

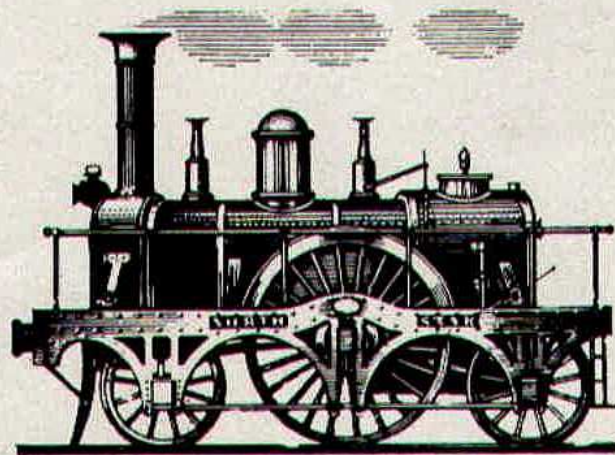

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NEWS & VIEWS

This afternoon we have great pleasure in entertaining Preston North End original members of the League in 1888 and the first club to achieve the League and F.A. Cup in that season.

Though it's a long while since they won anything big, the name of Preston North End is still revered throughout the game. They were the first of the game's giants and some of their early feats may never be bettered.

Last season Swindon won 1 - 0 against Preston North End at home on February 15th with a goal scored by Eastoe before a crowd of 11,892. It was a vital game as Swindon at that time were fourth and Preston fifth in the League table. On the following Tuesday the return game was played at Deepdale and Preston won 2 - 0 with goals from Elwiss and Morley.

Preston at that time were managed by Bobby Charlton who resigned in the early weeks of this season due to the Board's decision to sell centre-half, John Bird to Newcastle United. Unfortunately many clubs are faced with the same problem, and Chairman, Alan Jones, had no alternative due to the large bank overdraft, and he was no doubt very sad to be faced with Bobby Charlton's resignation as well.

However the new manager is now Harry Catterick, a man with vast experience as a player and manager in the game. Brought up in the Everton tradition of skilful and thoughtful football, he formulated and established a distinctly recognisable style of play for Everton which owes something to the old "push and run" devised by Arthur Rowe at Tottenham Hotspur in the 1950's.

Many will remember that wonderful display by Everton at the County Ground on Tuesday, January 29th, 1963 in the F.A. Cup, Fourth Round. It was during the big freeze-up, in fact the first game at the County Ground since January 12th when Swindon, donned in basketball boots and yellow gloves, proceeded to win 5 - 0 against Queens Park Rangers much to manager Alan Stock's dismay.

No doubt many of our older supporters will recall the Everton game in which they played wonderful football on a muddy and slippery pitch and proceed to win 5 - 1 before a crowd of nearly 26,000.

We welcome Mr. Catterick back to the County Ground but hope that score will be reversed in Swindon's favour and the attendance reaches that figure today!

No doubt Preston will provide tough opposition today with former Swindon Town centre-forward, Ray Treacy, back from his successful European Championship game with Republic of Ireland against Turkey.

Congratulations "Trace" and also to Ian Hand (centre-half of Republic of Ireland), who played at outside-right for Swindon Reserves in Season 1964/65. A former Preston goalkeeper, and now the club's second team coach is also the assistant manager to Republic of Ireland. Well played lads.

Preston's chief-coach is Nobby Stiles that well known character formerly with Manchester United, Middlesbrough and a member of England's 1966 World Cup winning team. After watching England against Czechoslovakia, on the television, no doubt Norbet was itching to get his England shirt back on.

Unfortunately on Match of the Day on Saturday a very bad incident was shown, which involved two ex-England players. I realise a few years ago, there was not so much publicity and television in football, but I often wonder why some present-day footballers do not follow the example set by Tom Finney, who was for me a credit to the game in playing skills and the manner in which he played the game. A credit to the game and his club, Preston North End.

Many great players have graced the Preston shirt, probably the best known character is Bill Shankly who joined Preston in the early 'thirties. After several months of playing in the reserves, his name initially appeared on the first-team sheet, he told the player he was replacing: "You may as well pack in now because I'm staying in the team!"

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JOHN McMAHON (Defender) John has been Preston's right-back for the past four years after making his initial appearance in 1970/71. That season he also played a few games while on loan to Southend.

League record: Southend (loan) 4 aps.; Preston 156 aps. 4 gls.

GARY WILLIAMS (Defender). Yet another locally-produced player in the Preston side, Gary is this season enjoying his first real run as a regular though he has played spasmodically over the past four seasons.

League record: Preston 31(4) aps. 1 gl.

DAVID SADLER (Defender). An England amateur international striker in his days with Maidstone United, David joined Manchester United in 1962 and while with them won youth, under-23 and full caps for England, after switching to centre-back. Preston had to pay a £25,000 fee for his signature in 1973.

League record: Man. United 265(5) aps. 22 gls.; Preston 59(1) aps. 2 gls.

JIMMY BROWN (Midfield). Jimmy is on loan from Aston Villa for whom he made his League debut in 1969/70 when he was only 15. Though he later held his place for a couple of seasons, he was unable to get into the Villa team this term.

League record: A.Villa 72(4) aps. 2 gls.; Preston 3 aps.

MIKE ELWISS (Striker). Preston signed Mike from Doncaster for £70,000 in 1974 after he had twice topped Rovers' scoring list. He has since been scoring regularly for Preston and has four to his credit this season.

League record: Doncaster 96(1) aps. 30 gls.; Preston 66(1) aps. 19 gls.

ROY TUNKS (Goalkeeper). Roy took over in Preston's goal in Nov. 1974, immediately after his £15,000 transfer from Rotherham. Earlier last season he went on loan to Newcastle, though he didn't play in their senior team. Roy made his League debut for Rotherham in 1967/68 and the following season spent some weeks on loan to York.

ALEX BRUCE (Midfield). Preston re-signed Alex this season, after selling him to Newcastle for £150,000 in 1973. Prior to that he was a striker, twice topping the club's scoring list.
League record: Preston 55(7) aps. 22 gls.; Newcastle 16(4) aps. 3 gls.; Preston 8(1) aps. 3 gls.

FRANCIS BURNS (Midfield). Francis is a Scottish full and under-23 international who spent five years as a Manchester United first-teamer. He was transferred to Southampton for £50,000 in 1972 but, unable to settle down south, he was pleased to move on again, to Preston, a year later. League record: Man. United 115(8) aps. 6 gls.; Southampton 20(1) aps.; Preston 99 aps. 8 gls.

RAY TREACY (Striker). The former Swindon player is Preston's top scorer with nine goals. After kicking off with W.B.A., Ray spent five years with Charlton before joining us in 1972. He moved on to Deepdale after about 18 months. He has 33 Eire caps.
League record: W.B.A. 2(1) aps. 1 gl.; Charlton 144(5) aps. 43 gls.; Swindon 55 aps. 16 gls.; Preston 39(3) aps. 7 gls.; Oldham (loan) 3 aps. 1 gl.

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TONY MORLEY (Striker). Tony came through the junior teams to make his senior bow in 1972/73 and won a regular place last season. He has hit four goals this term.

Third Division Scene

PAIN NOT THE ONLY RECORD BREAKER

Terry Paine finally broke his old friend's record of Football League appearances when he played his 765th League match against Peterborough United recently. The former England winger didn't have the record-breaking stage to himself, however, for on the same day Mansfield's Sandy Pate was equalling a new club record with his 417th senior game. The Third Division, in fact, is the home of many of the game's "elder statesmen".

When Jimmy Dickinson retired in 1965 with his wonderful record of 764 League appearances for Portsmouth, Terry Paine set his sights on beating that total. The two men are old friends having spent most of their careers with neighbouring clubs. Paine made 713 of his League appearances for Southampton.

"It's rather nice to feel that we shall both remain in the record books," reflected Terry. "After all, Jimmy played all his games for one club. There's no one else around at the moment likely to do that apart from John Trollope, of Swindon, who is around the 630 mark".

The first of Paine's many League games was at Brentford in 1957. This is how his record was built up:

Sandy Pate played his 417th senior game for Mansfield against Preston, thus equalling Don Bradley's achievement between 1949 and 1962. Pate began his career with Watford and moved on to Mansfield in 1967.

More than half the Third Division clubs have players with more than 400 League appearances behind them. No one can match John Trollope's wonderful run, the nearest to that being Arfon Griffiths' 500-plus League games for Wrexham.

Griffiths achieved that in two spells with the club. He transferred to Arsenal in 1961 and played 15 First Division games for them before returning to his original club. It wasn't until he had reached the twilight of his career that he gained the first of his several Welsh caps in 1970/71.

Wrexham also possess another senior professional in skipper Eddie May who this season passed the 400 mark during service with Southend and his present club.

Indeed, many of these veterans seem to go in pairs. Peterborough have Bert Murray and Tommy Robson both totting up towards 500 while Chester's Derek Draper and Reg Matthewson are both past 400.

Aldershot's Len Walker chalked up his 400 last season as did his club mate, striker Jack Howarth. Len Walker has been fractionally ahead of Howarth but either could claim the club record for appearances when they finally quit. Howarth has for a long while held the club record for goals scored.

Look in at Halifax and you'll discover Sid Farrimond and Albert Phelan have both broken the 400 barrier. Another Swindon player to come into the "senior" class is, of course, Frank Burrows.

Brighton's Peter Grummitt, Cardiff's Brian Clark and Bury's Billy Rudd can all be classified in the veteran class. So it seems as if the moral is --- if you want to watch the experienced players in action, support a Third Division club!

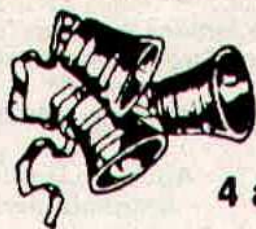

Danny's Desk

It is not often that a football club experiences such an injury problem over such a long period as we are undergoing at the present time. I realise that the Third Division is very physical and that our players are purists rather than relying on their physique but other footballing sides in the Division are not suffering as we are and I cannot explain therefore why these injuries are happening - injuries that effect varying parts from the pelvis to the spine, from the hamstring to the ankle. The result of these injuries is that we cannot field the same side for two consecutive games and this can only have an adverse effect upon the team performance. However I am sure that this situation cannot continue and I would ask for your continued support through this difficult period.

Despite our indifferent results the generosity of some of our supporters continues as strong as ever. Already match balls have been donated

for every league match this season and also for the first home F.A. Cup match should we be fortunate enough to have one. Thank you very much ball donors. We are already receiving enquiries regarding our sponsorship of playing kit and I would assure would be donors that we shall be making this appeal again shortly.

I expect most of you heard that my home since leaving Mansfield has been a caravan at Latton - well, my wife and I have now moved into a new bungalow at Lechlade and have settled very nicely with our two children into that lovely part of the country. I only want to get the team performance as settled and I shall be a very happy man.

Owing to the numerous injuries sustained, I went to Bristol City and obtained the loan of John Emanuel a very useful midfield player.

HARRY CATTERICK

Harry Catterick was delighted to get back into the day-to-day affairs of soccer management when Preston invited him to succeed Bobby Charlton this season. Mr. Catterick had spent the past two seasons in an executive capacity with Everton following an exceedingly successful spell as their manager.

After taking over as Everton's manager in April 1961 Harry Catterick plotted two League Championship successes (1963 and 1970) and one F.A. Cup final victory (1966) and suffered the disappointment of a Wembley defeat in 1968.

Injuries and the war wrecked his playing career with Everton and it was in 1951 that he first tried his hand at management -- as player-manager of Crewe. Two years later he moved on to become manager of Rochdale and it was at Scotland that his methods caught the admiration of bigger clubs. But he preferred to turn down early offers until he felt he had completed his "apprenticeship" in the rough and tumble of Third Division (North) soccer.

Eventually Sheffield Wednesday persuaded him it was time to move into a higher division. He reaped quick rewards at Hillsborough, leading them to the championship of Division Two at the end of his first season.

But his greatest successes were achieved with Everton.

A serious illness forced him to retire from management at Everton who showed their appreciation by ensuring him alternative employment. After more than two years away from the tensions of management at the top, Harry Catterick has regained all his old enthusiasm.

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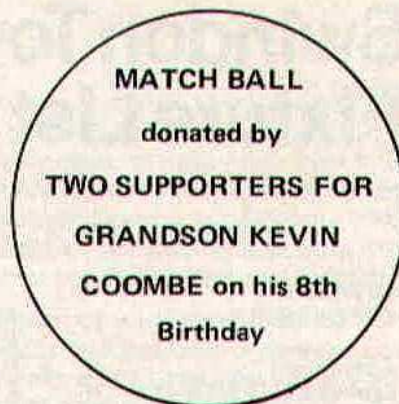
