THE CHAIRMAN WRITES...



If anyone here knew Canterbury Road in Kilburn from 1937 to 1948 they will understand that to come out of there and succeed at anything you have to be a 'survivor'. But to survive you need a cause and football for a lot of people in working class areas becomes that cause. At the age of ten in season 1947/48 I needed a cause so I took a pin to the First Division league table, closed my eyes, and followed Derby County fanatically, until Brian Clough left.

As a manager, in my lifetime, he has always been the best and I must be one of his greatest fans. I've nothing but admiration for what he achieved at Derby and what he's achieved in Nottingham — but beyond that he makes me sick, and reminds me of the bully at Percy Road School.


He had to leave Derby because he was beginning to be bigger than the club and I was very sad for them and for him. It now looks like the same thing is happening at Nottingham with the exception that a better job is being made of it. We were told in the summer that the new stand would cost 1½ million, now we hear it is 2½ million, and all credit to Brian because he forced them to build it. But all this and the million pound transfer can only be paid for from increased revenue — and without him and continued success they could be in trouble. If he left and their fortunes changed how long would it take to clear the liabilities and who is left to be responsible for them — not Clough.

It is of no mean significance that the present Committee are thinking of turning themselves into a Limited Liability company. Perhaps they should invite him to join the new board, but at the same time invite him to sign the guarantee at the bank and pass the deeds of his family house across to support it. Perhaps he will see things a bit differently then because everytime he threatens to leave, I've lost count how many times, the bank could call on him as one of the guarantors to pay off the overdraft.

As for the press remarks about nonentities becoming somebodies on the strength of his success, the Forest Committee reputably includes a Q.C., two J.P.s, two Chartered Accountants and a Surgeon. Which of these have become famous because of Clough? I would suggest it is the reverse that is true, it is the manager who becomes famous on the back of the club. Without a club Clough would have been nothing whether it be Nottingham Forest, Brighton, Derby or Hartlepool.

They also keep telling us that 90% of Directors know nothing about the game, but why should they, we have directors because they are specialists in a particular field whether it be the licensed trade or banking and if you haven't got a specialist you have to go out and hire one. You can't ask a football manager to solve your accountancy problem and you don't ask your Accountant Director about a manager until you are discussing the financial implications. The last thing I want is a Board of Directors who are all specialists in football, one or two is sufficient if we are going to achieve anything, otherwise it is like asking your 11 players how we should play, we would end up with six different opinions.

No, what bothers me is not Directors who know nothing about the game it is Managers who think they know it all and nobody else knows anything. Do you know some of them will tell you you cannot manage at pro. level if you haven't played at pro. level, I wonder what Dario and Laurie McMenemy and Bertie Mee, to name but three, think of that. By all means let them join the Board if they are prepared to take their share of the responsibilities, but first of all make them go on a course and study the problems of management. Make them understand that Public Relations, Marketing, Motivation, Communication, Budgeting Control and People are all important if the club is to be successful.

TOMMY CUNNINGHAM

This afternoon it is the turn of our skipper Tommy Cunningham to be "profiled". Tommy, who is our most expensive player at £45,000, hails from East London. It was for that district of London that Tommy first played football and where he attracted the attention of the scouts from several London clubs. The club he eventually signed "associate schoolboy" forms for was Chelsea and he subsequently joined them as an A.P. Unfortunately for Tommy he fractured an elbow and missed a year of his apprenticeship through that injury. When he did resume playing he was in the South East Counties League and Reserve teams. These sides, under coach Dario Gradi, won the League, and League Cup and the Combination League.

When Tommy joined Chelsea he was a midfield player and it was Dave Sexton who converted him to centre-half, the position he fills so well for the Dons.

In season 1975/6 Tommy was released by Chelsea and he immediately was signed by Queens Park Rangers. He had three seasons at Loftus Road and made his debut for them in season 1976/77 against Arsenal at Highbury. Last season he played in 26 games for Q.P.R. before leaving them to join the Dons. Since he has been here Tommy has scored four goals, including last Saturday's goal at Carlisle, his first this season.

In the same East London Schoolboy side as Tommy played in was a lad called Steve Perkins. This lad joined Chelsea, Tommy followed him there. Then Tommy went to Q.P.R. and Steve Perkins went there too. Steve Perkins then signed for the Dons and a few months later — you will never believe it — Tommy joined him here. They only live five minutes away from each other in Stepney.

Tom who is married coaches the youngsters at his old school, Morpeth Street, Bethnal Green on Monday and Thursday evenings. He also helps his wife at her stall in Bethnal Green market where she sells baby clothes. Tom and his wife Linda will soon be having to buy clothes from their stall for they are awaiting the birth of their first child.

There will be no cheap admission on the night of the game for Senior Citizens and Juveniles. They will be able to purchase their tickets at the reduced price from the office prior to the game but on the night of the match, admission will be at full price.

Ground tickets are on sale now and our supporters are advised to buy these from the office before the game because the two groups of supporters will be segregated.





HISTORY REPEATING FOR SWINDON?

Swindon fans are beginning to wonder — and, indeed, hope — that this is going to be like season 1968/69 all over again. That was the year Swindon defeated Arsenal at Wembley in the League Cup final and then went on to gain promotion to the Second Division.

After an exciting opening to the season, the Robins are wonderfully placed to go for promotion and, with victories over Portsmouth, Chester and First Division Stoke already behind them in the League Cup, they are contemplating another visit to Plough Lane in a couple of weeks' time when they clash with us in the Fourth round.

Swindon are very much an attacking team. Both Andy Rowland and Alan Mayes have been scoring profusely this season and there were only three games, of their opening 16, when one or the other failed to get his name on the scoresheet. One was last Saturday when they drew 0-0 at home to Hull. The Wiltshire club was a strong promotion contender last season, when they finished fifth. If they are to improve upon that this time they will need to procure a higher percentage of their away points.

Though Swindon have drawn all their three away cup-ties this season, they had picked up only two points from four away League games prior to their midweek trip to Reading. Their solitary win was at Colchester (3-2) but they were beaten at Sheffield United (1-2), Rotherham (0-3) and Sheffield Wednesday (2-4).

BOBBY SMITH (Manager) Bobby Smith was appointed manager of Swindon in May 1978 after previous spells in charge of Bury and Port Vale. As a player, he began his career with Manchester United but didn't play League soccer until joining Scunthorpe in 1964. He later served Grimsby, Brighton, Chester and Hartlepool before joining Bury, initially as coach, in 1973.

JIMMY ALLAN (Goalkeeper) Jimmy has been a Swindon professional since 1971 and is now coming to his 200th League appearance for them.

JOHN TEMPLEMAN (Defender)
John was a close-season signing from
Exeter City. Once a Portsmouth
reserve player, John enjoyed his
first League soccer after signing for
Brighton in 1966. He completed
more than 200 League games for the
Goldstone club before signing for
Exeter in 1974.

BILLY TUCKER (Defender) Billy thought he was destined to spend his career in Southern League football with Hereford but their election to the League in 1972 took him into higher company. Bury signed him in 1976 and he moved on to Swindon this summer.

KEN STROUD (Defender) Ken has been with Swindon since his apprentice days, first stepping into their senior team in 1971/72. He completed his second century of League appearances at the end of last season

RUSSELL LEWIS (Defender) Versatile Russell, who has been a Swindon professional since 1976, has appeared as a central defender and in both full-back positions this season. He made his League bow in 1976/77 but is only now beginning to hold a regular place.

ANDY FORD (Defender) Andy didn't get a game in Bournemouth's first team so he moved on to Southend in 1972. It took him a year to get his big chance but he took it well and held his place for four years until moving to Swindon in 1977.

RAY McHALE (Midfield) Ray began his career with Chesterfield and in his second season (1972/73) in their first team he was their leading scorer with 12 goals. He moved on to Halifax in 1974 and in his second campaign there was their best marksman with 16. Swindon signed him in 1976 and he has averaged more than ten goals per season for them. He had scored three times this term by last Saturday.

CHRIS KAMAR (Midfield) Chris emerged as a League player with Portsmouth in 1975 and Swindon paid £20,000 for him during the 1977 close season.

PAUL GILCHRIST (Midfield) Paul's first club was Charlton but, after spells with Fulham (on loan) and Doncaster, he signed for Southampton in 1972 and he was a member of the Saints' F.A. Cup winning team in 1976. He moved on to Portsmouth in 1977 and to Swindon last season.

ROY CARTER (Midfield) Hereford signed Roy from Falmouth in 1975 and he made more than 70 League appearances for them before signing for Swindon two seasons back.

BRIAN WILLIAMS (Midfield) Brian made his name with Bury and, after a fine performance against Q.P.R. in a League Cup tie, he was signed by the London Club for £70,000 in 1977. A year later he was sold to Swindon for £55,000.

IAN MILLER (Forward) Another former Bury player, Ian joined Nottingham Forest in 1974 but moved on to Doncaster a year later. Swindon signed him in 1978.

ANDY ROWLAND (Forward) Andy left Derby to join Bury in 1974 and after finishing top scorer for three seasons on the trot, he was signed by Swindon for £80,000 last season. He had netted seven times after last Saturday's game.


ALAN MAYES (Forward) With 11 goals last weekend, Alan was one of the country's top scorers. Once with Q.P.R., he joined Watford in 1974 and was sold to Swindon for £80,000 last season.


