Our visitors caught us on the rebound, and we won by 6 goals to nil, and further more continued in that vein, in the following games with scores of 3-0; 5-0; 5-1; 6-2; 2-3; 6-1.

The two teams have changed in personnel, but some are still in football Swindon — Downsborough, Dawson, Trollope, Morgan, Nurse, Shergold, Weaver, Smart, Lawton, Brown, Rogers.

Scorers Trollope, Lawton, Brown, Rogers (2) own goal, Downsborough plays for Bradford City. John Trollope, still as good as ever in that same position. Don Rogers still on the books, and Roger Smart — Bath City.

Our last connection with York City was the transfer from us, to them, of Chris Jones the centre forward, whom we bought from Manchester City.

In tonight's game again we meet a team in the danger area of relegation and the teams in this zone of the league prove very difficult to beat because of course they are fighting to keep their status in Division III. After our recent game against

At the Football League meeting held for all Clubs in london recently, firstly for Third and Fourth Division Clubs on the Thursday and all Divisions on Friday, the new proposals agreed between the Football League and the Professional Players Union were discussed, for the ultimate agreement of these proposals by the League Clubs but there are several important issues in the new proposals which League Clubs are not happy about and at the end of the meetings it was agreed that all Clubs put in writing their various views, then the Negotiating Committee of the League will try and iron out these difficulties with the Professional Players Union. An agreement will have to be reached by the 17th June which is the date of the Annual Meeting of the Football League. The position at this very moment is that we are still negotiating, but both sides are hopeful of an agreed compromise.

At this meeting new minimum admission charges will come up for discussion.

The other important issue is the possible election of non-league Clubs with the League, to the exclusion of possible members whom have strived hard for years to keep their heads above water. Member Clubs have always rallied around unfortunate Clubs, but times are changing, and with several non League Clubs knocking on the door for admission, with the potential crowd attendance far in advance of some existing clubs, it looks as if there may be changes this year.

The League have implied that they will accept only two non League Clubs with suitable facilities, financial backing and of course with team strength to go forward for election, although I know that they will receive many applications from Clubs to be vetted by the League. Geographical positions in this Country will of course be taken into consideration.

Have you applied to Bob Jefferies for your Club Dinner and Dance tickets yet, because the date of Wednesday 27th April is not far away and Bob is receiving many such applications.

Thank you for supporting us and I hope that tonights game is exciting.

# OUR VISITORS

## **YORK CITY**

GRAEME CRAWFORD (Goalkeeper) Graeme has been a wonderfully consistent performer for York since his transfer from Sheffield United in 1971. Once with East Stirling, he entered English football with Sheffield United in 1968.

League record: E. Stirling 2 aps; Sheff. Un. 2 aps; Mansfield (loan) 2 aps. York 227 aps.

PETER SCOTT (Defender) Peter held a regular place in Everton's First Division side in 1971/72 and, even though losing his place after that, he became a fairly regular member of the Northern Ireland team. He has six caps. York signed him last season.

League record: Everton 42(2) aps, 1 gl; Southport (loan) 4 aps; York 39 (1) aps.

CHRIS GALVIN (Forward) Chris, on loan from Hull City, has been scoring some vital goals for York. A one-time Leeds reserve, Chris went to Hull for £40,000 in 1973.

League record: Leeds 7(1) aps; Hull 92(5) aps. 7 gls; York 14 aps. 5 gls.

GORDON HUNTER (Defender) Gordon has played at left-back and centre-back this season, recently returning in the middle. A local discovery, he made his first League appearance in 1973/74.

League record: York 35(2) aps. 1 gl.

STEVE JAMES (Defender) Steve made well over 100 League appearances for Manchester United, and won England youth caps, before arriving at Bootham Crescent last season. He has been holding one of the central defensive positions

League record: Man. Un 129 aps, 4 gls; York 40 aps 1 gl.

GEOFF HUTT (Defender) Geoff was for several years Huddersfield's left-back when they were in the First and Second Divisions. When losing his place last season, he joined Blackburn on loan. York signed him a few weeks ago.

League record: Huddersfield 245 aps, 4 gls. Blackburn (Ioan) 10 aps, 1 gl; York 8 aps. IAN HOLMES (Midfield) Ian got his initial chance in League football with Sheffield United in 1971/72 though he never won a regular place with the Blades. York signed him in 1973 and he has taken over as their penalty-taker. His 8 goals include three spot-kicks.

League record: Sheff. Un 4 (2) aps; York 127 (7) aps, 24 gls.

CHRIS TOPPING (Midfield). Chris, who came through the juniors to make his League debut in 1968/69, has a wonderful record of consistency. At the end of last season he looked back on 263 consecutive League appearances for the club. Now he is up to 295 without a break.

League record: York 350 (2) aps, 8 gls.

GORDON STANIFORTH (Forward) Gordon also joined York from Hull on loan this season but the transfer has now been completed following a successful, scoring start to his stay at Bootham Crescent. He made his Hull debut in 1973/74.

League record: Hull 7(5) aps. 2 gls; York 14 aps, 3 gls.

JIMMY HINCH (Forward) Jimmy launched his career with Tranmere Rovers, but left them for Plymouth in 1971. Hereford paid £20,000 for him two years later and York invested an £11,000 fee in his transfer in 1974. Two seasons ago he assisted Southport on Ioan.

League record: Tranmere 36 (3) aps, 10 gls; Plymouth 102 (5) aps; 28 gls. Hereford 22(5) aps. 7 gls; Southport (Ioan) 7 aps. 2 gls. York 47 (12) aps, 9 gls.

GEORGE HOPE (Forward) George is another of this season's new signings, arriving from Charlton. Originally with Newcastle, he joined Charlton in 1975 but was badly affected by injuries soon after arriving.

League record: Newcastle 6 aps, 1 gl; Charlton 13 aps, 2 gls; York 9 aps, 2 gls.

BRIAN POLLARD (Midfield/Forward) Brian is York's top scorer with 12 goals. A former England youth international Brian developed at Bootham Crescent, making his League debut in 1971/72.



# When The Lights Go Out

Familiarity breeds contempt, they say. And, when we have become accustomed to having something around us for a lengthy period of time, we tend to take it for granted. So it is in football with floodlights. These days artificial lighting enables us to enjoy soccer on winter evenings and to adopt more convenient kick-off times in the darker-months.

Only when something goes wrong with the circuit do we realise how dependent we have

become on the electricity supply!

A few weeks ago Aldershot's lights failed when they led Exeter 1–0 and there were only two minutes to play. Because the result could ultimately effect the Fourth Division promotion issue, the game had to be replayed in full. It's difficult to recall how things were before the advent of floodlighting.

Floodlighting transformed football and radically changed our soccer habits. No longer did we have to kill off all our grandmothers to get time off for mid-week afternoon games - - we could go to football at night. And, of course, Saturday games could kick off at a standard

time throughout the season.

During the three-day-week crisis several clubs hired generators to provide electric power. But, in much earlier times, other ingenious methods had been experimented with. In 1899 Manchester's City and United met under OIL lamps.

For the first recorded floodlit match, at Bramall Lane in 1878, the power was generated by two portable engines, one behind each goal,

driving dynamoes.

But the acceptance of floodlighting in modern times threw up a new hazard, one which can vitally affect promotion and relegation - - - power failures! One early disaster in 1966/67 caused a Fourth Division match between Crewe and Lincoln to come to a halt and the visitors were possibly robbed of two points which might well have proved vital. The game was abandoned after 36 minutes, with Lincoln winning 1 - 0, when the lights went out. When the game was replayed, Crewe won 3-0. In 1959 Shrewsbury almost lost promotion to Division III. They were winning 5 - 2 at Watford when the lights went out with only 12 minutes left. They returned to Vicarage Road on the last day of the season knowing at least one point was required for promotion. Fortunately, they won 4 - 1. Southampton ran into trouble at The Dell in 1961 when their League Cup tie with Leeds

was plunged into second-half darkness for an hour while repairs were effected. A freak game, undoubtedly influenced by this distraction, ended 5 - 4 to Southampton with Derek Reeves scoring all five of their goals --- one of only two cases in the whole history of this competition where any player has scored so many in a game.

It was in Sheffield, as I said above, that floodlit football was born, but there was no serious attempt to develop the technique until the late 'twenties. Because they were not satisfied with the standard of lighting, the F.A. banned all floodlit football in 1930 and didn't relax for a full twenty years.

Replayed cup-ties, prior to round three, and rearranged mid-week League games were permitted under lights in 1955, then a year later the present ruling, allowing games to be played wholly or partly under artificial light, was introduced.

## Danny's Desk

Maybe the picture will change eventually, even more likely if the government will only recognise the need for improvement and direct a proportion of the tax and profits derived from the football pools back into the game. The perhaps we could play on artificial turf and encourage other activities to utilise our facilities.


