

Bits and Pieces

Bury, like Swindon, have in recent years spent short periods in Division Two. On August 22 1964, the opening day of the 1964-65 season, the Town travelled to Bury.

Swindon scored first, then misfortunte struck. Goalkeeper Norman Oakley was injured in an attempt to prevent an equalising goal. Swindon, reduced to ten men - as the use of substitutes was still a season away - lost the match 1-6.

Gordon Atherton was signed from Bury just before Christmas, 1964 when the Town visited Leyton Orient and won by three goals to nil. Although at times struggling, Swindon kept out of the bottom two places, defeating Rotherham United (managed by one Mr. Williams) at Easter. But defeats following against Preston, the return at Rotherham and finally Southampton.

And so for the first time, Swindon occupied one of the two relegation places. Visitors to the County Ground during that season included Manchester City, Derby County, Coventry City, Ipswich Town, Middlesbrough and Newcastle United. Gates were upwards of eighteen thousand with the visit of Manchester City attracting 28,173.

Transfers from Bury to Swindon date back to 1907, when Frank Warburton came south. He has been followed by Norman Kirby and Dick Rushton in 1930 and Harry Williams in 1954. When Bert Head left Gigg Lane to take up the appointment as Town manager in 1956, one of his first signings was 6' 4" centre-half Vincent Jack. Gordon Atherton joined Swindon in 1964 before returning to Bury and Tommy Henderson made the journey in 1966.


In two F.A. Cup Finals Bury amassed ten goals without reply. Four came against Southampton. Of the Southern League in 1900 and just three years later, Derby County was the unfortunate side to concede six. No club, before or since, has won the F.A. Cup by such a decisive margin.

Former Town centre-half Mick Blick has signed for Reading Combination League champions, Hambleden.

A Birmingham programme dealer recently sold a Swindon v. Newcastle F.A. Cup Semi-Final of 1910 - the price? - £55.

A recent browse through past programmes brought to light the following plea in the Club Notes for 2nd January 1965 "May we make a final appeal to those who occupy the ring seats not to move until the game has ended" Well, in twelve years we have still not been able to cure the problem but now many folk block the exits waiting for the final whistle. This practice must cease - exits must be kept clear for safety reasons.

On the date mentioned above we had almost 2000 seats around the touchline with little fear of anyone running on to the pitch - what a far cry from the wire fences that need to be erected

Talk of the Town

By the Chairman

Tonight is the first of our Friday evening games and we welcome the Players and Officials from Bury. Bury like ourselves have made a good start to the season and we hope, in a friendly way of speaking, to continue the good work tonight.

Our young reserve side did exceptionally well at Luton last week, especially as they had to play without the experience of Andy Ford who took over from Ken Stroud at the last hour in the First Team. When we can produce this kind of performance away from home it augers well for the Club. The majority of this same side also travelled away to Birmingham in mid-week and recorded a 2 - 1 win in the Midland Youth League. If you would like to see this young side in action we are playing against Northampton Town on our Shrivenham Road Ground, tomorrow, Saturday at 11.00 a.m.

A very successful evening was held in the Rendevous Club last Friday with a cabaret show and a racing film show. This was successfully organised by Mr. Glyn Johns and Mr. Ted East who worked very hard, not forgetting of course the backing that they received from their wives. We make many friends for the Club on such occasions and I am sure that George Shelton will be pleased to welcome new faces to our Rendevous Club.

The successful clubs in football are those that over the years build up close relationships not only with their supporters, but through the good will and co-operation with their local schools and clubs. We at Swindon have always had this friendliness and over many years the help from school teachers has been tremendous. The voluntary work put in by these people to give enjoyment to children later reflects through the schoolboys that come to us to learn their trade as apprentices. Geoff Walters has been a real stalwart for the cause and at one time played in our young side. Fred Coleman and George Gleed are other members of the teaching profession who have always been supporters of our club, but to mention everyone who has helped over the years would take a volume of space. We at Swindon Town Football Club are truly grateful for all the help that we receive from these sources and of course the schools and clubs from the surrounding districts as well as in Swindon. The one problem of apprentices at a football club is the disappointments that invariably occur when the ultimate decision is taken as to his suitability to become a professional. We feel at Swindon that if we could coach and encourage school boys from the age of 13 years, by the time that they are old enough to become an apprentice we should be able to ensure that there would be a future for the boy. At the present moment we are not allowed to play a schoolboy in competitive games before leaving school without special arrangement with his school and not at all under the age of fourteen. This is a good safeguard for the boy so that he is advised correctly at a young age, but it does not help our coaches who like to play the most promising boys with our young apprentices.

We are helped over this hurdle by our friends who run local youth teams and one such club is the New Town Boys Football Club. The Club caters for boys of a very young age and both Mr. Pat Murray and Mr. Peter Levett are very helpful to Jack Smith our Youth Manager and often arranges games so that we can play young schoolboys in their team and allow us the opportunity to watch their progress. Such games are often played on our Shrivenham Road pitch and we are always pleased to welcome the parents and friends of these young players. Thank you Pat and Peter for your great work with these youngsters and the help that you give so freely to our Club. John Renwick is another stalwart for the Club and co-operates with Frank and Jack in bringing boys to our notice along with Dennis Stone; they are also responsible for the under 13 and 14 representative sides.

News of our new Squash Club is that anyone wishing to partake in these activities can be eligible by becoming a member of the Supporters Club. Enquire at the Supporters Club office for details, we shall be opening very shortly now. The floors are laid and only the finishing touches remain to be done. The buildings have to be passed by the Magistrates of course, but the premises are an extension to our existing club.

Here is hoping you enjoy the game tonight.

JOHN FORREST (Goalkeeper)

John worked his way through Bury's junior teams and got his first chance in their senior side in 1967/ 68. He has been the Shakers' number one choice for the past six years. Last season he completed a run of 100 consecutive games.

League record: Bury 289 aps.

GERRY KEENAN (Defender)

Gerry got his first chance three seasons ago but he really came into his own last season when Bury sold Steve Hoolickin to Carlisle and Gerry took over at right-back.

League Record: Bury 29(2) aps.

BILLY TUCKER (Defender)

Billy linked up with the Shakers last December after serving Hereford United during their remarkable run from the Southern League up to the Second Division of the Football League. His height is a great asset in the middle of the defence.

League Record: Hereford 135(2) aps., 12 gls; Bury 29(1) aps.

DAVE HATTON (Defender)

Dave was signed from Blackpool for £12,000 in 1976 and immediately installed as captain. A player of tremendous experience, he made over 200 appearances for Bolton before joining Blackpool in 1969.

League Record: Bolton 231 aps., 7 gls; Blackpool 250(1) aps., 6 gls; Bury 47 aps., 1 gl. KEITH KENNEDY (Defender)

Keith initially joined Bury on loan from Newcastle in 1972 and, since the transfer was completed, he maintained a run of 162 consecutive League appearances for the club before an injury interrupted the sequence last season.

League Record: Newcastle 1 aps., Bury 211 aps., 2 gls. TONY BAILEY (Defender)

Tony got only one outing in Derby's League eleven and transferred to Oldham in 1974. Bury signed him three seasons ago for £10,000

JOHN THOMSON (Midfield)

John was given his chance to hold his place last season when he scored five goals. He has made a good start this term, with two goals so far. Bury signed him from Newcastle in 1974.

League Record: Newcastle nil aps., Bury 60 (7) aps., 6 gls. JIMMY McILWRAITH (Midfield)

Bury paid a club record £25,000 fee to sign Jimmy from Motherwell two seasons ago. His probing, and his excellent use of the long ball make him a most dangerous opponent. He scored 12 goals last season.

League Record: Motherwell 21(7) aps., 6 gls; Bury 50(6) aps., 14 gls.

IAN ROBINS (Midfield)

Bury equalled their club record £25,000 fee when they signed Ian from Oldham in the summer. His first goal, two minutes from time, earned Bury a 1-1 League Cup draw at Oxford recently. Then he hit the winner in the replay.

League Record: Oldham 202(18) aps., 40 gls.; Bury 2 aps.

ANDY ROWLAND (Forward)

Andy has been Bury's top scorer for the past two seasons with 21 each time. Last season he hit his first hat-trick, against Peterborough. Bury signed him from Derby in 1974. Andy converted two penalties against Wednesday two weeks ago.

League Record: Derby nil aps., Bury 123(5) aps., 45 gls. ALAN WOOLFALL (Forward)

Alan usually plays on the right wing. Another player who has come through the club's nursery, Alan was given his head last season after impressing when called up as understudy over the previous seasons.

League Record: Bury 38(10) aps., 9 gls.

WAYNE ENTWISTLE (Forward)
Wayen is really beginning to est-

ablish himself in the side this season, hitting four goals in his first seven games. An England youth international, Wayne joined the club from school three years ago and made his first-team debut last season, when he scored 5 goals.

'The Youth of Today' are 'The Men of Tomorrow' that saying is true enough, but in my case I hope 'The Youth of Today' are the 'First Team" of tomorrow.

Finding these youngster's is no easy task I can assure you, we have scouts the length and bredth of the British Isles keeping an eye out for a promising boy. Being a player myself for so many years, has helped to have a good many contacts in the game.

I am inundated with letter's from boy's, from schools, Dads, even Mums, asking if they could bring boys down for trial's. Well, we do our utmost to give everyone a crack of the whip. But it all takes time, as you will well know, once this season is under way, time is very limited.

When we sign a boy on "schoolboy forms" it does not mean he will automatically become an apprentice with the club. It is up to himself to prove with our coaching that he is good enough by sheer hard work, not only on the field, but, also he must conduct himself correctly off the field. One thing we insist on at "Swindon Town" is the boy's education continues, even if he is good enough to be "signed on" at the age of 16. All our boy's go to college once or twice a week, like it or

not, they go, because even if you "make it" in football it's got to end sometime, and at least they will have a good education to fall back on. Out of every 100 boy's signed on only about 20% make the grade.

I won't say result's don't matter they do of course, but more important to me, is the progress of a young player, to see if all the coaching is paying dividends and believe me, when a youngster starts to blossom it's worth all the sweat, blood and tears!

People may say, fancy putting such young boys into combination games. Well why not? They have to gain experience from somewhere so why not go all out, and give them a real game, they will learn a lot more from those games than ten practice matches. I hope you will be patient with our youngsters, and with me, and give them all the encouragement you can, as a young boy's spirit can be easily broken.

We want to win all our Youth & Combination games, we won't of course, but be sure we will be really trying and we won't worry to much so long as the first team are winning.



Spotlight on Division 3

Bury striker Andy Rowland, top scorer with 21 goals last season, hasn't been having the best of luck with his shooting from open play this term but V he has converted three penalties in his last two League games. Andy, who tends to play a little deeper these days with Wayne Entwistle doing the main striking job, has been so close with a number of shorts and headers --- but so far this season there seems to have been something of a jinx on him.

I don't know if Third Division football is getting dirtier --- which I would very much doubt,--- or whether referees are applying a stricter hand, but there seems to have been a large number of penalties awarded this season. Exeter's Lammie Robertson has already converted five spot kicks this

season -- and that's as many as Exeter grabbed from penalties for the whole of last season!

Robertson's conversions edged Exeter to within a point of the leaders Colchester last Saturday --- and the Devon club had a game in hand. This is a magnificent effort following their promotion from the Fourth Division last season.

Exeter's success has obviously attracted a lot of attention and it now looks likely that they could lose their two main strikers, Alan Beer and Tony Kellow. Beer, who hit 23 goals in 1975/76 and 21 last season, has been lined up to join First Division trouble club Leicester City, though the deal was delayed because of a doubt about the player's injured knee.

Beer was once a Swansea player but he was freed in 1972. He then spent a couple of seasons in the Southern League with Weymouth before signing for Exeter in 1974.

Beer and Kellow have both scored three goals this season and Kellow seems certain to be the next target for a top club. Exeter signed Kellow in 1976 after he had hit a fabulous 46 goals for Falmouth Town in Rothmans Western League. He contributed 22 League and Cup goals to Exeter's

Exeter up from the Fourth Division this year, have also made a splendid start. The man who has done as much as anyone to take them into top spot is forward Bobby Gough, the former Walsall, Port Vale and Southport player. Bobby, who scored 18 goals last season, was the Third Division's top marksman after last Saturday's games: Barry Butlin, Peterborough's £20,000 signing from Nottingham Forest, opened his Posh account with a goal in his second game for the club -- but it had more than an element of luck about it. Only four minutes remained at Lincoln, with the score at 0-0, when Peterborough goalkeeper Keith Waugh whipped an almightly clearance up field. The ball bounced once but, with a tremendous wind behind it, went deep into Lincoln's half.

Butlin made a chase for it and, as the home goalkeeper advanced from his goal, the striker got a touch with his head sufficient to deflect the ball over the 'keeper and into the net for the only goal. It was Peterborough's first League victory of the season. That's typical of the luck hapless Lincoln are suffering this season. With only one point from five games they were bottom of the Third Division last weekend.

Lincoln were one of only two Third Division sides still awaiting their first League victory. The other, surprisingly, was Sheffield Wednesday, beaten at home by Shrewsbury. That left Wednesday with only one point and one goal from four games.

Yet in a similar number of League Cup ties, Wednesday have netted 13 goals! Five of those were scored against Second Division Blackpool whom they
