club record to me.

It's a capital run which has sparked off an exciting new mood among second team trainer David Coates and his players, and has put the club in line for Combination Cup honours, as well as keeping them close on the heels of leaders Spurs in the league chart.

It began with a 4-0 beating of Luton at home on November 8th, followed by further home wins against Q.P.R. 2-1 and Reading 5-0, and away successes against Southampton 2-1 and Swindon 2-0. Next came the distinction of being the first conquerors of Spurs Reserves in any competition this term — 2-1 at Filbert Street in the Cup. Another 4-0 slamming of Luton, on their ground, and the 2-1 return at Walsall last week took the sequence to eight.

The line-up has, of course, varied according to first team requirements, but much credit goes to the core of regulars on duty in most of the matches, with skipper Derek Harrison at No. 5 in all of them.

Not only has the series boosted team morale; it has inspired several good individual performances that should strengthen claims to senior recognition. And let us not forget that David Tearse earned his chance by consistent football with the reserves which opened the way to similar play in the higher grade — an example we earnestly hope to see fol-

lowed in the not too distant future.

At the outset, I spoke of incentive. David Coates makes the encouraging comment: "When a player has come to

us from the first team, he has always played hard for the side, as well as for himself".

While on the theme of youthful prowess, I draw your attention to the high placing of our Intermediate League side, also gaining more than their share of victories.

UNFAIR TO A BIG-HEARTED PLAYER

Any player who wears a Leicester City jersey should be guaranteed the full, unqualified backing of those who call themselves City supporters.

This is the view of our manager, Frank O'Farrell, which he is moved to express after a disappointment for him in the Cup-tie with Sunderland.

He says: "I was upset by the treatment meted out to Mike Stringfellow, and took him out of the game because of this. I thought it grossly unfair to a great-hearted player who is making a courageous effort to play himself back into League football. Too many people seem to have forgotten that Mike underwent two cartilage operations on one knee, and those who know anything about this type of football injury need no telling that the come-back process is extremely difficult, both physically and mentally.

"What a pity memories are so short. Mike has given us yeoman service, as 100 per cent trier and goalscorer, and has earned plenty of cheers for his sheer guts, in the face of tough opposition, which he has overcome so often in the past. He is one of those who gets more than his share of stick, but never complains.

"I must also point out that his challenge was largely responsible for our winning goal in the Cup match, a vital factor that seems to have been overlooked by those who booed Mike at the end.

"Most of you may be ignorant of the fact that his problem was aggravated by an injury to his other knee recently. This put an added strain on the troubled knee that was by no means welcome at such a time".

The late David Halliday

All connected with Leicester City offer their sympathy to Mrs David Halliday and family on the death, recently, of her husband, who was our manager from June, 1956 to November, 1958.

Mr Halliday died in Aberdeen, where he had managed the Aberdeen Football Club with conspicuous success before taking the Leicester appointment, and after leaving football had become an hotelier.

In his first season as manager of a League club in England, he had the satisfaction of leading us to the 1956-57 championship of Division Two, and that, indeed, was our last term in the lower section until the current season.

A celebrated centre-forward of his time, Scotsman Halliday shared in a record-breaking occasion at Filbert Street, where, on April 21st, 1930, he scored four of Arsenal's goals in the 6-6 draw with City that was one of the two top scoring encounters here.

Town have passed their Second Division test

After winning promotion last season, Swindon Town's feelings were summed up by their left-half and captain, Stan Harland. "As far as I am concerned, we are still a Division Three side until we have proved ourselves in the Second Division", he said.

Even the sceptical Liverpoolian must now feel that his team have achieved this objective.

Until just before Christmas, Swindon did not, in fact, drop below sixth position, and although they have slipped a little lately, they still occupy quite a healthy place among their new company.

Wembley Triumph

It would be true to say that the Wiltshire club have lost a little of the confidence and authority which flavoured their play last term, and enabled them to couple their promotion win with a great triumph, in carrying off the Football League Cup by beating Arsenal 3-1 at Wembley last March.

Much of this slight decline in their powerful attacking approach to the game stemmed from the fact that Don Rogers, their brilliant outside left, was forced to miss six successive matches because of a troublesome hamstring injury to his right leg.

Since dropping a home point to Leicester City — or, rather, Peter Shilton — on September 27th, Swindon have scored fine 2-1 home wins over Sheffield United and

Huddersfield, both of whom visited the County Ground in the capacity of Division Two leaders. In fact, the Town were defending an unbeaten home record this season when they entertained visiting Queen's Park Rangers last Saturday.

Six Away Draws

In away matches, Swindon have not fared so well. Their only two wins have been at Aston Villa, 2-0 and Bolton, 1-0. But, they have collected points from draws at Cardiff, Middlesbrough, Carlisle, Watford, Oxford and Charlton.

Perhaps their best away feat came a fortnight ago, however, when they scored a fine 4-0 victory at Blackburn in the third round of the F.A. Cup.

With Division 4 Chester as their fourth round opponents at Swindon, it seems — on paper — that last season's League Cup winners could find this term's F.A. Cup competition quite a lucrative proposition.

ROGER SMART (Right Half or Inside Forward). Born Swindon. Another local player who joined the club direct from Swindon Schoolboys. A versatile player. 5ft. 11½ins. 12st. 11lb.

FRANK BURROWS (Centre Half). Born Larkhall, Scotland. Joined the club from Scunthorpe United. Formerly with Raith Rovers. 6ft. 1in. 12st. 8lb.

STAN HARLAND (Left Half, Captain). Born Liverpool. From Carlisle United in July, 1966. Formerly with Everton and Bradford City. He has been a regular choice at left-half since making his debut at the beginning of the 1966-67 season. 6ft. 12st. 5lb.

DON ROGERS (Winger). Born Paul-ton. Signed by Swindon when 15 and quickly came to the fore. Gained many England youth international caps and subsequently played in the England Under-23 team. Club's top scorer last season. 5ft. 10½ins. 12st. 10lb.

DON HEATH (Outside right). Born Stockton. Signed from Norwich in September, 1967. Formerly with Middlesbrough. 5ft. 8ins. 11st. 8lb.

WILLIE PENMAN (Inside Forward). Born Wemyss, Fife. Signed from Newcastle United in September, 1966 for a considerable fee. Formerly with Glasgow Rangers. 5ft. 8ins. 10st. 10lb.

PETER NOBLE (Inside Forward). Born Sunderland. Joined the club from Newcastle in January, 1968 for whom he played for four years. 5ft. 8ins. 10st. 10lb.

JOHN SMITH (Inside Forward). Born London. Signed from Torquay in June, 1968 and previously played for Leyton Orient, West Ham United, Tottenham and Coventry. Former England Under-23 international. 5ft. 8ins. 13st.

CHRIS JONES (Centre Forward). Born Altrincham. Centre forward signed from Manchester City. 5ft. 11ins. 11st. 12lb.

ARTHUR HORSFIELD (Inside Forward). Born Newcastle. A close season signing from Newcastle United. Previously played for Middlesbrough whom he joined as a Youth International. 5ft. 11ins. 12st. 11lb.


