## PEN PICTURES

**JIM BARRON.** Goalkeeper. Signed from Nottingham Forest last July. Comes from County Durham and was formerly with Wolves, Chelsea and Oxford United.

**WILFRED DIXON.** Playing at fullback but can also play in midfield. A Londoner signed in September, 1973, from Reading.

**JOHN TROLLOPE.** Fullback. Completed 600 League appearances last Saturday. A Local player who joined the club straight from school.

**KEN STROUD.** A Londoner who is a skilled midfield player. A former apprentice and full professional since 1970.

**FRANK BURROWS.** A big, strong centre half who was formerly with Raith Rovers and Scunthorpe. A Scot who has shared in Swindon's many triumphs since 1968.

**COLIN PROPHETT.** A midfield man from Crewe. Cost £20,000 when signed last September from Norwich City. Has also been with Sheffield Wednesday.

**TOM JENKINS.** A winger signed from Southampton in October, 1972, after Swindon had sold Don Rogers to Crystal Palace. Formerly with Orient and Reading.

**JOHN McLOUGHLIN.** Another Londoner and a former England youth international. Transferred from Colchester in December, 1973, and can play either in defence or midfield.

**PETER EASTOE.** A striker signed from Wolves in March last year who is having a great season. So far has scored 23 goals, including the winning goal against us on Saturday.

**JOE BUTLER.** Joined Swindon as a fullback from his native Newcastle in 1965 and a regular member of the side almost ever since.

**TREVOR ANDERSON.** Signed in November from Manchester United, for whom he made 11 appearances last season. A Northern Ireland international.



# SWINDON TOWN

Swindon's descent into present company along with Preston and Crystal Palace ended a five-year spell in the Second Division and tonight we find ourselves facing them for the second time in four days.

Last season, when they collected only 25 points from the 42 matches, we broke even with a couple of 1-1 draws and now they are staging something of a revival.

The results of our previous League matches against them were:

Founded as an amateur club in 1881 by the Rev. W. Pitt, Swindon, when still in the Southern League, reached the F.A. Cup semi-final in 1910 by beating Crystal Palace, Burnley, Spurs and Manchester City. They lost in the semi-final to Newcastle, who went on to win the trophy.

They again reached the semi-final in 1912, losing to Barnsley in a replay.

However, on joining the Third Division (South) when it was formed in 1920, they languished there until 1963 and had to seek re-election on three occasions. It was, therefore, a great event when the Wiltshire club gained promotion to the Second Division in 1962-63, but after two seasons they were back again in the Third.

They fought their way back after four seasons, being runners-up to Watford in 1968-69. This proved a magnificent season for them, as they also won the League Cup, beating Arsenal 3-1 before 100,000 spectators at Wembley.

Their hero in that match, Don Rogers, who scored two of the goals, was later transferred to Crystal Palace for £150,000. Roger Smart, scorer of the other goal, is no longer with the club.

Other Swindon triumphs have been the lifting of the League Cup Winners Cup in 1969, against Roma, and winning the Anglo-Italian Inter-League Clubs competition in 1970 against Naples in the inaugural year of both competitions.

Famous players at Swindon in the past have included Harold Fleming, an England cap although his team was playing in the Southern League, Mike Summerbee and Norman Uprichard.

Swindon have not been very successful away from home this season, their record so far reading:

P.13 W.2 D.5 L.6 F.17 A.27

Over half of their goals this season, 23 to be exact, have come from centre forward Peter Eastoe.

## MANAGER



Danny Williams spent 22½ years at Rotherham, over 19 as a player, during which he made 621 appearances, and the rest as manager. For the first 10 years of his playing career he was a part-timer, putting in a full day's shift in the mine before reporting for training.

After three years in the manager's chair, he moved on to Bournemouth and then to Swindon, where he led the club to that tremendous League Cup final triumph of 1969 and also back to the Second Division.

Following these achievements, he was appointed manager of Sheffield United, but only remained with them for 16 months.

His next club was Mansfield, where he worked most successfully for 2½ years before being asked to rejoin Swindon in March, 1974.

season and as the second highest goal scorer he will be missed up front, while Dave has been another automatic choice and has been very consistent in the defence.

Fortunately, we have plenty of good substitutes available, lads who have been tried in the first team and have not let us down, but even so, if I thought we needed someone else to strengthen the side I would take the necessary steps.

So far we have been fairly fortunate with injuries and suspensions, but at the moment we seem to have struck a bad patch. It must be our turn.

lost at Tranmere in November, another defeat which we shall soon have the chance to avenge.

Swindon will have to make at least one change tonight as Dave Moss, a regular scorer, has started a two-match suspension, but that still leaves Peter Eastoe and we shall be keeping a close watch on this ex-Wolves player whose goals record this season is one of the best in the four divisions.

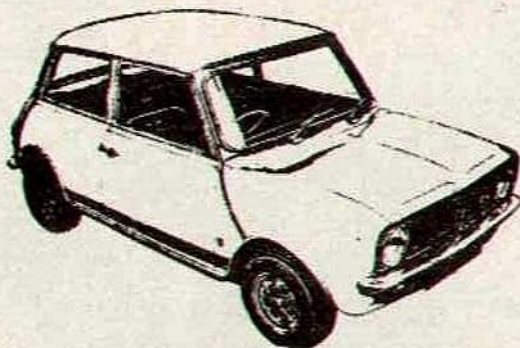

# OUR DIVISION

Blackburn Rovers not only re-established themselves at the top of the table by their magnificent recovery from 0-2 down to a 5-2 victory over Plymouth Argyle but surely gave notice that they are in fighting trim for the final stage of the season.

They are obviously bent on faking the championship and however envious we might be as promotion rivals we have to acknowledge that in inflicting Plymouth's first defeat in 16 League games they showed themselves worthy of the top spot. It was the second time in two matches they had come from behind to win, their victory at Bury having also been achieved after they had given their opponents a start.

At any rate, Rovers look good enough to go up - and what is just as important, to stay up.

Plymouth's defeat in no sense puts them out of the race, just as we hope North End's unprofitable trip to Swindon doesn't mean we say goodbye to our chances.

Tonight will be vital for North End; two points would put us back in fourth position, or even third if the goal margin was good enough.

Of the clubs immediately below North End, Peterborough, still involved in the F.A. Cup, have the best chance, needing to win their two outstanding games to bring them into real contention.

There is just as intriguing a position at the foot of the table, where Huddersfield will need to pull off a Houdini act to save themselves. Few would want to see such a famous club, who enjoyed First Division status as recently as 1971-2, suffer the indignity of descent to the Fourth.

Chesterfield and Halifax both did themselves a good turn by picking up two points on Saturday, leaving the situation wide open.

But with a third of the season still to come, and many decisive matches left, it would be a brave man who would forecast the outcome of the relegation and promotion battles.

We can, however, look forward to a nail-biting finish in April.

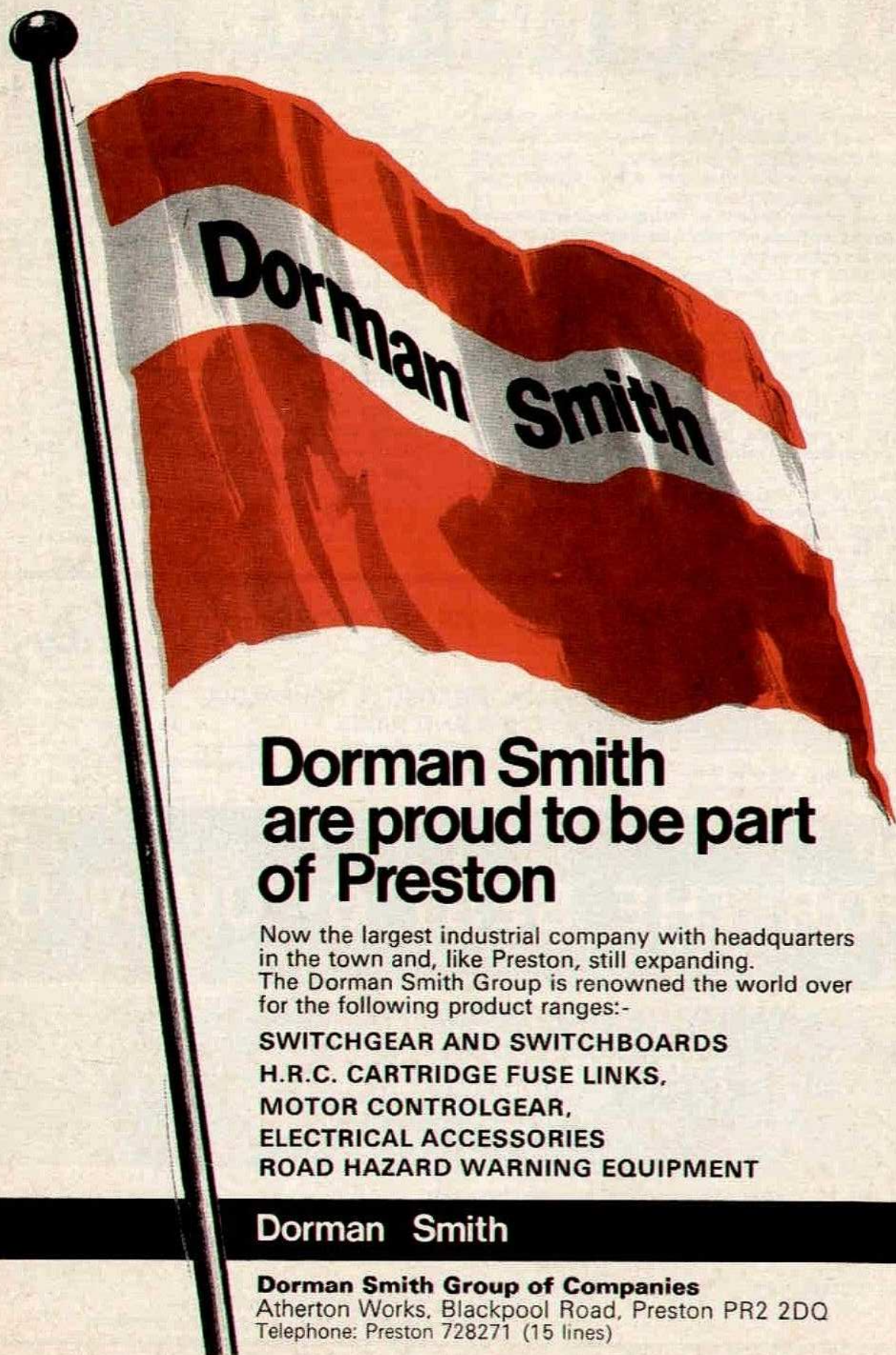

"It was a fortune to me in those days as a 16-year old apprentice bricklayer earning 17/6d. a week", said Fred.

That, of course, was the match in which Angus Morrison scored a hat-trick against us. Two years later, North End signed Morrison and he went on to give the club valuable service.

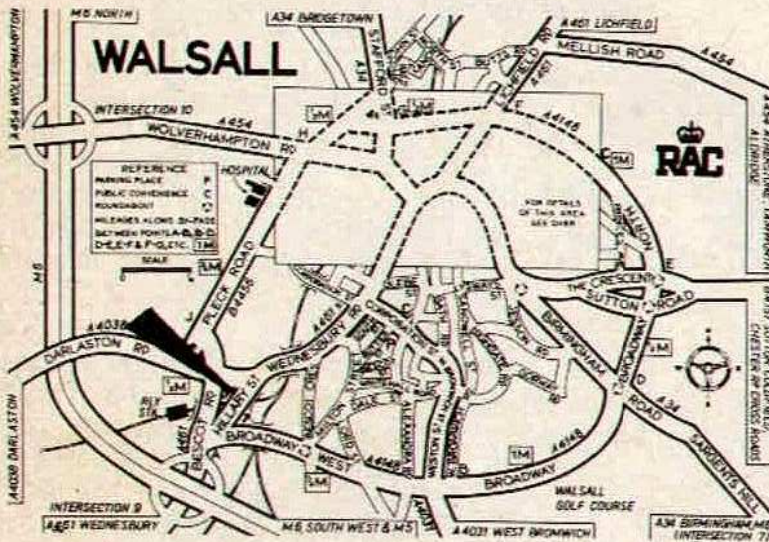
