THE CHAIRMAN SAYS



Dave Mackay has become almost a soccer legend for his exploits at Tottenham and Derby. Today we welcome him as Swindon's new manager in all but name—he prefers to be known as player/coach at present while he is still playing.

He is the only member of Tottenham's famous League and Cup double side of 1961 still playing in top flight football. He won three F.A. Cup winners medals at the club and won numerous caps for Scotland.

At an age when most players think of hanging up their boots he played a major role in a dramatic Derby County revival, leading them to the Second Division title and helping them establish themselves as one of the First Division's top clubs.

Now at 37 he has taken over at the helm at Swindon to begin his career in management—while still exerting his considerable influence on the field. We wish him well.

Tom Walley, our £25,000 signing from Watford early this week makes his debut today and I am sure you will give him a big welcome. Needless to say we feel he will be a great asset to the side. Manager George Petchey talks in more detail about the Welsh international later in the programme.

We hope he will help us to victory today to add to our success at Watford last Saturday, when we might well have won by more than 1-0.

Our club has always had a fine tradition for producing home-grown players, Dennis Rofe, Paul Harris, Terry Brisley and Barrie Fairbrother are typical examples of it. In this respect I would like to point out to any youngsters who may be considered good enough to make football a career that at Orient we do have one big advantage over some of our First Division neighbours in that we do give early opportunities to show what they can do.

Being a smaller club their chances of league football are greater. It is something which a young player and his parents might well consider.

Our London Challenge Cup Final replay against Dagenham at Brisbane Road has been postponed until later in the season because of a fixture congestion. As it happens it could be for the best for it will prove quite an attraction later in the season with the probability of better weather.

I would like to wish all our supporters a very happy Christmas and hope to see them on Boxing Day for our match with Queen's Park Rangers—who could not ask for a better holiday fixture than that?

SIR ALF'S TIP FOR THE TOP

A few years ago England team manager Sir Alf Ramsey called Ian Bowyer one of the most promising young players in the country. Bowyer was at Manchester City then but now at Orient many feel he will prove Sir Alf's judgement right.

Still only 20 Ian came to Orient for a then club record fee in the close season just before Jimmy Bloomfield left to take over at Leicester City. He was bought to score goals—and that's just what he has been doing this season, having already reached double figures.

The fans at Maine Road had often picked out Ian as a scapegoat for any of the side's failures but down at Brisbane Road he has quickly become a firm favourite.

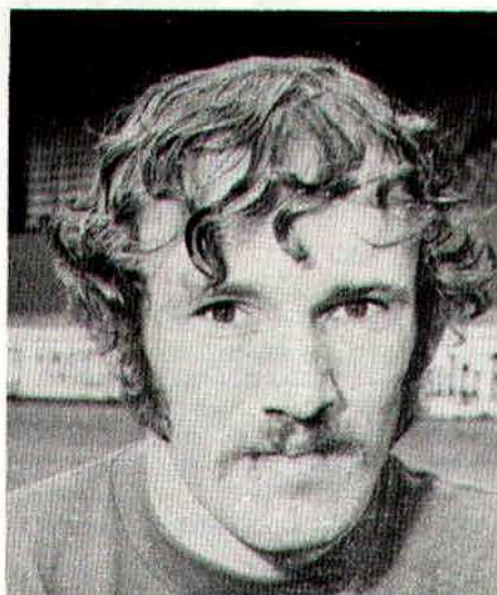
"The fans have been great to me here," says Ian. "It makes a change from being the villain and has really made me feel at home."

Like Phil Hoadley Ian is proving a real bargain buy. Many clubs were caught napping when Orient stepped in to sign him.

"I must admit I wasn't too keen on going down to the Second Division at first but I wanted first team football and at the time was in City's reserve side," recalls Ian.

"At the time Manchester City were trying to sign Queen's Park Rangers' striker Rodney Marsh and this convinced me that my future was limited at City.

"I was impressed with Orient as a club that could go places and thought that in the long run I had a better future with them in London.



"Those first few weeks were a bit confusing because Jimmy Bloomfield had signed me and then left and I didn't know who was taking over.

"But once George Petchey became manager I soon settled in and have been enjoying my football. It was great to score a hat-trick in my home league debut. It was just the kind of start you dream about."

Player Profile

George Petchey was quick to see Bowyer's potential and thinks he will win international honours.

"He is a rare commodity in football today—a winger who can score goals," says George. "I think he could well win an England Under 23 cap as could several of the other players here.

"We have already had an Under 23 selector at the ground and I'll be surprised if they don't pay us a few more visits."

Bowyer is just one more reason why Orient can feel confident about their future.

SWINDON TOWN

Dave Mackay, now in charge at Swindon although not wishing to be called player/manager, needs little introduction to London's soccer fans.

After tremendous service at Tottenham, where he helped them to the League and Cup double in 1960/61 and further F.A. Cup triumphs in 1962 and 1967, Mackay led the Derby County revival. Now at 37 he has taken over from Fred Ford at Swindon to get his first taste of management.

Peter Downsbrough (goalkeeper): Born Halifax. Signed in August 1965 from Halifax Town where he was a product of local football. Regular member of promotion winning side of Season 1968/69. Played in Football League Cup Final winning team.

Rod Thomas (full-back): Born Glyncoirwg. A former youth player with the Club. He was signed from Gloucester City in July 1964. Has gained Welsh Under 23 Caps and Full Welsh Caps.

Joe Butler (full-back): Born Newcastle—Joined Swindon from Newcastle United in August 1965 where he graduated to the senior ranks through the Club's Junior Team.

John Trollope (left back): Born Swindon. A local player who joined the Swindon Ground Staff from school. He was selected for the first team at the beginning of the 1960/61 season when he was just 16 years old, and was ever present during that season. Together with his partner that year, who was also 16, they were the youngest full-backs ever to appear as a pair in League Football.

Roger Smart (right-half or inside-forward): Born Swindon. Another local player who joined the Club direct from Swindon Schoolboys Team. At 17 he was appearing regularly at centre-forward in the Reserve Team, but he excels as a deep-lying inside-forward.

Frank Burrows (centre-half): Born Larkhall, Scotland. Joined the Club from Scunthorpe United for whom

he played 3 seasons. Formerly with Raith Rovers. A strong defender who has made his mark in the first team. Regular member of promotion winning side of Season 1968/69.

Don Rogers (outside-right or left): Born Paulton. He was signed by Swindon when only 15 and quickly came to the fore. Gained many England Youth International Caps and subsequently played in the England under 23 International Team.

Peter Noble (inside forward): Born Sunderland. Joined the Club from Newcastle in January 1968. Regular member of promotion winning side of Season 1968/69.

Chris Jones (centre-forward): Born Altrincham. A hard-working centre-forward signed from Manchester City. Played in Anglo-Italian Inter-Club Competition Winning Team Season 1969/70. Height 5 ft. 11 in. Weight 11 st. 12 lbs.

Dave Mackay (defender): Born Edinburgh. He commenced his professional career with the Scottish Club Hearts in 1951. Was subsequently transferred to Tottenham Hotspur in 1953 and left them to join Derby in Season 1967/68. He was capped 26 times for Scotland and is the holder of a Scottish League Cup Winners medal, the Scottish Football Association Cup Winners medal and the England Football Association Cup Winners medal.

Ray Bunkell (wing-half): Born Tottenham. Joined the Club during the close season from Tottenham where he was a regular Football Combination player. He also played for the England Youth Team. Height 5 ft. 9 in. Weight 11 st. 2 lb.

David Dangerfield (inside-forward): Born Nailsworth. English Schoolboy International. Signed as a Professional 1969. Height 5 ft. 8 in. Weight 11 st. 2 lb.

MR. FARR AND 'THE PEOPLE'

Poor Mr. Farr having embarked on a series of reports to expose dishonesty in the running of football pools came a cropper when he investigated the Orient Supporters Club Pool and wrote about it in the edition of "The People" of the 28th November. FROM THE MANAGER

On Monday I completed the signing of Welsh international Tom Walley from Watford for £25,000 and I'm sure that he will soon become a firm favourite at Brisbane Road.

Terms had been agreed between Watford and ourselves in mid-week but they obviously did not want to release him at that time so he could play against them. So we had to wait and this proved nervewracking because several other clubs started to show interest in the former Arsenal midfielder player.

But after Saturday's game at Vicarage Road Tom Walley was informed of our bid and after a chat agreed to sign for us.

He had been with Watford since March, 1967, when he signed from Arsenal, and had made well over 200 first team appearances. He helped them towards promotion from the Third Division in 1969 and to the F.A. Cup semi-final in 1970. He has gained a full Welsh cap being in their party for the Home Internationals last season and was formerly skipper of the Welsh Under 23 side. We naturally hope he will win more caps with us.

Walley is a hardworking, skilful player who packs a tremendous shot and will greatly strengthen our mid-field play. He is the kind of player I have been looking for but it is not often that they become available and

I'm sure he will prove a valuable capture.

That win at Watford, which finally ended our disappointing away record which until then had not contained a win, was most welcome. It placed us clear of the Second Division's bottom clubs and into a position we hope to improve on in the coming weeks.

With regard to new players I would like to pay tribute to the work being done by chief scout Len Cheeswright. He has been touring the country watching players who interest us as well as watching future opponents and providing detailed information on them.

Today we welcome Swindon Town and look forward to an entertaining game—and a win which will compensate for our home defeat against Sheffield Wednesday. Despite the 3-0 deficit which everyone agreed was never a true reflection of the game I would add that Wednesday were the best side I have seen this season and that includes leaders Norwich and Millwall. I have no doubt they will be figuring in the promotion race before the end of the season.
