

Our visitors today revive memories of many epic struggles. Probably the one that stands out in the minds of some of our older supporters is the replay at Peterborough in the F.A. Cup Second Round in December 1955.

We defeated Hereford United (then in the Southern League) in the First Round by 4 goals to nil. Swindon was drawn at home in the next round. Peterborough then right in the news as the outstanding non-league club, came to the County Ground with a huge following, and full of confidence. Manager George Swindin (Ex Arsenal goalkeeper), had produced an outstanding team, backed by great enthusiasm on the part of the Directors and Club Officials.

A very exciting match produced a draw, one goal each with Swindon being rather fortunate.

We travelled to Peterborough on the following Wednesday, with a certain amount of trepidation.

However after a hard fought ninety minutes, honours again were even, one goal each. Fortunately, in extra time Jimmy Cross scored from a quickly taken free kick by Tony McShane.

In the Third Round we defeated another nonleague club, Worksop Town by the only goal scored. Finally, in the Fourth Round we lost to Charlton, (Division 1) at the Valley, but only after a great fight by Swindon.

1955-56 was one of the seasons when we were passing through a very difficult period financial, and playing wise. To revise memories, Geoff Fox was a part-time player manager. The rest of the team comprised Sam Burton, George Hunt, Jimmy Cross, George Hudson, Tony McShane, David Gibson, Andy Micklewright, Maurice Owen, Bob Edwards, and Jimmy Brennan.

The Reserve team was composed of part-time and amateur players, with a trainer, working in a voluntary capacity.

Both clubs have passed through many hard times, with their ups and downs, but although conditions are still difficult, both clubs are firmly established.

While we are striving to move away from the bottom four positions in the league table, Peterborough has a chance of gaining promotion. At the time of writing they have 33 points from 27 games, while Shrewsbury in third position has 36 points from 29 games.

Today's game is a vital one for both clubs. We need the points urgently, to move up the league table, while our opponents require the points to maintain their challenge for promotion.

Last season we lost at home 0-1 in December, but in March when we visited London Road, the match ended in a 0-0 draw.

There was little difference between the records of the two clubs at the end of the season.

# Talk of the Town

# By the Chairman

With several mid week fixtures to fulfull, between our normal Saturday home games it makes these notes appear a little out of date. Every supporter that attended our mid week game against Aldershot seems to have enjoyed the game except of course the Aldershot contingency, and the result from this kind of game was an upsurge of enthusiasm, such as people writing in to support the Club through sponsorship of one kind or another. We have received many letters of approval not just for the fact of winning, but for the entertainment given. We also received accolades from Preston Supporters, but unfortunately, we lost both points there. The League position is very open at the moment with a few wins sending Clubs close to promotion and of course a few losses would cause headaches at the other end, increasing the number of clubs to be promoted and likewise relegated, has certainly kept an interest in League positions right to the end of the season.

This coming week a meeting of Club Chairmen will be held in London to vote on the proposal for changes to the structure of the terms of employment of all footballers registered with the Football League. Many months of discussion between a Negotiating Committee and the Football League and the Professional Footballers Association has resulted in a final draught proposal. The Manager's and Secretary's Association have come out against the new proposals, if not in full at least against the proposals they consider are detrimental to the playing future of their players. I am confident that the proposals as a package will be rejected by the Clubs at the meeting in London whilst approving the sensible suggestions which will help the players without upsetting the present system.

Never in the history of football has there been such an economic crisis affecting three parts of the League structure as there is today and all Clubs, having to face these facts, cannot commit suicide by paying out vast sums of money in the transfer market. We at Swindon are determined with your help to keep our standards high and with this thought in mind we look forward to the success of our New Supporters Club which is making rapid progress each week. Our Sport Shop managed so ably by Dougy Woodman is attracting new customers each

week and sports clubs come from all round to discuss their needs with Doug. Already some Clubs are thinking of the coming cricket season, and although the shop window is dressed with the winter sports equipment, behind the scenes Doug is well prepared for the requirements of summer games.

This week we held a meeting with our Liasion Officers and in case some might wonder what this organisation is all about it is a group of supporters from a wide area from which we draw our support in the country districts who make themselves responsible for keeping such support up to date with Club news, that we are able to get printed in their local newspapers. It is an amazing fact that we cannot get our area reporters to report our football news. The Wiltshire Gazette whose headquarters are at Swindon, a newspaper widely read in country areas, gets very little coverage, especially the team news. We are constantly being pressed by supporters in the areas around Swindon to give them more news and we keep trying, but up to now with little success. In my next notes, I will give you more information about the Liasion Officers, and where they can be contacted.

JON NIXON (Striker), Jon gave up a teaching career to turn professional with Notts County, made over 150 League appearances for the Meadow Lane cluband topped their scorers three seasons ago - before transferring to Peterborough last season. JOHN COZENS (Striker). With 25 goals, John was one of the Fourth Division's leading scorers two seasons ago. He played for Southern League Hillingdon until Notts County signed him in 1970. 

# `WEMBLEY HERE WE COME!'- say Palace

Back in the grey days of November, when F.A. Cup frenzy still centred around such places as Spennymoor, Wimbledon and Stafford, Crystal Palace manager Malcolm Allison predicted: "Palace are going to win the Cup this season!"

As no Third Division club has ever achieved that — much less, even appeared in a final — most critics put that remark down as merely another Allison gimmick. Yet, privately, the man himself was at pains to emphasise that he was in all earnest.

Well, now that Palace have added Chelsea to Leeds among their string of conquests, perhaps people will begin to take them seriously? An away game against the winners of the Sunderland—Stoke replay will be taken in its stride by confident Palace. Their victory at Chelsea, incidentally, caused quite a family feud. For Chelsea defender Ron Harris's brother Allan—a former Chelsea player himself—is now a part-time Palace "spy" and it was upon his report that Palace based their winning Stamford Bridge strategy.

It was a happy day, too, for Palace coach Terry Venables, who, as a former Chelsea midfield star, added this to many other happy memories of Stamford Bridge.

The Third Division's only other F.A. Cup survivors, Southend United, lost predictably at Derby against the League Champions. The surprising thing was, in most folks' eyes, the narrowness of the score. In spite of subjecting the Southend defence to tremendous pressure, Derby could only score once and, even then, Bruce Rioch only succeeded at the second attempt when goalkeeper Malcolm Webster failed to hold the ball.

Some folk may believe in the old adage — never go back. Not Alan Ball senior who has just returned for his second spell as manager of Halifax Town. In his previous era he led them to promotion for the only time in club history and very nearly got them into the Second Division. After leaving The Shay, Mr. Ball took over at Preston and then accepted some continental appointments before joining Southport last Season. Now, back at Halifax, his only concern is to get the club out of the last four

positions. Their defeat at home to bottom team Mansfield last Saturday was their fifth reverse in succession.

Defeat for leaders Hereford United, at Grimsby, will probably prove only a temporary obstacle on their road to the Second Division. If Hereford do make it they will break all records for this is only their fourth season as a Football League club. Previous best rise from non-League circles to Division Two was by Oxford who did it in six years.

Hereford had collected 14 points from their previous eight matches and Grimsby's success must make them rue their terrible away record. Grimsby are the only Third Division side with an unbeaten home record, yet they have picked up only three away points. Grimsby's last home League defeat was by Huddersfield in October 1974, since when they have remained unbeaten in 32 matches.

Grimsby's magnificent home record was spoiled, incredibly, by non-League Gateshead who beat them 3-1 in the F.A. Cup. That's Grimsby's only defeat in 36 matches at Blundell Park.

Millwall directors rubbed their hands with glee when they heard news of Manchester United winger Gordon Hill's selection for the England under-23 squad for the forthcoming European Championship tie against Hungary. Millwall sold Hill to United for £70,000 earlier this season but, if he wins his under-23 cap, the Lions will receive an added bonus of £5,000. If Hill plays for the full England team, they will get another lump sum of £10,000.

Colchester's 0-1 defeat at Shrewsbury was their seventh defeat in a row. For Shrewsbury, it was an extension of their unbeaten run to nine games.
