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news & views

Yes, once again, 'The tumult and the shouting dies, the captains and the kings depart'. Thirty-two thousand spectators – shall we get half that number today? The thrill of Cup-tie is over, but Swindon now face a hard, long grind in League football to ensure safety from relegation. Once again the Club will be asked: 'What is going to be done about it?' 'Which players are going to be purchased?' The simple answer to those two depends entirely upon the numbers present at the rest of the home games. Will our new Stand, with its magnificent views, be one-third empty? That third full would help considerably to producing better results.

Although Swindon were defeated by Arsenal, everyone present must agree the game itself was a fine display of class, controlled football, on a very difficult pitch, and provided excellent entertainment. We were defeated by two goals to nil, but we certainly made Arsenal fight all the way. We thought most reports in the National Press were rather unfair and unjust. Undoubtedly the better team won, but it was not so much superior, especially in the first half. The opening goal was probably well worked, but the final completion was rather fortunate, in so much as the final pass, which was a mis-hit, found an Arsenal player in the open space in front of goal.

Let us be gracious in defeat. We wish Arsenal the best of luck, may they go on to

win the Cup. They came with great determination (and they played throughout the game in that way) to redress their defeat in the League Cup Final. They had much to play for, and they accomplished that purpose. The game was played in the right spirit, no incidents, petty fouls, gamesmanship or time wasting. The strict enforcement of the laws of the game this season has done much to reduce those factors, but we must credit both teams for playing real football for the whole ninety minutes. I know it was a very relieved party which left the County Ground after the game. The officials were very apprehensive about the outcome before the match.

Now to the remainder of the season. Today we face stern opposition. This time last season Hull City appeared to be in a challenging position for promotion. That same club today is fighting might and main to move away from the two dreaded bottom positions. They will therefore play with great determination and energy, but Swindon just cannot afford to lose any more points at home. To date we have dropped twelve points at home, and thirteen away. It is a long time since we lost four home games with four drawn out of twelve matches played. Yet away we have won four and drawn four (our best record for years). Thus the number of points gained at home and away games are equal at twelve each.

Our opponents will come with great confidence as a result of their fine win at Norwich in the F.A. Cup. This was a magnificent result, which will give them much heart for their League programme. Despite

all the arguments against it, success in the Cup helps to win points in the League. Nothing succeeds like success, and Hull come to Swindon very much on the crest of the wave.

Hull have one of the finest football grounds in the country, Boothferry Park. Apart from the playing pitch itself, with its very fine floodlighting system, there is also a gymnasium in which two five a-side games can be played simultaneously, and a new outdoor training area. A huge cantilever Stand at the southern end of the ground has all the new modern amenities and all tip-up seats. Hull also has its own railway station – a direct link from the City centre.

Hull's great ambition is to obtain Division One status, and several times it appeared likely. In 1965/66 they gained promotion from Division Three and the following season shot right to the top of the table, but were unable to hold that position until the end of the season.

Last year, 1970/71, Hull maintained a high place, but finished in fifth place with fifty-one points. This season, like Cardiff City (who finished in third position), they are very near the bottom place. In fact they are in twenty-first position, one above Watford, so the struggle must be on. We look forward to a keenly contested, but clean game, with good entertainment.

PLAYING STAFF

Jimmy McGill

Born in Glasgow in 1946. Jimmy made his League debut with Arsenal in 1967. Since then he has played with Huddersfield Town and joined Hull City in October 1971. He is a young and strong player with a courageous spirit.

Ken Wagstaff (Forward)

A striker in every sense of the word. Ken has so far scored over 200 League goals for the Tigers and a total of over 260 in his career. He signed for Hull City in November 1964 and since going to Boothferry Park has played in over 250 League games. A danger to every defence he plays against. Selected by the English F.A. to tour Australia during the summer of 1971 with an England XI.

Paddy Greenwood (Utility)

Earned his first team place through consistently good performances in the Hull City Junior and Reserve teams. Made his first team debut in January 1966 and in subsequent years became a regular member of the side.

Ian McKechnie (Goalkeeper)

Born Hellshill, Glasgow. Joined Hull City in August 1966. Previously with Arsenal and Southend United. Ian has now completed over four full seasons as an ever-present in the Hull City side.

Stuart Pearson (Forward)

Another local player who joined Hull City as an amateur in 1965 and has 'risen through the ranks' now to command a regular first team place as centre-forward. Still only in his early twenties, Stuart is gaining a reputation as a goal-getter with Hull City.

Don Beardsley (Full-back)

Born Alyth, Scotland. Signed full-time for the Tigers in October 1964 after serving as an amateur and apprentice with the Club. A determined and strong defender.

Ian Butler (Winger)

A very versatile and skilful player, a wing-forward who has all the ability and know-how to probe open defences. Makes some dazzling runs on the wing and makes many chances for his colleagues, but also takes them himself when the opportunity arises. Joined Hull City from Rotherham United in January 1965.

Billy Wilkinson (Midfield)

Joined the Tigers as an amateur and is now in his sixth season with the Club as a full-time professional. One of the most industrious players of any club, Billy packs tremendous stamina and ability into his games. Most reliant, very effective and a real trier.

Ken Houghton (Forward)

Schemer, general, tactician and goal-scorer. He can always be relied upon to cause the opposition some defensive trouble. Joined the Tigers shortly after his former team-mate, Ian Butler, who was also with Rotherham United. These two players have formed a great understanding.

Ken Knighton (Forward)

Another player who joined Hull City in March 1971. Was with Blackburn Rovers and Hull City paid a big cash fee for this player. Ken can either play in the defence or in attack. A very versatile and strong player.

Terry Neill (Half-back)

Born in Bangor, Northern Ireland. He became Hull City's team manager and captain in June 1970. Was captain of Arsenal when only 20 years old and completed 241 games for the 'Gunners'. He has played for his country since 1964. A current Northern Ireland International and is captain of the side. He now has 46 caps. A player of outstanding ability and merit.

Became a Hull City player in March 1971. Transferred to Hull City from Ipswich Town where he had been club captain. A very reliable defender with a great deal of skill and experience.

Malcolm Lord (Forward)

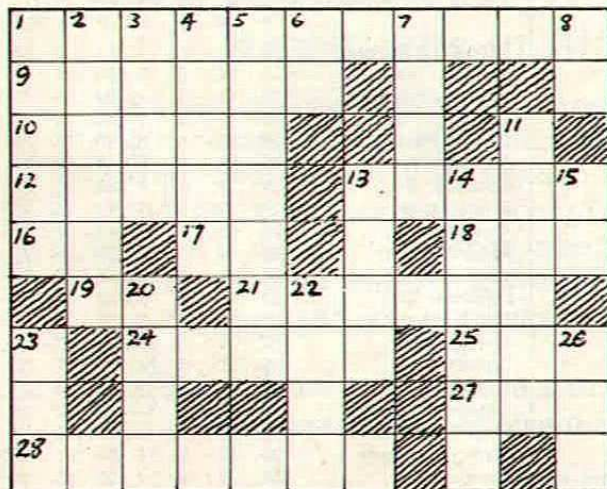
Born near Hull and signed professional in July 1965. Another local player who has risen through the Junior and Reserve sides. Now a regular member of the first team squad.

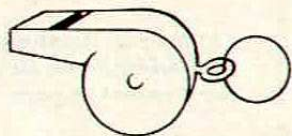
