VIEW FROM THE STANDS

Bury take the field today deservedly in second place in the Fourth Division, and behind leaders Wimbledon only on goal difference. The surge from a mid-table position has taken place in the context of two superb away wins, sandwiched by a point in the derby with Rochdale, and two wins in our last two home appearances.


Halifax Town offered the stiff resistance expected from a side built on strength which had only conceded nine goals in nine games to last weekend, and on the following Tuesday our lads prepared for the trip to Spotland with a comfortable win over a disappointing Tranmere side. Local derbies are never easy and encouraged by Pearce's brilliant save from Steve Johnson's penalty before half-time there was no doubt that 'Dale played above themselves. Certainly their supporters were well satisfied with a home point.

On to Mansfield, and the whole side reproduced the impressive form which had so comprehensively defeated Northampton Town three weeks ago. Taking command from the kick-off the only surprise was that it took so long to open the scoring and that when Mansfield scored with almost their first attack after 43 minutes it was possible for them to be still in with a shout. An inspired first half from 'keeper Arnold, plus several goal line clearances, had kept Town in the game, but in the second half three more Bury goals fairly reflected our superiority. The travelling Bury fans roared their appreciation — as, more reluctantly, did the local supporters — and it was a joy and a privilege to witness such an irresistible display.

Swindon Town who are expected to include Andy Rowland this afternoon have a well publicised Bury connection and will most certainly be looking to interrupt our run of good form. It should be that in any event football, and a larger crowd, will be the winners this afternoon.

JIM ALLAN: Born Inverness. Experienced goalkeeper who has been with Swindon since signing from Scottish junior football in 1970. Made his league debut in September 1971 and has been the regular first team goalkeeper since 1976.

Now the longest serving player at the club with 318 league appearances to the end of last season.

KEVIN BADDELEY: Born Swindon. Although brought up in Swindon Kevin joined Bristol City to serve his apprenticeship and made one league appearance for them against West Ham United in August 1980. Joined Swindon in July 1981

Ham United in August 1980. Joined Swindon in July 1981 and established himself in the first team last season making 29 league appearances. Can play in either fullback position although usually found on the left.

LEIGH BARNARD: Born Worsley. A player who served his apprenticeship with Portsmouth and spent several seasons with them after making his league debut against Exete. City in September 1977. A busy hardworking player he made around 90 league appearances for Portsmouth before joining Swindon in July 1982.

PAUL BATTY: Born Edlington, Yorkshire. Young player who completed his apprenticeship last season and signed professional but had not appeared in the first team at the season's end.

GARY EMMANUEL: Born Swansea. Gary started his career with Birmingham City making his debut in January 1975 at Stoke City. He played 71 first division games for the blues before a transfer to Bristol Rovers in December 1978. A further 65 league appearances followed for the Eastville club and he joined Swindon in an exchange deal during the 1981 close season. Gave some all-action displays last

MIKE GRAHAM: Born Lancaster. Mike began his career with Bolton Wanderers and made his league debut as sub-stitute at Mansfield in March 1978. He had made 46 league appearances for Bolton, mostly at fullback before he joined Swindon in the summer of 1981. He made 30 league appearances last season often in the centre of the defence but also in midfield

CHARLIE HENRY: Born Acton, Charlie grew up in Swindon

and served his apprenticeship with the club signing professional in February 1980. By September 1980 he had made his first team debut in a league cup match at Lincoln City and went on to establish himself in the first team at right fullback although he can also play at centre half. Had made 69 league appearances at the end of last season.

RUSSELL LEWIS: Born Blaengwynfi, Russell joined Swindon from Welsh League Football in 1976 and made his league debut at York City in April 1977. He had to spend several seasons as reserve centre-half before winning a regular first team place a right fullback during the 1979-80 season. The following season he took over at centre-half and season. The following season he took over at centre-half and at the end of last season had 138 league appearances to his

at the end of last season had 138 league appearances to his credit. A whole-hearted tough-tackling player.

HOWARD PRITCHARD: Born Cardiff. Howard served his apprenticeship with Bristol City and made his league debut against Aston Villa in August 1978. He made 38 league appearances over the next three seasons and was released to join Swindon in July 1981. He made 28 league appearances for Swindon last season and usually plays as an arcthodox winger on either side of the pitch although usually orthodox winger on either side of the pitch although usually

favouring the right.

PAUL RIDEOUT: Born Bournemouth. Paul was the regular centre forward in the England Schoolboy's team for two seasons and signed as an apprentice for Swindon in May 1980. He was given a professional contract on his seventeenth birthday but by that time had already scored on his league debut against Hull City in November 1980 and made 16 league appearances last season to take his total to

made 16 league appearances last season to take his total to 51 before his eighteenth birthday. His ability to produce goals out of unpromising situations marks him as a player with the potential to succeed at the highest level.

ANDY ROWLAND: Born Derby. Andy was an apprentice with Derby County but did not appear in their first team. He was three times leading scorer for Bury and played 174 league games for them before his transfer to Swindon in September 1978. He made 141 league appearances for Swindon at the end of last season and has a consistent coalscoring record. goalscoring record.

THE SWINDON CONNECTION

We welcome Swindon Town back to Gigg Lane today after an absence of just two seasons. As recently as 1974 the Robins were competing at Second Division level, and only 3 seasons ago Swindon were just a breath away from a Wembley League Cup Final. Last season after winning 4-1 at Bristol Rovers in October Swindon actually led the table, but just 3 wins in the following 27 fixtures was a slide that manager Trollope was unable to halt and hence the Robins are now experiencing their first ever spell in Division 4.

Post War connections between the two clubs are numerous, beginning with the transfer of Henry Williams to Swindon in June '54. Centre-half Bert Head left Bury in the summer of '56 after just 22 appearances for the Shakers, to become Manager at the County Ground. One of his first signings was Vincent Jack from Bury in October '56. Bert held the post successfully for 9 years before returning to Bury in the 1965 closeseason to manage his old club.

Gordon Atherton also made the return journey between the clubs, leaving Bury for Wiltshire in December '64 only to return in January '66. He completed a total of 333 league appearances scoring 13 goals in his two spells at Gigg Lane.

Following the appointment of Bob Smith as Swindon manager in May '78 — their first match under Smith's guidance being a 2-1 defeat of Bury — there was a large influx of ex-Shakers at the County Ground. Andy Rowland and Bill Tucker were recruited from Gigg Lane, lan Miller from Doncaster and Brian Williams from QPR. Barry Lowes, Tom Henderson and Ken Beamish are the only other ex-Shakers to wear the red and white of Swindon Town.

Our last home victory against the Robins was on 21st October '75. The Shakers having lost the tag of being the only unbeaten team in the league just 3 days earlier at Peterborough and desperately needing a victory as a pick-me-up.


The scoring opened after 15 minutes when Phillips scored from a rebound off the bar. Rowland scored a penalty two minutes later after Joe Butler handled. Hulme headed home after 31 minutes from a Phillips free kick and Rowland headed a fourth goal before half-time. Brian Williams latched onto a Rowland header after 69 minutes to shoot past Allan and complete the scoring. The result left Bury in second place while Swindon remained 21st.

Swindon have visited Gigg Lane on four occasions since, winning and drawing twice - with a total of only 4 goals in the four games. A goal shortage indeed, but this wasn't the case when we last visited the County Ground on a cold December day in 1979. Dave Connor's team, already deep in relegation trouble, lost 8-0 from goals by McHale (2), Rowland (2), Mayes (2), Kamara and Tucker. It was a result which equalled our worst ever league defeat sustained at Bramall Lane, Sheffield on 6th April 1896!!



Apart from being inappropriately named, the so-called 'professional foul' will undoubtedly end up as the season's most controversial talking point.

Any action by a player that obviously warrants a sending off, or leads directly to a goal conceded, must surely be termed as unprofessional. But putting that argument aside the controversy again surrounds the interpretation by referees, who have been told to get tough and dismiss any player who commits the (un)professional foul, or deliberately handles the ball and prevents the 'possibility' of a goal being scored. As so many managers are prone to point out; 'anything's possible in football'. It is so easy to find loopholes in these new methods to clean up and improve the game, especially when one offence is dealt with strictly and another virtually ignored.

Spare a thought for the players who've already seen a record number of sendings off so far this season and, arguably, an equal number of let offs!

I began to get worried before the season even started. At a friendly between Wigan and Everton one of the home defenders tipped a shot from Adrian Heath over the bar. The referee awarded a penalty and had a quiet word with the offender, who wasn't sent off.

The referee said afterwards that it was a sending off offence, but considering it was a friendly and that Everton were already winning 5-0, he decided not to obey the new instructions.


Now while I admit to having some sympathy, had the referee followed the new letter of the law . . . at least two clubs would have known exactly what to expect once the season started. Also, with the inevitable publicity the incident would have attracted, the implications might have sunk in at a few more clubs as well.

Take the case of Peter Fox, the Stoke City goalkeeper, sent off for deliberate hand ball in the game with Luton, A case could have been made that Fox didn't deliberately handle, and that by the time he had connected with the ball, it was inside the area. Fox, however, did not receive the benefit of the doubt and was ordered off. Once again no-one could really argue with the referee's decision. But how on earth could he allow David McAughtrie to stay on the pitch after his cynical way of stopping Brian Stein in the same match. It is that sort of inconsistency which makes this new code of discipline very difficult for the players to accept.

JOHN TROLLOPE - PROFILE

Swindon Manager John Trollope made his league debut for Town in August 1960, at the age of 17 years old. He went on to make 770 league appearances at fullback for the Robins which is an all-time appearance record for any League Club. smashed the record of appearances which Jimmy Dickinson completed for Portsmouth. Trollope made his 500th appearance on 1 May 1972 and at 28 years old he became the youngest player to reach this milestone. He won a League Cup Winners Medal at Wembley in 1969 and was a key member of Swindon's promotion teams of 1962/63 and 1968/69. Proof of his consistency is the fact that he has appeared in 17 of the 24 fixtures between Bury and Swindon since we first met in 1958. He was awarded the MBE for services to football in 1972 and succeeded Bob Smith as manager at the County Ground in November 1980.



The BUFF described the first goal — also the scorer's first for the Shakers — thus: "Firth's cross was flicked on by Johnson to Potts who beat the 'keeper with a well-struck drive from just inside the penalty area."

Just before half-time the PINK told us "The Shakers increased their lead when Steve Johnson seized on a weak back pass by Smith to round 'keeper Butcher and shoot into an empty net."

"Bury might have increased their margin of victory in the second-half but for poor finishing and a brilliant save from Town's on-loan goalkeeper John Butcher which denied Craig Madden a goal on his 24th birthday." (MANCHESTER EVENING NEWS).
