

Bits and Pieces

Port Vale are one of the few Football League clubs, who geographically speaking, cannot be found on the map. The North Staffordshire club is based in the mother town of the Potteries, Burslem and the name 'Port Vale' is believed to have been taken from a house near to where the inaugral meeting of the club took place.

Port Vale celebrated its centenary last year. The club was formed as Burslem Port Vale and dropped the prefix in 1913, when it took up occupation of the Old Recreation Ground in nearby Hanley. This was the fourth change of headquarters though the clubs previous addresses were all within a two mile radius of the present home Vale Park, in use since 1950.

Burslem Port Vale joined the Football League Second Division on its formation in 1892, but failed to be relected in 1896. During its first season, the club suffered the worst home defeat ever for any League club - 10-0 to Sheffield United. Burslem returned to the League after a two-year exile in 1898 but resigned through financial difficulties in 1907.

In the previous December, Swindon Town had entertained the Potteries club in the fifth qualifying round of the F.A. Cup. This was the first meeting of the two clubs in a competitive match. It resulted in a 2-1 win for the visitors. Town's scorer was insideleft Billy Wardrope from the penalty spot.

In October 1919, the Football League expelled Leeds City from its ranks and Port Vale was invited to take over that club's fixtures. Port Vale suffered a similar expulsion, coupled with a fine, in 1968 - but the club was immediately re-elected to the Fourth Division.

Port Vale now play at Vale Park which was opened in 1950. The man behind the scheme was Alderman Oldcroft who, although the new big stadium was very impressive, must have been disappointed that it's full development was never fully completed.

Jimmy Oakes, a full-back for Port Vale, created an odd record by playing for both clubs in one League fixture. It happened in one of Vale's meetings with Charlton Athletic at the Valley. Oakes was playing for the visitors when the match was abandoned and he was transferred to Charlton before the teams met again in the 'replayed' game, when he duly turned out for the home side.

Port Vale reached the semi-final stage of the F.A. Cup in 1954 whilst in the Third Division. Only Millwall had achieved this feat before and only three clubs have done it since. On the way, Blackpool the Cup holders, together with Stanley Matthews, were defeated 2-0. Sir Stanley later managed the club for a short while. Port Vale eventually lost to Cup Winners, West Bromwich Albion by the odd goal in three in front of 68,221 at Villa Park.

In the same year, Port Vale also won the Third Division North championship by a margin of eleven points from Barnsley. Only three games were lost with a mere 21 goals being conceded and only five of these came at Vale Park.

Swindon's biggest victory against Port Vale was on October 1, 1960. A near twelve-thousand crowd at the County Ground saw Town score six without reply, Bobby Woodruff claiming a hat-trick. Only six months previously, Port Vale had inflicted the heaviest defeat on Swindon in fixtures between the clubs. Town went down 1-6 at

Vale Park, Jimmy Gauld netting for the visitors.

Morris Jones joined Swindon from Port Vale in November 1947, scoring 48 goals in 94 League appearances before joining Crystal Palace.

Port Vale manager, Roy Sproson, made 756 full Football League appearances for the club before retiring in 1972. He first joined the Club in the fifties as an amateur.

GILLINGHAM TOP FOR FIRST TIME!

Gillingham enjoyed a completely new experience a fortnight ago after their 3-1 win at Plymouth. Those two points took the Gills into top place in the Third Division for the first time since the division was re-formed in 1958!

Indeed, it was a whole weekend of unique happenings for the Kent club. They had never before managed to win at Home Park in 32 attempts in the Football League and the Southern League. Gillingham, who first entered the Football League in 1920, spent a few fleeting moments at the head of the old Southern Section of the Third Division in the distant past but had never viewed things-from such a dizzy height since the league was re-arranged on a national basis in 1958.

Gillingham maintained their momentum last weekend when two goals from Ken Price gave them a 2-1 victory over Rotherham.

Colchester United were this week poised to pay a club record transfer fee of £15,000 to Walsall for their skilful Republic of Ireland international winger, or midfield man, Miah Dennehy. The idea was to improve the service to striker Bobby Gough who, though he was still the Third Division's top scorer last weekend, had not scored for two games.

Dixie McNeil hit Wrexham's winner at Exeter in the very last minute and has now scored four goals in five League matches for his new club following his transfer from Hereford United.

Plymouth Argyle are becoming the most philanthropic team in the country. Brian Hall became their fourth player to put through his own goal this season when he equalised for the home side at Chester last weekend. He is the fourth Plymouth man to score for the opposition this season — and each incident has cost Argyle either a League point or denied them victory in a cup-tie.

A goal by Tommy Tynan gave Sheffield Wednesday their first League victory of the season, after ten abortive attempts, at home to Chesterfield. Being a local "derby", the game attracted Wednesday's best League attendance (12,920) of the season at a time when their gates had dropped down to around the 8,500 mark.

Former England defender, and Middlesbrough manager, Jackie Charlton must have liked what he saw of Wednesday for, after the match, he accepted the club's offer to become their new manager. He refused a contract and is unlikely to stay for more than about three seasons, if he maintains his past philosphy.

I like to make continual progress and when, at Middlesbrough, I found I had taken them just about as far as I could I felt the time had come to hand over to someone else", said Mr. Charlton. "I wanted to stay in management and one day I would love to be given the opportunity of managing the England side. That's one of the reasons I did not sign a contract. It has been agreed with the directors that they would release me automatically if I was ever considered for the England job."

Mr. Charlton starts off at rock bottom. Wednesday are bottom of the Third Division — a position they had never previously sampled, until this season, in the whole of their 107 years.

It Happened In October

A Dairy of Town Events that occurred during this month

October 5 1889

Swindon Town's first venture into the F.A. Cup ended in defeat in the first qualifying round by five goals to three at the hands of Watford Rovers.

October 29 1898

Warmley inflicted a shock 1 - 0 F.A. Cup defeat on the Town. Later that season, the Bristolians withdrew from the Southern League after Swindon had gained maximum points from them by virtue of a 5-0 win at home and 4 - 2 away. Warmley's results were expunged from the records and so the Town lost four points.

October 12 1907

Harold Fleming made his debut for Swindon in a reserve game against Salisbury. He scored twice in a 4 - 0 win. A week later, on his first team debut, he obtained the fourth goal in a similar victory over Luton Town.

October 8 1927

In a Division 3 South match away to Merthyr Town, half-time arrived with Swindon trailing by five goals to one scored by Harris Morris. After the interval, the home side added a further three with Leslie Roberts replying for the Town. Goalkeeper Jack Bourne lost his place to Ted Nash after this game and never again appeared in Swindon's first team.

October 30 1937

A crowd of 11,421 turned up at the County Ground to see the Town's new £1,000 centre-forward, Ben Morton. But they had to wait until January to witness his first Swindon goal - against First Division Grimsby Town in the F.A. Cup.

October 5 1946

The County Ground gate record was pushed up to 25,007 for the visit of Bristol City. Town secured a point from a 1 - 1 draw with a second-half equaliser by Gordon 'Slacker' Williams.

October 27 1951

Swindon recorded a 5 - 1 win at Portman Road, Ipswich. Mick Betteridge and Maurice Owen grabbed two each with a home defender supplying another.

October 12 1960

Swindon's first ever League Cup Tie kicked off against Shrewsbury Town. It turned out to be a 330 minute marathon, before the Shropshire side produced two goals in extra-time of the second replay to gain a Third Round Tie against Bradford City.


