SWINDON TOWN

On the face of it, manager Fred Ford's decision to sign Derby County and Scotland wing-half Dave Mackay was an act of potential suicide. For, though the Scot's present job is to back Swindon's drive of First Division football on the field it is very possible that he'll take over Ford's managerial duties in due course!

Mr Ford's action was in the interest of the club, of course. And should the anticipated change in positions take place Mr Ford will probably take over as general manager — he wouldn't be out on his neck.

The object of the whole exercise is to get the Wiltshire club into the First Division for the first time. They finished half-way last season and would have been a lot higher but for a very poor away record which was only brightened by two end-of-season wins here at Vicarage Road and at Portsmouth.

This is the form Swindon hope to strike early on. They had the chance during the summer to test their skills in Italy, when they entered the Anglo-Italian tournament for the second time, and they pulled off a fine 2-1 victory over Sampdoria. They only narrowly failed to reach the final, Blackpool pipping them. In 1970 Swindon won the tournament, defeating Napoli 2-0 in the final.

Last season the Robins beat us 2-1 at Vicarage Road, their first win here in 14 years. Our League record against them is:

Apart from Mackay, Swindon signed no new first-team players during the summer though they completed the transfer from Liverpool of Steve Peplow, who was with them on loan last season.

The Swindon club was formed in 1881 by a clergyman. They were one of the original members of the Southern League in 1894, later winning the championship on two occasions, and it wasn't long before they won national acclaim. In 1910 they fought their way to the semi-final of the F.A. Cup, defeating First Division Spurs (3-2), and two Second Division sides Burnley (2-0) and the divisional champions-to-be Manchester City (2-0) on the way before succumbing to the reigning Football League champions, Newcastle United, 0-2 at Tottenham. Two years later they made a second semi-final appearance.

Swindon became members of the Third Division (South), along with all the other Southern League first division sides, in 1920. And they made a flying start to their career, finishing in fourth place a position they were unable to improve upon until winning promotion 43 years later!

They moved into Division Two in 1963 with a star-studded team of youngsters, many of whom went on to win fame with bigger clubs. The only survivor of that side still on regular first-team duty is Don Rogers who remained loyal to the club while Mike Summerbee (Manchester City), Ernie Hunt (now Coventry), and Bobby Woodruff (now Cardiff) all moved up into the First Division soon after attaining that success.

After only two seasons, Swindon slipped back into the Third Division remaining until 1969 when they won promotion plus the Football League Cup in a Wembley game that will long be remembered. Arsenal, their lordly opponents, were well beaten 3-1 after extra-time.

Voice of Watford

THE 1971/72 season is but a fortnight old and yet the football world is in tumult. Firstly, we hear of secret meetings of referees and linesmen being held, at which they were apparently told to "lay the law down" and to control matches strictly in accordance with the laws of the game. This is all very well, and surely only good can come of such action, but we are of the opinion that this particular exercise would have achieved far better results if clubs and their managers had been informed of the intentions of the Football League in this matter. The main cause of concern in the past has been that one referee will penalise a certain action, whereas a week later a colleague operating under the same laws of the game will allow such action to go unpunished. Supporters will be aware that recently club officials were called before the FA Disciplinary Committee, and when asked for comments it was pointed out to the committee that this lack of uniformity was partially responsible for the considerable number of cases of dissent which are clogging up the courts. There were several occasions last season when referees visited the dressing-rooms and said if such-and-such a foul is committed by a player he will be booked. But when on the field the foul took place, the referee took no action at all. Let us, therefore, have the game controlled strictly in accordance with the laws and we have a feeling that this will be good for the game itself, for the players, and certainly for the spectators, and we might well see the skills and the arts displayed rather than brute force.

We now read of a revolt against the Football League hierarchy, and there is no doubt that much could be done to improve the running of such an organisation, but there is a constitutional way of dealing with this matter and that is by calling an extraordinary general meeting of the Football League

in accordance with its regulations. At present, all that is being done is to increase the profits of the Barons of Fleet Street, and things are being said which might at a later stage be regretted. Let us hope that when the shouting and the tumult have died, the captains and the kings have departed, that football will be the better for it.

As announced in the Press, we recently appointed a new director, Mr H. Muir-Stratford, from Loudwater. Mr Muir-Stratford has supported the club for many years, in recent days as vice-president, and we trust that he has a long and happy association with the club.

The new club handbook is available from the Supporters Club shop,

priced 5p. It looks back into the past and gives details of our playing record from the date the club was formed; contains the fixtures for the future; gives details of the items available from the club shops and details of how to get

stand tickets for away matches. This is a must for all supporters.

What is it like to be Ralph Coates, who this season has a £190,000 price tag to live up to? "It does not worry me," says Ralph, and goes on to say why. What does the future hold for England, Leeds United, Arsenal and Swansea City? Who better to give their views than Sir Alf Ramsey, Billy Bremner, John Radford and Ray Kennedy and Roy Bentley? Is the "get tough" policy of the FA Disciplinary Committee proving effective? FA secretary Denis Follows has some illuminating facts and figures to produce. Where can you read in full the answers to all these provocative questions, written by the men who matter? In the September issue of FA News, now on sale, price 20p, at your local newsagent. Every copy of the September issue will include a kingsize colour wall chart containing the official, up-to-date laws of the game.

The Reserves got away to a flying start, for in their opening match they defeated Orient by six goals to one. The first goal was scored by Gary Hayes, one of our apprentices, and at half-time the score was one each, with little hint of what was to come. Colin Franks wrote himself into the history books by equalling the most goals scored by a Watford player in a match in modernday football. In January 1968 Roy Lowe hit five goals in a Reserve game against Charlton, and we have to go back to 1956 when Ben Marden similarly scored five in a Reserve fixture against Swindon Town.

Next Saturday we are at home to Cardiff City in the Football League,

and the kick-off is at 3 p.m.

It is our pleasure this evening to welcome the officials, players and supporters of Swindon Town, together with their new captain, Dave Mackay. Past matches between our two teams have always been entertaining, and we trust that will be the case tonight.

the Supporters Club shops.



Peter Downsborough (goalkeeper).
Born Halifax. Signed in August 1965
from Halifax Town, where he was a
product of local football. A fearless, agile
player who has done much to strengthen
the Town's defence.

Roy Jones (goalkeeper). Born Clactonon-Sea, Signed for the club in October 1967 after obtaining his release from the R.A.F.

Owen Dawson (right back). Born Hatfield. Joined the club from Portsmouth in June 1962. He was a regular first team player until he was unlucky to lose his place through injury.

Rod Thomas (full back). Born Glyncorrwg. A former youth player with the club. He was signed from Gloucester City in July 1964. Has gained Welsh Under 23 Caps and Full Welsh Caps.

Joe Butler (full back). Born Newcastle Joined Swindon from Newcastle United in August 1965 where he graduated to the senior ranks through the club's junior team. A tenacious player whose speed and ability amply make up for his lack of inches.

John Trollope (left back). Born Swindon. A local player who joined the Swindon ground staff from school. He was selected for the first team at the beginning of the 1960/61 season when he was just 16 years old, and was ever present during that season.

Roger Smart (right half or inside forward). Born Swindon. Another local player who joined the club direct from Swindon schoolboys team. At 17 he appeared regularly at centre forward in the Reserves, but he excels as a deep lying inside forward. A versatile player who is able to play at wing half.

Frank Burrows (centre half). Born Larkhall, Scotland. Joined the club from Scunthorpe United, for whom he played three seasons. Formerly with Raith Rovers. A strong defender who has made his mark in the first team.

Stan Harland (left half). Born Liver-pool. Signed from Carlisle United in July 1966; formerly with Everton and Bradford City. He has been a regular choice at left half since making his debut at the beginning of the 1966/67 season. A forceful player who likes to go forward to back up the forwards in attack.

Don Rogers (outside right or left). Born Paulton. Signed by Swindon when only 15 and quickly came to the fore. Gained many England Youth International Caps and subsequently played in the England Under 23 international team.

Peter Noble (inside forward). Born Sunderland. Joined the club from Newcastle in January 1968, for whom he played for four years. Prefers to play an attacking role.

Chris Jones (centre forward). Born Altrincham. A hard working centre forward signed from Manchester City,

Arthur Horsfield (inside forward). Born Newcastle. A close season signing from Newcastle United. Previously played for Middlesbrough, whom he joined as a Youth International. Top goal scorer last season.

Stephen Peplow (outside right). Born Liverpool. Played for Liverpool schoolboys, and joined Liverpool from school. Made three first team appearances season 1969/70 for Liverpool.

Dave Mackay (defender). Born Edinburgh. He commenced his professional career with Hearts in 1951, Was subsequently transferred to Tottenham in 1953 and left them to join Derby in 1967. He was capped 26 times for Scotland, He is probably the only player who has played both for the Scottish League team and also the English Football League team. Signed by Swindon in May 1971. His experience and ability is expected to do much for Swindon in their quest for First Division status.

The Second Division Scene

PLENTY OF GOALS

One pleasing aspect of the opening Second Division games is the great increase in goalscoring. Second Division matches had averaged over three goals per game by the second Saturday. Top scorers are, surprisingly, Bristol City—one of the division's most shot-shy teams last term. They took their total to eight with a remarkable 5-1 win at Sheffield Wednesday. John Galley hit a hat-trick—the first by a City player since Galley himself hit three into Charlton's net two years ago.

Another hat-trickster was Orient's summer buy from Manchester City, Ian Bowyer. This was Orient's first hat-trick since the days of Cliff Holton in 1967 and it was the first time Bowyer had netted three in a game. He added yet more worries to Cardiff boss Jimmy Scoular's burden. The Bluebirds only managed to draw their opening game at home to Burnley (2-2), then took successive thrashings at Blackpool (0-3) and Orient (1-4). Hardly promoting form, this.

Another manager for whom the new season quickly went sour was Wednesday's Derek Dooley, who had high hopes for his side this term. But injuries forced him to play four reserves in their first game at Queen's Park Rangers, where they went down 0-3, then came Saturday's shattering home defeat.

Such is the close competition that no club had maintained its 100 per cent record and only Sheffield Wednesday were without a point. And, with only two games played by most clubs, Preston were the only team in the country with a nought still in their goals against column.

Millwall might well prove one of the dark horses this season. The only London club never to play in the First Division, they kicked off as if they mean to try and break this duck in the near future. At Bristol City on the opening day they recovered from a two-goal deficit to draw 3-3 and last Saturday at The Den they halted the rampant Blackpool—4-1 winners over Swindon and 3-0 victors against Cardiff—and sent them to a 1-0 defeat.

- 5. Play cannot be guaranteed on any day, and no refund of cash admission charges paid at the turnstiles can be made.
- 6. Refunds will not normally be made in respect of seats booked in advance where a match is postponed, as the ticket will automatically be available for the date on which the match is eventually played. No such refund will be made in respect of abandoned matches.
- The climbing of floodlight pylons, stands, or other buildings in the ground is strictly forbidden.

TODAY'S OFFICIALS
