news & views

Today we have great pleasure in entertaining our friends from Oxford. No doubt the game, as usual, will be an exciting and close encounter. To date we have played eleven games against Oxford, eight of those have resulted in drawn matches, and Swindon have won the other three. The scoring has been very low, as the score in most drawn games was 0-0.

This season we visited the Manor Ground on Saturday, 6th November, 1971. Result: Oxford United 1 (Clarke, 15 min.), Swindon 1 (Butler, 50 min.). This was Dave Mackay's first game as Manager, and it proved to be quite entertaining, with Oxford very much in command during the first half but Swindon taking over during the second period. Joe Butler's goal was a splendid header, from a cross from the right wing. The attendance was 12,345 spectators, much higher than the home gate at Oxford last Saturday. It is indeed a credit to the Oxford officials that the Club holds its position in Division 2. This season the Club has lost two of its early stalwarts - Ron Coppock, its Chairman for many years right from the Southern League days, died after a very long illness; and Arthur Turner, manager for a number of years, left the Club.

The League record of the two clubs is very similar, both having played twenty-nine games. Oxford are in eleventh position with 29 points, and Swindon fifteenth place with

28 points. One point makes a difference of four places. Our away record is slightly better than that of our opponents, having won four, drawn four, lost seven; whereas Oxford have won two, drawn four, lost eight. Their home record is much better than Swindon's, and of course, their scoring potential is higher, with 32 goals compared with ours of 26, although only 11 of those have been scored on opponents' grounds.

Today's game is a very vital one for both clubs. The League table is very closely knitted, and the loss of several games could put each or either in danger of relegation. We are in 15th place with 28 points, eight more than Cardiff City in twenty-first position, but we have only six more than Fulham, four more than Hull and two more than Charlton.

On the other side of the picture, we have only three points less than Blackpool in seventh place, and six points fewer than Middlesbrough, a club still hoping to gain promotion. Their form against us last Saturday certainly strengthened that opinion.

The games between Oxford and Swindon have for the most part been low-scoring matches. The clubs have met on eleven occasions, and Oxford have yet to win. Eight of the games have been drawn (six 0-0, and two 1-1). The other three have been victories for Swindon by three goals to nil - once at Oxford, and twice at Swindon.

The corresponding game last season broke the spell of drawn games. Swindon were much the superior team and won by

three goals to nil. Noble scored in eleven minutes, Porter twenty-eight minutes, and Rogers (penalty) in sixty minutes. The attendance was 17,744.

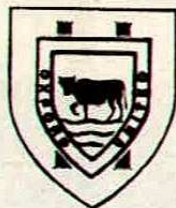

Height 6ft. Weight 13st 13lb. Born Liverpool. Previously with Aston Villa F.C., Ron has played for Oxford since 1959 and has skippered the side from the Southern League to its present position. A 100% performer, Ron turned in some excellent performances in mid-field again last season.

Mick Kearns (Goalkeeper)

Height 6ft 3in. Weight 11st 12lb. Born Banbury. Joined the Club as an apprentice. Has shown considerable promise in his first season as United's first team keeper and won Eire international recognition.

Graham Atkinson (Midfield)

Height 5ft 10in. Weight 12st 7lb. Born Liverpool. Also joined the Club from Aston Villa in 1960. He is a constructive player and shows flair in mid-field. Graham has a tremendous shot and has scored some exciting goals in his time.

Colin Harrington (Winger)

Height 5ft 11in. Weight 12st 7lb. Born Bicester. Signed for Oxford in 1962 from Wolverhampton F.C. Colin is fast and direct, a forward who has few equals for speed.

David Jones (Midfield)

Height 5ft 8in. Weight 10st 6lb. Born Brixham. Joined United from Arsenal where he was an apprentice. A fast and direct player who has made a number of first team appearances.

Michael Way (Midfield)

Height 5ft 7in. Weight 11st 2lb. Born Salisbury. Joined Oxford from a local club and has played in a number of first team matches. A busy player, Michael is knocking on the door of first team football.

Colin Clarke (Centre-half)

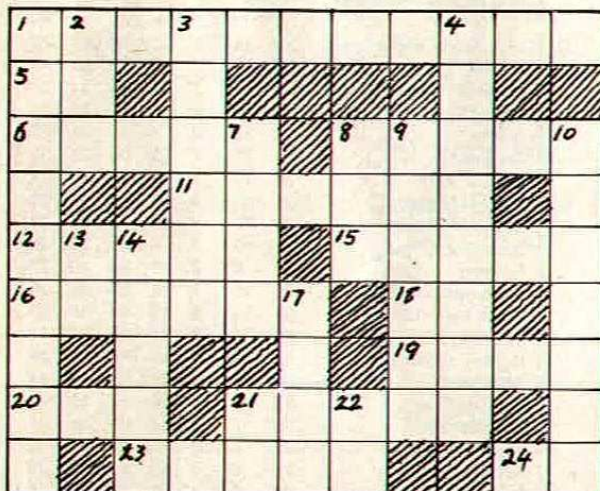

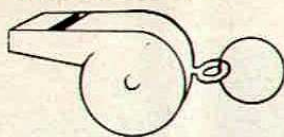

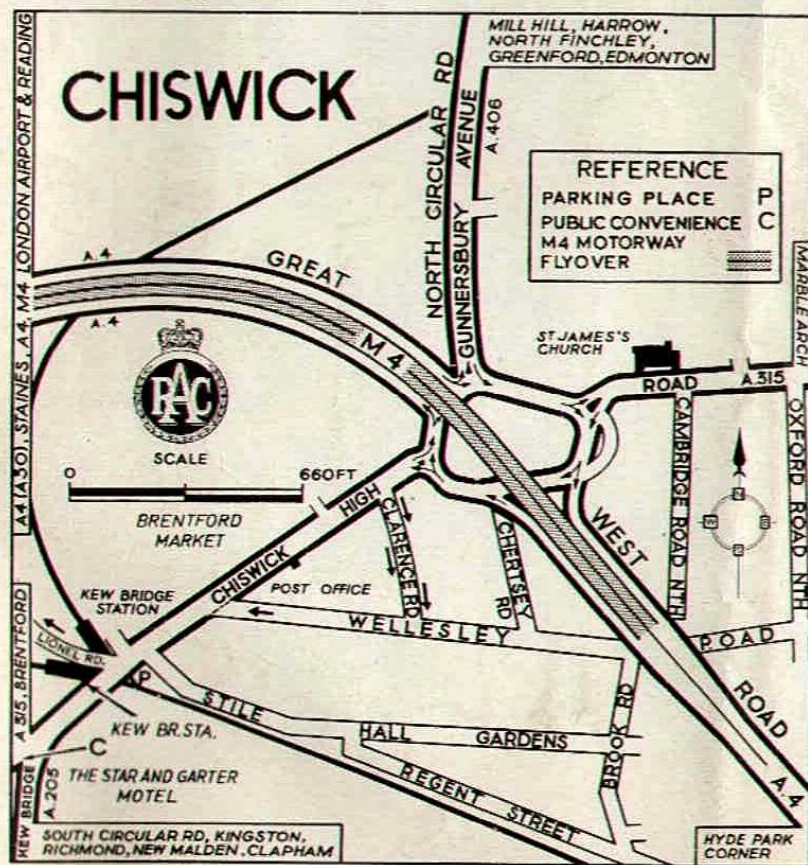
