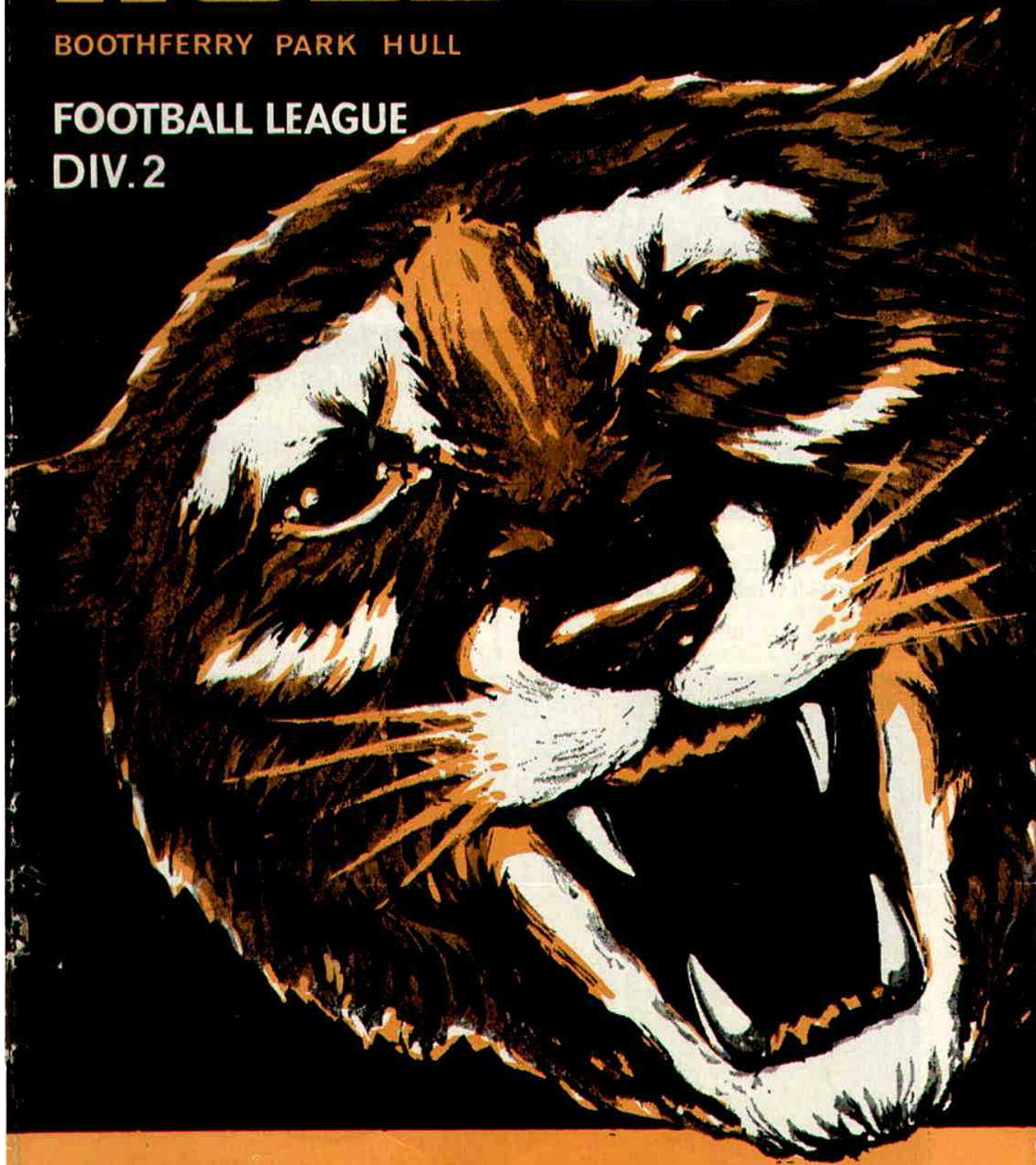

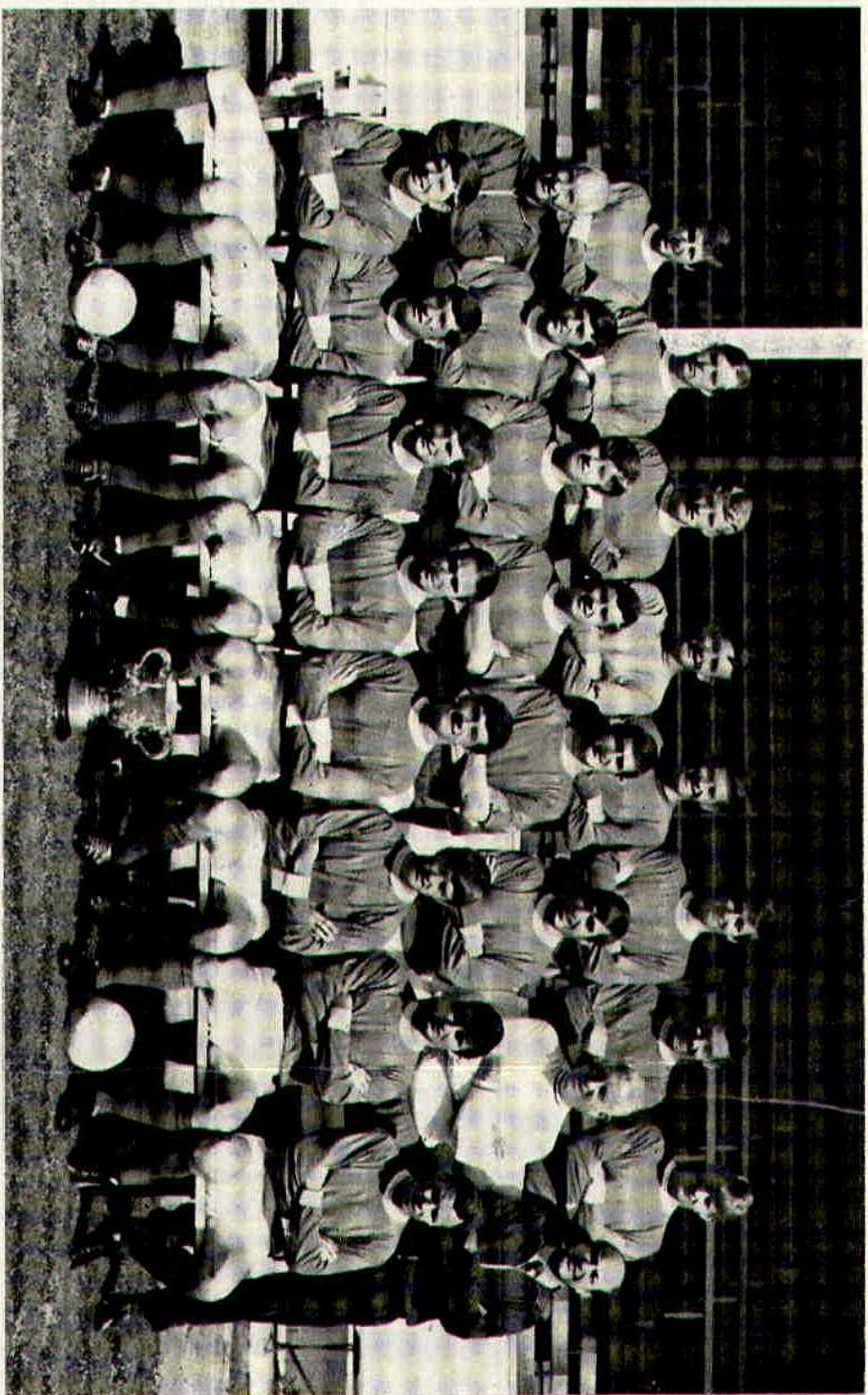

COMMENT

Most Hull City supporters do not need reminding that a visit to Deepdale usually provided just one result — a win for the home side. So last Saturday there was a fair amount of apprehension amongst our supporters as we once again faced the Lancashire side on their own ground. The reason for this apprehension was emphasised by the fact we had not gained a solitary point at Deepdale for 40 years. And of course at this particular stage of the season the points at stake in this match were of great importance to both teams, and it looked as though the Tigers would, on form, concede points to a team who, like ourselves, were battling to climb away from the relegation zone. After only four minutes play in the match at Preston the home side took the lead, and it appeared the 'Deepdale Depression' for the Tigers was to continue. It was a quick set-back which could have really shook the visitors beyond recovery had they allowed themselves to be panicked or worried by 'form.' Preston tried hard at this stage to put the game beyond the Tigers' reach, probably realising the psychological advantage they had gained through the early goal. But the visitors were not in any mood to be bothered by the early reverse and settled down to some constructive play. Conditions were not exactly ideal for the game. Driving wind and rain on a heavy playing surface, put premium on the skills of the game and mistakes were made by both sides. The Tigers' perseverance, however, paid off when Chris Simpkin scored for us to restore the balance, but unfortunately Tommy Wilson conceded an own goal to put the home team back in front and leave us trailing 1-2 at the interval. In the second half the Tigers faced the deficit with plenty of determination and Chris Chilton was on hand to finish off a good move by the Tigers and once again bring the scores level. Fortunes continued to fluctuate as the game progressed, and the result seemed to be going in the home side's favour after all when Spark put Preston in the lead for the third time. The Tigers, however, were not finished and Ken Wagstaff neatly rounded the home 'keeper to score our third goal and provide the visitors with a point. All in all this was a good point to take from Deepdale, and after being behind three times our team did well to keep in the game and eventually gain a well deserved point.

Introducing . . .

Swindon Town

Swindon's hopes of pulling off a fabulous Cup and promotion double were crushed last Saturday when the League Champions Leeds United inflicted on them a 2-0 home defeat in the F.A. Cup quarter-final. But the Wiltshire club still have a fine chance of moving up into Division One for the first time in its history and, should they pull this off, they would become the third team to rise from the Third to the First Division in successive seasons.

Their Cup knockout also ended dreams of becoming the first non-First Division side to play at Wembley in successive seasons. They are, of course, the current holders of the Football League Cup.

Memories of that wonderful Wembley victory over Arsenal last season will remain indelibly inscribed in the minds of all who saw it for many years. In one of the finest games ever played at Wembley, Swindon completely outplayed their First Division opponents to win 3-1 in extra time.

Swindon followed that triumph by crushing Italian first division side A.S. Roma 5-2 on aggregate in the first of what could become a series of challenge matches between the Italian and English League Cup winners. Swindon won their home leg in magnificent style, cruising to a 4-0 victory.

Today, back on League duty again, Swindon are hungry for League points which could take them into the First Division.

Swindon's side has shown few changes this season and, barring injuries, will almost certainly be chosen from the following players:—

PETER DOWNSBOROUGH (Goal-keeper). Peter was still an amateur when introduced to League football with Halifax Town. He turned professional in 1960 and joined Swindon for a nominal £3,000 fee five years later. Has been a magnificent performer in recent years, turning in a five-star show at Wembley last season.

League record: Halifax 148 appearances; Swindon 171 appearances; total 319 appearances.

ROD THOMAS (Right back). Rod is now first-choice at full-back for Wales. He is the only player in post-war soccer to win his first seven full caps while playing in Third Division football. Now he totals nine caps. Swindon picked Rod up from Gloucester City and put him in the senior side in 1965/66. Scored the first League goal of his career at Aston Villa this season.

League record: Swindon 150 appearances, 1 goal.

JOHN TROLLOPE (Left back). A Swindon discovery, John made his League debut in 1960 and remained in the side for an incredible run of 360 consecutive League games, the sequence ending when he broke an arm at Hartlepool last season. He's fully fit again now and ever-present this term.

League record: Swindon 407 (1) appearances, 13 goals.

JOE BUTLER (Right half). Joe entered League football with Newcastle United in 1963/4 and joined Swindon in 1965. He was originally a full-back but has switched, with considerable success, to wing half.

League record: Newcastle 3 appearances; Swindon 146 (1) appearances, 7 goals; total 149 (1) appearances, 7 goals.

FRANK BURROWS (Centre half). Frank left Raith Rovers to try his luck in English football with Scunthorpe United in 1965. In his last two campaigns, before joining Swindon in 1968, he missed only five League games and he has continued to perform consistently well since his move. Frank has missed only three games since he signed for the Wiltshire club.

League record: Scunthorpe 106 appearances, 4 goals; Swindon 73 appearances, 2 goals; total 179 appearances, 6 goals.

STAN HARLAND (Left half). Stan made several abortive attempts to break into professional football before he eventually succeeded. He was an amateur at Burnley, turned pro. with New Brighton then had a go with Everton — but he didn't make the League side. Bradford City gave him his League debut, then he spent two seasons at Carlisle before joining Swindon three years ago. Has made 158 consecutive League appearances for Swindon.

League record: Bradford City 120 appearances, 20 goals; Carlisle 77 appearances, 7 goals; Swindon 168 appearances, 6 goals; total 365 appearances, 33 goals.

JOHN SMITH (Outside right). A former England youth and under-23 cap, John kicked off with West Ham as a wing half. After holding a regular place for four years he moved to Tottenham in 1960 but was unable to command a regular League place with Spurs. Consequently, he shifted to Coventry City, then had short spells with Orient and Torquay before linking with Swindon in 1968.

League record: West Ham 125 appearances, 21 goals; Tottenham 21 appearances, 1 goal; Coventry 34 (1) appearances, 1 goal; Orient 38 (1) appearances, 3 goals; Torquay 68 appearances, 8 goals; Swindon 54 (3) appearances, 9 goals; total 340 (5) appearances, 43 goals.

DON HEATH (outside right). Don first signed professional for Middlesbrough but he never managed to get a League game with them. He moved on to Norwich City where he won himself a regular place in the senior team in 1964/5. For three years he was a member of the senior squad, then he shifted to Swindon in September 1967.

League record: Norwich 80 (3) appearances, 15 goals; Swindon 82 (6) appearances, 2 goals; total 162 (9) appearances, 17 goals.

ROGER SMART (Inside forward). Roger is a product of Swindon schools' football who got his first taste of League football in 1961/2. He helped Swindon into the Second Division for the first time in 1963 when he really began to establish himself as a regular and now looks back on over 250 League games for them.

League record: Swindon 271 appearances, 45 goals.

ARTHUR HORSFIELD (Centre forward). Swindon's leading scorer with 17 League and Cup goals this season. Middlesbrough spotted Arthur in Newcastle junior soccer and he continued his scoring ways in their reserve teams until given his chance in the League team in 1963/4. All told he scored 51 goals in 107 full League games for Middlesbrough — including 22 in 1966/7 — before he moved to Newcastle in January 1969. Swindon signed him last May.

League record: Middlesbrough 107 (4) appearances, 51 goals; Newcastle 7 (2) appearances, 3 goals; Swindon 29 appearances, 13 goals; total 143 (6) appearances, 67 goals.

TONS UP:

On the 18th November, 1967 the name of Ian McKechnie appeared on the Tigers 1st XI team sheet for the game against Aston Villa at Villa Park. It was the 45th time Ian had been selected for first team League duty. He had completed 41 games in season 1966/7 but the 1967/8 season had seen Maurice Swan occupying the 'keeper's position except for three matches in which Ian had played, until the Villa game. That match at Villa Park is now 100 League games away, and Ian has remained the Tigers' custodian for the whole of the intervening period. So to Ian we offer him our congratulations on reaching his 100th consecutive League appearance today.

For those who like details, here are a few facts regarding Ian's playing career. His 100 consecutive League games for us came as follows:—

Season 1967/8: 26 appearances.

1968/9: 42 and 1969/70: 31.

which together with today's match totals 100.

Altogether Ian has played in 155 League and Cup matches for Hull City and since becoming a professional player has totalled 240 games. These include the following:—

PETER NOBLE (Inside forward). A native of the north-east, Peter started with Newcastle and cost Swindon £10,000 in January 1968. This season he bagged hat-tricks in successive games against Charlton (League) and Swansea (League Cup).

League record: Newcastle 22 (3) appearances, 7 goals; Swindon 83 (4) appearances, 27 goals; total 105 (7) appearances, 34 goals.

CHRIS JONES (Inside forward) Chris developed in Manchester City's junior teams, rising to their First Division side in 1966/7. But he didn't manage to shift any of the big stars on a permanent basis so he moved to Swindon last season.

League record: Manchester City 6 (1) appearances, 2 goals; Swindon 26 (9) appearances, 11 goals; total 32 (10) appearances, 13 goals.

DON ROGERS (Outside left). An England under-23 international, Don has been a regular for six seasons and top scorer for the past three campaigns. This season he hasn't been on the mark so regularly — he has only six goals so far. Nevertheless many First Division clubs have made fabulous offers for him but so far Swindon have been able to hang on to one of their prize assets.

League record: Swindon 292 appearances, 113 goals.

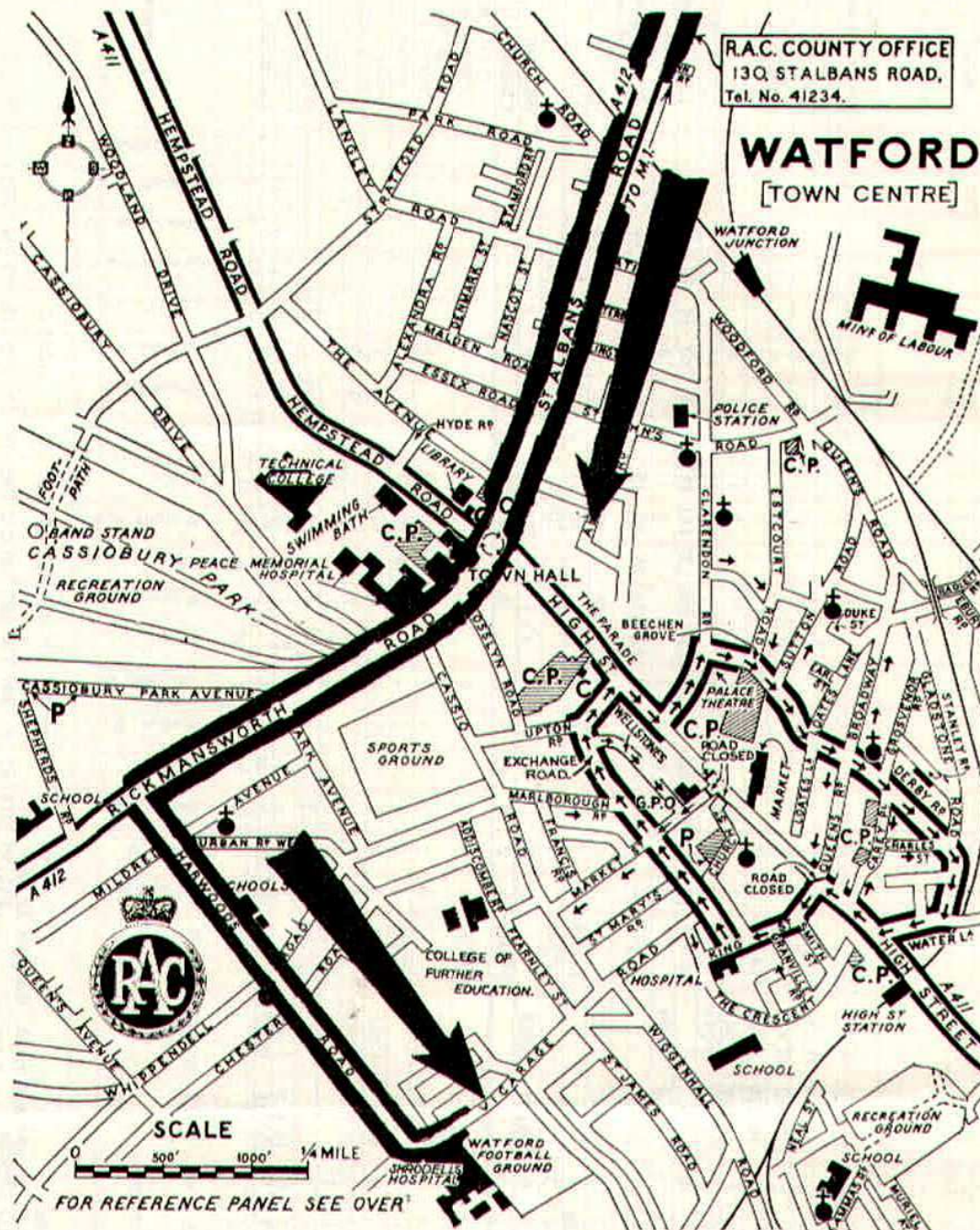

His total consecutive League and Cup appearances for the Tigers is now 108. It is somewhat ironical that on the day Ian commenced his run of 100 consecutive League games was the same day as former club skipper Andy Davidson made his last appearance in the Tigers' League side, and Andy is the only other Hull City player in the post-war history of the club to have completed 100 or more consecutive appearances for the Tigers' senior eleven.

Another Tiger celebrates a Ton Up today. Paddy Greenwood will be playing in his 100th League game for our club today. Paddy made his League debut, against Swindon Town at Swindon on the 8th January, 1966. Though this was to be his only senior game that season he had 10 games in 1966/7 and really made his mark in the first team the following season 1967/8 when he played in 39 matches. He followed this with 33 games last term and has so far completed 16 matches this season in the Tigers' League side.

Around and About Division Two

TIGERS BEAT DEEPPDALE HOODOO

It's no longer 'depressing Deepdale' for the Tigers. After a string of unhappy results on that ground our 3-3 draw last Saturday gave us our first point at Preston for 40 years! We had lost 12 of our previous 13 League games there and the only time we avoided defeat was in January 1930 when we won 2-1. It also extended our run to four away games without defeat.

For Preston, the loss of that home point provides them with more problems. With but one victory behind them in nine League games, the threat of relegation remains as large as ever. If they, and Aston Villa, who also dropped home points to Bristol City last Saturday, did go down to Division Three it would be a sad day for the clubs and English football, as both these famous clubs were original members of the Football League and the first two to win the Cup and League double.

Swindon, today's visitors, found the professionalism of Leeds United just a little over-aweing and their magnificent F.A. Cup run came to an end on their own County Ground last Saturday. But Watford, whom we visit next Friday, are still revelling very much in Cup glory.

Their splendid victory over Liverpool made them the 47th Second Division club to reach the semi-final stage. Now, but 90 minutes from Wembley, they must be reflecting upon the fate of previous Second Division semi-finalists — only five of them managed to overcome First Division opposition at the penultimate stage. Without their homely Vicarage Road surroundings, the Watford side could well find the lack of familiar atmosphere weighing heavily against them, but it may also be a case of 'Cometh the hour, cometh the men', and the men of Watford could well produce the result to shock their semi-final opponents, Chelsea.

Should Watford get to Wembley they would be the most unlikely of all finalists in F.A. Cup history. The only time such a lowly Second Division club has made the final was in 1949 when Leicester City battled their way there and then missed relegation to Division Three by only one point.

Their Cup run seems to have inspired them, particularly at home where they have been beaten only once — 1-0 by Blackpool — in their last nine Cup and League games. So we can expect a tough game as Watford strive desperately to rise up the table and we may find it difficult to record our first-ever victory at the Vicarage Road ground.

Elsewhere in the Second Division, the fight is really hotting up at both ends of the table. One of the strongest late runners at the top is Blackpool, whose 2-0 victory at Bolton took them to nine League games without defeat. All the top ten clubs can be considered serious contenders for promotion and, though the situation can change dramatically from week to week, Blackpool are currently performing more consistently than any of their nine rivals. Huddersfield and Swindon, both uncracked in eight League games, are only a short-head behind them.

Norwich shocked everyone by taking a point from Huddersfield on their own ground. Yet, was it such a shock? Any well-advised pools punter will tell you this was the Canaries' eighth draw in ten visits to Huddersfield and this was one shock draw no experienced gambler should have missed. Norwich's equaliser — from David Stringer two minutes from time — was only the second goal conceded by Huddersfield in their last 12 home League games.

Recent results have thrown up the intriguing possibility of the Second Division's two best supported teams finishing in the bottom two positions, something that surely has never occurred before. As hope recedes for Aston Villa, it has not gone unnoticed by sad Villa fans that their local rivals Birmingham City have won only once in 11 games and are now only three points above the 21st club. No city has ever had two clubs relegated together and we trust this fate will not befall the famous Midlands' city with the largest band of soccer followers in Division Two. After last Saturday the leading positions in the crowd charts were:—

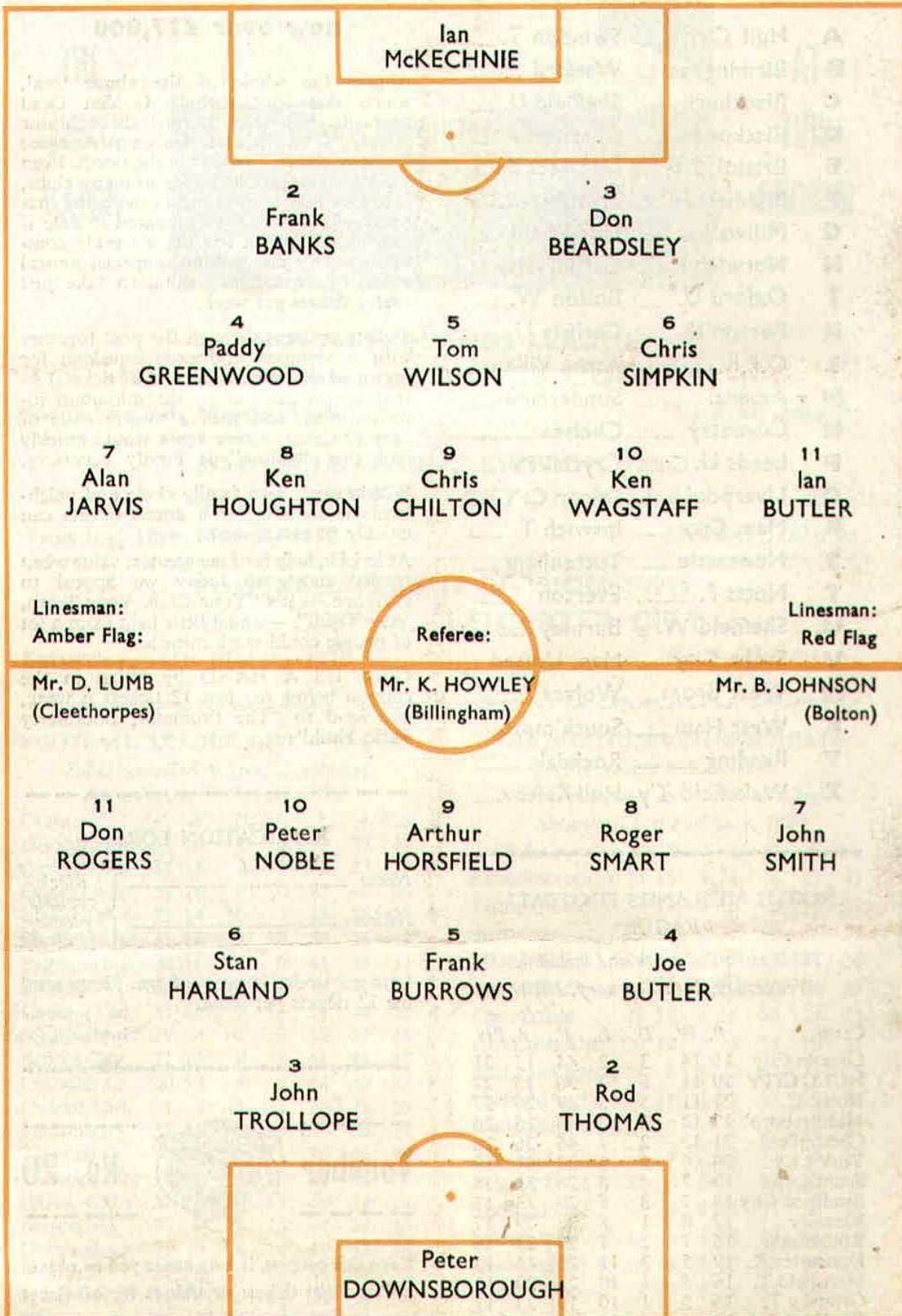
