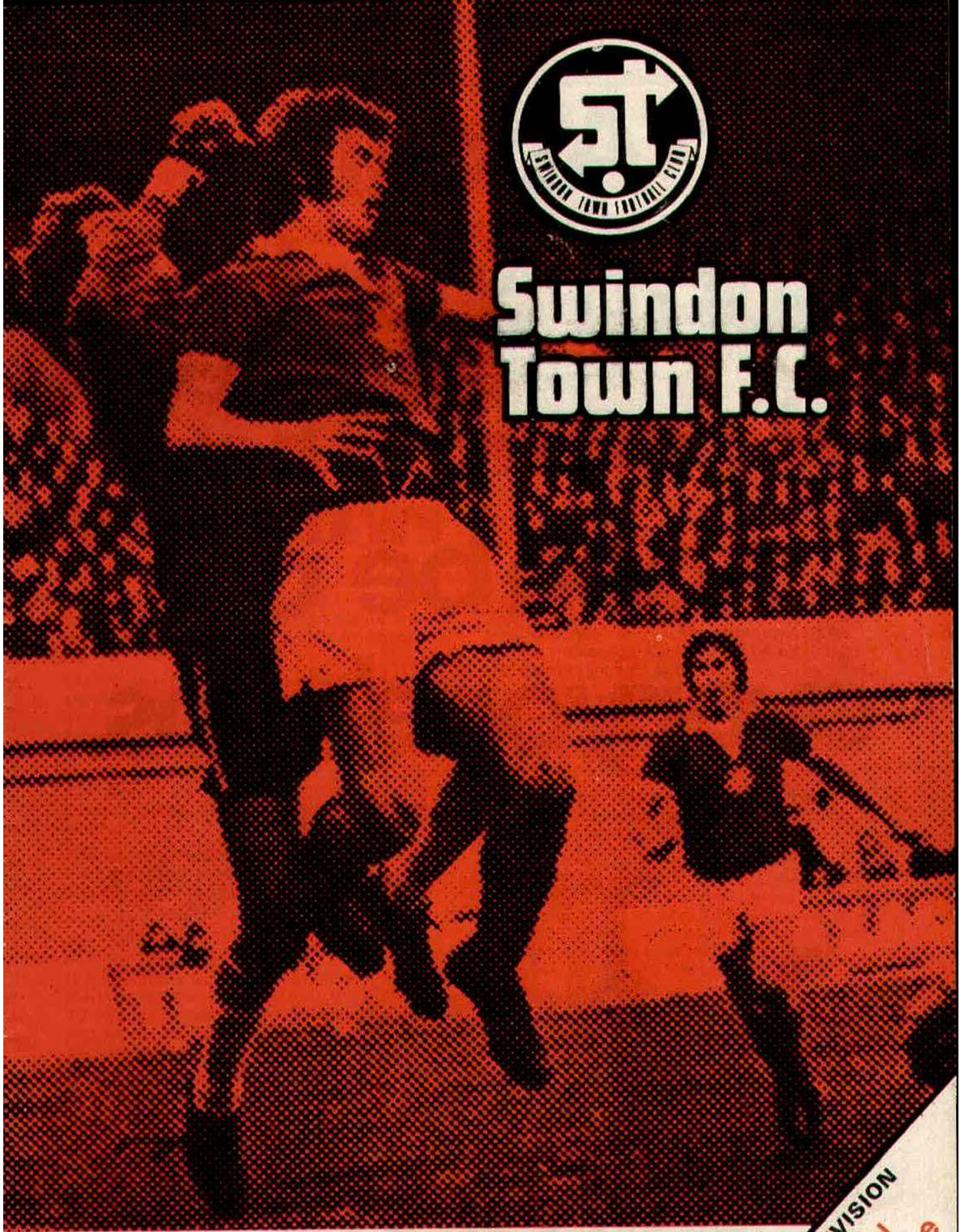




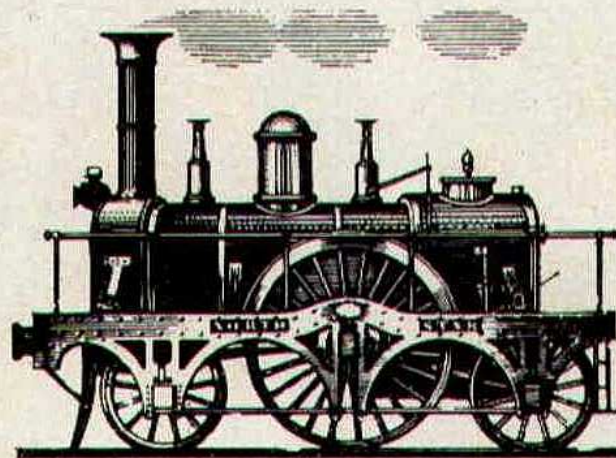

NEWS & VIEWS

Again we welcome to the County Ground, our friends from Grimsby Town, and hope the game will be as enjoyable as that played on Saturday 2nd November 1974.

Our opponents played really good football and the result was in doubt up to the final whistle. The game fluctuated, with the first half full of incident, and a score-line of 2 - 2 at the interval. In the second half Swindon managed to score the winning goal, after an exciting match, played in a splendid spirit. Our scorers were McLaughlin, Syrett and Wigginton (o.g.) while Lewis and Hubbard replied for the visitors.

This season Grimsby has made quite a good start and today occupy 7th place in the League Table with the following record:

It is interesting to note that Swindon has played the same number of games, has a goal average of 10/16 (almost identical to that of Grimsby) and yet has only won three games, and drawn two and gained 8 points against Grimsby's 13.

Such are the vagaries of goals and results our visitors success has been mainly at home, as on four occasions away they have failed to score. That same figure applies to Swindon, and unfortunately on two occasions we have not scored at home.

However we hope for many more goals this afternoon. A repeat performance will be most pleasing.

The financial side of football is very much in the news these days, and it was most interesting to

read the views of Mr. Jimmy Hill, Sports Commentator on B.B.C. Television, and the man who had much to do with the removal of the maximum wage in Football: He writes in the Arsenal Programme as follows:

"There have got to be big changes in football. For a start, a lot of League clubs and players will have to go part-time — or out of business. In hard times you have to pull your belts in, and going part-time is the sensible thing to do.

Whatever division you are in, there are two-priorities in football; to be solvent and to be successful. And of these two solvency is definitely No.1.

Lifting of the maximum wage was inevitable but there should be a maximum wage within every club in the interests of their own survival. It should be governed simply by what they can afford to pay. It's vital for clubs to control their own affairs and financially, run their players — not vice versa."

Dare we comment? I would agree with Priority No. 1, obviously if a club is insolvent, it cannot function. I would not agree the "Lifting of the maximum wage was inevitable". The raising of the figure certainly.

As regards other ideas and remedies, many think the answer is to make Football more entertaining thus encouraging more supporters and increased revenue.

This must have been a night of nostalgia for the fans and the supporters of both sides gave Mike a great ovation as he said his farewells to the City, but I am sure that he is far from finished and will be out to prove this point when he returns to Manchester with Burnley.

Mike is playing at the present mid-field which is something new for him.

In these days of newspaper reporting on the unsportsman like happenings it is nice to hear of the more pleasant side of the player's life and I can assure you that if it is bold warfare on the field sometimes it is always a great friendship off the field.

On Sunday last a dinner was given in Mike's honour and over four hundred people attended this function held in the Piccadilly Hotel Manchester.

Attending this function was another of our favourites in Rod Thomas. Rod you will remember came from Gloucester when Mike

came from Cheltenham and Rod's story of success still continues as he is a firm favourite with Derby County and of course the current full-back at Wolves.

Rod was spending the weekend with Francis Lee who has been a great friend of Mike's since his City days.

It was a gathering of Sportsmen and the Cricket world was represented by Colin Millburn who used to excite cricket followers with his aggressive balling.

I also met Bobby Charlton during the evening and although not connected with a club at the moment. I think that it will not be long before he is. I am sure that Football can benefit from his experience.

This season Joe Butler will have completed ten years in our service and I know that everyone will agree that Joe has always given us one hundred per cent.

FRANK BARTON (Midfield). A former youth international, Frank began his professional career with Scunthorpe United, making his League debut in 1964/65. He was the club's top scorer in his last full season before moving on to Carlisle in 1968. Blackpool signed him for £20,000 in 1972 but he was on the move again a year later --- to Grimsby.

JACKIE LEWIS (Striker). Jackie is once again Grimsby's leading scorer, with 6 goals. He has been top for the past two seasons, netting 22 last term. Grimsby signed him from Lincoln City in January 1970.

Third Division Scene by Tony Pullein

Bury's unbeaten run of 10 League games came to a sticky end at Peterborough where they crashed 0 - 4. Until then, the Shakers had been the only unbeaten side in the Football League. The man who did most of the damage was Tommy Robson who hit three of the goals.

Bury's demise left Crystal Palace as the only Third Division club with an unbeaten away record, something only Fourth Division Huddersfield in the entire Football League could equal. Palace maintained their lead at the top of the table by drawing 0 - 0 at Preston where they were watched by Rodney Marsh, the transfer-listed Manchester City player who was expecting to sign for the London club this week.

If the deal has been completed, Marsh will be the third Manchester City man to follow Malcolm Allison to Selhurst Park, Derek Jeffries and Jeff Johnson having been established members of the side for some while.

Marsh's arrival would seem to make almost certain that Palace will win promotion this season for they have one of the most talented sides the Third Division has seen in years. Jeffries, Johnson, Stuart Jump and Phillip Holder are all experienced First Division players as are Peter Wall, Tony Burns and Alan Whittle though the latter three have not been in the team recently. Palace also possess England under-23 winger Peter Taylor.

Wrexham maintained their 100 per cent home record with a 2 - 0 win over us We were the last visiting side to succeed at the Racecourse in the League last April.

Since then only one visiting side -- Aldershot, on the opening day of this season -- has even managed to score there. Wrexham did lose at home in the League Cup, however, when Mansfield defeated them 2 - 1.

Hereford United, who have crept almost unnoticed into the top three, won their third away game in succession at Halifax where a Dudley Tyler goal gave them both points. Quite a transformation for the Edgar Street outfit who, prior to this successful burst, had endured a run of 17 away League games without a win.

Brighton, the Third Division's highest-scoring team with 22 goals, looked set for their fifth win on the trot when Neil Martin put them ahead soon after the interval at Grimsby. But

the home side recovered and goals from Ron Wigg and Jack Lewis extended their unbeaten home record to 23 League games.

Brighton, were without top scorer Fred Binney and Barry Butlin, the latter having returned to Nottingham Forest after a successful loan spell at The Goldstone Ground.

Binney remains one of the Third Division's most successful strikers, in spite of his absence:

Tommy Casey

Tommy Casey has done just about everything imaginable in football during more than a quarter of a century's dedication to the game. He played in all divisions of the Football League, won 12 caps for Northern Ireland and won an F.A. Cup winners' medal as a player. Later he gained experience as manager and coach at several top clubs.

Born in Bangor, Northern Ireland, Mr. Casey joined Leeds United as a teenager but, after only four League games with them, he transferred to Bournemouth in 1950. At Dean Court he quickly earned a reputation as a firm-tackling, enthusiastic human dynamo of a wing-half.

Within two years he had joined Newcastle United.

Events took a strange twist for him in 1955. Though he lost his place in the Newcastle side, he won his first Irish cap, against Wales, in April

and three weeks later he was in the Newcastle side which beat Manchester City 3 - 1 at Wembley!

His international career spanned four years, by which time he had transferred to Portsmouth. But his was only a brief stay at Fratton Park before moving on to Bristol City where he remained an important member of their senior squad until 1962/63.

From Ashton Gate he went to Southern League Gloucester City as player manager until Swansea offered him a coaching appointment which lasted for 18 months. Then he returned to his native Northern Ireland to manage Distillery.

From this stemmed coaching jobs at Everton and Coventry before he got his first opportunity to manage a League club last season when accepting the Grimsby challenge.

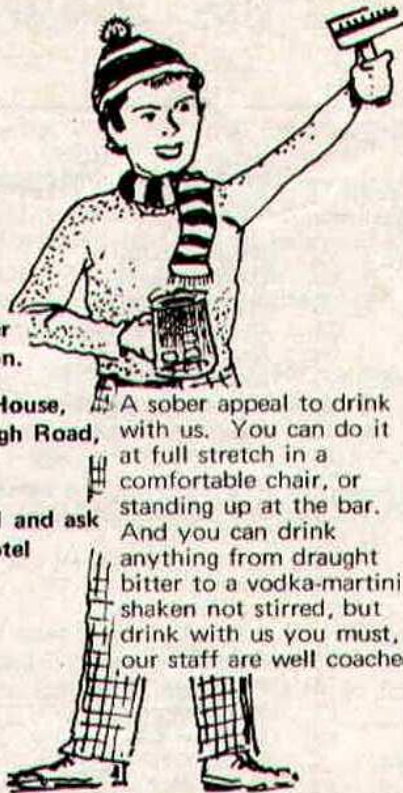
