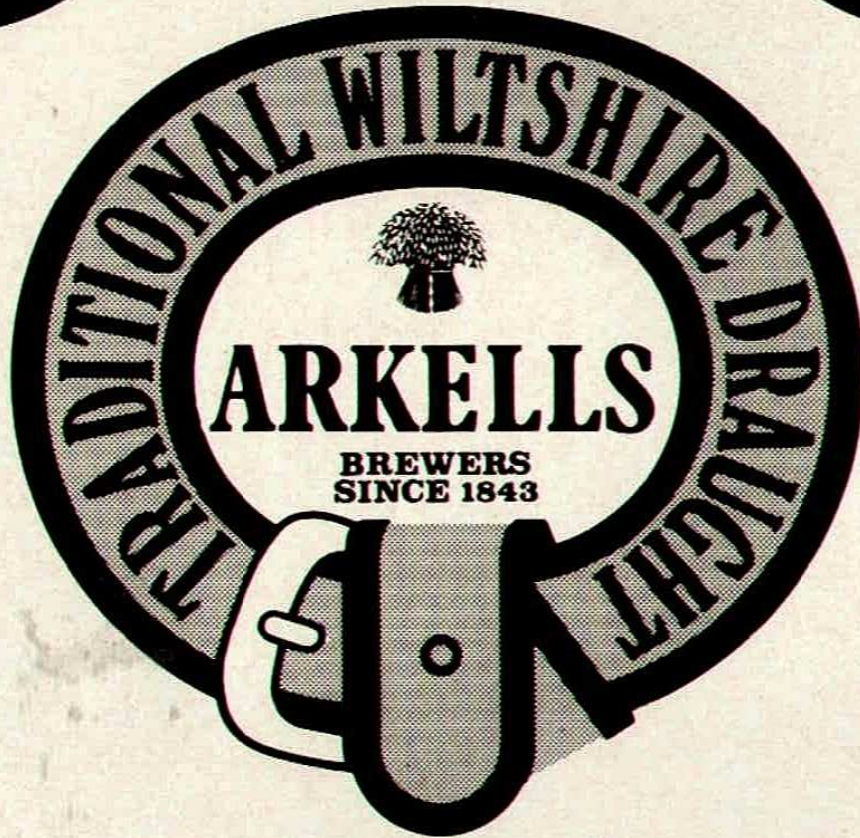
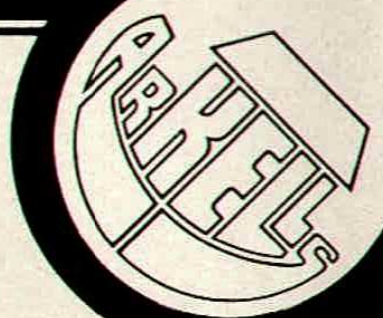


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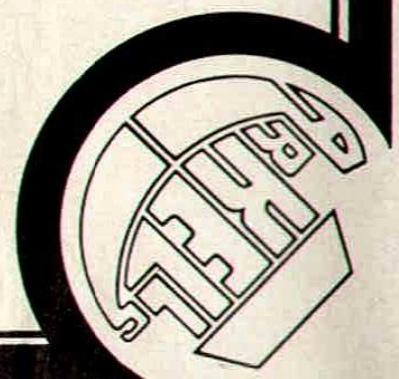
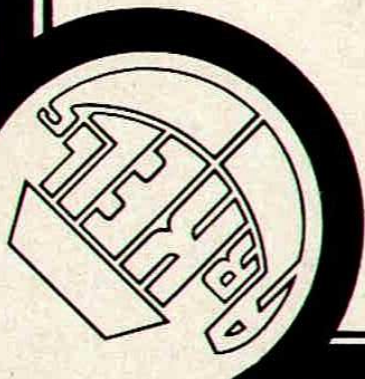
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## Bob Smith says.....

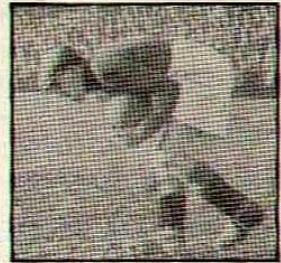


### GOING TO WIMBLEDON? (Route suggested by A.A.)

# TOWN THROUGH TIME — Goalkeepers — part nine

After returning from Ireland's headquarters at Bangor in October 1952, NORMAN UPRICHARD was only to appear three more times for the Town. His last game turned out to be a home encounter with Crystal Palace when, despite having scored three goals after an hour's play, Swindon somehow managed to concede six. Norman then went off north to Hampden Park to face the Scots, helping his fellow countrymen to a creditable 1-1 draw. Very late the following evening, Thursday November 6, First Division Portsmouth wrote out a five-figure cheque to take him to Fratton Park - and so, with the Town languishing at the very foot of the League, SAM BURTON was back in the driving seat. Sixteenth was the highest that Swindon could reach throughout that winter and it must have come as little consolation to Sam to be voted 'man of the match' in a 0-7 F.A. Cup Third Round thumping at Maine Road. The 1953-54 season started on a much brighter note with three wins then, with Burton sidelined temporarily, a new face emerged. TREVOR CHURCHILL, who had learnt his trade at Reading returned South after tasting life in the Northern section with Rochdale. But Sam was back by October when, after three consecutive losses, the defence was given a shake-up. Churchill, left-back Terry Elwell and pivot Ted Batchelor all lost their first-team status. The tonic worked, for the Town stormed to a 5-0 win at the expense of Bristol City. The ex-Reading man came back for a matter of just three weeks while Burton carried a strained thigh muscle following a night of shooting practice for the Town with the Turkish League champions Fenerbahce the victims. But once Sam had recovered there was no one to stop him totting up 94 consecutive first-team appearances. Scot Johnnie Kyle, a bricklayer signed from Stirling Albion in the summer of 1955, (he was also a goalkeeper!) spent the duration of his stay in the south in the Combination League - and by this time Trevor Churchill had been despatched to the hop fields of Kent to assist Southern League Tonbridge. Only on one isolated occasion between November 1953 and September 1956 was Sam Burton not on hand - COLIN GILL had the honour - and he chalked up his 250th game for the Town during Christmas 1955. The sequence came to an end after a 0-7 drubbing at Bournemouth. Caretaker-manager, full-back Geoff Fox, wielded the axe and five changes were made. In goal he brought in a close-season capture from his former club Bristol Rovers, RAY CHANDLER. Burton was

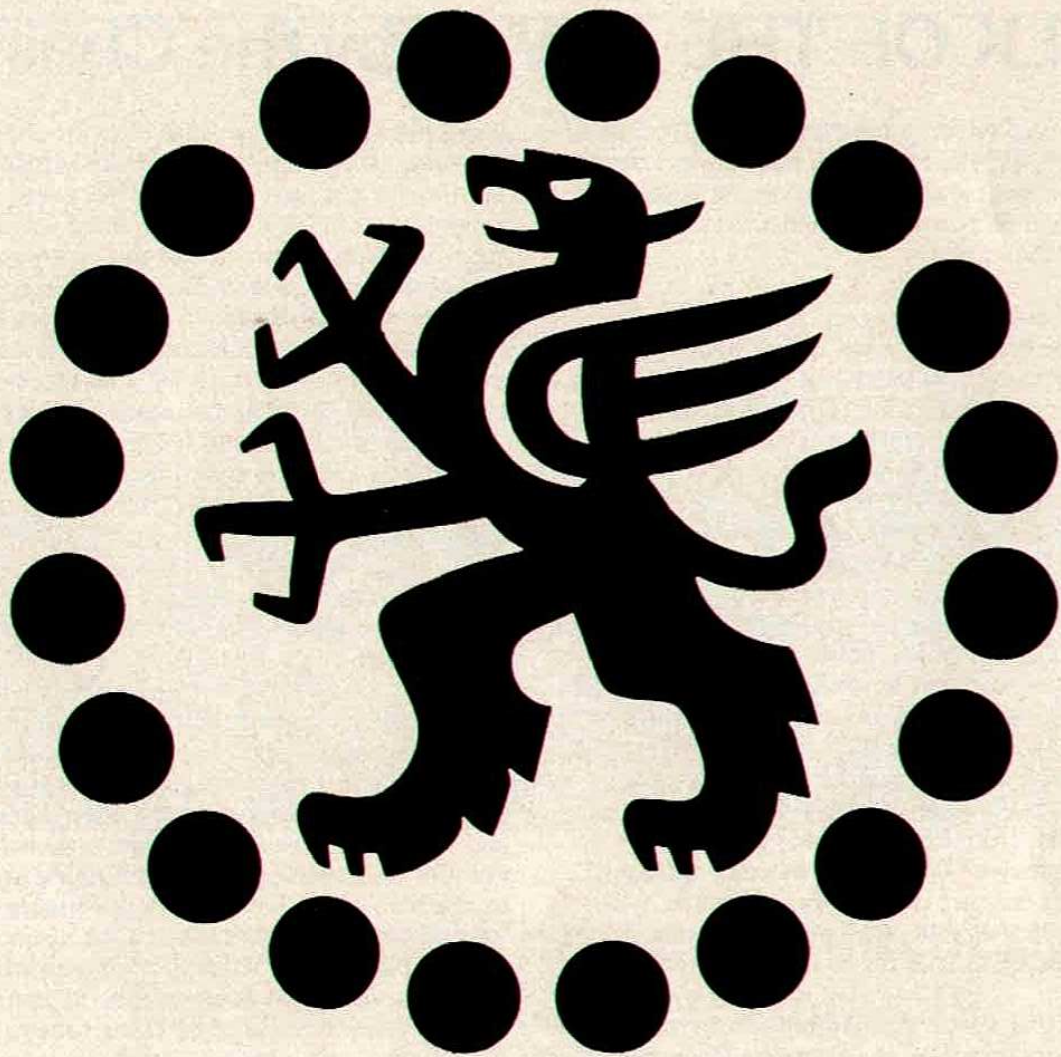
still left out in the cold when Bert Head was appointed in Fox's place and he was not selected again until early in the new year of 1957. There followed quite a remarkable upsurge in the fortunes of Swindon Town in 1957-58 when, after hovering around the bottom of the table for some two years, the club actually sat at the top on three separate occasions during the season. As would be expected, the improvement reflected on a more settled team line-up and Sam Burton was ever-present. The final game of that campaign marked his 350th and by the time Chandler saw the light of day again, in Division Three terms, Sam had strung together another unbroken spell of seventy-one matches. When Ray did re-emerge, he was treated to five away trips in six games - at Rochdale, Halifax, Accrington, Notts County and Tranmere! He saw out the remainder of that season, but from August 1959 until his farewell performance towards the end of 1961, Sam Burton was undisputed 'number one'. There were three challengers during that time but they were limited to a meagre total of eight games between them. A former Chelsea reserve, OWEN MEDLOCK, mustered four appearances and MIKE TEAGUE, from Gloucester, was allowed three. The least privileged was GEOFF CROOK, whose solitary contribution to the records was an F.A. Cup First Round replay at Bath - where the Town participated in a goal bonanza. The non-league side put four past Crook but thankfully 'Bronco' Layne cancelled them out - and Ernie Hunt grabbed another two to save any possible embarrassment.

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# TALK OF THE TOWN by the Chairman

Tonight we welcome the players and officials of Plymouth Argyle. Plymouth have always been an attractive side, and like ourselves, have sampled the success and disappointments that go along with football history.

Devon and Cornwall are not industrial areas where football usually has its hot beds but over the years they have produced many fine players. Bastin was the first teenager to play for England before the Second World War and made his League debut with Exeter before playing for the Arsenal. In those days very few players entered League Football in their early teens and the advent of boys into League Football came about through the introduction of ground staff boys and then apprenticeship schemes. Ellis Studdard the Chief Scout of Plymouth was on our staff when Bert Head was our manager and his duties included looking after our youths as well as scouting. Ellis was a former player at Plymouth although he originally came from the north. Rollo Jack a brother of the pre war famous David Jack from Plymouth was also a player on our books when Ted Vizard was our manager. Our latest contact with Devon of course, is our own Roy Carter and, who knows, he may become as famous as his namesake Raich Carter.

On Saturday last, we held a collection on the ground, organised by the Swindon Chamber of Commerce in aid of various charities who support underprivileged and handicapped children. A further collection will be taken this evening for this very much worthy cause and we hope that those of you who have not already supported this cause will do so tonight. On Tuesday next, we travel to Wimbledon for our cup encounter and already we are assured of a good following. We are running a special train which leaves at 3.45 p.m. and the fare is three pounds and forty pence. You do not have to be a member of the club to join the party, but it is advisable to get in touch with Mick Conley at the Supporters Squash Club as soon as possible to avoid any disappointments.

This game is not an all ticket match. The seating capacity at Wimbledon is very limited and these will all have been sold before the match, but there should be room on the terraces, although they have been selling tickets for these areas as well. If we force a replay the return game will be played at Swindon on Tuesday evening, 6th

November at 7.30 p.m. This date would clash with our return fixture with Plymouth Argyle. During the last week you may have read of the resignation of Player/Manager Mike Summerbee from Stockport County and during this week I was able to discuss with him the problems that football managers have when results are unfavorable, particularly with clubs that have a small experienced playing staff. This was Mikes first experience in football management since living in the top bracket of the football world with Manchester City and sampling the taste of International class with his experiences of appearances for England.

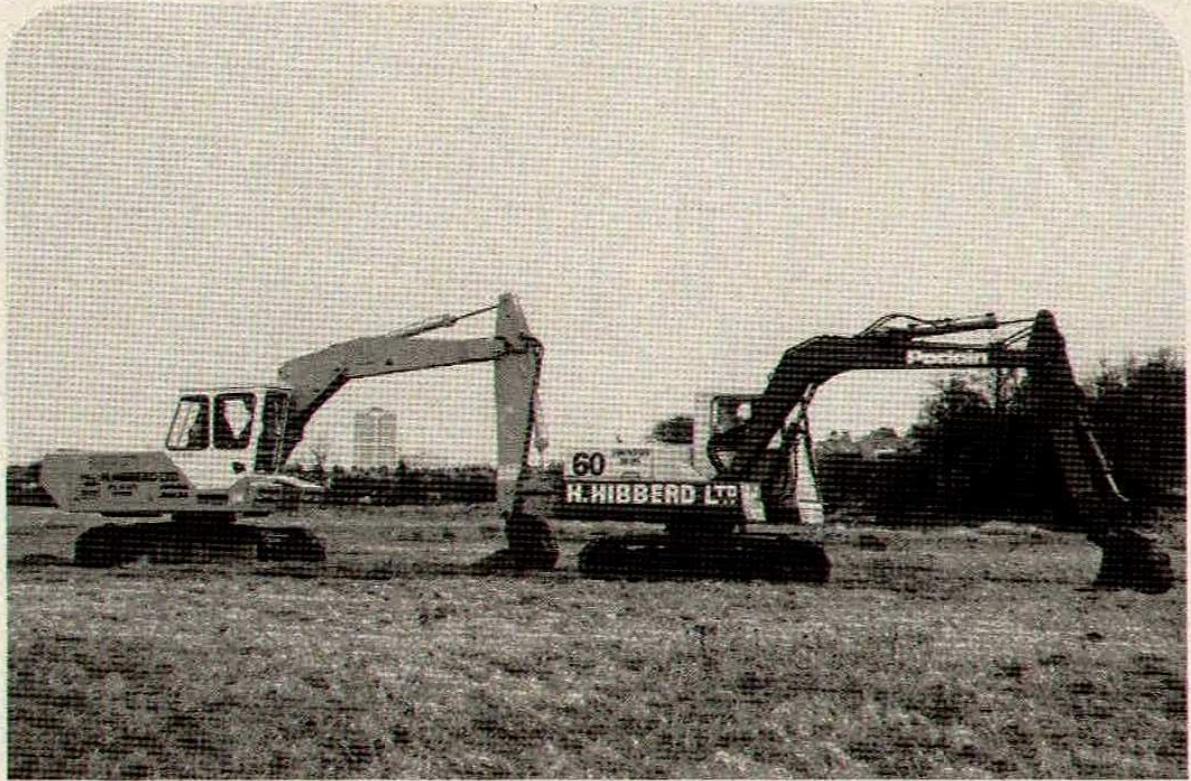

Colchester, 3-1 winners over Blackpool at Layer Road on Friday, are now unbeaten in nine games and have taken maximum points from their last four trips. Twin strikers Bobby Gough and Trevor Lee both netted, with Bob Hodge getting the third. Jimmy Weston replied for the visitors.

Oxford Trained at Hillsborough to a seventh-minute goal from Rodger Wylde - but Billy Jeffrey and Gordon Hodgson, neither of whom had scored since the opening League game of the season, put United 2-1 up in the second half. Within a minute, however, Wednesday were back on equal terms when Wylde was again successful.

Now in a full-back role, Reading's Wiltshire-born 'play anywhere' Steve Hetzke rifled home a twenty-yard free kick to put his side ahead against Exeter just after the break. Mike Kearney added a second before substitute Ian Pearson pulled one back for City.

Mansfield, who lost all their first five away games, picked up a point at high-riding Millwall thanks to Terry Austin. He grabbed two goals in the last ten minutes to go equal top

scorer in the Football League - along with the Town's Alan Mayes and Phil Boyer of Southampton. John Seasman, highest scorer at the Den last year, got his first League goal this season.

Gillingham, fifth in the table just three weeks ago, slumped to another home defeat. Kevin Kilmore did the damage for Grimsby, to give the Mariners their first away win since April.

The biggest League gate at Gigg Lane for eighteen months - 8,347 - saw Bury go down by the odd goal in three to leaders Sheffield United. Dave Gregory replied to an early Tony Kenworthy score for the Blades, but the home side's fate was sealed ten minutes from time when David Constantine diverted a cross into his own net.

Carlisle, leading 1-0 with just four minutes to go, finally put paid to Barnsley by three goals to one. Paul Bannon increased the Cumbrians' lead before Mike Lester, a recent signing from Grimsby, reduced the arrears. In the dying moments, George McVitie restored United's two-goal lead with his first since Boxing Day last year.

# John Ward talks to Chris Ogden

"I enjoy playing at centre forward in training" said Chris Ogden, "but I've always been a goalkeeper. Perhaps it's because I wasn't good enough at anything else!" he added with a smile. You might think that there has not been a lot for Chris to smile about recently with Jimmy Allan apparently confirmed as the first choice goalkeeper but while clearly disappointed to be playing second fiddle he is determined not to let it get him down. It is all the more ironic when you consider that Chris left his home town club Oldham "because I was in the reserves and wanted first team football."

Chris had joined Oldham at the age of eighteen, leaving an engineering apprenticeship unfinished, and stayed for seven years being a member of the team which won promotion from the Third to the Second Division in the 1973/74 season. "Then I realised that I was in a bit of a rut and refused to sign." This led to his transfer to Swindon. He immediately noticed the difference: "Unlike Swindon, Oldham has a lot of clubs to contend with and it's a very different area. But I've made a lot of friends in Swindon in spite of being a northerner."

On his arrival last season he made an immediate impact with a crucial penalty save in the League Cup match against West Ham at Upton Park. "Of course it was me who punched the ball off the line in the first place but the referee said it was Andy Ford. I wasn't pleased." (this must be one of the understatements of last year). "I was ready to go either way. I was just glad when justice was done." From this account of what any witness will agree was an extremely dramatic incident you will have gathered that Chris is not the most excitable of people. Indeed this is perhaps one of his problems as a goalkeeper. "I'm not a natural when it comes to shouting at the defence. The manager says that I don't do it enough. I have to be forced to do it." The West Ham game was not the one most vivid in his memory however. Instead he particularly recalls the away defeat of Swansea at Christmas, not because he had an especially outstanding game but because it was "a good team effort." He went on to comment on the good squad spirit that was built up last season and thus cemented by the club holiday in May in Torremolinos and the week before the beginning of this season on tour in Scotland which enabled the squad to get together for training without any distractions from home.

Chris is single and lives in digs in Swindon.

In his spare time he enjoys playing most ball games, especially golf although "it's one of those games which annoys me." He admits to worrying too much about this football: "Whenever you let a goal through you always think that there's some way in which you could have stopped it even when everyone is agreed it was not your fault." I wondered if he had any regrets at the way things had turned out, a chance to become a skilled engineer turned down and nothing obvious to turn his hand to when his career as a footballer ended. "We'll have to see where I am when I finish playing," he replied philosophically. "I wouldn't change anything. Once you've tasted first team football it's difficult to accept anything less but in spite of this I always enjoy playing. That's what I have to do now, keep playing and hoping."

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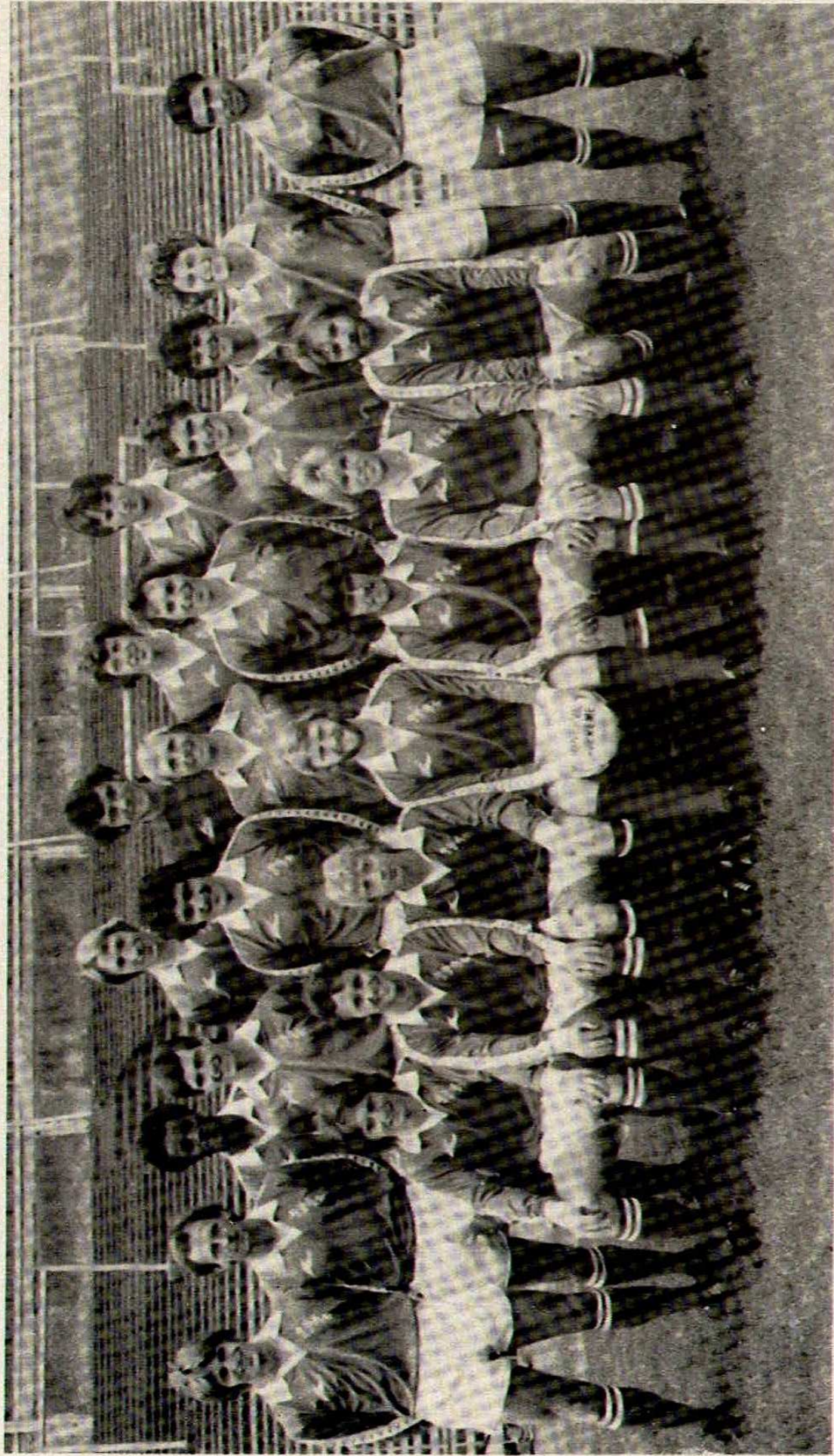

# Argyle's poor away record

Plymouth Argyle are now the only Third Division side without an away point to their credit and it was largely due to this aspect of their play that they found themselves bottom of the table last week. Manager Bobby Saxton is, of course, very concerned about the current situation and, in one move to try and improve things he recently signed goalkeeper Geoff Crudgington from Swansea for £40,000. A few weeks earlier he bought striker Dave Kemp from Carlisle for £75,000.

Goalkeeping is one position that has been giving Argyle great problems this season. Possibly they now regret the sale of two goalkeepers over the past 18 months --- Paul Barron to Arsenal for £70,000 and Martin Hodge to Everton for £190,000.

Argyle opened the season with the inexperienced teenager Neil Hards in goal and later loaned David Brown from Devon rivals Plymouth. Now Crudgington is bringing his experience to bear in the penalty area. Geoff played a few games for Aston Villa but really established himself in League soccer after joining Crewe in 1972. Swansea signed him for £20,000 during the 1978 close-season.

There have been quite a few changes in defence, too, though just recently the back four has been a little more settled with Kevin Hodges, Tyron James, George Foster and Brian McNeill on parade. Forbes Phillipson-Master and Chris Harrison have also appeared in defence.

Hodges, Foster and Harrison, who has always played in midfield, are all products of Argyle's nursery teams. James made several appearances in Fulham's Second Division side before his £15,000 transfer to Plymouth two seasons ago. McNeill played a few times in Bristol City's First Division side and it was only after his transfer to Plymouth last season that he began to enjoy regular League soccer.

Phillipson-Masters developed with Southampton but played only nine League games for them. While at The Dell, he was loaned out to Exeter, Bournemouth and Luton but this summer he severed his connections with the Saints when signing for Argyle.

Gary Megson, Colin Randell and Brian Bason have been fairly settled in midfield.

Megson came through the ranks to make his senior bow for Plymouth two seasons ago. Randell is in his second spell with the club. He

originally joined them from Coventry in 1973 and held a regular place until moving to Exeter in 1977. He returned to Home Park this summer. Bason spent several years as a Chelsea professional, and made a couple of dozen First Division appearances for them, before moving to Plymouth for £30,000 two seasons ago.

The £75,000 fee paid for striker Dave Kemp was a club record but he lost no time in rewarding the club for its confidence. Dave hit four goals in his first three games and tallied five before Saturday's game. A goalscorer all his life, Dave was signed by Crystal Palace from Slough Town in 1975 and hit 13 goals in his first full season. He then moved on to Portsmouth and was top scorer in two seasons with them. Pompey sold him to Carlisle for £75,000 in 1978 and last season he was the Cumbrians' best marksman with 21 goals.

Kemp has been partnering another well-known goalscorer, Fred Binney, with Brian Johnson playing on the wing.

Binney was Argyle's top scorer with 28 goals last season and, Kemp, had netted five times this term prior to the weekend. Once with Torquay, Fred joined Exeter in 1970 and on three occasions topped their scoring list. He moved on to Brighton in 1974, becoming their chief scorer in his second season, and joined Plymouth in 1977.

Johnson is one of several Argyle apprentices in the team. He turned professional in 1973 and has been in the side for five years.

The last time Plymouth won away from home in a League game was here at the County Ground last January! Since then they have collected only two points from 16 away games.

This season's run of away disasters began with a 1-2 reverse at Millwall and was followed by defeats at Chesterfield (1-3), Grimsby (0-1), Southend (1-4), Chester (0-1) and Blackburn (0-1).

The strange thing was that Plymouth had to visit Second Division Chelsea in the League Cup and won 2-1 at Stamford Bridge. Argyle's League Cup run took them as far as round three. After ousting Newport 2-1 on aggregate in the first round, they put Chelsea out by 4-3 on aggregate and were then held to a goalless home draw by Wimbledon. They lost the replay 0-1.



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# SOCCER SCENE by Tony Pullein

England's spanking 5-1 victory over N. Ireland in Belfast last Wednesday really does make them certainties for the final stages of the European Football Championship in Italy next June. I know we must always tone our remarks with the thought that there is no such thing as a certainty in football but even the Republic of Ireland --- the only side that can upset us now --- realise that not even a miracle is likely to help them now.

To fail now, England would have to lose to Bulgaria at Wembley next month. In that event the Republic of Ireland would have to beat N. Ireland by something like four or five goals in Belfast and then beat England by three or four at Wembley.

So Ron Greenwood has achieved the first part of his brief in just over two years in charge. But, having steered England into the final stages, he must now plan for the higher quality of opposition we shall meet when we get there.

Though the England manager has not been without his critics, we can only judge him upon results and the evidence is that England have dropped only two points, are unbeaten, in 12 competitive matches since he took over.

Having qualified for the last eight, Mr. Greenwood has said that he will bring in new players between now and June. Up until now he has remained loyal to a basic squad while also bleeding players for the future.

Ron Greenwood has used 31 players in 21 matches since he took over, giving first caps to Terry McDermott, Trevor Whymark, Bob Latchford, Steve Coppell, Peter Barnes, Tony Woodcock, Viv Anderson, Kenny Sansom and Laurie Cunningham.

Indeed, Mr. Greenwood is now in a position to field two full England teams!

Only four months ago, in fact, he fielded only three of the players then considered as his strongest team --- Dave Watson, Kevin Keegan and Terry McDermott --- against Sweden. In a prestige match which the Swedes desperately wanted to win, England were good enough to draw 0-0.

It's not difficult to pick two outstanding teams from Mr Greenwood's regular squad.

We can use last week's selection in N. Ireland as the "A" choice: Stilton --- Neal, Thompson, Watson, Mills --- Coppell, Keegan, Wilkins, Brooking --- Francis, Woodcock.

And how about this "B" selection? Clemence --- Anderson, Cherry, Hughes, Sanson ---

McDermott, Kennedy (Ray), Currie --- Cunningham, Latchford, Barnes.

The "B" side obviously would lack such world-class stars as Kevin Keegan and Trevor Francis but men like Tony Currie, when fit, Terry McDermott and Laurie Cunningham are players of stature who could lift the side.

Though the England boss now has at least two players, of more or less equal claims, to most positions, he has not yet got around to experimenting with any young central defenders. Should both Phil Thompson and Dave Watson be out together, Mr Greenwood would have great difficulty in finding experienced cover.

Emlyn Hughes, of course, continues to surprise us when he is picked for the team and Trevor Cherry, a versatile player who can fill in almost anywhere, would do a good job. But they are both approaching the ends of their international careers.

It could be that the England manager has his eyes on the young Ipswich centre-backs Russell Osman and Terry Butcher, who have been playing in the First Division together for only a year but who are both now established members of the England u-21 team.

We should see one, or both, in the full England team as Mr Greenwood experiments in the games leading up to the European finals. But it would be unthinkable to introduce both together in any England match of any importance at this stage.

There are many more outstanding players being groomed by the England manager. Midfield men Glen Hoddle (Tottenham) and Steve Williams (Southampton) are virtual certainties for the full England team this season. And striker Kevin Reeves could also find himself gaining a full cap before long.

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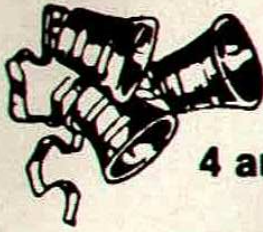
