Continuing our great new series, Town Focus today turned the spotlight on full-back Don Shanks. We talked to him about his likes and his dislikes.

As well as being one of our most gifted players, Don puts in a tremendous amount of work helping and coaching to youth teams—Kilburn and Rangers Youth Club—near his White City home.

It's therefore not surprising that 21 year old Don did so well himself as a youngster, signing schoolboy forms with Fulham when only 12.

Although he represented West London Schoolboys, Don reckons the biggest breaks in his

career were: "playing for the England Youth team and signing for Luton from Fulham two years ago."

In fact it was while playing with the England Youth squad that Don really made a name for himself. He turned in some magnificent performances to help England win the "Little World Cup" two years ago in Czechoslovakia.

Manager Harry Haslam certainly knew what he was doing when he persuaded Fulham to part with Shanks after that "Little World Cup".

"It was certainly one of the biggest breaks in my career signing for Luton and I have never looked back," said Don, adding: "Now my main ambition is to play for England."

"Although I love playing for Luton, I must admit that one of the biggest thrills of my career was scoring the equalising goal for the England Youth side

against Russia in the semi-final of the Little World Cup.

"And like most of my team-mates my biggest disappointment was losing to Sunderland in the FA Cup last year."

Don made his debut for Luton against Preston in August 1971 and, of course, played in the Anglo-Italian tournament last season.

His hobbies are horse-riding, swimming and, naturally, coaching schoolboys.

His favourite colour is blue and he likes to dress in anything that is fashionable.

Gilbert O'Sullivan is his favourite male singer, while Suzie Quatro takes the honours amongst the females and Slade amongst the groups.

Big John Wayne is the tops with Don as far as film actors go and his favourite footballer is Scotland and Manchester City star Denis Law.

Surprisingly, Don's favourite meal is Wimpey chips and beans and his favourite drink is a shandy—after matches.

Naturally, being involved in soccer so much, Don loves to win, but hates to lose—he should have plenty to shout about this season.

INTRODUCING . . .

SWINDON TOWN

Swindon manager Les Allen has been facing a few problems this season, a recent run of six games without a win putting his team in a precarious position close to the foot of the Second Division.

Yet Swindon have the potential to do far better. One of the danger men in Swindon's attack is Republic of Ireland international Ray Treacy, a bustling centre-forward who began his League career with West Bromwich Albion. He moved to Charlton in 1968 and in 1971/72 was their top scorer with 19 goals. Last season he topped Swindon's list with 14.

Swindon's other chief striker is likely to be either Richard Legg, a local discovery, or Mike Collins, a South African-born forward who was signed from Wolves this summer. He didn't play in Wolves' first-team but made his League bow against Notts County recently.

On the left wing will be David Moss, who has now taken over from Don Rogers, who moved to Crystal Palace last season. Moss

is another Swindon discovery.

An injury to Mick McGovern gave Chris Porter his chance to return to the side, but he broke a collar bone in the Nottingham Forest game and another mid-field injury victim is Terry Hubbard.

Tom Jenkins, Ray Bunkell and David Syrett are other midfield players.

Porter was spotted playing for Bridgwater Town and made his League debut for Swindon in 1970-71. McGovern joined Swindon from Queen's Park Rangers, where he had won only occasional runs in the first-team, last season.

Hubbard, who made his debut in 1970-71, is a player who appears destined for the very top. And, following an injury-imposed lay-off Tom Jenkins has been displaying the type of form that made him a force in the First Division—though he has now switched from outside-left to midfield.

Swindon paid a club record £50,000 fee to Southampton for

Tom last season. Once discarded by West Ham and Orient, Tom drifted into non-league football with Margate until given a comeback chance by Reading in 1969. Within weeks he was the subject of a £60,000 transfer to Southampton.

Bunkell won England youth honours when he was with Spurs though he didn't get a game in their League team. He satisfied his ambition for League soccer soon after joining Swindon in 1971. Syrett is a Swindon product, still serving his apprenticeship. He played at Preston and against WBA as substitute on each occasion.

One of Swindon's best-known players is Welsh international defender Rod Thomas, who played in the recent World Cup clash in Poland.

Frank Burrows, Joe Butler, John Trollope, Ken Stroud and Ron Potter are all top class defenders too.

Burrows first entered English football with Scunthorpe in 1965 after serving Raith Rovers. Swin-

don signed him in 1968 and only injuries have since kept him out of the side. Butler, who was signed from Newcastle in 1965, has played in several positions for Swindon, proving one of their most valuable players over the years. He recently shifted again from defence to midfield. Trollope has been on parade—apart from a short injury absence—continually for 12 seasons. He is now nearing 550 League appearances for the club and in one unbroken run he played 368 consecutive games.

Stroud is another of Swindon's own discoveries while Potter was signed from West Bromwich in 1970.

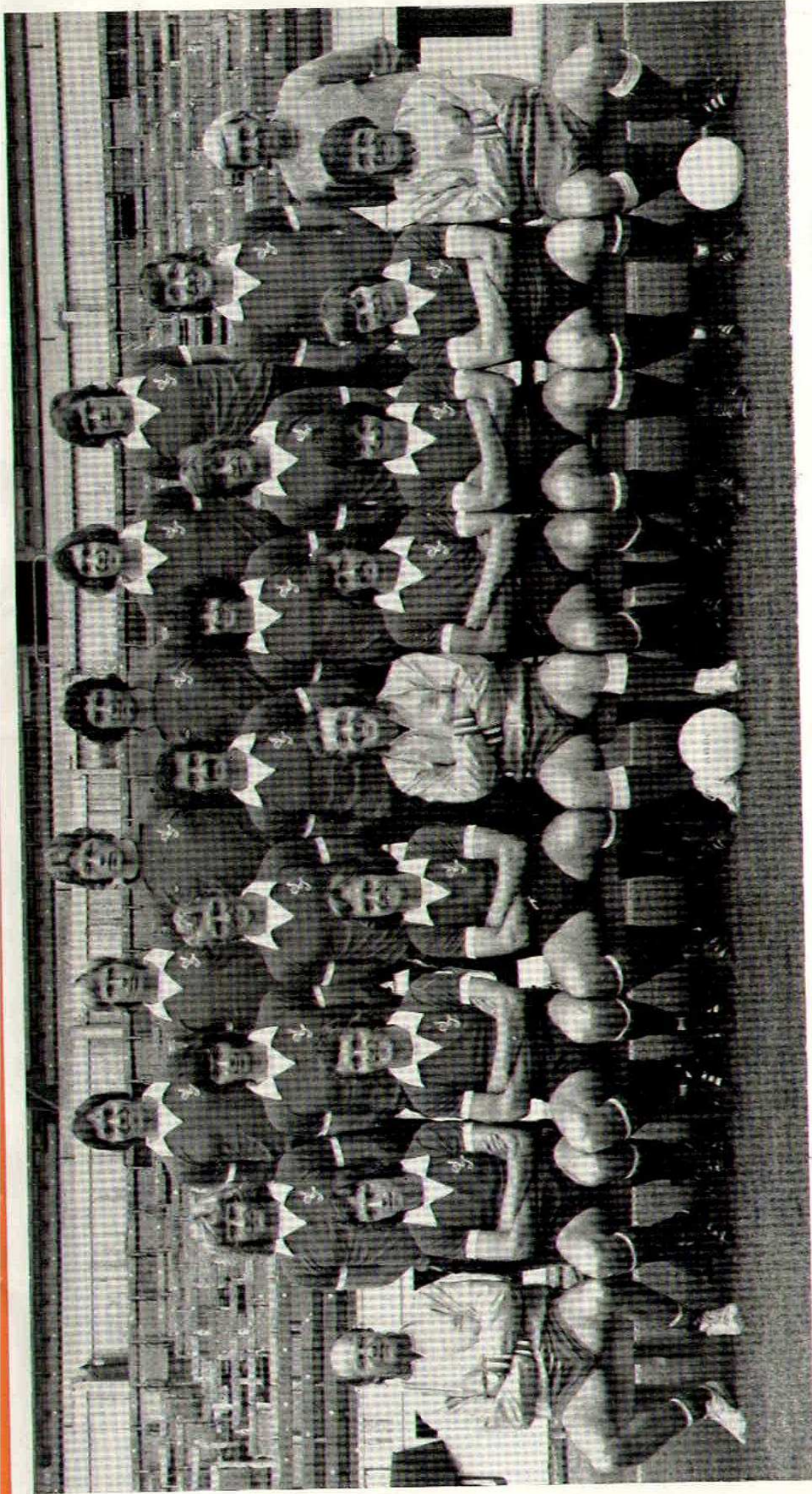

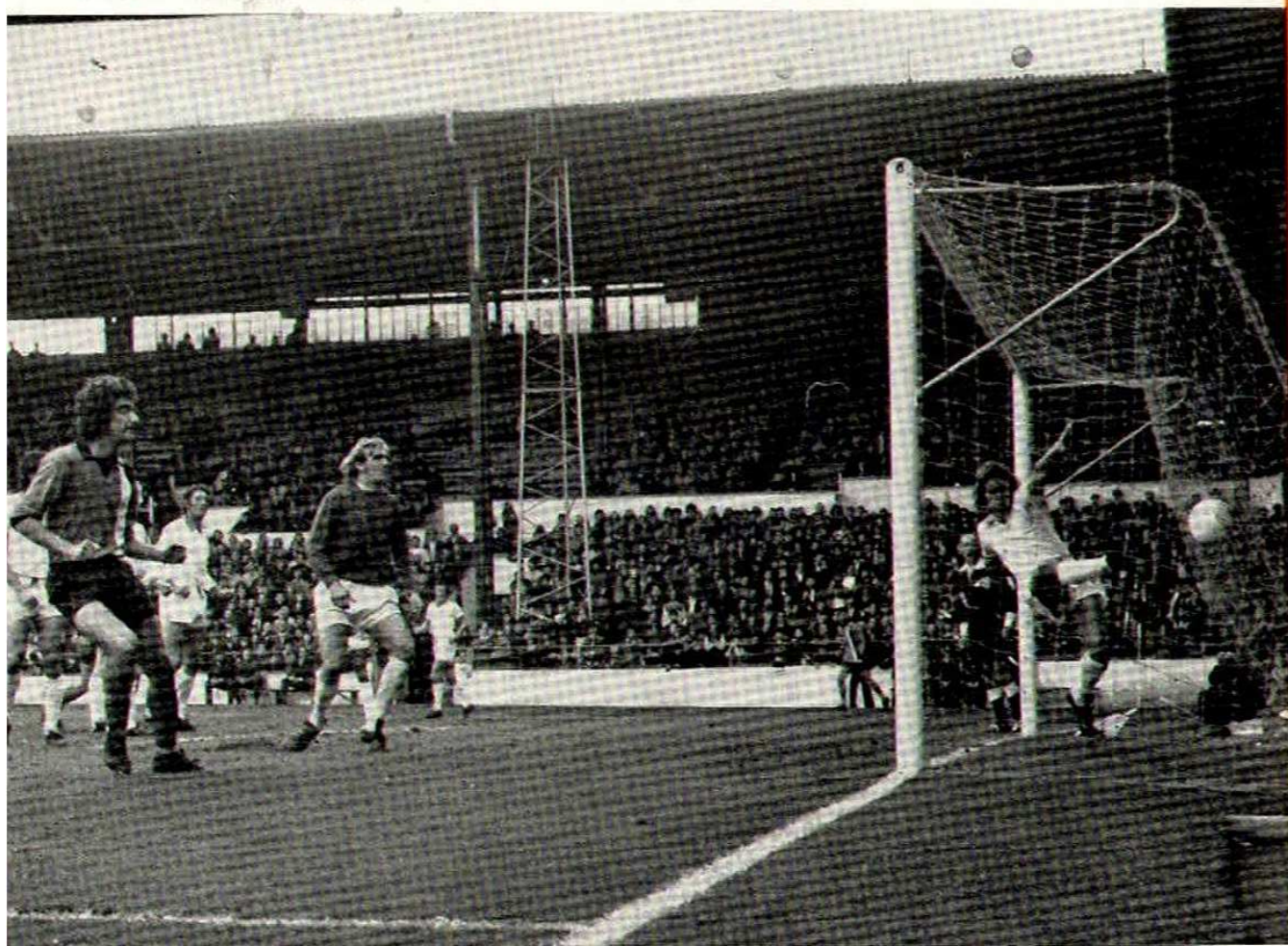

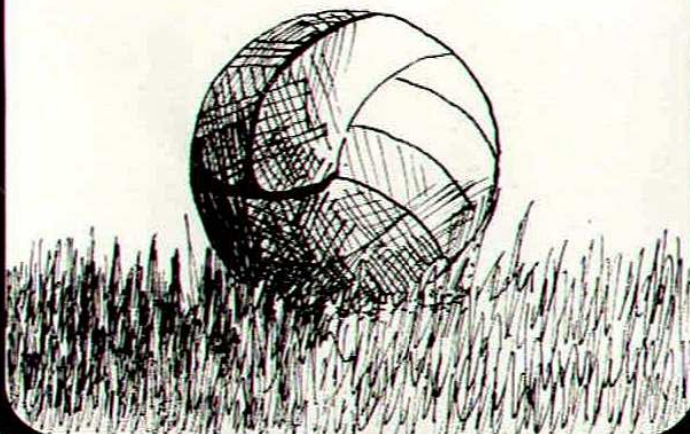
