## The Alan

T'S been a busy period for us and the last three matches have brought mixed results—three points from one home and two away games. The best performance was at Preston before Christmas but I suppose the best result was the slender win over Cardiff on Boxing Day which gave us only our second home win of the season.

Yet at Preston I was beginning to wonder what was hitting us. We were a goal down after only 12 seconds and two behind after about 15 minutes. Up until that stage we just weren't in the match and it looked like a repetition of our indifferent results at Deepdale last season.

We went there twice at about this time—once in the League and once in the Cup. And we lost both games—the Cup match after we had led 2-1 until just near the end.

This time it was our turn to come from behind and what a magnificent fight the boys put up. The tremendous spirit and determination shown brought us right into the match.

#### SATISFACTION

Bobby Gould had the satisfaction of netting his first goal for us—a thundering drive which gave the goalkeeper no chance. Then Trevor Tainton collected a great pass from Bobby and ran through the middle to steer in the equaliser with as cool a goal as you could wish to see.

But we conceded a third goal through slack marking and had to come from behind once again to gain a point. We were rewarded for some brilliant second-half attacking when Tom Ritchie, who had come on as substitute, slammed in the equaliser near the end.

It was a "first" for all three scorers—Bobby's first for the club, Trevor's first of the season and Tom's first in League football. May they get many more in the months to come!

Those who watch our matches regularly must be surprised that Trevor hasn't scored more goals this season. He is disappointed at not getting his name on the score-sheet more often, but I still believe he can get his full ratio of goals.

He's got to hit the target more often for he certainly tries to get in a shot when the opportunity arises. He should really be looking for 10 goals a season for I know he's capable of getting goals.

The game which followed will probably be remembered most for that controversial penalty which brought us the only goal of the game. But I thought we gave a workmanlike performance without touching on the form we showed at Preston.

It was a tight battle, as many of our games against Cardiff tend to be. But I feel praise is due to Gerry Gow for the superb way in which he took the penalty. The pressure was right on him at that stage of the game and he struck the ball magnificently to give the goalkeeper no chance.

At Millwall last Saturday we created enough chances to have made the score look a little more respectable. Indeed, if we had got the breaks at crucial stages in the match, the result could have been quite different.

Tom Ritchie was put through by Bobby Gould early in the match, but Bryan King rushed out almost to the edge of his penalty area to spot the danger and save. Another save from Gerry Gow in the first-half was an example of goal-keeping at its best.

But we made mistakes in defence and paid the penalty. We lost midfield for much of the game, but we still had as much of the play as Millwall.

Peter Spiring came on in the secondhalf when David Rodgers had to come off with a back injury and stretched their defence with his forward running.

We finished the game pressing strongly, but it just wasn't our day. We never seem to get good results at Millwall, my first professional club.

I would like to take this opportunity of wishing all our supporters a very happy New Year on behalf of the directors, staff and players. I would like to think that 1973 will bring us many more home points and goals than we obtained in the latter half of 1972.

PAUL CROWLEY, the 17-year-old youth team centre-half, showed his goalscoring prowess in the F.A. Youth Cup third round tie against Northfield Juniors at Ashton Gate on Tuesday.

Paul netted two goals in the first-half to bring a 2-0 win against the Birmingham amateurs and put the club into the last 16 of the competition.

The youth team is unbeaten this season—the first under Dave Merrington's command. The side plays Swindon at Ashton Gate in the quarter-final of the Southern Junior Floodlit Cup.

The match has been pencilled in for Tuesday January 16 (7.30 p.m.) unless the F.A. Cup match at Portsmouth is drawn next week.

Gerry Gow is claiming a unique record after his successful penalty kick against Cardiff here on Boxing Day. It was the third spot-kick he has converted in eight months against Cardiff in three successive matches.

He scored at Ninian Park in the 3-2 win in the last away match of last season in April and again in September in a

3-1 victory.

The Boxing Day win established the club's first double of the season and a double was achieved over Cardiff last season as well.

By coincidence, Gow also scored in the match against Cardiff in August, 1971, so he's netted in the last four games against the men from Wales.

#### May we introduce

THE comparative respectability of Swindon Town's Division Two position has been achieved through consistent performances since manager Les Allen succeeded Dave Mackay at the beginning of November.

In fact, since Mr. Allen took over, Swindon have lost only one of their eight games picking up ten points, six

of them away from home.

They have done so without spending any of the £150,000 remaining from the sale of long-time hero Don Rogers to

Crystal Palace.

Even Tom Jenkins, the man Mr. Mackay bought from Southampton for £50,000 two days before he resigned, has had only one complete game since he joined the club.

Swindon's only two away victories, at Luton and Middlesbrough have both come during Mr. Allen's control.

He has, however, made few changes in the side, the only major one being in goal where Jimmy Allan has replaced transfer listed Peter Downsborough, a veteran of more than 250 Football League games with the club. JIMMY ALLAN (goalkeeper)

Made only seven first team appearances last season and has played eight times this term. Born in Inverness.

ROD THOMAS (full back)

A regular member of the Welsh side with 24 caps to his credit. He has been the subject of a great deal of transfer talk this season and is continually watched by the leading First Division clubs. Signed from Gloucester City in July 1964 and made his 250th Football League appearance earlier this season.

JOHN TROLLOPE (full back)

One of the most loyal and consistent players in the Football League. He has appeared in 526 League games for his club and has not missed a match since October 1970. Has scored 17 goals, including one in the victory over Middlesbrough in November.

ROGER SMART (Midfield)

Joined the club from Swindon schoolboys and has over 350 first team appearances on his record, and almost 50 goals. Could not gain a place in the side at the start of the season but his return to form is one of the most significant aspects of Swindon's improved displays. Missed the Christmas games because of injury.

ROD THOMAS

FRANK BURROWS (centre-haif)

Started with Raith Rovers and spent three seasons with Scunthorpe United before joining the club. Has played in over 280 Football League games, 174 of them with Swindon.

RON POTTER (defender)

Born in Wolverhampton, he was originally with West Bromwich Albion, making eight first team appearances. Played only six times for Swindon before this term but has been a regular partner for Burrows this season.

TOMMY JENKINS (forward)

Injury has restricted him to only one complete game since he signed for £50,000 from Southampton on November 1, but he is now fit again. Started with Orient and was with Reading before he joined Southampton.

RAY TREACY (forward)

Swindon payed Charlton Athletic









£40,000 for their new striker in June season while Treacy has found the net and four days later sold them Arthur Horsfield for £20,000. Horsfield is the Football League's leading scorer this eight times, including five in successive games during October and November.

PETER NOBLE (forward)
Joined the club in January 1968 after four years with Newcastle United.
Today marks his 199th League appearance for Swindon and he has scored 61 goals in those games. Missed six of the season's early games through injury.

#### RAY BUNKELL (midfield)

A former England youth team player who joined the club from Tottenham Hotspur on a free transfer last year.

JOE BUTLER (midfield or defender)

Another ex-Newcastle United player, he joined Swindon in 1965. Has made over 250 League appearances and earned a reputation as a ferocious little player.

RON HOWELLS (midfield)

Signed from Kettering Town, he has

Signed from Kettering Town, he has established himself in the side since September. Previous experience with Tottenham, Millwall and Cambridge United.



In 1968-69 Swindon Town won the Football League Cup, beating Arsenal 3-1 at Wembley, and were promoted from Division Three. In 1970, they won the Anglo-Italian Cup.

City did the double over Swindon last season winning both games 1-0. At the County Ground, in October, PETER SPIRING scored before 21,382 people. At Ashton Gate, in March, JOHN GALLEY was the scorer and the attendance was 21.496.

This season Swindon won 2-1 at the County Ground. STEVE PEPLOW netted both goals with PETER SPIRING netting for City.

DON ROGERS has scored seven goals in nine games since he joined Crystal Palace. In his League career with Swindon he scored 147 goals in exactly 400 games.

Former City player B O B B Y KELLARD is back in the Second Division. He joined Portsmouth, City's F.A. Cup opponents next Saturday, from Crystal Palace for £42,000.

Midfield player RICKY HEPPO-LETTE has joined Orient from Preston North End for £60,000 while Aston Villa have paid out £90,000 for Derby County full back JOHN ROBSON.

Fulham's STAN BROWN has joined Colchester United on a free transfer after a spell on loan with Brighton. Fulham have also released defender REG MATTHEWSON.


