Peter's Points

Here we go again . . . and you might say this is where I came in, ten years ago. Apart from my receding hair line such a lot has changed since I covered my first Sheffield United away match for the Green 'Un. That was at Norwich, the Blades drew 1-1, and went on to gain promotion.

It would be pleasant if this '70-'71 campaign had started with an away point or two at Orient. I can only hope that depressing result has reminded everyone of the need to take nothing for granted.

Yet I saw so much that was good at Aldershot and Derby in the Watney Cup, that one result which was a jar to everyone's pride is not going to swing me from my honest opinion . . . that United will win promotion this season.

Funnily enough, someone very close to the Lane affairs grinned last Saturday and said: "YOU haven't tipped us for promotion, have you?" As if I could put the Indian Sign on anyone . . .

Though wrong the season before last, when I fancied the Blades for an immediate return to Division One, I was right (but very nearly wrong) last season when I didn't think promotion was 'on'. So here's hoping I'm right this time.

Once again, this is a season where local pride means everything with Wednesday in the same Division. It is a tragedy it is not Division One, and I hope the day rivalry is resumed at this level is not too far away.

MORE THAN HOPE IS NEEDED

But as everyone knows, a rise in status is not brought about by hope. Good management, good players, good teamwork and a little luck are the foremost requirements and I reckon United did themselves a good turn before even a ball was kicked in practice this summer.

For the best part of last season, Chairman Dick Wragg and Manager John Harris spent time they ill afford denying one transfer link with the Lane after another. Backed by the Board, they constantly said it was not club policy to part with star players; they would do all in their power to keep such players at the Lane.

Now, I don't know how they have managed to keep this policy but this act of faith has been one of the main reasons why there has been a definite improvement in the feeling for the Lane club during the summer months.

This, and the high standard of entertainment provided in nearly all of the matches last season, has boosted season ticket sales. MORE people do seem to be talking about United. There seems to be a fine spirit within the club—a handy start in itself—and outside, people seem to be gaining the impression that United do mean business.

Even though last year's programme was a distinct improvement, and welcomed, the club has gone a step further with this new magazine . . . a 'trendy' offering which should have even greater appeal. The idea of a special souvenir shop is a good one, a social club is on the cards and thanks to Harold Rumsey, the financial 'awareness' all round seems to have taken on fresh meaning.

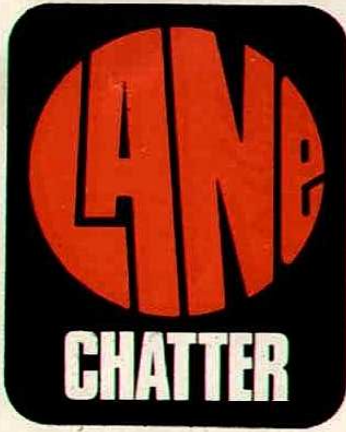
A more professional outlook has been in evidence in the past few years at Bramall Lane and I like to think this is not the end of the improvements. Just, if you like, the beginning of a new era.

For too long now, Sheffield has been a soccer backwater where it was once a brave pioneer. I know to some folk traditions count for 'nowt' in football (e.g. Aston Villa and Preston), but I am not one for de-bunking history.

The pages of the past offer many useful lessons. Tomorrow is important. If you can learn from yesterday—or last Saturday, for that matter!

I would like to see the Blades start their winning streak this afternoon against Swindon; I would like to write about promotion celebrations next May, and I hope I never have to write about unruly behaviour by Sheffield supporters wearing red and white.

If supporters like to be proud of their team, I'm sure this works in reverse.



The challenge of a new season

Home again at last and rarin' to go. Rather different from the spate of Bramall Lane fixtures at the start of last season. This time we had an early kick-off at Swansea. The team moved on to Newbury for an overnight stay and then we met Aldershot.

Everyone was pleased with the outcome which produced two away wins in succession. Then on to Derby where we hoped for a third away victory in a row. But the breaks did not come despite our lads playing well.

We felt ourselves unlucky not to have had at least one penalty, but we had no intention of feeling sorry for ourselves. There were some knocks but all responded to treatment.

The Watney Cup competition, in which we had to do well to take part, was worth while. We gained much valuable experience and found the ties far better for getting settled in than friendly games owing to the spirit in which they were played.

Since our last home appearance four of our players have entered into matrimony. Our congratulations to John Flynn, Geoff. Salmons, Ian Mackenzie and Graeme Crawford and to their wives.

Also congratulations to Mr. and Mrs. Bill Dearden on their welcome though belated new arrival. Bill has moved into Sheffield and is now living near Len Badger.

Supporters will note the ground improvements which are going on apace. We are trying to do something all the time. The main entrance for directors, players and visitors, has undergone a face-lift which sets the tone together with other improvements in keeping with the high standard we shall maintain.

A look around will show that the five pylons have been re-painted and the flood-lights have been overhauled. In addition the crash barriers have been tested and strengthened and improved where required.

Once again, four-minute miler Ken Wood has been putting our players through their paces at Dore, taking them on stamina-building cross-country runs two or three times a week. It is felt that this training is proving so beneficial that it will continue throughout the season.

When today's visitors, Swindon Town, won promotion to Division Two for the first time in 1963 they went straight to the top. But they couldn't keep it up and the following season they were relegated. They are determined it won't happen again. For winning the League Cup they received £32,000 and the cash was well spent.

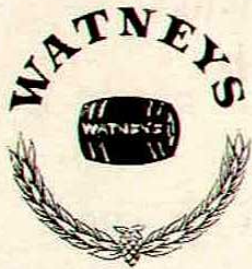

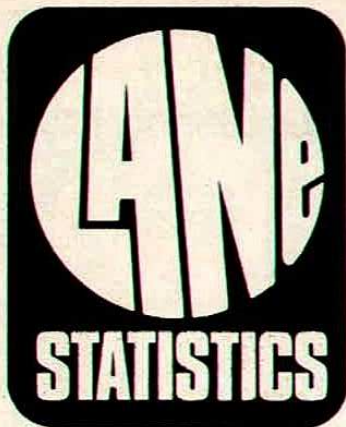

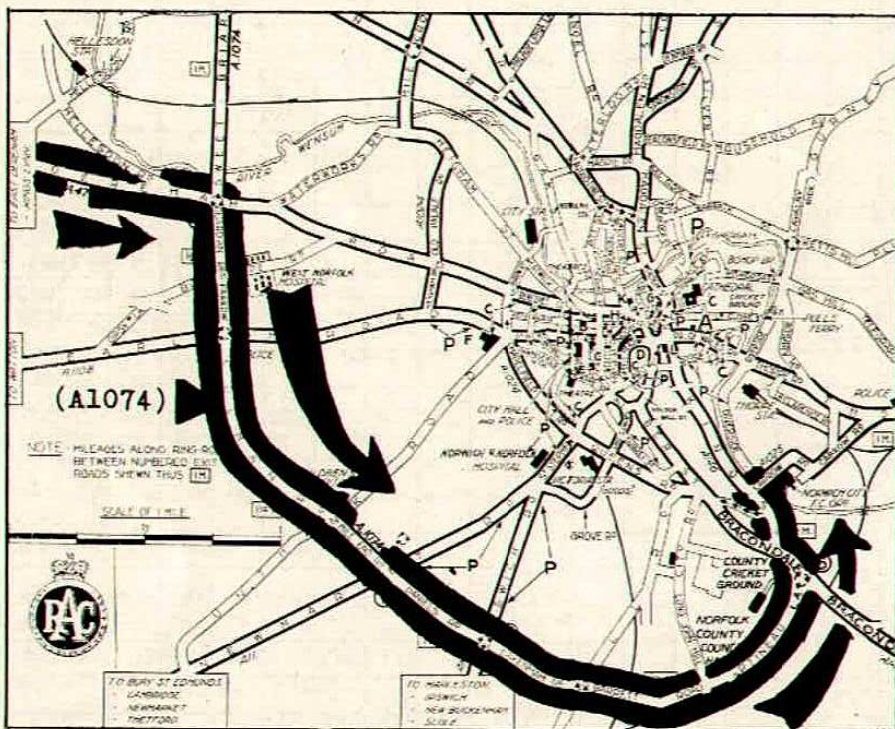
Leave by Mansfield Road A616. At 11 miles on cross M1. Continue ahead on A616 through Ollerton to Newark-on-Trent.

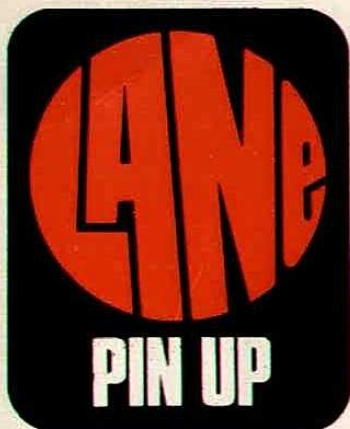

Season after season "Hodgy" plays on. Has he found the secret of eternal youth? It looks that way. What is his formula? Said Alan a few days ago:

"I'm now 25 and a bit, and have a long way to go ahead! I like to think I'm playing as well as ever. The more the seasons come round the more I look forward to them. The way to play for a long time is to enjoy what you're doing. I really enjoy my job and that's the reason I've played so long".

How does he keep fit? "I'm a man of all seasons" he said. "In the winter I play football and badminton and in the summer I play cricket, squash and golf".

At the start of the season someone told "Hodgy" he was disappointed that United had not gone further in the Watney Cup. Replied Alan "Don't worry. At the end of the season we shall collect Division Two Championship Medals". He firmly believes it. That's confidence for you.

DON ROGERS
Swindon's ace winger

The occasion was the F.A. Cup, the date February 1967. Two of the goals which earned Swindon Town a draw at West Ham came from Don Rogers, then 21. The replay brought one of the shocks of that great levelling competition. Town were leading when Johnny Sissons equalised 15 minutes from the end. Only six minutes remained when Rogers shot on the run to regain the lead and two minutes from the final whistle he laid on another for Ken Skeen.

This has been typical of Don, envy of so many rival clubs, who won his first England Under-23 cap against Yugoslavia in 1965. This Somerset lad attracted the attention of Bristol City and Swindon but had a hankering for City.

It was with some reluctance that he finally accepted the offer of Town's then manager, Bert Head, and at the age of 15 made the first train journey of his life to the West Country's great home of the railways. Perhaps it is ironic that Swindon's present manager is Fred Ford, former manager of Bristol City. After leaving City he spent five months with Town on scouting and coaching duties under Danny Williams, now Sheffield Wednesday team-manager, before taking over at Bristol Rovers. He returned to Swindon in July last year.

To return to Rogers, he made the grade in the "A" and reserve teams and when 17 was given a regular place with seniors and also played for England Youth in the team who won the International Youth tournament in Holland. In fact, he was voted "Best Player of the Tournament".

Still he is in demand. But Mr. Ford has said a firm "No" to all offers.

This is, however, no "one man" team and we know it. Town have a formidable list of players and this always has been so. Remember Grenville Morris, capped 21 times for Wales, Harold Fleming who had nine England caps and John Walker with a similar number for Scotland?
