

VOICE OF ARSENAL

Very few of the 55,546 crowd who crammed into Arsenal Stadium for the Liverpool game will forget it—despite the fact that no goals were scored, and many of them will not easily understand one newspaper heading which read—'Liverpool put Arsenal in their place.' Since it was a match which we might have won, just as much as Liverpool might have won it, it is difficult to see how we were put in our place. It was a red-blooded contest with no nastiness in any shape or form so that both sides were allowed to play football and this they did.

It is interesting to speculate on how the League table will be looking when we play the return game with Liverpool at Anfield on 19 April. Already with normal fixtures we have six League games scheduled for April including Spurs, Nottingham Forest and Liverpool so we can only hope to avoid a congestion of fixtures at the end of the season.

All eyes now are on the winter weather.

A REPLAY

If tonight's match is drawn the replay will be at Swindon on Tuesday, 11 December, kick-off 7.30 p.m.

Tonight we switch to one of our main targets the Football League Cup, which we have yet to win, and that is why we want to beat Swindon tonight, not, as some have suggested, to avenge our defeat by them in the 1969 Final. Not one of our current team played in that Final so they have nothing to avenge, and in any case, does it matter what happened in 1969, or what Walsall did to us before the war. Tonight's the night that matters, and Terry Neill, Don Howe and the team know enough about Cup football to have prepared for any eventuality; the preparation has been as intense as for any game we play these days whether in Istanbul, Anfield or Old Trafford. We welcome the officials, players and supporters of Swindon Town to our stadium. That they have got so far in the competition must deserve the respect of any opposition.

Swindon say 'WE'LL PLAY IT OUR WAY'

Listen to Swindon Town manager Bobby Smith as he sets the scene - from the Wiltshire club's point of view, anyway-for this Football League Cup quarter-final: 'At Highbury tonight, in our second colours of blue, Arsenal will find that we are a good football side. I'm expecting a great match. Such is the standard of football today that you rarely get a game in which a First Division side outclasses Third or Fourth Division opponents. My team saw Arsenal play Brighton, but it was difficult to assess because Brighton were poor opposition. The Gunners play a fluid 4-4-2 system. They have class midfield players, Brady and Talbot, but Rix and Price are good, too, and they all try to get forward.

'We shall not concentrate on how to stop Arsenal. We are concentrating on what WE are going to do. We will play our normal attacking game, seeking to win possession and use it to advantage. Arsenal will know they have been in a game and, if the atmosphere is right, it should be quite a night.'

Swindon, a Wiltshire town of 90,680 inhabitants and 77 miles west of London, developed in a football sense from the railway works there. Formed in 1881, Swindon Town F.C. turned professional in 1894. They became original members of the Football League Division Three in 1920 and have remained in that section except for two spells in Division Two (1963–65 and 1969–74).

Even in their non-League days, 'The Robins' had famous players. Harold Fleming gained 11 full England caps before World War One and helped Swindon to reach the F.A. Cup semi-final in 1910 and 1912. He became a legend in his own day.

Swindon was the name on nearly every football follower's lips in the sensational 1968–69 season. They had a promotion run on the boil, and in the Football League Cup they went through the first round 2-1 at home to Torquay, beat Bradford City 4-3 at home in a second round replay and defeated Second Division Blackburn Rovers 1-0 at home in Round 3.

People really took notice when they eliminated First Division Coventry City 3-0 in a fourth round replay, which brought a quarter-final tie against Derby County. Swindon earned a 0-0 draw at the Baseball Ground, before defeating County 1-0 in the replay.

In the intended two-leg semi-final Swindon had a three-match tussle with First Division Burnley, defeating them 3-2 (6-5 on aggregate) after extra time at West Bromwich to clinch a Wembley final place against Arsenal, who had overcome North London rivals Spurs in their semi-final.

Arsenal, losing Finalists by 1-0 to Leeds the previous season, were determined to add the League Cup to their long list of honours and their side included seven internationals and eight of the team destined to complete the 'double' two seasons later.

At Wembley on a quagmire pitch, Arsenal contained Swindon's zestful forwards until the 35th minute, when a mix-up between goalkeeper Bob Wilson and giant Scot Ian Ure presented Peter Noble with a chance. His shot hit Wilson, and Roger Smart forced home the rebound.

Swindon then played with great confidence but Arsenal kept their nerve and with 30 minutes remaining began to assert themselves. Poor shooting and Peter Downsborough's brilliant goalkeeping delayed the equaliser until the 86th minute, when that indefatigable worker Bobby Gould headed home.

Extra time belonged to Swindon, especially to left-winger Don Rogers, whose two goals stunned the Gunners. He had looked throughout the most accomplished player afield, and on the verge of the extra time interval, he restored Swindon's lead when he gathered Willie Penman's corner, dribbled round a defender and slammed the ball high into the net.

Swindon, scorning all-out defence, continued to attack. With extra time running out, Rogers raced from his own half on to Smart's clearance, went clear of all opposition towards Arsenal's penalty-area, paused, drew Wilson out, dribbled round him and drove home the individual goal of the season.

Rogers, surprisingly, never gained an England cap. When he joined Crystal Palace for £150,000 in October 1972, there were protests in Swindon's streets. But first with Palace and later with Q.P.R., Rogers never reproduced the sensational performance of March 15, 1969, at Wembley.

Rod Thomas, who played splendidly at right-back, collected a Swindon record number of caps—30 for Wales, to which he added 19 while with Derby County and one with Cardiff City. Peter Noble, inside-left that day, still plays in the Football League, captaining Burnley, who are struggling in Division Two.

Swindon completed their wonderful 1968–69 season by gaining promotion to Division Two, equal on points with champions Watford. Next season they defeated Roma in the Anglo-Italian Cup Final. Dave Mackay, fearless, battling Scottish international of Spurs and Derby County fame, became Swindon's player-manager before moving on to manage Nottingham Forest and Derby.


Swindon appointed Bobby Smith as manager in May 1978 after spells at Bury and Port Vale. As a player, he never faced Arsenal although he trained at Highbury in 1958 before playing wing-half for England schoolboys against Germany at Wembley. He started with Manchester United before moving to Scunthorpe, with whom he made his League debut, and later to Grimsby, Brighton, Chester and Hartlepool.

Smith says: 'Swindon finished fifth in Division Three last season, three points off promotion, but it was a fair reflection of our play. We didn't deserve to go up. I imagine 57 points will win promotion from our division this time and if we are challenging with ten matches to go, last season's experience will help.

'At present we are handily placed. Home performances have been very good. Yet elsewhere our League form is poor, with six defeats in the first nine away games. Perhaps we attack too much away from home and we should think more about defensive situations to improve results, but we have players with a natural attacking flair.

'There is tremendous team spirit. This showed itself in our third round League Cup visit to First Division Stoke. We were 2-0 down but fought back and scored a last-minute equaliser. Then we beat them 2-1 in the replay at Swindon. When we visited Wimbledon for the fourth round the lads did everything right. I would have been content with a draw but the winning chance came late in the game and we took it ... which brings us to Highbury tonight.'

THE SWINDON PLAYERS

Jimmy Allan 6 ft. 1 in. goalkeeper who arrived at the County Ground as an apprentice from Scottish club Brora Rangers in October 1970. Chris Ogden was the first-choice Swindon goalkeeper for the first half of last season, but Allan returned in February and has now made nearly 200 League appearances. Born Inverness.

Russell Lewis: Welsh defender who can play in any back-four position but prefers full-back. Turned professional with Swindon in 1976, and made debut in April 1977 against York City, but appearances were limited before this season. Born Neath.

Andy Ford Began with Bournemouth but made his League debut for Southend in 1972. Played 137 League games for them before moving to Swindon at the beginning of the 1977-78 season, and was an ever-present at left-back last season. Born Minehead.

Ray McHale Swindon club captain and penalty-taker. Began with Chesterfield in 1971, and played 124 League games before joining Halifax Town. Midfield player who added a further 85 consecutive League appearances for the Yorkshire club before Swindon signed him in September 1976 for £8,000. Born Sheffield.

Billy Tucker Was centre-half in the Hereford United side that gained entry to the Football League from the Southern League in 1972 and moved on to Bury in 1976. Joined Swindon last June after making 96 League appearances for Bury. Born Kidderminster.

Ken Stroud Defender who joined Swindon from school. Took three years to gain a regular first-team place but has made more then 200 League appearances since signing professional forms in 1970. Now in his ninth season of League football. Born London.

Ian Miller Right-winger and another current Swindon player formerly with Bury. Made 15 League appearances for them before signing for Nottingham Forest. Then in August 1975 he transferred to Doncaster before a third move took him to Swindon in July 1978. Born Perth.

Chris Kamara Skilful midfield player or forward signed from Portsmouth for a £20,000

fee in August 1977. Made debut for the Fratton Park club in September 1975 and played a total of 63 League games before his move to Swindon. Born Middlesbrough.

Andy Rowland Forms the season's most successful striking partnership in the Third Division with Alan Mayes. Began with Derby and joined Bury in 1974. Was their top scorer for three successive seasons before re-joining his old manager, Bobby Smith, at Swindon, in an £80,000 deal in September 1978. Born Derby.

Alan Mayes Former Q.P.R. and Watford striker who pairs so well in attack with Rowland. Did not make a League appearance at Loftus Road, but scored 31 goals in 133 League appearances for Watford before joining Swindon for £80,000 last February. Hat-trick debut for Swindon at Rotherham. Born London.

Brian Williams Left-sided midfield player or winger, he began with Bury and joined Q.P.R. in July 1977 for £70,000. Made 19 League appearances for Rangers before signing for Swindon for £55,000 in June 1978. Born Manchester.

Roy Carter Midfield player who was 'scouted' by Hereford when playing for Falmouth Town in the Western League. Signed for Hereford in 1975, and was a member of their team that won promotion to Division Two in 1976. Swindon signed him two years ago today – December 4, 1977 – for £25,000. Ever-present last season, when voted Swindon's Player of the Year. Born Torpoint, Cornwall.

John Templeman This defender began his career with Portsmouth, but it was not until he joined Brighton in 1966 that he played first-team football. After eight years and 236 League appearances for them he was transferred to Exeter, for whom he played nearly 200 League matches, missing only two games last season. Joined Swindon during the past summer. Born Yapton.

Chick Bates Swindon's leading scorer last season with 16 goals. Formerly with Shrewsbury Town, he was top scorer there for two seasons before transferring to Swindon in January 1978. Born West Bromwich.






