Football Today

FROM time to time, football clubs in various divisions have been said to be on the verge of extinction, a fate which last occurred to Accrington Stanley when they were members of the Football League.

Since then, of course, Bradford (P,A) have folded up, but their demise came after they had been voted out of the League. Other clubs, Lincoln City among them in the disaster days of the 1960s, have also hoisted the warning flags, but generally they have managed to survive.

The Majority of these clubs have been in the third and fourth divisions, and the fact that they have been able to come through has probably been because their accumulated debts have not been so unmanageable after

That fitted in with the popular image, carefully fostered by the national Press and the clubs in the first and second divisions, that these clubs were a drain on football, were run by well-meaning but ham-fisted managements. and that it just couldn't happen in the best circles.

But suddenly, the fears have moved out from the lower divisions. There are still times when money is tight, of course, but it is higher up the scale where the closure axe seems now to be threatening.

And, of course, the amount of money involved is so much bigger, so much more difficult to find that the mind boggles at some of the figures quoted.

Luton Town were the first, with huge sums of money mentioned as being owed, Luton, it seems, are back on the right track, and may well be on the way to putting their finances in order.

Then came Chelsea, reported to be in debt to a staggering tune of three million pounds.

Here again, emergency action was taken, and though they are a long way out of the wood, they are still active and doing well in the second division.

Sheffield United, another club which built a costly new stand and then went down, partly solved their financial worries by the big cash deal which took Tony Currie to Leeds United.

Now, it is that famous club Portsmouth which are in dire straits. One hopes that they can themselves put their house in order, but a total of around £500,000 owing is not an easy write-off for a third division club, And, if this be used again to show the irresponsibility of the lower divisions, let it be remembered that Pompey were in the second division last season.

It is not just a case of £850 due to Lincoln City for gate receipts last Saturday, though that amount of money is obviously needed at Sincil Bank, It is perhaps as well for Pompey that City are not desperately in need of their cash...but one is still tempted to wonder how a club can get into such a situation.

I am not passing judgment on Pompey. I sincerely hope that they can overcome their problems and continue to play a part in the Football League, which they have graced for years. Indeed, 25 years ago they were top of the first division.

One must further hope that the experiences of Chelsea, Luton and now Portsmouth will serve as a warning to other clubs whose debts are mounting through inflated wages and high transfer commitments. Not every creditor will be in the mood to wait ... and it may be that one day that axe will fall, and that it will fall on some very distinguished shoulders indeed.

LINCOLN City gained their first Division Three win at the expense of a rugged Port Vale this afternoon. The decisive break for Lincoln came in the first half, when Ellis netted a penalty kick, and the City skipper repeated the performance after the interval to put the Red Imps on the points chart. Fromer Lincoln player-coach Roy Chapman was with the Vale team in his new post as their coach after being replaced as manager of Stockport during the close season.

LINCOLN City clinched their first win of the season with two penalty goals from captain, and man-of-the-match Sam Ellis. This was Vale's first defeat at Lincoln for 20 years, but theycould not complain about either the penalties or the result.

City stifled all Vale's build-ups until the last quarter-of-an-hour. Then Peter Grotier made a great save from a 25-yards blast by Geoff Davies. The first penalty came when City's John Fleming hit the post from an in-swinging corner by Dennis Booth. Percy Freeman, looked certain to score with a lob from the rebound, but Bailey palmed the ball away. He was booked for deliberate handling and Ellis, one of the most consistent penalty-takers in soccer, stepped-up to shoot past Connaughton. Ellis chose the same spot for the second penalty, given when Booth was pushed to the ground by lan Osborne as he went for a floated through ball by Ellis.






Billy Best (right) the Northampton captain, heads away as Lincoln City's Phil Hubbard dives in for a header during the third division game at Northampton.

AWAY FORM HINDERS SWINDON AGAIN

SWINDON'S inadequate away record, which very nearly caused their relegation last season, has already been causing grave concern to manager Danny Williams. The Robins lost their first two away matches at Northampton (0-2) in the League Cup and Portsmouth (1-2) in the League. So it came as a big relief when they came away from Chesterfield with a 1-0 win.

With little money in the kitty, Mr. Williams was unable to do much team strengthening during the close-season, his only major signings being striker Howard Goddard from Bournemouth and defender Tony Taylor (Southend) both on free transfers.

Goddard, a regular member of the Bournemouth attack for two seasons, was one of the victims when economies forced them to slash their professional staff to around 14. He celebrated his first game for Swindon with a goal in their 3–2 League Cup victory over Northampton.

The other forwards could be David Moss and David Syrett, both local discoveries. Moss came into the side in 1971/72 and usually manages to net around ten goals per season. He got off the mark this term with two goals in their 3–2 victory over Wrexham.

Syrett made his debut in 1973/74 and last season spent a period on loan to Wolves, though he didn't play in their First Division side.

Midfield players include Ken Stroud, Bill Dixon Trevor Anderson, Gerry O'Brien, Phil Harris and Don Rogers.

Stroud is another locally produced player, serving his apprenticeship with the club before making his League bow in 1971/72.

Dixon began with Arsenal, though he didn't play in their first-team. A move to Reading in 1969 enabled him to establish himself in League football. He transferred to Colchester in 1973 but, before he had played for the club, he was on the move again to Swindon.

Anderson has been capped on eight occasions by Northern Ireland. He was playing for Portadown when Manchester United paid £20,000 for him in 1972. Trevor made some 20 First Division appearances for the Reds and joined Swindon for £25,000 in 1974.

O'Brien was brought into English football by Southampton in 1970. The Saints had admired his play for Scottish side Clydebank and he made about 60 senior appearances for the Hampshire club prior to his £15,000 transfer to Swindon last season. While with the Saints, Gerry also went on loan to Bristol Rovers.

Though still an apprentice, Phil Harris has

been picked several times as substitute this season and he has already made his League debut.

Don Rogers spent many years with Swindon until joining Crystal Palace for £140,000 in 1972. Three years later he moved on to Q.P.R. for £200,000 but last season Swindon re-purchased him for only £33,000. Rogers is a former England Under-20 International.

Barring injuries, the defence is likely to be: John McLaughlin, Steve Aizlewood, Colin Prophett and Tony Taylor.

McLaughlin began his career with Colchester United, transferring to Swindon in 1972.

Swindon paid £12,000 to sign Aizlewood from Newport County on the eve of last season's transfer deadline. Steve won five Welsh under-23 caps in his Newport days.

Prophett, who has now taken over as captain, is the former Sheffield Wednesday and Norwich player.

Taylor, signed from Southend during the summer, is a versatile player who can also play on the left-wing. That was his position when Crystal Palace signed him from Morton in 1968. He later switched to left-back and was transferred to Southend in 1974.

When Aizlewood was injured in an early game, the veteran Frank Burrows returned to the centre of the defence. Frank made his League bow for Raith Rovers in 1962/63, moved on to Scunthorpe in 1965 and has been with Swindon since 1968. Three seasons ago he went to Mansfield on loan.

Jimmy Allan has had another chance to establish himself in goal this season, being preferred to Jim Barron for early games. Allan played his first League game in 1971/72 and in 1973/74 he held the position for most of the season.

One familiar face missing from the Swindon side this season is John Trollope, who began his career with Swindon in the early 'sixties. In one incredible run Trollope made 368 successive appearances until a broken arm ended the run. He now holds the club record with over 660 League appearances.

Swindon Twon F.C. was formed in 1881 by a clergyman and they became one of the founder members of the Southern League in 1894. They took the championship of that competition on two occasions before they joined the Football League in 1920 when the Southern League's first division was taken over to form the Third Division (South). They finished fourth in their first season in the League — a position they were unable to improve upon until winning promotion 43 years later!

Yet Swindon were still a Southern League club when they first hit the national headlines. In 1910 they fought their way to the semi-final of the F.A. Cup after defeating First Division Spurs (3-2), and two Second Division sides — Burnley (2-0) and the divisional champions-to-be Manchester



City (2-0) - before falling to the reigning League Champions Newcastle United (0-2) at Tottenham. Two years later they made another appearance in the semi-finale.

On that occasion they held the eventual winners, Barnsley, to a 0-0 draw before going down 0-1 in the replay.

It was in 1963 that they moved into Division Two for the first time in their history, a star-studded team of local discoveries taking them there. One or two of those players — Mike Summerbee, Bobby Woodruff, Don Rogers, Cliff Jackson and Ernie Hunt — moved on to win fame with bigger clubs.

The 1963 team was the creation of Bert Head. And, in the opening weeks of their Second Divison debut season, Swindon went to the top of the table!

Yet, after making a wonderful start to their Second Division career. Swindon failed to make any lasting impression. And, within two years, they were back in the Third Division.

And Bert Head was sacked.

Danny Williams took over and it wasn't long before Swindon were on the upgrade again. Soon the Robins were to enjoy their greatest-ever season.

Swindon quickly established themselves among the Third Division leaders in 1968/69 but there were few signs of any sensational Cup exploits in view as they struggled to overcome Torquay and Bradford City in the first two rounds of the League Cup.

Yet, after that they beat First Division sides Coventry and Burnley en route to a dramatic Wembley final against Arsenal.

Came the great day on the quagmire at


Wembley. Roger Smart scored an early goal to give Swindon a half-time lead. And when both sides were shattered in the mud, Swindon should have been exploded by Bobby Gould's equaliser for Arsenal four minutes from the end.

In the event, Swindon held out better in extratime when two memorable individual goals by Don Rogers won the Third Division side an outstanding victory.

A few weeks later Swindon clinched promotion to the Second Division.

Manager Williams left soon afterwards to serve Sheffield Wednesday and Mansfield before returning to his old club after it had been relegated from the Second Division in 1974.



THIRD DIVISION NEWS by C. J. Travers

LAST weekend saw Mansfield and Swindon both record victories, and these two points put the sides level on eight points at the top of the table.

Mansfield completely outplayed York at Bootham Crescent but had to wait for a late winner by Terry Eccles whilst Swindon had no such problems scoring five times against visiting Sheffield Wednesday who themselves managed two.

Rotherham dropped a home point in a 1-1 draw with Oxford but remain in third place on the same number of points as Brighton who suffered a surprising 2-0 defeat at Grimsby, and Reading who had a useful 2-1 win at Northampton,

Wrexham slammed in six goals at Chesterfield who are the only side in the League not having scored in front of their own fans, and Shrewsbury scored three times at Walsall, a feat which the home side matched in a highly entertaining 3–3 draw, Chester and Preston played out a drab 0–0 draw at Sealand Road, leaving Chester without a home victory, and Preston still seeking their first win away from home,

Port Vale slipped to a 2-1 home defeat by Gillingham whilst Crystal Palace disposed of Bury by the same scoreline after a close battle at Selhurst Park.




These special envelopes (including postage stamp 7p for inland addresses and appropriate rates for overseas countries) are available from Sincil Bank price 35p on or before Saturday 2nd October 1976, or supporters can in fact order one to be sent anywhere, on their behalf, by forwarding the relevant remittance and leaving the respective name and address for the Sincil Bank staff to complete.

It will then be franked with the special Lincoln City cancellation stamp, posted in the special G.P.O. posting box which will be open at Sincil Bank only, and delivered to the address written on the envelope by the normal postal letter service.

As this is the first issue of its kind by Lincoln City with a limited supply making it a collectors item, it would be advisable for supporters to sub mit their orders containing the necessary information and remittance at a very early date to avoid disappointment.

Profile on VISITING CAPTAIN

COLIN PROPHETT (Swindon's Captain)

Colin Prophett has this season been appointed Swindon's captain, a reward for his drive and for his solid performances in the back four.

Colin makes no secret of the fact that he would like to play in a higher grade of football again, having once tasted life in Division One. Ironically, his two campaigns as a First Division player both ended in relegation.

Born in Crewe, Colin joined Sheffield Wednesday as an amateur in September 1967. He turned professional the following June but had to wait until 1969/70 before getting his chance in the senior side.

Once in, Colin stayed. But that season saw the end of Wednesday's reign in Division One. He stayed until a £45,000 transfer took him to Norwich in 1973.

He played in nearly every match the following season when Norwich, too, lost their First Division place. Swindon paid £20,000 for him early in the 1974/75 season and he has figured prominently at centre-back ever since.

VISITING MANAGER

DANNY WILLIAMS (Swindon's Manager)

Danny Williams decided in 1973 to return to the scene of his greatest managerial triumphs. During a previous spell with Swindon he led them to a sensational Wembley victory over Arsenal in the League Cup final and to promotion to the Second Division.

As a player, Mr. Williams was a one-club man, he totted up 23 years service with Rotherham United. His playing days ended in 1960, after a run of 460 games in their League team. There was a short break while he opened a sports business but, when the managerial chair became vacant in 1962, he was persuaded to return to the club.

Relying mainly on young players developed by the club, Mr. Williams built a team which at one time looked likely to gain promotion to the First Division. Then after three years in the job he decided to retire to open a shop in Bournemouth. Swindon were then seeking a manager and, eventually, he agreed to join them while keeping his business by the sea.


In 1968/69 he produced the side which gained promotion to the Second Division and became only the second Third Division club to win the League Cup. They beat mighty Arsenal 3—1 at Wembley after extra-time.

Sheffield Wednesday, who had been struggling for some while, gave him their manager's job a few weeks after that Wembley triumph and, with it, the chance for him to return to his native part of the country. But he was unable to halt their slide into the Second Division. He then left Hillsborough and, mid-way through the 1971/72 campaign, he took over at Mansfield.

When he received the call to return to Swindon he gladly accepted the challenge.
