

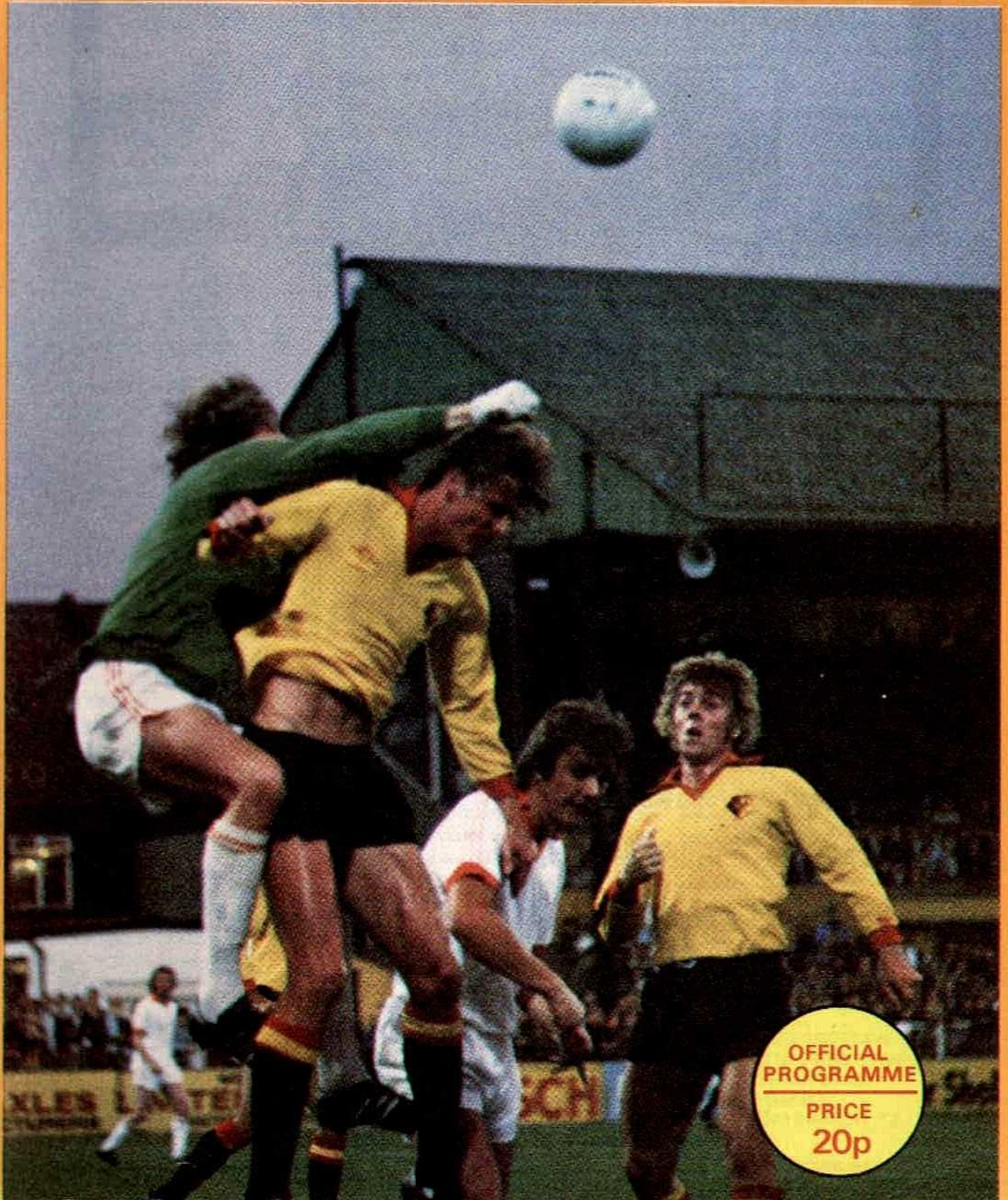

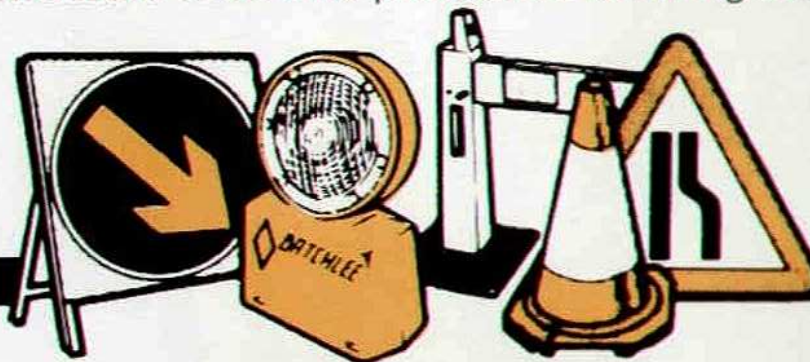

I don't think many people realise how lonely it can be for the players, myself and the rest of the party when we visit an away ground knowing that virtually everybody there is willing us to lose.

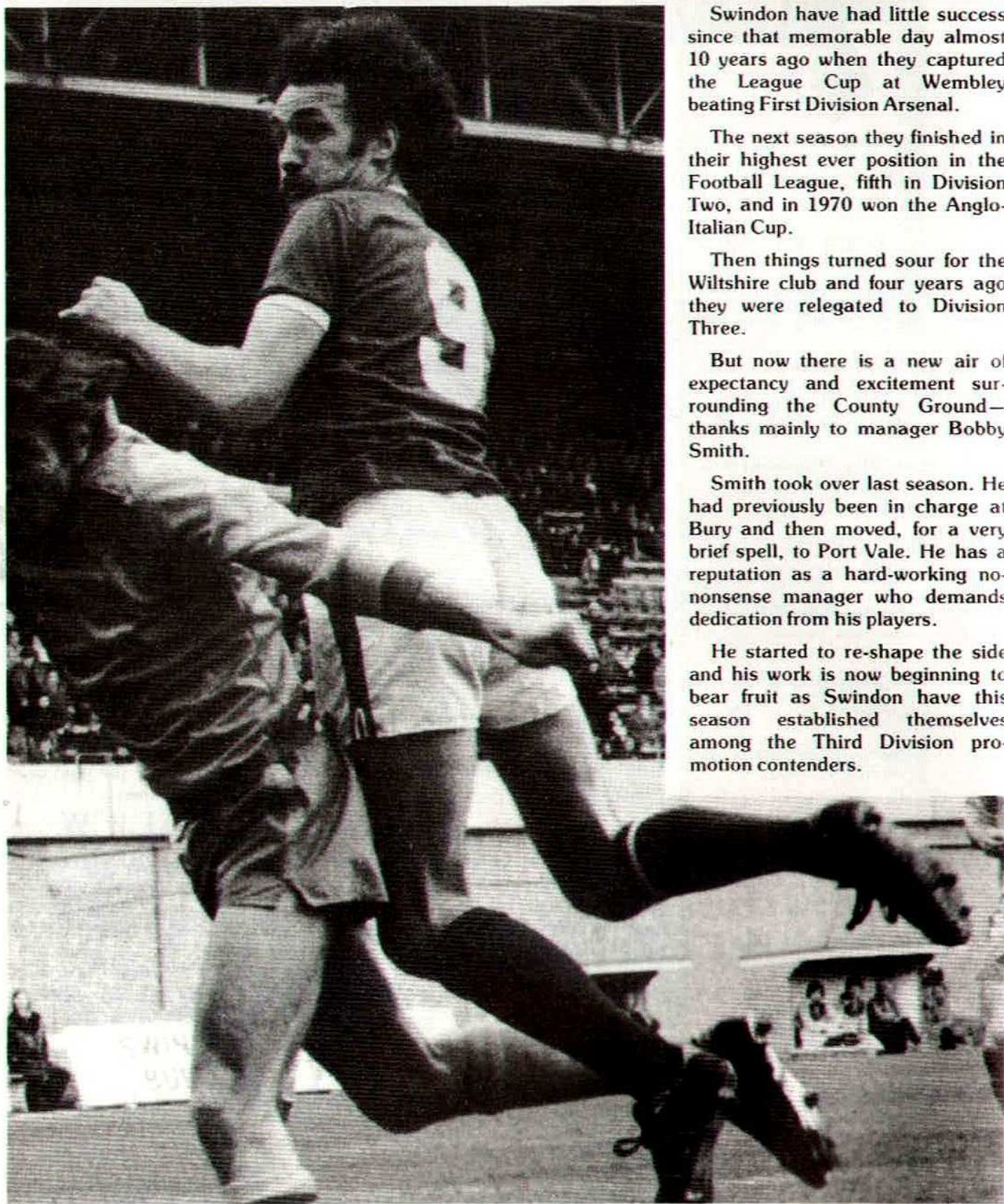
It pleases me no end to see the fans driving home after an away match with their scarves hanging out of the windows when we have won and done them proud.

Swindon Town



Swindon have had little success since that memorable day almost 10 years ago when they captured the League Cup at Wembley beating First Division Arsenal.

The next season they finished in their highest ever position in the Football League, fifth in Division Two, and in 1970 won the Anglo-Italian Cup.

Then things turned sour for the Wiltshire club and four years ago they were relegated to Division Three.

But now there is a new air of expectancy and excitement surrounding the County Ground—thanks mainly to manager Bobby Smith.

Smith took over last season. He had previously been in charge at Bury and then moved, for a very brief spell, to Port Vale. He has a reputation as a hard-working no-nonsense manager who demands dedication from his players.

He started to re-shape the side and his work is now beginning to bear fruit as Swindon have this season established themselves among the Third Division promotion contenders.

Smith has attempted to blend experience with youth in his team-building plans.

He has recently signed Bryan Hamilton, the former Everton, Ipswich, Millwall and Northern Ireland international midfielder player, who is now concentrating more on coaching but his wealth of knowledge should still prove to be invaluable to the club.

Paul Gilchrist, a member of the Southampton side which won the FA Cup recently has been signed from Portsmouth and Smith has also gone back to his former club Bury to buy prolific goalscorer Andy Rowlands.

Smith has also signed an experienced goalkeeper, Chris Ogden, from Oldham, where he had made more than 100 first team appearances.

The new faces have been moulded into a team which still contains several players who have been with the club for some time.

Player Profile



It took Graham Taylor only a few minutes to convince Steve Harrison that his future lay with Watford.

Harrison admits: "You are never sure what is the best thing. I have known a number of players who were really happy to move to a club, only to find that after a week or two they discovered it wasn't the right set up for them.

"But as soon as I met the boss he soon took away any fears I might have had. He quickly put me in the picture about the way Watford was going. He sounded so confident about the next couple of seasons that I just had to come here.

"I am not just saying this, but he must be one of the top managers in the game today. He has so much talent and all the players look up to his way of doing things."

Harrison certainly does not regret his move from Blackpool. He has already impressed Watford supporters with his defensive qualities and the hard working full back is also showing a rare attacking flair.

He enjoys moving up with the Watford front runners when possible and likes to get into the box. Steve explains: "I suppose every defender thinks he can do a strikers job if he is given the chance. But then it's probably a fair bet that most forwards feel they could play in the back four.

"But these days it is often the case that defenders can score quite a number of goals. It's nice to be given the chance to press into your opponent's box if you want to. Some back four men can't even go outside their own half without a strange look from the manager."

When he first came to the club, Steve was surprised at the standard of the side and the team spirit, which he admits is "superb". He adds: "Everything about Watford is first rate. Nothing is too much. We are not a Third Division outfit. Ever since I came here I have felt a better player."

Organisation

"There can't be a complaint from anyone. We prepare fully for matches and the management make you think and feel like a Division One side. The organisation is out of this world and the whole team responds with results on the field."

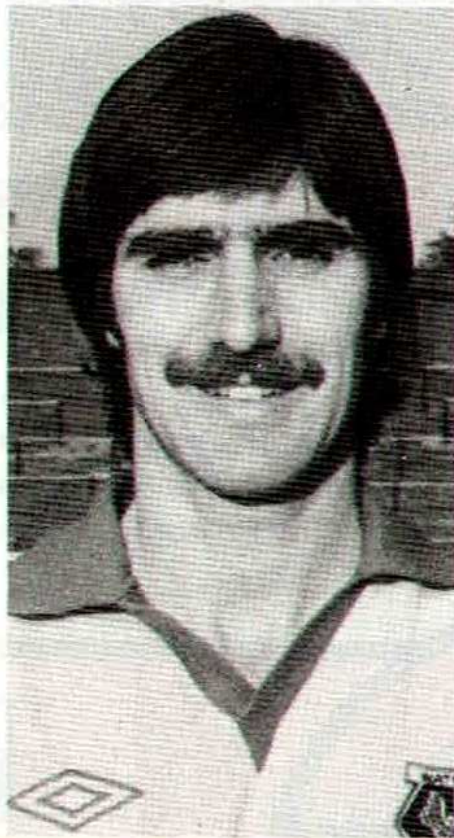
"We are all willing to help and work for each other both on and off the pitch. That helps to build up a good understanding and because we enjoy playing for the club it gives us an extra added boost."

Steve also points out: "I won't name the players in question—it will only make them blush—but they have some brilliant ball control and read the game very well."

"We have some players here who would easily fit into the First Division without any real problems. No wonder the lads came up from the Fourth in one season."

Preparing

"The manager is already preparing us to go up. He is adding players to the first team and with a back up crew like our coaching staff, Bertie Mee, Eddie Plumley and Elton John, I don't think we can fail. Don't get me wrong, I'm



not over confident but our team spirit is so high at the moment that we feel promotion is in sight."

Although Steve is prepared to praise his team mates he is very modest about his own considerable ability. He says: "I simply go out to do my best for the whole game. It is always difficult to comment on your own performances. But it helps any player to have people he can trust around him. I am lucky because each member of our side will give everything."

Steve is an admirer of Everton full back Mike Pejic." He is my type of player. Hard in the tackle, uses the ball well, is not afraid to go forward and has stacks of talent."

Interesting

"He would be in my England team without a second thought. But it is interesting over the last few years how the role of full back, both right and left, has developed. There are some really good players in those positions around just now."

"Maybe in any local team the full back is not important. And at school anybody who can't play anywhere else sometimes get put there to keep him out of the way!"

"It is certainly not a place where you can grab the headlines or become a really big star. But now I think people are beginning to see what a vital member of the side he can be."
