NEWS & VIEWS

This evening we welcome to the County Ground, Port Vale, who have made great strides considering that as recently as 1968 the club had to seek re-election to the Fourth Division. They gained promotion to Division Three in 1969/70 along with Chesterfield, Wrexham and Swansea.

A game between Swindon and Port Vale which stands out in my memory was in Season 1951/52 played on a Monday 28th April, 1952. It was a hard fought match, with Maurice Owen being carried off injured.

Swindon: Uprichard, Hunt, May, Kaye, Hudson, Batchelor, Millar, Onslow, Owen, Betteridge, Bain.

Port Vale: King, Turner, Potts, Leake, Hamlett (now the trainer) Sproson (Present Manager) Hulligan, Polk, Barber, Griffiths, Bennett.

Referee: Alf Bond. Result: Swindon 2 Port Vale 0.

Our average gate that season was 10,936, league position 16th. Maurice Owen was top scorer with 18 goals, and George Hudson an ever present with 46 appearances. Brian Farr, father of the present reserves centre-forward played eight times in the Senior Team.

Port Vale's best season was 1953/54 when

they reached the Semi-final of the F.A. Cup. They narrowly failed to make history by becoming the first Third Division side to reach the Cup Final, losing 1 - 2 at Villa Park to their First Division neighbours West Bromwich Albion (the eventual winners) by a penalty goal. The unkindest cut of all was, it was scored by Ronnie Allen, one of their former players.

However Port Vale gained promotion from Division Three with the following record.

They stayed up for three seasons but in 1957 they came out of Division Two for the fifth time. They found themselves in Division Three (South) for the decisive season of 1957/58 in which the top 12 of the Southern and Northern sections were to establish the new Third Division.

Vale failed to make the grade by three places, so in August 1958 they broke still more new ground as one of the founder members of Division Four. They earned the distinction of being first champions of the Leagues Basement, but in 1965 in company with Luton, Barnsley and Colchester they fell back into the Fourth Division.

Brave Vale Bid to Fail?

Though Port Vale made a tremendous late bid to break into the promotion bracket, it was beginning to look as if they would have to concede defeat. If they lost at Plymouth on Saturday then their chances must now be considered nil. Even if they won, the odds will still be in favour of Charlton taking third place . . . but, of course, that would, at least, have left a chance of a Charlton flop making it turn out good for Vale.

Even if they fail to gain promotion, Port Vale can look back on an outstanding season, the club's biggest disappointment being the size of their home attendances. Vale Park's crowds have hovered around the 4,500 mark, even though the club has been on the fringe of the promotion race most of the campaign.

Manager Roy Sproson, their former full-back who took charge at the end of last season, has fashioned his side around a very good defence. One of his early signings was goalkeeper John Connaughton from Sheffield United. Connaughton has enjoyed a colourful, and varied, career so far. He set out with Manchester United, getting the occasional first-team game for the Reds. While at Old Trafford he was loaned out to both Halifax and Torquay before being transferred to Sheffield United for £20,000 in 1973.

Several players have been occupying the back four positions in recent matches, among them Tony Lacey, Colin Tartt, David Harris, John Ridley and Garry Dulson.

Lacey, who arrived on a free transfer from local rivals Stoke City in 1970, has been a regular for most of his stay. Formerly a

midfield player, he has been turning out at right-back in recent weeks. Tartt, discovered by Vale, made his League bow in 1972/73.

David Harris is another player to graduate through the juniors. He won his first-team chance last season, as did John Ridley who took the same route to success.

Dulson learned his game with Nottingham Forest, joining Vale earlier this season on loan.

Contenders for midfield places include Brian Horton, Tom McLaren, Terry Bailey and Frank Sharp.

Horton has been a Vale regular for five years and is now their penalty-taker. With 13 goals before the weekend, he is also one of their leading scorers. McLaren came into the side in 1967/68 while Bailey joined the club as a professional last summer and was top scorer with 14 goals before Saturday.

Sharp came into English football with Carlisle in 1966 after a spell with Hearts. He then went to Southport on loan before transferring to Cardiff in 1969. Another move took him to Barnsley a year later and he spent last season with Grimsby.

John Woodward, Ray Williams and Derek Brownbill are the strikers. Woodward, who joined the club from Walsall two seasons ago, was top scorer last season with 18 goals and had hit four before the weekend this term.

Williams arrived from Stafford Rangers in 1972 and was top scorer in his first season at Vale Park. Brownbill was signed from

Liverpool in February. Though he got the odd game in the Reds senior side, it wasn't until his transfer that he won a regular League place.

Manager Roy Sproson made his name with Vale as a full-back, making fantastic total of 761 League appearances for them between 1950 and 1972, only three short of the all-time record held by Portsmouth's Jimmy Dickinson. When he retired, Mr. Sproson took up coaching duties and last season, when Gordon Lee left for Blackburn, he was appointed manager.

Vale did not make a particularly good start to the season, winning only one of their opening six League games. After that they showed a steady improvement, though their away form kept letting them down. It wasn't until their tenth away trip, to Bournemouth, that Vale managed to collect both points. They won 2 - 1 at Dean Court in November.

Since then they have won at Peterborough (2 - 0) and Southend (3 - 1).

If they could have reproduced their home form when travelling, Vale would have tied up promotion weeks ago. The only visiting team to win in the Potteries this season was Peterborough who chalked up a 3 - 1 success in January.

Formed in 1876, Vale became founder members of the Second Division in 1892. The first taste of League football was all too brief, though. After only four seasons they failed to gain re-election and found themselves back in junior circles. Within two years they had regained their place and remained until 1907 when they resigned from the competition.

Vale's next re-appearance in League football came in unique circumstances which may never be repeated. In October 1919 Leeds City F.C. was dissolved by the F.A. for alleged illegal practices and Port Vale were elected to take over their fixtures.

They remained in Division two until 1929 and during the 'thirties they jockeyed

between the Second and Third Divisions, finally resting in the Third in 1936, just before war broke out.

The Second Division welcomed them back in 1954 but this, their last spell in that section, lasted only three years. When the Fourth Division was formed in 1958 Vale became a founder member but they won the championship first time out, in brilliant style, to return to grade three.

They almost regained a place in Division Two in 1963. When they missed promotion by only four points, yet two years later they were relegated again. By 1970 they were back in Division Three.

Last season they were only one place from relegation again, though there was a fairly healthy margin of seven points between them and the first of the relegated clubs.

Vale's finest achievement was in reaching the semi-final of the F.A. Cup in 1954 --- one of only four Third Division clubs ever to achieve that distinction. They were beaten only 1 - 2 by West Bromwich Albion, who went on to win at Wembley.

Vale twice won the championship of the old Third Division (North) in 1930 and 1954 and were Fourth Division champions in 1959.

At Vale Park earlier this season we went 2 - 0 up after only 16 through goals from Hubbard and Moss. But goals by Williams and Sharp leveled up the final score to 2-2.

The Chairmans Column

Tonight is our last home league game of the season, and on behalf of my Board of Directors I would like to thank you for your loyal support throughout this season.

We are all naturally disappointed at our failure to win promotion, but I am sure that we can look forward with confidence to next season.

On Saturday last an award to the Supporters of the Year was made to Mr. Paul Ploughman of Tonbridge, Kent, and to Mr. Andrew Fitzgerald from Hove in Sussex. This award was adjudicated by a panel of judges from the Supporters Club. Nominations were received for this award from friends of these loyal supporters, and many considerations were taken into account in arriving at their final decision. I am sure that both Mr. Ploughman and Mr. Fitzgerald will be the first to say that we at Swindon have many such fine supporters, and to all those of you who travel to all our away matches, may I say a special thank you.

As you will have read in our local paper, we have come up with a scheme by which we can admit our standing customers for just under 55p. per match. This, of course, means purchasing a season ticket, but the cost of this can be paid into our office by instalments, as long as the final instalment is paid before the beginning of next season.

With the season ending for league fixtures we naturally look forward to the Cup Final at Wembley, and as is usual, the hunt for a cup final ticket begins. This has always been a headache for our Staff, because so few tickets are available. Each year the Finalists are besieged from their followers, and last year for the first time the competing clubs allocation was increased. This naturally meant a cut back in the allocation to Club and County Associations. This year we at Swindon have had a further reduction of more than

50% to our allocation because we are only associates and not full members of the league as we were when in Division Two. Resulting from this we have had to reduce our allocation to shareholders to 4 tickets and our allocation to our Supporters Club to 2 tickets. We have only enough tickets to allot 1 each to the senior players, and these tickets are only for standing. before anyone asks where they are distributed to, I would like to say that we have in the past tried to let the people who do voluntary work for us throughout the year have the chance of a ticket, but this year we have had to prune even this, so please try and understand the position and not worry our staff for requests.

We also get a full list of enquiries for the International versus Scotland, and being played at Wembley this year will make this list longer, and here again we have only a very limited allocation and cannot even start to satisfy the demand. We only hope that we shall have these headaches as a club ourselves again soon, and I know we shall look forward to the next season as our season.

Port Vale has been served by many loyal people including Mr. Norman Jones, the secretary who has worked for the club, for nearly a generation. He helped keep Vale alive in the Second World War by running their Junior Team, and from 1941 to 1948 he gave his services as secretary in an honorary capacity.

The present manager is Mr. Roy Sproson, who played 761 games for Port Vale from 1950 to 1972, and the trainer is Mr. Hamlett, also a former player.

The last time we played Port Vale at Swindon was in 1962/63 our promotion year, and we lost both games. On 27th October 1962 we were beaten at Port Vale 1 - 2. Swindon scorer Cliff Jackson. At home on 16th March 1963 the visitors won 3 - 2.

Third Division Scene

ARGYLE FIRST TO MAKE SURE

Plymouth Argyle were the first side to make absolutely sure of promotion when they defeated visiting Colchester United 1 - 0 before a 23,551 crowd at Home Park last week. Thus Argyle return to Division Two after a six-year absence. The decisive goal, a spectacular one, was netted by Paul Mariner. It was his 20th of the season.

Argyle's crowds this season have rocketed from an early average of 5,000 to around the 15,000 mark as their promotion drive gathered momentum. Their smallest attendance was 5,175 for Aldershot's visit in October. Argyle won 1 - 0 to begin a run of 16 games without defeat.

And as they shot up the table, so did their gates. Blackburn's visit in February drew 28,744 - - - Home Park's biggest League attendance for 15 years.

By now Blackburn Rovers should have joined Argyle in the Second Division and it seemed almost certain that the third place would go to Charlton Athletic.

Though we can feel sympathy for those clubs who so narrowly missed - - - particularly Crystal Palace whose team and ground deserve something better than a Third Division existence - - - it is a good thing for football that three such well-known clubs, who have recently fallen upon hard times, should be making their ways back up the scale.

Plymouth spent most of their League career in the Second Division, even though they have never aspired to anything higher. Blackburn and Charlton, of course, are both ex-First Division clubs. Blackburn won the League Championship twice and the F.A. Cup six times, including one hat-trick of successes before the turn of the century

Charlton never won the Championship but they did finish runners-up in their first campaign in the top section, to cap a fantastic performance in rising from the Third Division to runners-up in Division One within the space of three seasons - - - a feat no club is likely to repeat. Charlton also won the F.A. Cup in 1947 after losing at Wembley a year earlier.

Preston's failure to maintain their promotion challenge was a big disappointment to player-manager Bobby Charlton, whose team looked ready to jump straight back into Division Two by mid-February. Yet, at the moment when Preston really needed to pull out all the stops, they went into decline. Prior to last Saturday's game, they had managed only one win in ten matches.

Crystal Palace's failure to gain promotion came as a joy to those clubs who will remain with them in Division Three next season for they were by far the best supported side in the division, with an average of more than 17,000.

Providing Palace can make a similar challenge next season, their loyal fans are likely to remain, for in spite of setbacks over the years Palace have always been able to command big crowds. They still hold the record average for any Fourth Division club when they returned figures of 19,020 in 1960/61.

Apart from Sheffield Wednesday's Hillsborough stadium, Palace will without doubt be able to claim they have the finest ground - - - and probably, still, the finest fans - - - in the Third Division next season.
