It is unfortunate that the media today spotlights only the trouble and is rarely prepared to give the right and proper praise to those who have helped to foster a trouble-free occasion.





JIMMY ALLAN (GOALKEEPER) Born in Inverness, Jimmy will have been at Swindon for ten years this season, having been signed from Scottish non-league football. He made his debut against Queens Park Rangers in September 1971, and has been first choice Keeper for most of the last four seasons. He had made 227 league appearances at the end of last season. ROY CARTER (MIDFIELD) From Torpoint, Cornwall, and played part-time Western League football for Falmouth before joining Hereford in the summer of 1975. He played in 64 League games there including the side which won the Third Division Championship in 1976. He signed for Swindon in December 1977, making his debut against Carlisle that month, and had made 104 league appearances to the end of last

GLENN COCKERILL (MIDFIELD) From Grimsby and made his League debut with Lincoln City in season 1976/77. He played well over 50 League games for Lincoln and Swindon began watching him in March 1979. He eventually signed for a then club record of £110,000 in December 1979, but injury and other factors prevented his League debut until March 1980

ROY GREENWOOD (FORWARD) A native of Leeds he served his apprenticeship with Hull City making his League debut in season 1971/72. He made 118 league appearances for Hull, and moved to Sunderland in January 1976 in time to help that club win the Second Division. He played 45 league games for Sunderland but signed for Derby County in February 1979 making 20 league appearances for them. A further move came just over one year later to Swindon for whom he made his debut against Carlisle in April 1980.

BRYAN HAMILTON (MIDFIELD) From Belfast, Bryan manages

the Swindon Reserve Team but is still available to play for the First Team if needed. Indeed, during Northern Ireland's 1980 Summer tour to Australia, he won two more International Caps bringing his total to 50. His previous League clubs were Ipswich, Everton and Millwall.

CHRIS KAMARA (MIDFIELD) Chris is from Middlesbrough but served his apprenticeship at Portsmouth where he was one of a number of teenagers given League debuts in season 1975/76. He went on to make 56 league appearances for Portsmouth and signed for Swindon just before the start of the 1977/78 season. His debut for Swindon was against Sheffield Wednesday in August 1977 and he had made 89 League appearances by the end of last season.

RUSSELL LEWIS (DEFENDER) Born in Blaengwynfi, he joined Swindon from Welsh League football in 1976 and made his league debut at York City in April 1977. His First Team chances were limited until last season when he broke through to the First Team playing mostly at full back, although until then he had normally been a central defender. Noted for hard tackling he had made 52 league appearances to the end of last season

ALAN MAYES (FORWARD) A Londoner whose first club was Queens Park Rangers, Alan's League career began in November 1974 following a transfer to Watford. In 1976 he made ten appearances on loan to Northampton but then returned to Watford for whom his League appearances totalled 110 when he signed for Swindon in February 1979. He scored a hat trick on his debut at Rotherham and had made 65 league appearances for Swindon to the end of last season. A mobile striker who makes, as well as scores goals. He was joint leading scorer last season with 28 in all competitions.

IAN MILLER (FORWARD) lan is from Perth and made his League debut with Bury for whom he made nine League appearances before moving to Nottingham Forest. He did not make the first team there, but a move to Doncaster Rovers in August 1975 gave him regular first team football. He stayed for three seasons making 124 League appearances and signed for Swindon during the 1978 close season. He made his debut against Bury in August 1978 and had made 81 league appearances to the end of last season.

ANDY ROWLAND (FORWARD) Born in Derby he was apprenticed with his home town team but did not play League football until a transfer took him to Bury before the start of the 1974/75 season. He was three times leading scorer and made 169 League appearances before his move to Swindon in September 1978. His debut came that month against Blackpool and he had made 72 league appearances to the end of last season. Although he plays as the target man, he also scored 28 goals in all competitions last season.

CHARLIE HENRY (FULL-BACK) A product of Swindon's youth policy. Has come into the first team this season and turned in

several consistent and solid performances.

JOHN TROLLOPPE (FULL-BACK) Before this season had made 756 League appearances for Swindon, only eight short of Jimmy Dickenson's all-time record. Made his League debut in 1960.

TODAY - SWINDON TOWN

THEIR HISTORY

Every club has a bogey team and Swindon must be United's. We have only won three out of 26 League and Cup matches with our Wiltshire neighbours.

United first met Swindon in a Division III fixture at the County Ground in August 1965, when they drew 0-0. But Swindon won 3-0 at the Manor the following January with goals from Henderson, Brown and Nurse. The following season United drew 0-0 at the Manor, but went down 0-3 at the County Ground with goals from Terry, Smart and Rogers.

We had a little more luck in our promotion season (1967/8), drawing 0-0 at the Manor on Good Friday and drawing 1-1 four days later at Swindon with goals from Graham Atkinson for United and Don Rogers for Swindon.

Swindon beat Arsenal 3-1 in the final of the 1969 League Cup competition and the following season they were drawn against United at the Manor in the fourth round. United won 1-0 with a David Sloan diving header before a crowd of 18,193. The teams were:

UNITED: Barron, Lucas, Shuker, Smithson, Kyle, Clarke, Sloan, Atkinson G., Skeen, Jones, Atkinson R. Sub: Gladwin.

SWINDON: Downsborough, Thomas, Trollope, Butler, Burrows, Harland, Smith (Penman), Horsfield, Smart, Noble, Rogers.

In that same season the teams met in Division II, drawing both games 0-0. The Robins came to the Manor in November 1970 and drew 0-0 in front of the Match of the Day cameras. Noble, Porter and Rogers made sure of the points at Swindon in February.

In 1971/2 they drew 1-1 at the Manor: Colin Clarke scoring for United and Joe Butler for Swindon. In the return at Swindon, an Arthur Horsfield hat-trick and a John Trollope goal took the points for Swindon. On to 1972/3, and the first League double of the series plus United's only League victories over Swindon, A Nigel Cassidy header took the points at the Manor and there was a 3-1 scoreline at Swindon, with goals from Dave Roberts, Nigel Cassidy and Hugh Curran for United and Mick McGovern replying for the Robins. In 1973/4 Swindon took three points off United: a Ray Legg goal deciding the game at the County Ground and goals from Hugh Curran and Dave Moss sharing the points at the Manor, but they were relegated to Division III at the end of the season.

We next met Swindon in Division III in 1976/7, a John Trollope goal securing the game for Swindon at the County Ground and both sides taking a point in the 0-0 draw at the Manor. The following season United led 3-0 at the Manor through Peter Foley (2) and lan Stott, but Swindon came back to level the score with goals from Chris Kamara (2) and Chris Guthrie. Dave Moss scored a hat-trick for Swindon at the County Ground, United replying through Peter Foley and Jason Seacole.

Swindon did the double in 1978/9, a Roy Carter penalty winner at the Manor and goals by Chic Bates and Roy Carter taking the points at the County Ground. Swindon last came to the Manor on February 6 1980 drawing 2-2.

In the return at Swindon, Peter Foley scored a late goal to equalise an Andy Rowland goal. United travelled to Swindon a fortnight ago, but went down to an Ian Miller goal against the run of play.


