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## NEWS & VIEWS

Again, we have the honour of welcoming to Swindon, for the F.A. Cup Replay, one of the finest footballing teams in the country. Over the past few months our visitors have built for themselves, a great reputation, for playing football of the highest class. Now they are in a challenging position for the championship of Division 1. We wish them every success in that quest.

This evening's game will recall in the memories of many, a similar one in January 1967 in the 3rd Round of the F.A. Cup.

On the previous Saturday, we played at West Ham, and those supporters who made the journey to London witnessed a great game. Now we have had a repeat performance. What a great bunch of followers we have! Something over three thousand from Swindon must have been present to swell the splendid gate (The 2,000 tickets for seats were sold by Monday following the Hereford game).

This game at West Ham has certainly caught the imagination of our supporters, possibly because of those games in 1967.

It is worth recalling here; the two teams who met on Tuesday 31st January 1967. Swindon — Hicks, Thomas, Trollope,

Morgan, Nurse, Harland, Brown, Penman, Skeen, Smart, Rogers.

West Ham United — Standen, Borington, Burkett, Peters, Bickles, Moore, Dear, Boyce, Byrne, Hurst, Sissons.

Scorers — Swindon — Penman 18 mins, Rogers 84 mins, Skeen 89 mins.

West Ham — Sissons 78 mins.

Manager — Danny Williams, Ron Greenwood.

Attendance — 25,789 (2,000 locked out)  
Receipts £5,394

West Ham United have never played in a league lower than Division 2, and have spent most of their life in Division 1.

The late Charles Paynter, known to many as "Mr. West Ham Himself" because he helped so much to build West Ham into the great club it is, as player, trainer, and Manager was born in Cross Street (off Victoria Road) Swindon in 1879.

Following the magnificent win over West Ham United, in the Fourth Round we defeated Bury at Swindon by two goals to one (Morgan and Rogers — Owen Bury) before an attendance of 24452.

In the following Round i.e. the Fifth, came the three outstanding games against Nottingham Forest. The first played at Nottingham on Saturday 11th March

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# WEST HAM SPARKLE

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Any team managing to hold West Ham to a draw these days on their own Upton Park pitch has to produce something very special. So we can feel mighty proud of our achievement. Nevertheless, we know we face another extremely difficult task this evening for this new West Ham side has added a new dimension to its talent and its sparkle - - - a new iron spirit which refused to accept defeat until the final whistle blows.

Few men have enjoyed a more remarkable start to their managerial career than West Ham's John Lyall. The Hammers were close to the foot of the First Division table when he took over a few weeks ago. Now, following a run of only three defeat's in 20 games, they have a great chance of pulling off the League and Cup double.

In one early run the Hammers cracked in 20 goals in four games.

All this boosted the team's morale, they are consequently playing a far more relaxed game and all those little experiments - - - which seemed to fall down when the club was down on its luck - - - are paying off.

West Ham have bought two new strikers this season - - - Billy Jennings from Watford for £110,000 and Keith Robson from Newcastle for £45,000. Robson has taken over from Clyde Best while Jennings displaced midfield man Pat Holland, now often named as substitute, in a re-arranged line up of 4 - 3 - 3.

The Hammers received a severe blow when leading scorer Bobby Gould (11 goals) broke a leg in training. Subsequently, Mr. Lyall had to re-organise his team, with Trevor Brooking pushed forward in attack

with Jennings and Robson while Clyde Best has been given a new incentive with a recall to the squad - - - often as substitute.

Brooking's outstanding performance in midfield earned him a game for the England under-23 team three seasons ago and last summer he was one of the outstanding successes in the full England team's summer tour. Now he has six caps and should win many, many, more.

Jennings took to First Division football like a duck to water following his £110,000 transfer from Watford earlier this season. Now he is one of the Hammers' top scorers with if he scores on Saturday 10 goals. A former England youth international, Billy was Watford's top scorer with 29 goals last season.

Robson scored five goals in one recent four-game run for the Hammers - - - and that's more than he had scored in his entire previous League career! He played several First Division games for Newcastle, without gaining a regular place, but has been a huge success at West Ham since his £45,000 transfer in September. He has scored nine times so far.

Clyde Best came over especially from Bermuda to sign for West Ham in the late 'sixties. He was a big hit when making his League debut in 1969/70, earning international caps for Bermuda in the World Cup qualifying competition. In 1971/72 he was top scorer with 23 goals but this season he was dropped after five seasons as a first-teamer. Gould's injury opened the way for his recall.

Another player who could come into the reckoning is Alan Taylor, a surprise £40,000 buy from Rochdale a few weeks ago. Two seasons ago he was playing in

the obscurity of the Northern Premier League for Morecambe.

Injuries permitting, the midfield will probably comprise Billy Bonds, Graham Paddon and John McDowell, though Pat Holland is another contender.

Discovered by Charlton, Bonds moved to Upton Park in 1967 for a £50,000 fee and his displays soon won him England under-23 honours. Formerly a defender, Billy soon switched with great success to midfield. Top scorer last season, he is again among the leaders with 11 goals.

Paddon was valued at £170,000 in last season's exchange deal which took Ted MacDougall to Norwich. Graham had been with the Canaries for four years after getting his first League experience with Coventry City.

McDowell switched to a midfield role earlier this season after excelling in the West Ham defence for four seasons. His superb performances at right-back earned him 13 England under-23 caps.

Holland developed in the club's junior teams, made his League debut in 1968/69 but, when he failed to win a regular place, he left for a loan period with Bournemouth two years later. He returned to Upton Park and, until dropping out this season, had been a first-team player for two years.

The back four is normally Keith Coleman, Tommy Taylor, Kevin Lock and Frank Lampard.

Coleman was dropped by Sunderland,

after two years as a first-teamer, a few weeks before their fabulous F.A. Cup success in 1973. After a trial with Arsenal, he joined the Hammers for £20,000 at the beginning of last season.

Taylor developed with Orient and West Ham had to pay £78,000 to sign him in October 1970. He was capped 10 times for the England under-23 side, after gaining earlier youth honours.

Lock captained the England youth team which won the UEFA Youth Tournament in 1972, soon after making his League debut. He made rapid progress and has now added three England under-23 caps to his personal collection. Kevin took over from Bobby Moore in the Hammers' back four.

Lampard won his first full England cap against Yugoslavia two seasons ago after playing four under-23 games the previous season. A former Angland youth international, Frank made his bow in the Hammers' team against Manchester City in November 1967.

Goalkeeper Mervyn Day made a tremendous impression in his early League games for the Hammers last season - - - even though he shouldered many of their relegation pressures - - - that by the end of the campaign he had gained two England under-23 caps. Earlier he had won youth honours.

Under previous manager Ron Greenwood - - - now general manager - - the Hammers won the F.A. Cup in 1964 and the European Cup-Winners' Cup a year later.

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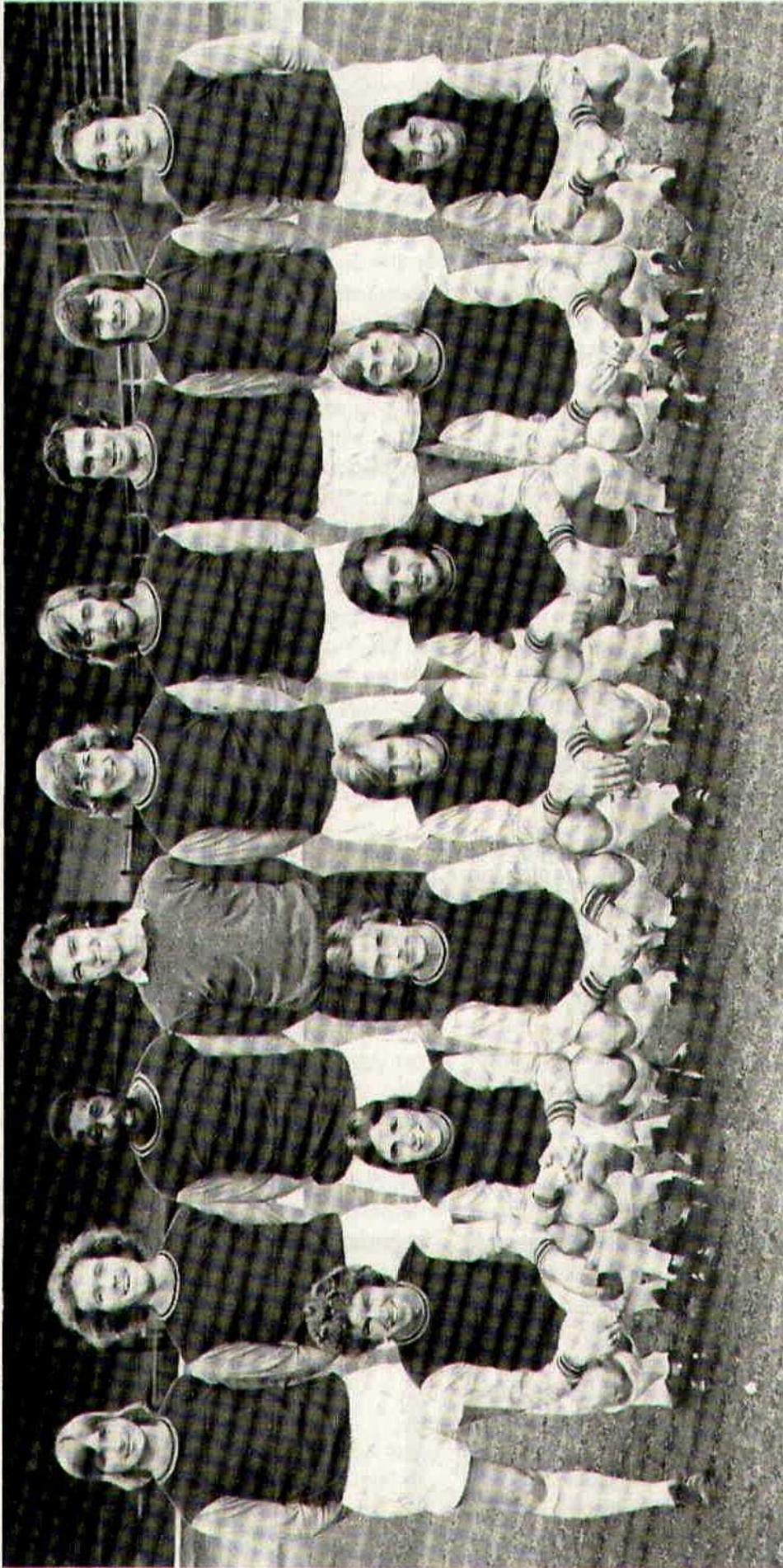

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### **Greatest-Ever Season for Non League Teams**

Whatever happened on Saturday, this season's F.A. Cup tournament will go down as one of the greatest-ever for non-League clubs.

This season we had three non-League clubs in round four for the first time since 1957. The last time one of these minnows got beyond this stage, however, was in 1949 when Yeovil Town crusaded through to a fifth round meeting with Manchester United and lost 8 - 0.

Numerous new records have been established this season. Wimbledon became the first non-League club ever to win an F.A. Cup tie on First Division soil, at Burnley, while Stafford Rangers became the first outsiders to claim three Football League scalps in one season.

At one time it was something of a shock when one of the little clubs performed one of its David and Goliath acts. Not any more!

Since the last war, well over half the League clubs have been K.O.'d by minnows.

In fact, 59 League clubs have been battered out of the competition by non-League clubs since the war. Champion fall guys are Exeter City who have taken no fewer than seven knockouts by "inferior" opposition!

Halifax were victims of giant-killing acts

for the sixth time when losing at Stafford Rangers in round three.

I have been asked to write these notes, prior to playing our Cup Tie at West Ham, but with the optimism that at least a replay would be necessary. History often repeats itself, and we are hoping for a repeat of that 1967 season.

Last week at Colchester, when the pitch was under water, the referee decided to take a chance with the weather, but every minute brought more rain, and eventually he had to call the game off. Many people must have asked themselves what went wrong with our defence in the opening minutes, but I can assure them that it was impossible to play the ball through the mud and water right through the centre of the field, and it would have been comical if the game could have been played as a friendly and not with match points at stake,

We were very pleased again with our home gate against Hereford exceeding the eleven thousand mark, and this game turned out to be an exciting encounter although there was only one goal scored.

It seems that many people were disappointed at not being able to obtain a ticket for the West Ham game at Upton Park. Selling these tickets after the home game with Hereford certainly helped some of our country supporters, but of course many people were not prepared for this and felt that they could leave it until Monday, but with only just over 2,000 to sell these were soon gone. We only hope that everybody has been able to get into today's replay.

It is pleasant that the demand to see our games has increased, and we hope that this will keep up until the end of the season.

The response to our sponsor a player scheme has proved very successful and already we have had many requests to do this. We are setting up a new scheme to help the finances of our Club which I am sure will appeal to everybody because not only does it benefit our Club, but also benefits the members.

The scheme briefly is this :- we have persuaded shops and firms in Swindon and the surrounding districts to agree to give a discount on cash sales to any person that becomes a member of our Discount Scheme. 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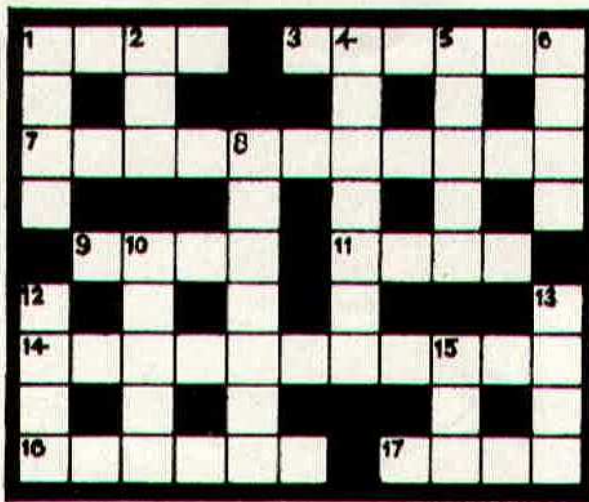
