By the high standards set during the past two seasons Swindon Town have had a disappointing season. Two recent home defeats by Birmingham and, last Saturday, by Leicester City ended all the club's outside promotion hopes.

A poor away record has contributed to the club's mid-table League position. But for two years Swindon—with an almost identical team—were the talk of the land.

Promotion to the Second Division and a merited Football League Cup Final win over Arsenal at Wembley made 1968-69 the most successful period in the club's history.

When Danny Williams went to manage Sheffield Wednesday, Fred Ford took over. And last season the club's triumphs continued. In a home-and-away match against Italian Cup-winners Roma, Swindon won on aggregate to pick up their first international trophy.

But the biggest achievement last season was in Italy. Swindon were leading Naples 3-0 in the final of the Anglo-Italian Inter-League clubs competition when rioting broke out. Swindon were awarded the trophy which they defend at the end of this season.

Here are the details of the players:

PETER DOWNSBOROUGH

(goalkeeper)

Born Halifax. Signed in August 1965 from Halifax Town where he was a product of local football. Regular member of promotion winning side of season 1968-69 and played in the League Cup Final. An ever-present last season and has made more than 200 appearances for Swindon.

ROD THOMAS (right-back)

Born Glyncoerrwg. A former youth player with the club. He was signed from Gloucester City in July 1964. Has gained Welsh Under 23 caps and full Welsh caps. Played in the League Cup Final. Is playing his 200th League appearance for the club.



● **DON ROGERS**

JOE BUTLER (midfield)

Born Newcastle. Joined Swindon from Newcastle United in August 1965 where he graduated to the senior ranks through the club's junior team. A tenacious player whose speed and ability amply make up for his lack of inches. Ever present last season, playing his 200th game.

JOHN TROLLOPE (left-back)

Born Swindon. A local player who joined the Swindon ground staff from school. He was selected for the first team at the beginning of the 1960-61 season when he was just 16-years-old, and was ever present during that season.

FRANK BURROWS (centre-half)

Born Larkhall, Scotland. Joined the club from Scunthorpe United for £13,000 for whom he played three seasons. Formerly with Raith Rovers. A strong defender who has made his mark in the first team. Since his arrival has made more than 100 appearances.

STAN HARLAND (left-half)

Born Liverpool. Was signed from Carlisle United in July 1966. Formerly with Everton and Bradford City. He has been a regular choice at left-half since making his debut at the beginning of the 1966-67 season. Club captain who leads by his own example.

DON ROGERS (outside-left)

Born Paulton. He was signed by Swindon when only 15 and quickly came to the fore. Gained many England Youth international caps and subsequently played in the England under 23 international team. Represented the Football League last season. Has scored 130 League goals in more than 300 appearances.

PETER NOBLE (inside-forward)

Born Sunderland. Signed from Newcastle for £7,000 in January 1968 for whom he played for four years. Prefers to play an attacking role. Passed his century of League appearances this season and a regular for three years.

ARTHUR HORSFIELD (centre forward)

Born Newcastle. Signed for £17,000 from Newcastle United two seasons ago. Previously played for Middlesbrough whom he joined as a youth international. Top goal-scorer last season with 18 goals.

STEPHEN PELOW (outside right)

Born Liverpool. Played for Liverpool schoolboys, and joined Liverpool from school. Made three first team appearances last season for Liverpool and was a regular member of the team which won the Central League for two consecutive years. On loan to Swindon for the season.

TONY GOUGH (midfield)

Born Bath. Signed for Bristol Rovers from Bath City at age of 17 and subsequently returned to Bath. Signed from Bath City in July 1970 for £500 to return to League football.

CITYVIEW

AFTER a depressing spell when relegation was being freely discussed, the events of the last 10 days have put a different complexion on the club's ability both to stay in the Second Division and to climb higher up the table.

An encouraging performance at Portsmouth when our first away win in the League always looked likely was followed by the busiest 24 hours of transfer activity ever crammed into one day by the club.

Manager Alan Dicks spent every available minute during the trip to Portsmouth telephoning all over the country to try to secure one or two players on temporary transfer until the end of the season.

At the same time he also endeavoured to arrange two transfers from the club. By the early hours of Thursday morning he had reached agreement with four different clubs about four different moves.

The first one—the proposed return of Steve Stacey to Wrexham on loan—fell through. But the other transactions went through smoothly.

During a drive from Bristol to the Football League headquarters at Lytham St. Annes he made three stops. He obtained the transfer of Brian Hill at Coventry, signed Les Wilson at Wolverhampton and then stopped on the M6 Motorway to arrange the move of Jantzen Derrick to Mansfield Town.

In all three cases the players have moved only until the end of the season. Whether any of the signings become permanent is a matter that will be negotiated later.

The necessary registration forms were lodged with the Football League just in time for both Brian and Les to make their debuts at Watford last Saturday. And they both helped greatly in a fine 3-0 win that has lifted much of the gloom and despondency.

But it would be unwise and premature to suggest that the battle against relegation has been won already. With 10 games left, several against sides chasing promotion, it is still going to take a wholehearted effort on everyone's part.

This means the team need the best possible support from the crowd. Counting today's match six of our last 10 matches are at Ashton Gate which is certainly in our favour if the vocal backing is forthcoming.

The team has been strengthened by the acquisition of two players of First Division calibre who have already proved their worth in the Watford match. If we can get a First Division type roar from the terraces we should make it.

Les Wilson and Brian Hill will continue to train and live in Wolverhampton and Coventry respectively until the end of the season.

Les, who was born in Manchester but moved to Canada when he was six, was brought back to England six years ago when he was 17 after being spotted by Wolves when they were playing in Vancouver.

He has played about 100 first-team matches for Wolves and appeared in 31 First Division matches last season.

Brian comes from Bedworth and Coventry City has been his only club during his 14 years in football which started when he left school at 15. He made more than 250 appearances for Coventry and is one of the few players to have appeared in all four divisions.

Jantzen Derrick spent last weekend in Mansfield after agreeing to move on loan until the end of the season. But an ankle injury prevented him making his debut for his new club last Saturday.

DAVID BRUTON was due to play again this afternoon after a lengthy and unwelcome lay-off with a knee injury. The injury needed an operation but he has recovered well to continue a professional career which only started on his 18th birthday earlier in the season.

Next Saturday at Ashton Gate promotion-contenders Sheffield United are the visitors.

On Tuesday (7.30 p.m.) Bath City's Southern League side plays here in the semi-final of the Somerset Professional Cup.

Flashback

Few matches provided more entertainment and more excitement than the corresponding game between the two leading West Country clubs at Ashton Gate last season.

Before a near-25,000 crowd—the largest League attendance here last season—the lead changed hands in dramatic fashion. A penalty from Bobby Kellard after a disputed handling offence by Rod Thomas put City ahead 3-2 after Arthur Horsfield had twice given Swindon the lead.

Then, to cap a match which lived up to its pre-match billing as the “unofficial championship of the West Country” Ken Wimshurst had the misfortune to put through his own goal to give Swindon a point.

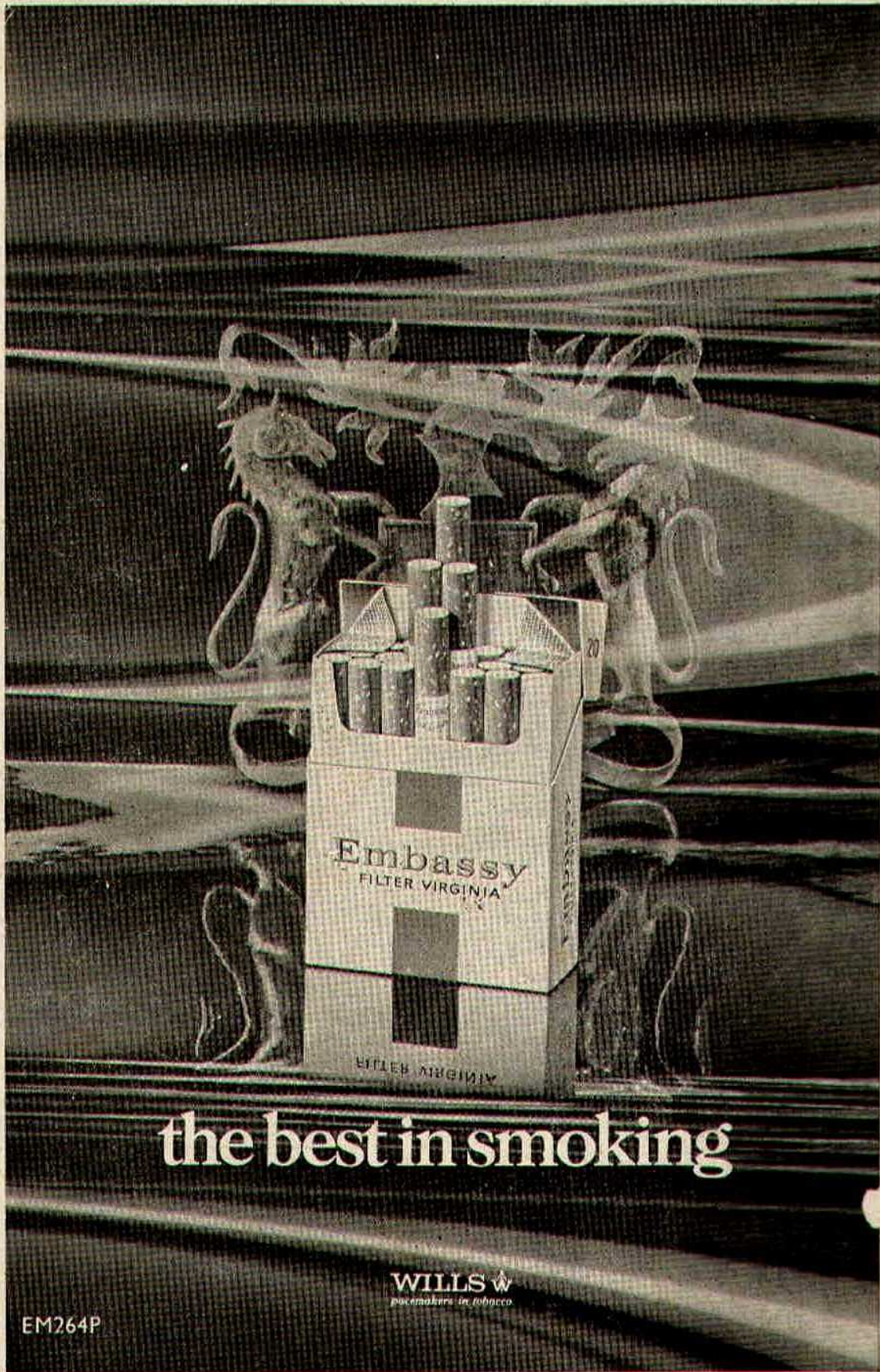
