## news & views

Welcome once again to Middlesbrough.

It is rather a coincidence as we played them last season on Saturday, 24th October. Another factor is at that date Swindon had gained eleven points from thirteen games. Our present record is thirteen points from fourteen games, so relatively speaking we are a little better off compared with last season.

Middlesbrough are in a higher position, as they now occupy fourth place in the League table with nineteen points from fourteen games, and are strong contenders for promotion. They have won all eight of their home games, but have only drawn one and won one of their away matches. They will no doubt provide strong opposition.

Middlesbrough is a club with a long and distinguished record, still looked upon really as a Division 1 team. They have one of the finest grounds in the country, and great potential. Tees-side fans are some of the finest in the country. The ground record is 53,596, and the seating accommodation totals 13,000. Swindon's is now 8,000.

The result of last season's game was a win for Swindon by three goals to nil. We were a little fortunate to win by such a margin, all the goals coming in the first thirteen minutes.

Large transfer fees and football finance still make plenty of news. Five players - Garland, Kember, Chilton, Birchenall and Weller, have been transferred for £100,000 or more, and not one is a full international.

There is also talk of much larger fees. In our humble opinion no player is worth that amount of money.

One wonders sometimes how topsy-turvy football finance can become. It is a sobering thought, or even a distressing one, that the total gate receipts of a Fourth Division club can be exceeded by profits from the sale of programmes of a Division 1 club, or the earnings from the game alone of a star player, and not all of those are really star players.

Far too much praise seems to be given these days. Every goal seen on TV is marvellous, and every average footballer a star. The whole mood has seemed to undermine common values, and often huge sums of money are paid out for mediocre players.

Yet many clubs are living on borrowed money, and usually just managing to keep their heads above water. Something like 75 per cent of income at the gates goes on players' wages, leaving 25 per cent for running expenses, equipment, ground maintenance, and administrative costs.

Even the League President says: 'Clubs must call a halt to extravagant spending or the results could be disastrous. The players won't stand for wage cuts, so staffs must be reduced, and more part-timers used'.

Another item soon to need the attention of all clubs is that of ground safety. The Wheatley Commission, appointed after the Ibrox disaster in January, will be submitting its report, and football fears that expensive ground improvements will be compulsory.

Although many clubs will claim they cannot afford them, obviously the members of the Commission will feel the money is there, even if it is not always spent in the right

way. In our opinion crowd safety must be priority number one for all clubs.

One wonders where it will all end. Will some clubs fall by the way? We have thought this would happen for quite a long time, but somehow clubs keep going and others are ready to step in should the opportunity arise, but the number of professional players on the books of the 92 League clubs decreases each year, hence the unrealistic transfer fees. A question of supply and demand.

# our visitors

## Middlesbrough



### **Willie Whigham (Goalkeeper)**

Willie's first taste of senior football was gained with Falkirk in the Scottish Second Division. He helped them gain promotion in 1961 and for the next five years he remained a regular member of their First Division side. Middlesbrough signed him in October 1966 and he made his debut against Watford. Apart from short spells out through injury, he has remained first-choice keeper since that day and has now completed almost 200 League appearances for the Club.

### **Stuart Boam (Half-back)**

A target for several top clubs, Stuart was a close season signing from Mansfield Town for whom he made 195 League and Cup appearances and set a Club record of 165 consecutive appearances. He was appointed Mansfield's first team skipper in 1969/70 season.

### **Mike Allen (Full-back)**

A player who can perform in several positions, Mike was signed as a professional in May 1966 after a spell as an apprentice. He made his League debut in the 1967/68 season and though he has not yet been able to gain a regular place, has played over 30 first-team games over the past four years.

### **Bill Gates (Half-back)**

Another ex-England youth cap, Bill is now entering his 11th season as a League player with Middlesbrough. But he's far from the veteran stage as he was originally blooded while still only 16. Played his 200th League game last season.

### **Gordon Jones (Full-back)**

Middlesbrough's longest-serving player, Gordon made his 400th League appearance for the Club last season. He joined the Club from School in 1958, gained England youth honours and made his League debut in 1960/61. He played nine times for the England Under-23 team and, such is his consistency he has missed only 11 League games over the past seven seasons.

### **Frank Spraggon (Half-back)**

Frank has been holding his own in the League team for the past four seasons, chalking up his 150th appearance last season. He became a professional in November 1962 and got his chance in the first team during the 1963/64 campaign.

### **Alex Smith (Full-back)**

A Middlesbrough professional for more than ten years, Alex has been a permanent member of the senior defence for the past three years. He made his debut in 1965/66 and completed his first century of League games last season.

### **John Hickton (Forward)**

Middlesbrough's top scorer for the past four seasons, John has come out on top of the Second Division chart in three of those four campaigns. Since joining them from Sheffield Wednesday in September 1966, John has hit no fewer than 119 goals in 226 League and Cup games for Middlesbrough, a record that has made him one of the most eagerly-sought strikers in the game. But Middlesbrough will not part with him.

### **Basil Stonehouse (Half-back)**

One of several promising youngsters awaiting his first team chance, Basil joined the Club on Associated School-boy forms in June 1968, and, after a period as an apprentice, signed professional in December 1969.

### **Nobby Stiles (Half-back)**

After more than a decade with Manchester United, he joined the 'Boro in May 1971. Nobby played for England at four levels—schoolboy, youth, under-23 and full, gaining 28 caps. He won two League Championship medals with Manchester United, for whom he made over 300 first team appearances, and was a member of their victorious European Cup winning side of 1968. Thrilled at the new challenge which now faces him, Nobby's ambition is to help Middlesbrough back into Division One.

### **Derrick Downing (Forward)**

Derrick joined Middlesbrough from Frickley Colliery in February 1965 as an outside-right, but he has performed equally well on the left flank. He made his League debut in 1965/66 and became a regular the following season when the Club won promotion from Division 3. Then injuries interfered, but he recovered and has been more or less permanently in the team for three years.

### **Eric McMordie (Forward)**

Eric came across from Dundella in 1964, won his way into Middlesbrough's senior team in 1965/66 and the following season he was picked for the Northern Ireland Under-23 team. He now has 14 full international caps. As a 15-year-old Eric travelled across from Ireland with George Best for a trial with Manchester United. Within a couple of days both boys walked out on Old Trafford because they were homesick!

### Willie Maddren (Forward)

A versatile player who seemed to have settled down in a defensive role. Willie was thrown into the attack last season with considerable success, then reverted to defence again before the season had ended. He opened his career in the juniors as an inside-left – and made his League debut at outside-left. Quite a player! He has been a professional since June 1968.

### Donald Burlaux (Forward)

A winger who hit 10 goals for the reserves last season, Donald was given his first taste of League football making three appearances. He joined the Club as a professional in June 1968.

### Patrick Cuff (Goalkeeper)

Local lad Patrick first linked with Middlesbrough as an amateur in June 1967 and was taken on apprentice forms just over a year later.

### Jimmy Platt (Goalkeeper)

An Irish youth and amateur international, Jimmy was invited to train with Coleraine when he was 15. But they didn't sign him so he joined Ballymena United and played for them in the Irish Cup Final in 1970, and joined Middlesbrough a few weeks after that game.

### John Vincent (Forward)

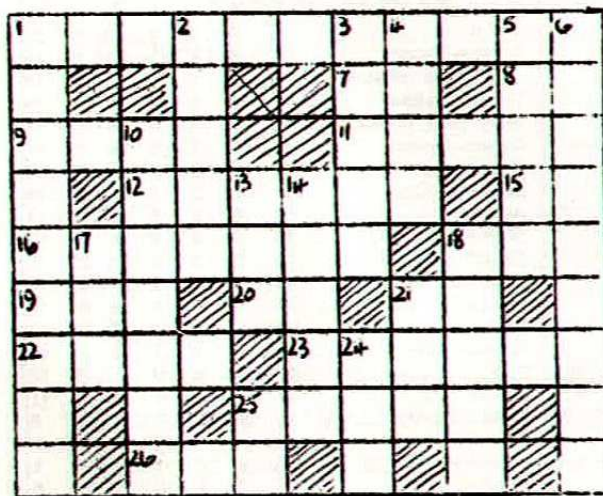
A much sought after Birmingham City player for whom he had made over 200 appearances. He was signed shortly before last season's deadline when 'Boro parted with George Smith and a cheque for his services.

### Joe Laidlaw (Forward)

Joe was introduced to Middlesbrough's senior team four seasons ago after making a big impression in the reserve team with his great determination and hard shooting. For the past two seasons he has held a regular place.

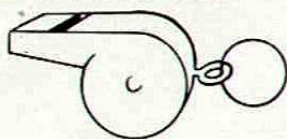

from Rugby

Started refereeing in 1959, in 1966 he was promoted to the referees list of the West Midlands Regional League and in the following year was appointed to the Football League Linesman List. In 1970 he became a supplementary referee with the Football League and was appointed to the full list in 1971.

In 1969 he refereed the F.A. Amateur Cup Semi-Final between Whitley Bay and Sutton United. In 1970 he officiated as linesman in the Hertha Berlin v Vitoria Setubal Inter-Cities Fairs Cup match. He was a linesman in the League Cup Semi-Final tie between Aston Villa and Manchester United.

After having spent 12 years in the Metropolitan and Warwickshire Police Forces rising to the rank of Detective Sergeant, Mr. Baker has now been appointed as the Divisional Security Officer for G.K.N. (Distributors) Ltd. He is Chairman of the Stratford-on-Avon Referees Society and Chairman of the Rugby and District Tennis League.

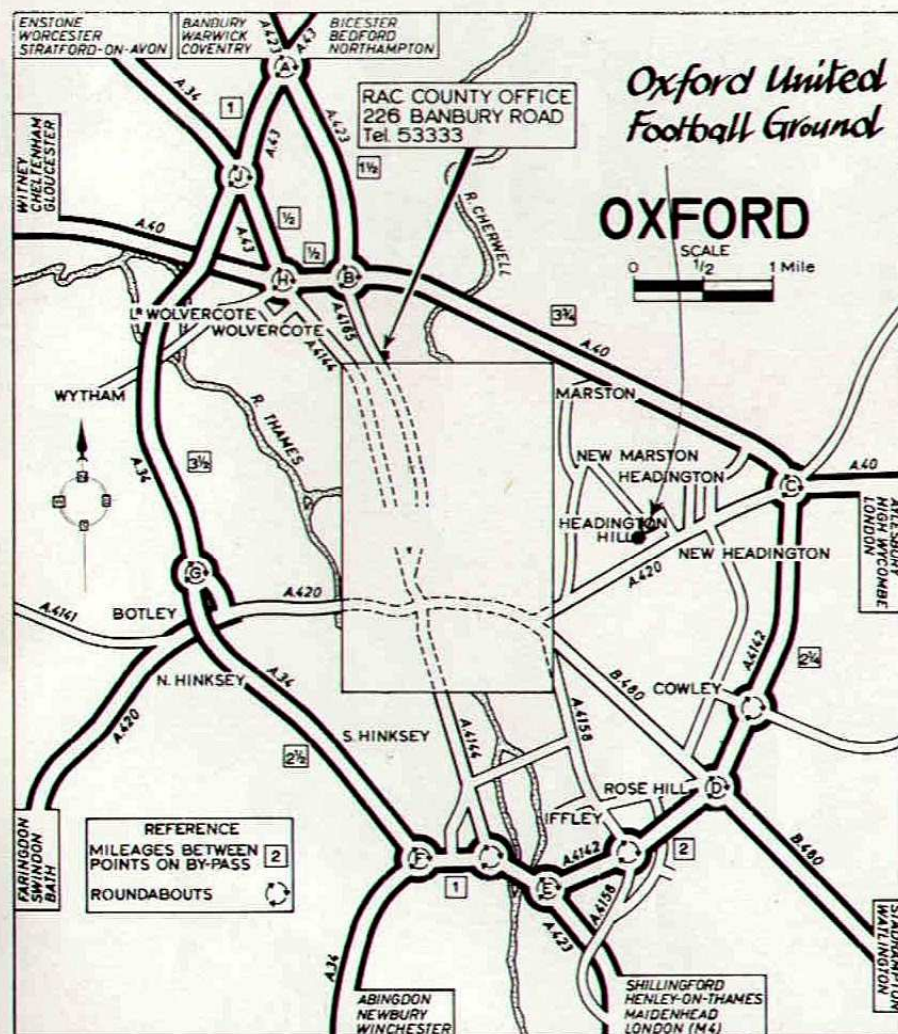
