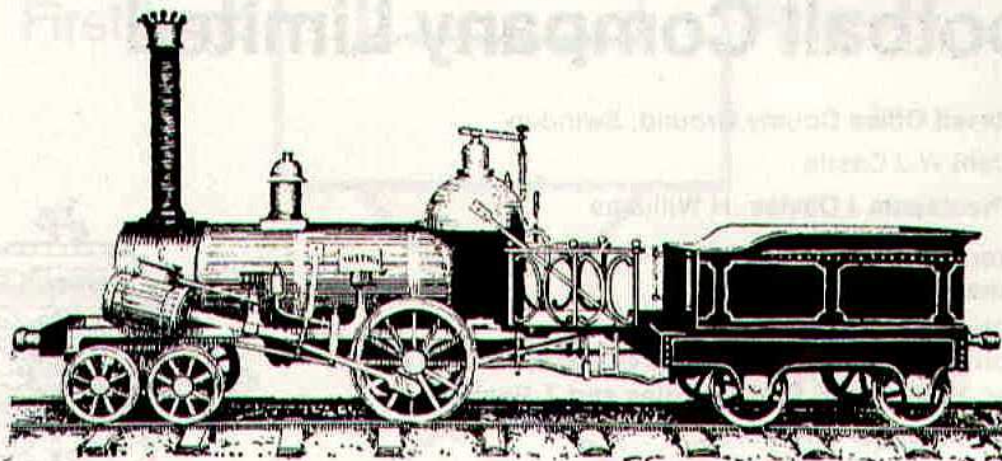

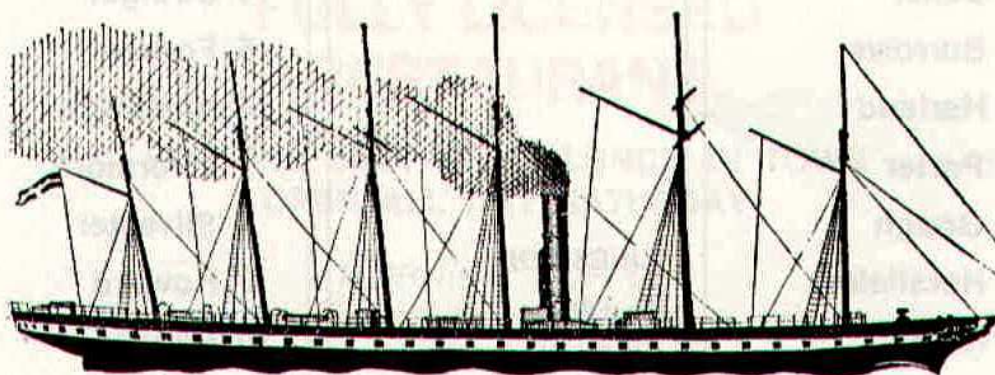

news & views

After an absence of just a month, Division 2 football returns to the County Ground. We last played at home against Sheffield United on 19th December, 1970. Since that date we have played three successive games away from home, with splendid results. Surely the bogey of away form in the earlier part of the season has been well and truly dispatched. We have now (dare I say it?) played eight games without defeat. This must be approaching championship form. We drew 1-1 at Cardiff (fifth in the League table, and strong contenders for promotion) on a very cold and windy Boxing Day, followed by a great win at Queen's Park Rangers in the Third Round of the F.A. Cup, and last Saturday we drew 2-2 at Millwall, after leading up to eight minutes from full time. Yes, these three results are a great achievement on the part of the team. What a wonderful following of supporters we had on each of these occasions. Many of them went to all three games.

This afternoon we entertain old friends from Norwich (three positions above us in the League table). We hope to continue our winning sequence. The match last season resulted in a two goals to nil victory for Swindon.

Peter Noble headed the first goal after a splendid overlap by John Trollope, and Chris Jones scored with a grand shot into the top corner of the net.

Three controversial topics occupy the minds of the authorities, and all football supporters. First, Sunday football; secondly summer soccer; and third, high-lighted by the Ibrox disaster, spectator comfort and safety. The last named should never be in doubt. Much needs, and must be done, to ensure absolute safety in every respect, and surely the time has come to consider the poor spectator. Gone are the days when he or she was content to stand on wind-swept terraces in rain. More and more supporters desire a comfortable seat protected from the rigours of the weather. Taken all in all, over the years, the football follower has had a poor deal.

He pays his money at the turnstile, and there it ends. He takes his chance whether he sees a good game or a poor one, or little or no entertainment.

Sometimes defensive football and time-wasting tactics ruins the game. When the record of the Club is at a low ebb, he is appealed to, to support the team in time of need (the real supporter does). When the Club is high in the championship stakes, or an attractive match is due, he has to scramble for a ticket or queue for long hours before the game (they can't all afford a season ticket).

The trouble is ground improvements cost money and in addition the sum involved is also liable for tax. However, it is obvious, spectator comfort and safety will be made priority number one for most clubs.

Next Sunday football. Will it prove the elixir of soccer, and produce the financial Utopia?

Above all is it necessary, or desirable? It is hard to believe that the vast majority of football followers really want such a change. Without considering the religious aspect, several factors are involved, including the forced employment of many people, who have only one free day per week. I trust I will never see the day when professional soccer is played on a Sunday. It is only in the last decade that we have witnessed the end of football on Christmas Day.

The recent spell of ice and snow has brought once again the suggestion of summer football. Would it be as successful as some would have us believe? Winter football is a tradition in England. Would the majority of supporters prefer summer to winter? Many believe football on wet grounds is far more interesting and thrilling than that which we would see on hard, dry, sun-baked pitches.

These alterations are proposed for one purpose, namely to hope to bring more spectators, and subsequent bigger gates. There has been a decline in attendances over the country as a whole.

Terry Anderson

Born Woking. Previous club, as apprentice and full-time professional, Arsenal (1961/65). Signed for Norwich February 1965 for what was then the Club's record fee for a winger. Former youth international. Has operated mainly in midfield in recent seasons. League and Cup appearances to the end of last season 143, goals twelve.

Albert Bennett

Born Durham. Signed for Norwich February 1968 from Newcastle United for a reported £25,000 fee. Previously with Rotherham and a former England Under-23 international. League and Cup appearances to end of last season thirty-nine, goals nine – including six in a four-match spell just before the end of the 1969/70 term.

Alan Black

Scottish full-back, formerly with Dumbarton, Alan was ex-manager Lol Morgan's first major signing, from Sunderland in September 1966. Black made his League debut for City at Northampton the same month and in all, to the end of last season, had made ninety-five League and Cup appearances.

Max Briggs

Norwich-born. Signed as a full-time professional for the Club in 1967/68 after playing for them as an amateur. Highly-rated young inside-forward or winger who made his League debut in 1968/69 and claimed a regular first-team place towards the end of last season, which he finished with thirty-two League and Cup appearances, one goal.

Geoff Butler

One of the most expensive players in the Second Division, Geoff was signed by City in October 1968 from Sunderland for a reported £30,000. He was previously with Middlesbrough and Chelsea and was twice transferred for a £60,000 fee. Born Middlesbrough, he had made fifty-one League and Cup appearances for City to the end of last season.

David Stringer

Born Gorleston. Capped for England Youth as an amateur, signed full-time forms for City in May 1963. David made his League debut for Norwich at Coventry in April 1965 and is now a regular member of the Canaries' defensive set-up. By the end of last season he had made 226 League and Cup appearances, scoring once.

Malcolm Darling

Scot from Arbroath who joined Norwich in May 1970 in an exchange deal which involved Bryan Conlon moving to Blackburn. Still in his early 20's, Malcolm had to wait until the 1970/71 season to make his League debut with the Canaries. He joined Blackburn Rovers from a Perthshire junior club and made his League debut for the Ewood Park club in 1965/66.

Ken Foggo

Born Perth. A clever and direct winger who joined City in October 1967 from West Bromwich Albion for a reported £15,000 fee. Soon became a firm favourite with the Carrow Road crowd, and became the Club's 1969 Player of the Year. Top scorer last season, which he ended with 112 League and Cup appearances, twenty-six goals.

Duncan Forbes

City's reigning Player of the Year. Born Edinburgh and signed in September 1968 from Colchester, for whom he had not missed a senior game since 1965. Utility player who settled well into the centre-half berth last season, at the end of which he had made sixty-six League and Cup appearances, with three goals to his credit. Joined Colchester from Musselburgh.

Peter Silvester

Born Wokingham. Highly-regarded young centre-forward who was signed by manager Ron Saunders from Reading in September 1969 for a reported £20,000 fee. Former Reading schoolboy who in thirty-nine outings in the first-team last season found the net ten times.

Stephen Govier

Born Watford. Young defender who joined City as an apprentice in September 1967 and signed full-time forms in July 1969. Was still waiting to make his League debut at the end of last season, but had become a regular in the Combination side.

Mervyn Cawston

Another of the Canaries' young discoveries. Mervyn joined the Club as an apprentice and after showing great promise in goal, signed full-time forms in the 1969 close season. Was still waiting to make his League debut at the end of last season.

Peter Vasper

Signed from Guildford City in February 1968 for a moderate fee. Peter, who was once with Orient as a junior, has been kept out of the first-team for the most part by the ability of Keelan. He had still managed to make thirty-two League and Cup appearances for the Canaries up to the end of last season, however.

Paul Wilkinson

Born in Norfolk at Themelthorpe, Paul joined City as an apprentice and signed full-time forms in May 1970. Another of the Club's promising young discoveries.

Trevor Howard

Born King's Lynn. One of several former apprentices who became full-time professionals in July 1967. After two brief appearances as substitute he made his full first-team debut against Blackpool in April 1968. Fitting well into a midfield role he ended last season with twenty-seven League and Cup appearances, three goals.

Gerry Howshall

Signed at the annual dinner of the Supporters' Club in October 1967 for a £25,000 fee. Stoke-born, Gerry became the first player ever to be signed in front of an 'invited' audience. Previously with West Bromwich Albion, his career with City has been hampered by injury, and at the end of last season he had made thirty-six League and Cup appearances.

Stephen Grapes

Norwich-born winger who made great strides last season and took the step from apprentice to full-time professional in July 1970.

Kevin Keelan

Calcutta-born goalkeeper who joined the Canaries from Wrexham in July 1963. Previously with Aston Villa, Stockport (on loan) and Kidderminster. Signed by City for a 'moderate' fee he has become regular first-team goalkeeper in recent seasons and despite a broken arm which kept him out of the game for many weeks last term he ended the campaign with 237 League and Cup appearances to his credit.

Ken Mallender

Born Thryberg. Signed in October 1968 at the same time as Geoff Butler, from Sheffield United for City's record fee of £40,000. A utility defender, he stepped into the centre-half berth but failed to regain his place last season following injury. Cousin of former manager Lol Morgan, he had made forty-five League and Cup appearances, scoring once, at the end of last term.

Neil O'Donnell

Born Glasgow. Scottish youth international who joined Norwich as a sixteen-year-old and signed as a full-time professional in December 1966. An inside-forward, he made his League debut in 1967/68. At the end of last season he had made thirty-seven League and Cup appearances, two goals to his credit.

Graham Paddon

Joined City as a teenager from Coventry in October 1969 for a fee of about £25,000. Born Manchester, he joined Coventry at the age of fifteen and had several games for them in the First Division. Quickly established himself in the League Side at Carrow Road and made thirty-one first-team appearances last season, scoring twice.

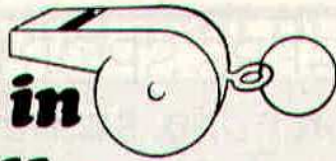


The Town's first at Millwall - a typical 'Rogers goal'. After racing clear of the Millwall defence he made it look easy.

 - 1935 Carrow Road ground opened.
 - 1939 Relegated to Division III (South).
 - 1947 Next to bottom, re-elected.
 - 1948 Next to bottom, re-elected.
 - 1951 Beat Liverpool in Cup (third round), lost at Sunderland in fifth. Runners-up Division III (South).
 - 1954 Beat Arsenal at Highbury in Cup (fourth round), lost to Leicester (home) in fifth.
 - 1957 Financial crisis. Appeal fund saved club. New Board elected. Finish bottom, re-elected.
 - 1958 Founder-members of new Third Division.
 - 1959 Beat Manchester United, Cardiff, Tottenham, Sheffield United to reach Cup semi-final. Lost to Luton in semi-final replay.
 - 1960 Runners-up Division III Football League - promoted to Division II.
 - 1962 Football League Cup winners.

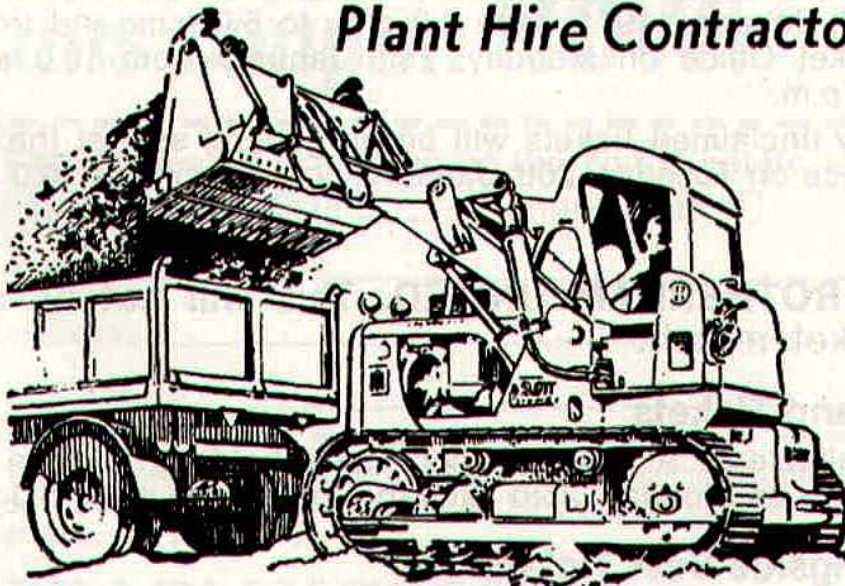
