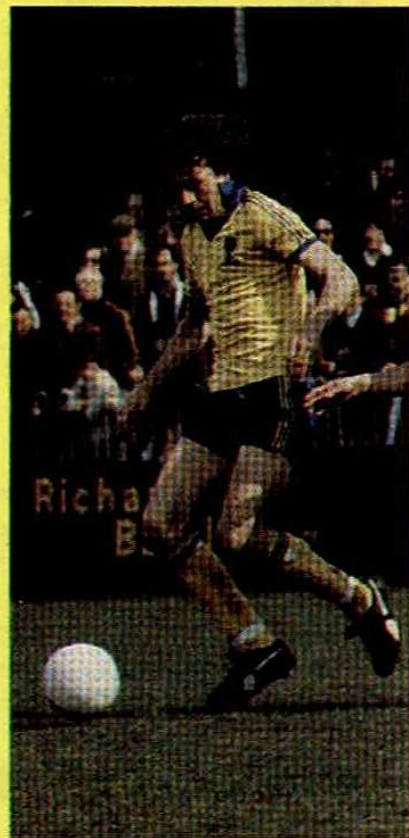
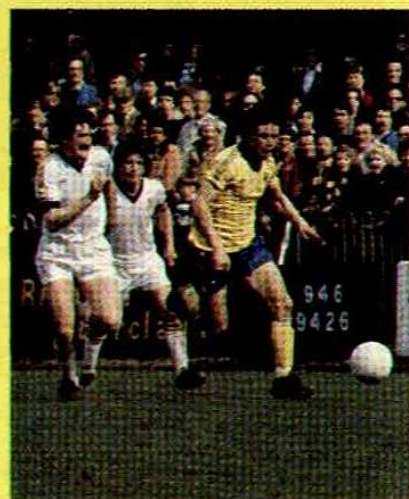

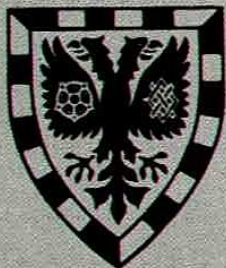

does in profile

Mark Dziadulewicz

Our 'profile' this evening is of the young man with the difficult name -- Mark Dziadulewicz (pronounced Juddalevich).

Mark was born nearby at Carshalton on the 29th January, 1960, but he and his parents moved to Chelmsford when he was around 2 years of age. His first football was for the Cubs when he was 7. He began playing for his school and for Chelmsford Schools when he was 13. He was then selected to play for Essex Boys at under 14's and under 15's levels. Chelmsford Schools reached the semi-finals of the English Schools Trophy, but were beaten 4-0 by Newham -- so no glory there for Mark.

Whilst at school Mark signed associated schoolboy forms for Southend United and on leaving school joined them as an Apprentice Professional, a status he held for 2 years. He was then signed by Southend as a professional in 1977/78 season but was released at the end of that season.

Mark then joined Southern League Chelmsford City and, along with Peterson, scored several goals. In February of this year Wimbledon gave Mark a 4 weeks trial and signed him at the end of it. Mark started his football playing in the midfield, but is now played as a striker, the position he favours most. His debut was against Darlington last year and his first goal came against Exeter City here on the 9th October. And what a good goal it was!

Mark is not married, and he lodges with his Grandmother here in Wimbledon. He travels home to Chelmsford at weekends to see his parents and his Shetland sheepdog and his black cat Sam.

Tennis is one of Mark's favourite sports and he also enjoys swimming. He drives a Vauxhall Cavalier and his taste in music is "New Wave" Gary Numan and all that. He likes it here at Wimbledon which he says is a friendly club and he is pleased to have the chance to prove his ability. His ambition is to play in the 1st Division.

Mark is 5'9" tall and weighs 10stone 13lbs.

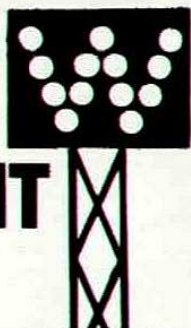

SWINDON EYE WEMBLEY AGAIN!

Swindon Town created a sensation when they beat mighty Arsenal at Wembley to win the League Cup as a Third Division club in 1969. Since then, however, they have not had a lot of success in this tournament and this is only the third time that they have subsequently survived to this fourth round stage.

But now the 'Robins' have their eyes very much on Wembley again following some outstanding performances in earlier rounds. They made light work of Portsmouth in the first round, drawing 1-1 at Fratton Park and winning the return 2-0. And we have all seen what Pompey have since achieved in the Fourth Division!

Chester proved pretty tough opponents in the next round and there was some concern when Swindon managed to win their home leg by only 1-0. Yet they came up good in the return to earn a 1-1 draw and further progress.

By far their best performance came at the Victoria Ground where they trailed 0-2 to First Division Stoke City as the interval approached. But Alan Mayes headed one in just before the break and Swindon's fine second-half display was rewarded when Andy Rowland equalised three minutes from time.

Goals by Mayes and Ray McHale gave Swindon a 2-1 victory in the replay and they have made it abundantly clear that they are good enough to make it all the way to Wembley again - providing they can survive at Plough Lane tonight.

In direct contrast to their performances in the League Cup, Swindon's away form in the Third Division has been very poor. Their only away win was, surprisingly, at Colchester (3-2), but they were beaten in five other away games at Sheffield United (1-2), Rotherham (0-3), Sheffield Wednesday (2-4), Reading (1-2) and, of course, here at Wimbledon (0-2). They were due to play at Blackpool on Saturday and, by the time you read this, you will be aware of whether or not they have improved their rather dismal away record.

In spite of their shortcomings away from home, Swindon remain very strong promotion contenders and they still have the chance to repeat their fabulous double of 1968/69 when they coupled Wembley success with promotion to the Second Division.

Swindon possess two aces in their front runners, Andy Rowland and Alan Mayes, who are both among the country's leading scorers at the moment. Their defence has proved suspect on occasions and they have suffered one or two heavy defeats.

But they adopt a different outlook in Cup-ties and, in six League Cup games so far this season, only First Division Stoke have managed to score more than one against them.

The stage is set, then, for what promises to be an outstanding Cup-tie. And it doesn't look as if more than one goal, either way, will settle it.

BOBBY SMITH (Manager) Bobby Smith enjoyed a long playing career in the Football League. After leaving Manchester United, he made his League debut for Scunthorpe in 1964 and later played for Grimsby, Brighton, Chester and Hartlepool. Bury gave him a job as coach, he later took over as manager and he had a short spell as Port Vale's manager before taking over at Swindon in 1978.

JIMMY ALLEN (Goalkeeper) Jimmy was beaten twice by Alan Cork on his last visit and will be aiming to keep a clean sheet this time. He has been a Swindon professional since 1971.

JOHN TEMPLEMAN (Defender) John began his career with Portsmouth but made his first League appearances after joining Brighton in 1966. Exeter signed him in 1974 and he signed for Swindon during the recent close-season.

BILLY TUCKER (Defender) Billy rose with Hereford from their Southern League days and moved on to Bury in 1976. Swindon signed him this summer.

KEN STROUD (Defender) Ken has now played well over 200 senior games for Swindon, the club he has

been with since his apprentice days. He made his League bow in 1971/72.

RUSSELL LEWIS (Defender) Russell turned professional in 1976 and made his League debut in 1976/77. He can play anywhere in the back four but is usually at left-back these days.

RAY McHALE (Midfield) Ray has a reputation for scoring goals from his midfield position. He led Chesterfield's scoring list in 1972/73 and later came out on top for Halifax. Swindon signed him in 1976 and now he takes their penalties. He had scored three goals before the weekend.

CHRIS KAMARA (Midfield) Chris began his League career with Portsmouth in 1975 and he moved on to Swindon for £20,000 during the summer of 1977.

ROY CARTER (Midfield) Hereford spotted Roy playing for Falmouth and signed him in 1975. Swindon secured his transfer two seasons ago.

BRIAN WILLIAMS (Midfield) Brian began with Bury and moved on to Q.P.R. for £70,000 in 1977. He played First Division football for Rangers and then moved down to Swindon for £55,000 in 1978.

IAN MILLER (Forward) Ian also started his career with Bury and was transferred to Nottm. Forest in 1974. Doncaster signed him just over a year later and he linked with Swindon last season.

ALAN MAYES (Forward) Alan is one of the country's top scorers with 14 goals before Saturday's game and he has scored in each of Swindon's

last four League Cup ties. He formerly played for Q.P.R. and Watford and joined Swindon for £80,000 last season.

ANDY ROWLAND (Forward) Another high-scoring forward, Andy had netted 9 times prior to the weekend. Once with Derby, he joined Bury in 1974 and was their top scorer for three successive seasons. Swindon paid £80,000 for him last season.

JOHN MARTIN
(Alton, Hants)

Started with the Bromley and District League in 1958. Moved to Surrey in 1964 and progressed through Surrey Senior and Isthmian Leagues to the Football League in 1973. Refereed Isthmian League Final in 1977, and lined a U.E.F.A. Cup match in 1978.

A married man with one son, he is manager of a purchase ledger department. Enjoys all sports, particularly badminton and athletics, and is a past member of the Polytechnic Harriers. Is Vice-Chairman of the Basingstoke Referees Association.

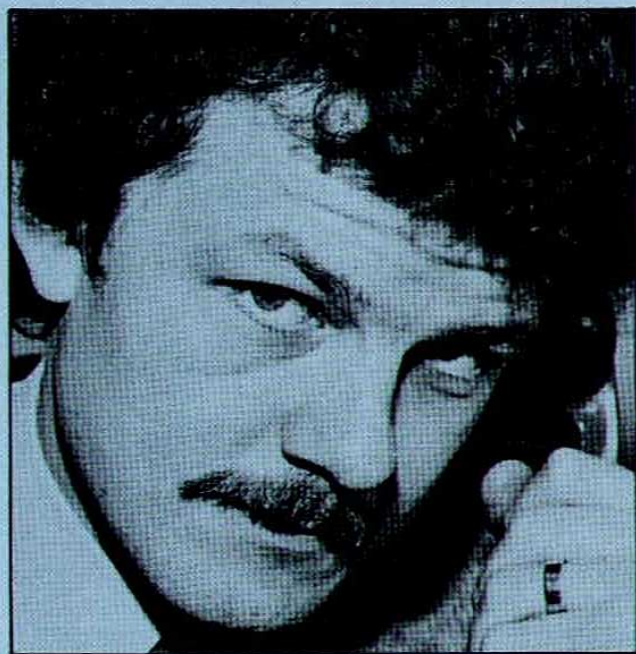
