Those postponed matches against Rotherham and Wimbledon also mean Mick McCarthy is still waiting to start his two-match suspension, so you will see why I had to move in quickly for Evans, and I hope you will give him a warm Oakwell welcome.

# SPOTLIGHT

Swindon Town come to Oakwell this afternoon absolutely bursting with confidence. And little wonder. **Bobby Smith's** outfit are having a dream of a season.

Not only are they challenging for promotion — they are fourth at the moment — they are also still involved on the two major cup fronts.

In fact, they have proved the season's giant-killers in the League Cup competition, having reached the semi-final with a magnificent

quarter-final victory over First Division aristocrats Arsenal, winning 4-3 in a replay at the County Ground after the original tie had ended all square at 1-1. They now meet Wolves next Wednesday.

They had earlier knocked out another First Division team, Stoke City, again after a replay, and last Saturday they moved into the draw for the fourth round of the F.A. Cup by beating Luton Town, second in the Second Division table, by 2-0 at Kenilworth Road.

They now meet either Manchester United or Spurs at home in what will be their 15th cup game of the season!

They have a prolific goalscoring record, largely due to the exploits of **Andy Rowland** and **Alan Mayes**, who between them have scored a remarkable 39 goals so far.

Mayes leads the way with 21, and the former Q.P.R. and Watford striker, signed last February, is certainly proving a bargain buy, while Rowland, a traditional-style centre-forward who began his Football League career with Bury, has benefited enormously since Mayes' introduction to the side, and has netted 18 times.

These two also owe some of their success to the service provided by former Bury, Nottingham Forest and Doncaster Rovers' winger, **Ian Miller**.

Another player who is no stranger to this area is mid-field man **Ray McHale**, who hails from Sheffield, and played with Chesterfield and Halifax before signing for Swindon in September, 1976.

The mid-field trio is completed by Middlesbrough-born **Chris Kamara**, who began his League career with Portsmouth before being transferred to Swindon in the summer of 1977, and **Brian Williams**, another ex-Bury player who has also played with Q.P.R., joining his present club in the 1978 close season.

In the middle of the defence are **Ken Stroud** and **Billy Tucker**. Originally from London, Stroud is one of the

longest-serving players at the club, having joined them from school and signing professional in 1970. He has now played more than 200 League games. Tucker was with Hereford United in their Southern League days and stayed with them until they reached the Second Division, moving to Bury in December, 1976, and joining Swindon in June last year.

Right-back **Russell Lewis** was signed from Welsh League football in the early part of the 1975-76 season, while on the opposite flank **Andy Ford** was previously with Bournemouth and Southend United, his transfer to Swindon coming during the 1977

close season.

Goalkeeper **Jimmy Allan**, from Inverness, was signed from Scottish non-league football in October, 1970. Although he made his debut in September, 1971, he had to wait for regular first-team football, but has now made more than 200 League appearances.

Others in the first-team squad include mid-field player **Roy Carter**, another ex-Hereford man who was voted 'Player of the Year' last season; former Shrewsbury forward **Chick Bates**, who finished last season in a mid-field role, and defender **John Templeman**, who has had experience with Portsmouth, Brighton and Exeter.

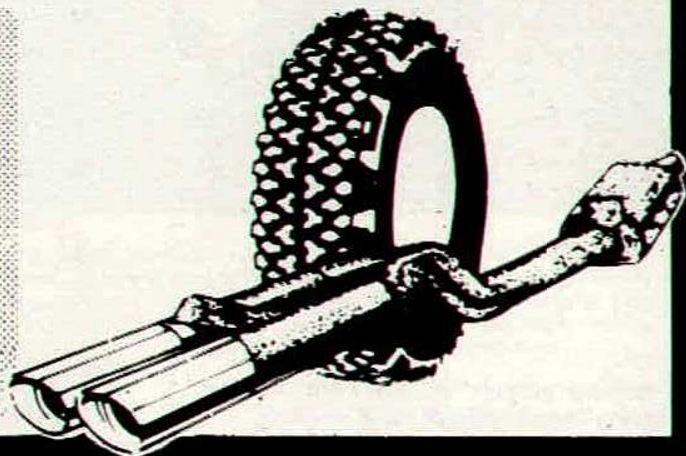

The last time Swindon Town visited Oakwell was for a Third Division fixture on Saturday, February 1st, 1969, when a crowd of 13,983 — the biggest 'gate' of the season for a League game — saw a 1-1 draw.

Although a draw was probably a fair result, the Reds were unlucky to have their fourth goal disallowed in the space of two matches — an Eric Winstanley header which would have given them victory.

Second-from-top Swindon, who did go on to win promotion, looked really good in the first half-hour and threatened to continue a scoring spree which had produced 10 goals in their previous two matches, but a magnificent goal by John Bettany — his first of the season — a minute before half-time put the Reds on level terms after John Trollope had given the visitors the lead.

The Reds fought back well in the second half, during which a torrential downpour of rain and sleet turned the muddy pitch into a quagmire.

Allen Bradbury made his 50th League appearance for the Reds.

The return encounter at the County ground should have been played the following Saturday, but, after completing a hazardous journey which had begun in a blinding snowstorm the previous day, the Oakwell party arrived just in time to hear referee Ray Tinkler, of Boston, declare the pitch unfit because of snow and ice.

When the game was eventually played on Tuesday, March 25th, it provided Swindon with their first home fixture since winning the Football League Cup — they beat Arsenal 3-1 at Wembley — and they celebrated with a 2-0 victory, both goals coming in the second half from Peter Noble. The gate was 17,198.

Swindon, remember, are in the semi-final of this year's League Cup after beating Arsenal in the quarter-final, and a further coincidence is that Barnsley's match immediately prior to their first meeting with Town had been away . . . at Reading!

# SCENE THREE

While Swindon, Grimsby, Sheffield United and Sheffield Wednesday continue to hog the Third Division headlines, none of them has a record over the last eight League games which bears comparison to that of another club which has joined the promotion possibles with a string of marvellous results.

It may have escaped your attention, but **Exeter City** have, quite suddenly, become the team most likely to succeed in 1980.

When they visited Oakwell on Saturday, November 10th, they were seventh from the bottom of the table and smarting from a 4-0 drubbing at the hands of bottom team Southend on Bonfire Day.

But since then they have gone eight matches without defeat, starting with a 2-2 draw against the Reds.

They have climbed eight places in the table after picking up 12 points out of a possible 16 and are now only one point behind fourth-from-top Swindon.

After their visit to Oakwell they drew 0-0 and 1-1 at home to Oxford and Rotherham respectively, and then followed three magnificent victories over three of the main promotion-chasing teams, two of them away from home.

They beat Sheffield Wednesday 1-0 at Hillsborough; Colchester United 3-1 at home, and then Swindon 3-2 at the County ground on Boxing Day.

The following Saturday they were held to a 2-2 draw at St. James' Park by another improving team, Plymouth, but bounced back to winning ways on New Year's Day by beating Mansfield Town 1-0 at Field Mill.

And that is certainly promotion form!

All credit to former Welsh international Brian Godfrey, who has been manager for exactly a year. He has transformed City from an indifferent, inconsistent side into one of the promotion dark horses, mainly by ironing out the problems which beset his side on their travels.

In the first nine away games they conceded 23 goals — the worst record in the division — with big defeats coming at Millwall (5-1), Grimsby (4-1), Southend (4-0) and Sheffield United (3-1).

Yet in the last four away games they have collected seven points out of a possible eight!

While the defence has been considerably tightened up the goals have begun to flow at the other end, with Keith Bowker, in his second spell with the club, leading the way with a

total of 13. Former Southampton striker Steve Neville has ten and ex-Portsmouth man David Pullar has seven.

Passing reference has already been made of Plymouth, and they, too, are enjoying a spirited revival which has lifted them from bottom position to one of far greater comfort in mid-table.

They have taken ten points from the last six games, their rapid climb up the table culminating for the present in a 5-1 trouncing of Hull City at Home Park last Saturday — a defeat which increased the troubles at Boothferry Park and new manager Mike Smith.

Meanwhile, Sheffield United's perch at the top of the Division was made to look very precarious as they were beaten 2-1 by neighbours Chesterfield in a rousing derby clash at Saltergate.

And the man who did most of the damage was former United mid-field player Geoff Salmons, an ex-England Under 23 man, who was involved in both goals.

He provided a telling cross from the left which led to Ernie Moss's 13th goal of the season and seven minutes later another piercing through ball had United goalkeeper Derek Richardson groping at the edge of his box as Andy Crawford raced in. The ball trickled loose and Phil Walker made it 2-0.

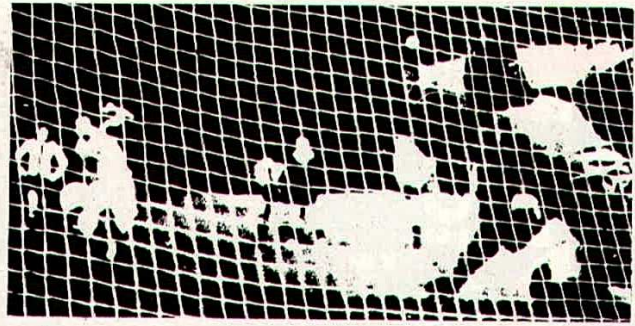
Chesterfield won easier than the scoreline suggests, with Viv Busby, on loan from Stoke City, netting for United only in the closing seconds.

Busby, in fact, provided United's only real menace, and manager Harry Haslam may be tempted to try to sign the player on a more permanent basis.

The gate of 13,887 was disappointing for such an attractive derby fixture, with both teams in the promotion hunt, and the continuing lack of support compared with the two Sheffield clubs and Barnsley must be worrying manager Arthur Cox, particularly as Chesterfield are the only team in the Division with an unbeaten home record.

A surprise result was the 2-0 home defeat of seventh-placed Brentford at the hands of mid-table Gillingham, while in the only other match played in the Division last Saturday Oxford United halted their slide down the table by beating Blackpool 2-1 at Bloomfield Road.

Ronnie Glavin has won the J. and B. Rare Scotch Whisky 'Player of the Month' award at Oakwell for the second time in succession.

A panel of local journalists had no hesitation in declaring the Scottish mid-field player the winner for November, during which he played a starring role in the Reds' run of five matches without defeat and scored five vital goals to become the Third Division's joint leading marksman with 14.

December was not such a good month for the Reds, with four league defeats, an exit from the F.A. Cup at the hands of Chester, and only one win, but Glavin continued to play well, clinching the award for that month with a superb display at Grimsby on Boxing Day.

The presentation will be made prior to the start of this afternoon's game against Swindon.

Barnsley's on-loan signing, Ian Evans, is a 27-years-old Welsh international whose flourishing career was so sadly interrupted when his leg was badly broken in a much-publicised clash with George Best while playing for Crystal Palace.

It was such a nasty injury that it kept him out of the game for two years, and he is now fighting to re-establish himself after 18 reserve team appearances with Palace since his come-back.

Allan Clarke completed the signing during the recent visit to Reading, explaining: "Because of Mick McCarthy's two-match suspension we needed a central defender quickly, and I remembered Ian from the time I played against him for Leeds.

"He was a very good player then, and I am delighted he agreed to join us, if only for a month's loan period."

Unfortunately, Ian's debut for the Reds has been delayed until today because of the weather which caused the postponement of the New Year's Day clash with Rotherham United and the fact that last Saturday's opponents, Wimbledon, were still involved in the F.A. Cup.

So a fortnight of his month's loan has gone already, and he still hasn't played a game.

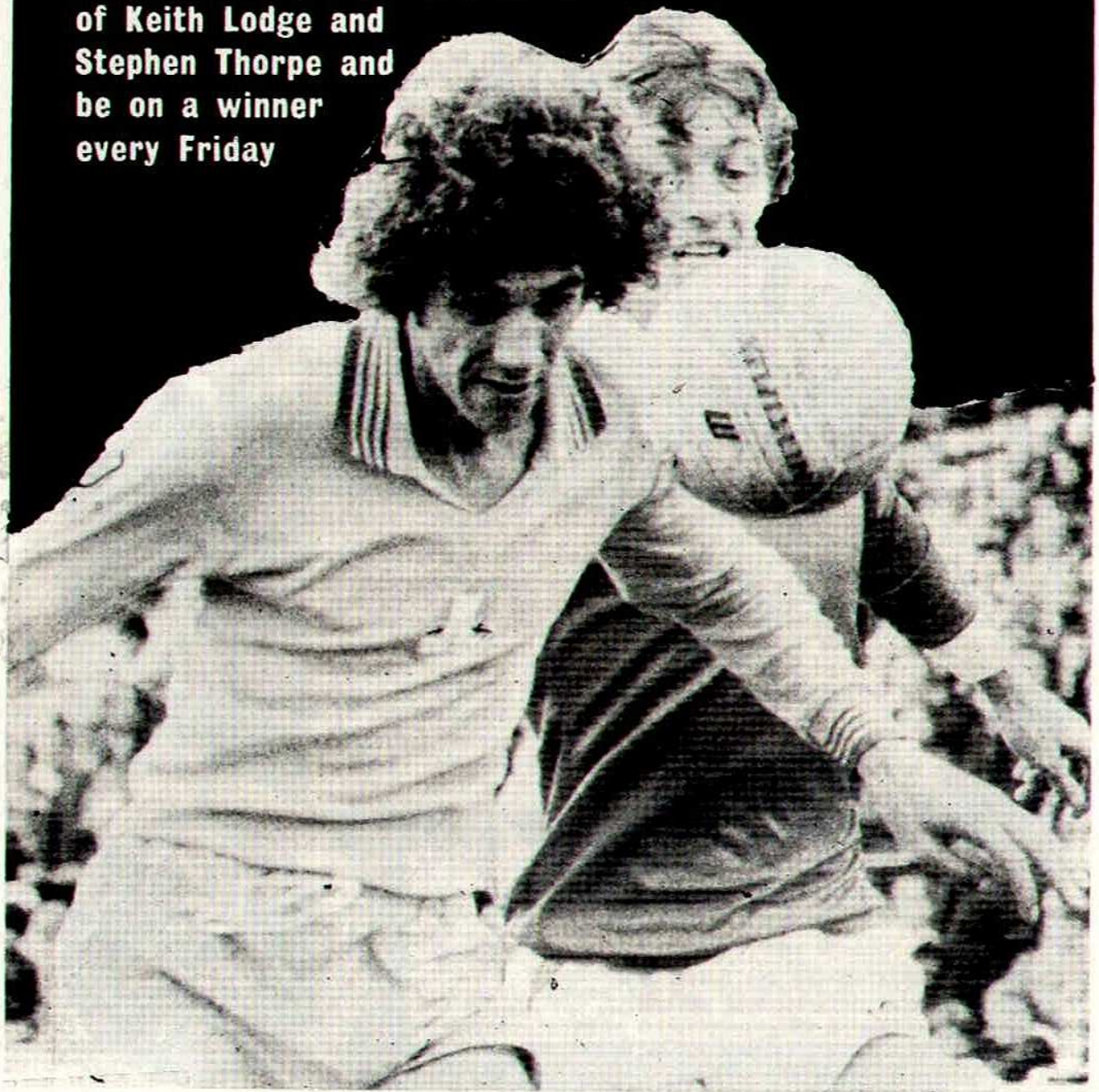
The period of enforced inactivity since that 7-0 hiding at Reading has also hit McCarthy, who will now start his two-match suspension today. He will be missing for next Saturday's visit to Mansfield and by the time he is due to return against Oxford United at Oakwell the following Saturday he will have been without a game for four weeks!

The Barnsley boss, incidentally, will probably have to be at his persuasive best if he is to entice Evans into making a more permanent move to Oakwell. The player has spent his entire career in London, having previously been with Q.P.R., and has reservations about coming north.

Before his injury, Ian made 137 League appearances for Palace and 39 with Q.P.R. With 13 internationals for Wales to his credit he is the most capped player in Palace's 75-years history.

# FROM THE PRESS BOX

● One of the perks of reporting for a newspaper, particularly for a writer like myself, who is relatively new to the business, is being in a position to meet and talk to the personalities who, to the majority of the footballing public, are inaccessible names in the headlines.

When I was a youngster I used to hang around the players' entrance outside football grounds, hoping one of my heroes might emerge and sign my autograph book.

Just to be in the presence of a player or a manager I could only read about or watch on television gave me a thrill, and I often used to wish that some day my encounters with such big names would be more than a case of worshipper meeting hero.

When I became a sports journalist and was thus able to relate to "big names" on a different basis, I quickly found my privileged position was not nearly as thrilling as I had imagined, but I have to admit to feeling a little in awe when I first met Allan Clarke.

My club when I was a supporter had been Leeds United, and since I had been a teenager on the terraces at the height of the Revie era, one of my heroes had been Allan Clarke.

And, in fact, my first assignment after my sports editor had finally agreed to let me loose in the world of football reporting was to interview Clarke here at Oakwell, shortly after Barnsley had appointed him manager.

I was pretty nervous at the prospect; after all it was barely a couple of seasons since I'd been chanting the fellow's name every time he scored a goal, but I was determined to keep my cool.

I was a professional journalist, I told myself. Professional journalists do not bow at the feet of the person they are interviewing.

Needless to say, my meeting with Clarke went nothing like the way I planned it.

I was late for my first appointment and had to ring up and apologise after arriving at Oakwell to find he had left.

I arrived on time the next day, but the intelligent, perceptive questions I had rehearsed in the car on the way vanished from my head the moment I shook the man's hand.

Dry-mouthed, I stuttered and stammered through a chat that seemed far too brief, and as I drove away from the ground I felt only slightly less awestruck than I had when I stepped into Clarke's office.

The sports editor seemed quite pleased with the article I produced, which gave me a good enough reason not to tell him about the ordeal I had gone through to get it.

I had not made a bad start, I thought, but being able to tackle the job with the jaunty self-confidence some of my senior colleagues appeared to have, seemed a long way away.

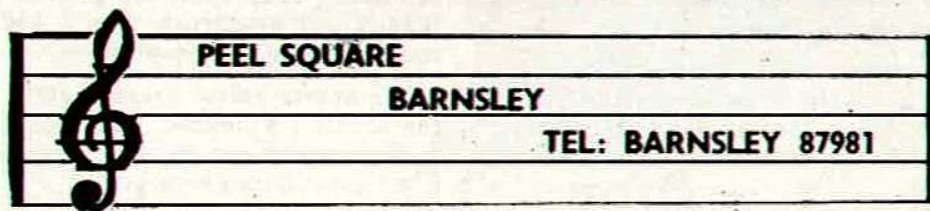

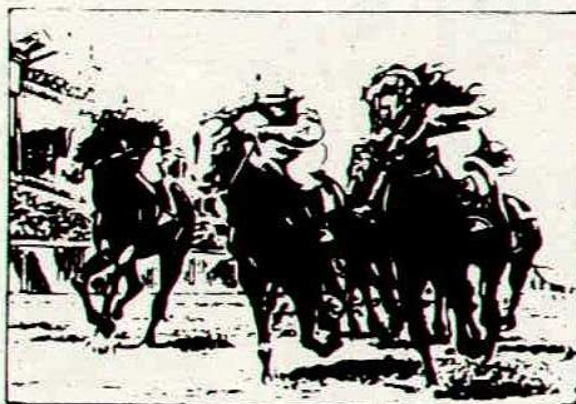
