



NEWS & VIEWS

Unfortunately, with Bank Holiday intervening, these Notes must be written before the Bristol City game. No doubt most supporters will be a little disappointed, because at the time of writing we have one point out of a possible six.

Our first match, against Queen's Park Rangers, was a most entertaining but very hard one. Following that, we had to travel north to play Sheffield Wednesday and then Carlisle. The former club seems to have recovered much of their power and form. It is a club with a great tradition, and one of the finest grounds in the country. I have yet to see a better stand than the cantilever one alongside the whole of the pitch at Hillsborough. Ten thousand seats, each with a perfect view of the game, with no uprights to cause an obstruction.

Following the game against Sheffield we had to travel further north to play Carlisle, where few teams enjoy much success. Whether it is distance, the ground, the surroundings or the air, most visiting teams come away without any points. Certainly it has never been a happy hunting ground for Swindon. As long ago as 1950, I remember being defeated there in the F.A. Cup.

It is the cause of much wonder in the foot-ball world that Carlisle still exists, yet alone does so well. Usually their home gate is the lowest in the League. For several seasons now Carlisle has been very much in the running for promotion. It is certainly a credit to all those who run the club that it functions so well. It even seems to be a training ground for managers. Several now in charge of senior clubs began there, including Bill Shankly and Fred Ford.

This evening we play the return fixture with Sheffield Wednesday, and it is with real pleasure we welcome the team, officials and players of this great club to the County Ground. Among them, we hope, will be Dr. Stephens, Chairman of the Football Association. We greet too the manager, Derek Dooley, whom many of us remember as a great centre-forward, whose career was ended by an injury, which caused the amoutation of his leg. No doubt this disability has had a bearing on his feelings towards two players so long out of the game -Peter Swan and 'Bronco' Layne. It is good to see them back, and there is sure to be a special cheer should 'Bronco' have made the first team for this game. However we do applaud the action of the Sheffield club in giving these players every opportunity to rehabilitate themselves.

We hope we shall witness a splendid game of football this evening, and is it too much to hope the result will be the same as last season, a resounding victory for Swindon?

After tonight's game we travel once again to the far north of the country to play Sunderland, and then 'hey presto', home to Derby County in the Football League Cup. Could that be the beginning of another epoc making era?

Derby, like ourselves, have not had a very promising start to the new season, and of course it is vital to both clubs to do well in the League Cup, so it is sure to be quite a tussle.


I feel much happier at the thought of playing Derby than I would have if it had been Arsenal, because I know Derby very well and I also know that we will be allowed to play football, whereas Arsenal just stopped us before we even started last year in the F.A. Cup. The thing that disappointed me was that we played badly as a team that day and just played into their hands.

We have just got to do better against Derby. Most of the real pressure should be on them and not on us because everybody will be calling us the underdogs (except me) and therefore we have nothing to lose and everything to gain by doing well.

It is very strange playing against your old club. After I left Tottenham for Derby, gaining promotion the first season, we of course met them in the League the following year at Derby. Of course I was excited and I wanted to do well against them, but much to my surprise and embarrassment we slaughtered them 5-0, and when I say I was embarrassed I really was because I had no grudge against Bill Nicholson or anyone at Tottenham. I even missed going into their dressing room because they might have thought I was taking the mickey. Still, I think I could stand it again if we could pull it off against Derby - but I think it is asking too much for a 5-0 victory. I think I would settle for the score Swindon beat Derby by (and I was playing) in the League Cup a few years back.

I would just like to take this opportunity to congratulate Derby on the great achievement last year of winning the League, and say they were a great bunch of lads, and it was a pleasure to be amongst them for three years.

The one thing in our favour is that I will at least know more about the opposition than anyone else, but when all is said and done it is not the opposition that really counts it is what Swindon Town do out there on the park that really matters.

Born 9th November, 1953. Reserve Scottish schoolboy international. No League experience.

Born Larne, Northern Ireland, 16th September, 1945. Joined Sheffield Wednesday from Coventry 27th August, 1971, and has made 39 appearances (League) season 1971/72. An Irish international player having made 26 appearances.

Peter Grummitt (Goalkeeper)

Born Bourne, Lincolnshire, 19th August, 1942. Signed from Nottingham Forest, 26th January, 1970. Debut v Coventry, 28th January, 1970. England Under-23 international and a member of the F.A. party to Australia in 1971. League appearances 89.

Tommy Craig (Midfield)

Born Aberdeen, 21st November, 1950. Captain of Scotland Youth team and signed by Wednesday for Club record fee of £100,000 on 7th May, 1969. League appearances 116. Goals 19.

Robert Coyle

Born Belfast 31st January, 1948. Joined Sheffield Wednesday from Glentoran in April 1972. No League experience.

David Hall (Forward)

Born Sheffield, 16th March, 1954. Former apprentice. No League experience.

Willie Henderson (Winger)

Scottish international who was signed from Glasgow Rangers on 10th July, 1972. Signed for Rangers on his 17th birthday after joining them as an apprentice from school. Appeared in their first team over three hundred times and won League, Cup and European honours with the club. Capped for Scotland 35 times and made his international debut against Wales when still only 17.

Peter Springett (Goalkeeper)

Born Fulham, 8th May, 1946. Signed from Queen's Park Rangers, 22nd May, 1967, in unique part-exchange deal for his international brother, Ron. Holder of England caps at Under-23 level and League Cup Winners' Medal with Queen's Park Rangers. League appearances 112.

Kenneth Burton (Full-back)

Born Sheffield, 11th February, 1950. Originally a wing-half and a Youth international, but now converted into a full-back. League debut v Stoke, 30th November, 1968. League appearances 57. Goals two.

John Holsgrove (Centre-half)

Born Southwark, London. Signed for £50,000 from Wolves on 24th June, 1970. Formerly with Spurs as a boy and then with Crystal Palace. Is now club captain. League appearances 36. Goals one.

Brian Joicey (Forward)

Born at Winlaton, Northumberland, 19th December, 1945. Joined Wednesday from Coventry along with Clements in August 1971. Has made 39 League appearances and was leading goal scorer season 1971/72 with 16 goals.

Stuart Latham (Centre-half)

Born Sheffield, 18th January, 1953. No League experience.

Jimmy Mullen (Wing-half)

Born Hedworth, Jarrow, 8th November, 1952. Forced his way into the League side last season. Debut v Hull, 26th December, 1970. League appearances 10.

Ian Musson (Inside-forward)

Born Lincoln, 13th December, 1953. No League appearances.

Mick Prendergast (Forward)

Born Denaby Main, 24th November, 1950. Joined club after playing with Don and Dearne Boys. Debut v Newcastle, 24th November, 1967. League appearances 77. Goals 27.

Colin Prophett (Centre-half)

Born Crewe, 8th March, 1947. Debut v Arsenal, 6th September, 1969. League appearances 100. Goals six.

David Sunley (Forward)







Proceed on A423 to Southam and at junction with B4100 turn right and ½ mile on connect with A426. Travel on this road to Rugby and on to roundabout at Gibbet Hill, where, after crossing A5, link up with A4114. Turn right and follow road for 2½ miles, until joining M1 motorway.

Proceed on M1 for 66‡ miles, then join M18 following signs 'North Doncaster M18'. At intersection with A1M follow signs 'North Doncaster A1(M)', until end of motorway. Join A1 and travel for 71¾ miles, until Scotch Corner, then taking road for Darlington, rejoin A1M (Darlington by-pass). Follow motorway for 22½ miles then take A690 into Sunderland. For details of route to Roker Park see map.
