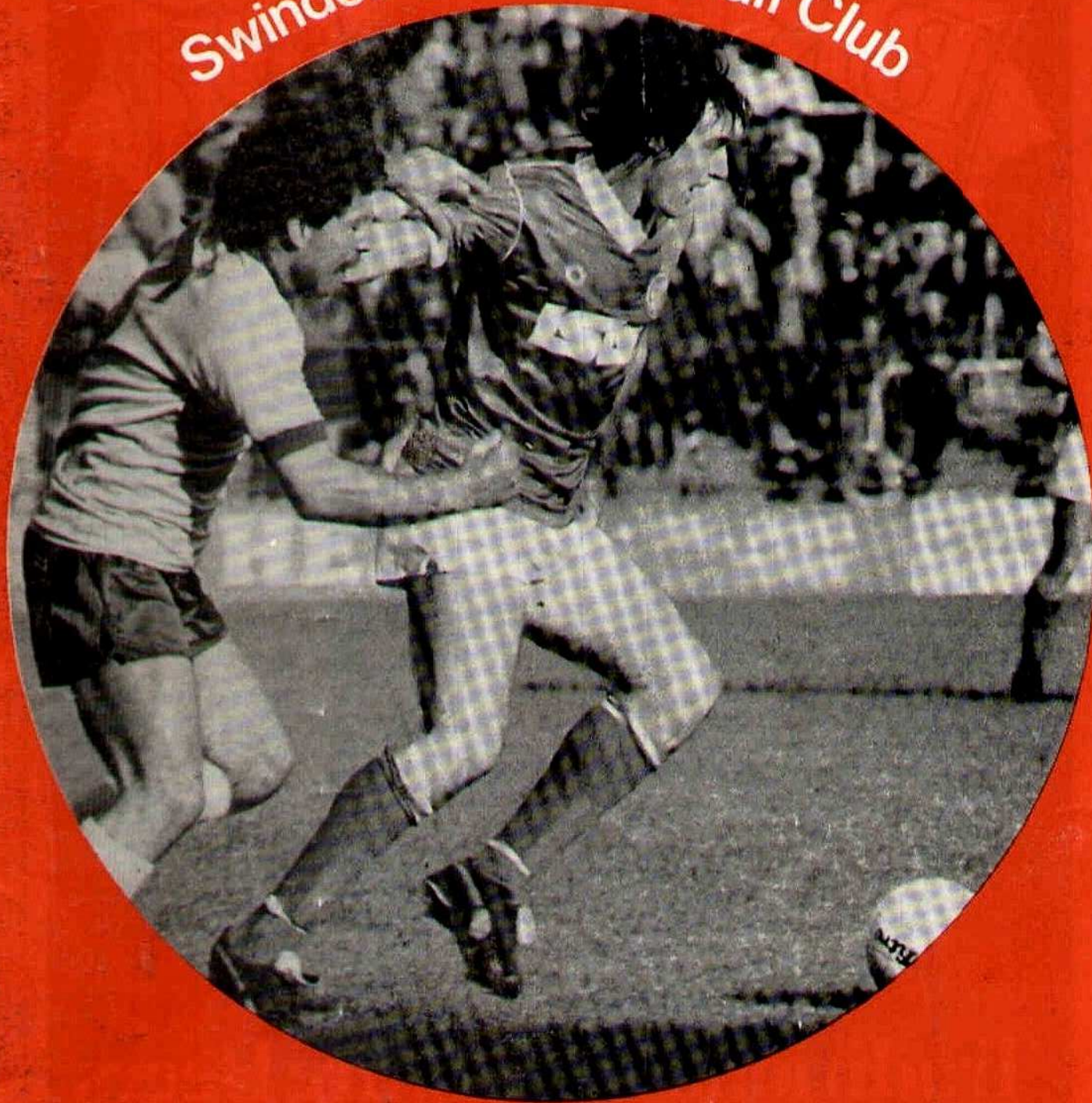

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Talk of the Town by the Chairman

After another away fixture, with Chester F.C. the result not known at the time of writing these notes, we have the pleasure of entertaining Tranmere Rovers now managed by Bryan Hamilton. Bryan was a very popular figure here at the County Ground and I know made many friends during his stay with us. Before this evening's fixture we shall have played eight games away and only five at home and this imbalance of fixtures continues through most of the season.

We were all delighted at the Club to hear that Howard Pritchard has only been suspended for one game after his sending off at Torquay, and goes to prove that the commission that sit on these enquiries are sympathetic to certain circumstances. Howard seemed determined to show that his aggressive forward running is part of his natural make up when he played a big part in our home win against Mansfield.

Talking about these controversial bookings leading to the dismissals, we had a very good example of how to keep the game under control and at the same time letting the play flow by Mr. R. Groves from Weston-Super-Mare who had control of our Football Combination game against Norwich City on the County Ground on Tuesday last. Mr. Groves used the method that used to be seen by having a quiet word with any offender and gaining the respect of both the players and spectators. He was very firm in his decisions without the use of that dreaded book which causes so much trouble. This game, although ending goal-less was not devoid of incidents and I am sure that the spectators must have enjoyed this spirited game.

On Wednesday of last week the County Ground came alive with its old enthusiasm on the occasion of the game arranged between John and the Speedway Riders for the late Martin Hewlett Fund. It was great to see the crowds filling the North Stand and the Swindon covered end. The attraction of seeing George Best, Mike Summerbee, Mike Channon and Viv Richards was rewarded with some scintillating skills in between many amusing incidents. It was unusual to see Russell Lewis and Charlie Henry, for instance, running at half speed alongside an opponent without their usual biting tackles, but the crowd loved it as a once off and rose in their seats to admire the ball juggling of George Best and the antics of Mike Summerbee who was such a favourite at the County Ground. The scoreline was, I think, about 12 goals to 9 in favour of John's celebrities. The admission price of £1. for adults and 50 pence for children and OAP's was attractive and if we could be certain of attracting crowds of about ten thousand at these lower prices to our league games it might be worthwhile. The crowd for this game was, of course, made up with a very large contingent of Speedway followers and we are hoping that the atmosphere of the County Ground will have attracted them to come again. I am sure that the cooperation of both factors will be of further benefit both to our Speedway friends and ourselves.

Our sponsors for today are Mr. Brian Jenkins, Heating Engineer, Mr. John Clifford, Blunsdon House Hotel, Mr. Roger Wise, Bakers and Confectioners, Mr. Edwards, Triumph International, Mr. Sutton, Borough News, and Mr. and Mrs. Julian Wilson, the BBC Racing Commentator. Ryan Beamish of Higherworth is our mascot for this evening. We are very grateful to these friends of our Club and hope that today's game will be enjoyed by everyone and thank you all for your support.

The most outstanding talking point of the two matches played since my last notes was that of the performances at Torquay United after having lost Howard Pritchard after sixteen minutes play and, whether the decision to send the player off was right or wrong, the action made it very much more difficult for the rest of the team. The controversies about sending off decisions is the inconsistencies of referees and quite frankly the players really do not know where they stand when certain officials send them off whilst others would not even record a caution for a similar offence. The foul upon Paul Rideout early in the game against Mansfield is a good illustration, this being a far worse foul than either committed by Howard Pritchard, but in this case the offending player was not booked although the offence was quite intentional.

Having dealt with the question of referees' decisions it must be said that the game at Torquay was a tremendous team performance on the part of our players, not only did they weather anything that Torquay threw at us, but also played some good football creating openings against a full side. This was possibly the best battling performance since I took over as manager, not necessarily the best performance, but certainly one of great character.

This spirit and will to win was carried into the home game against Mansfield and although we took a little time to get the football side of our game together, the effort was there for everyone to see and once we did hit a rhythm, especially our second half, we were well worth the four to nil win. This win increased our unbeaten run to eight and hopefully after the Chester game, these notes being written before that match, we will have maintained that record.

It was nice to see such a crowd at the game on Wednesday last in aid of the Martin Hewlett Trust Fund, when George Best, Mick Channon Mike Summerbee and others showed they still had the skills necessary to provide sparkling entertainment and hopefully after the visit of more than five thousand people to the County Ground, many of these folk will have regained the taste of live football and once again visit us regularly.

We welcome the team, officials and supporters of Tranmere Rovers, especially our old friend Bryan Hamilton, who managed the Reserve Side here at the County Ground whilst I was Youth Manager. It is good to see him back again but hopefully our hospitality will not extend to his leaving today with any points. Thank you for all your attendance this evening and I hope that you enjoy the match.

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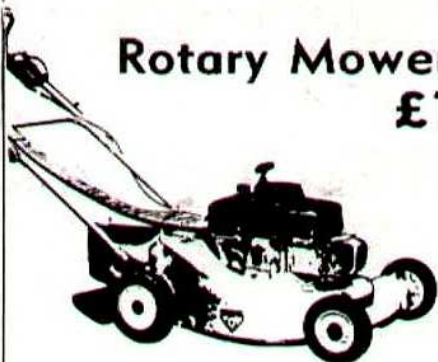
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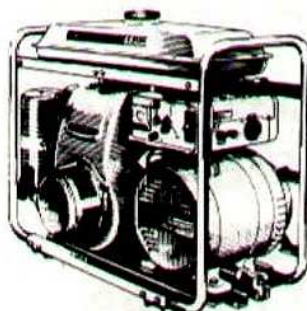

SCOTT ENDERSBY, Goalkeeper. Played under Bobby Robson at Ipswich for 3 years. Rovers snapped him up and Scott soon forced his way into the First Team with solid performances.

IAN GRIFFITHS, Forward. Ian completed his apprenticeship as a welder before joining Rovers full time. There can't be many players small in height than Ian in the Football League but equally so, there can't be as many with as skilful a left foot. An exciting flanker player.

JOHN WILLIAMS, Utility. Born in Liverpool, John escaped the net of Everton and Liverpool and Rovers are glad he did. He has played in many positions for the Club. Surprisingly enough his hobbies include as diverse subjects as train spotting and boxing.

JOHN KERR, Forward. Rovers' leading scorer last season. John also joined the Club straight from school and likes nothing better than scoring goals. Over 6 ft and powerfully built, John is another of the Rovers' players who does a lot of work with the handicapped in his spare time.

RAY WOODS, Forward. A local lad who impressed us in the local leagues, that he was asked to join the Club as an apprentice. Ray is one of the quickest players on the books.

DAVE BURGESS, Defender. Dave is a part time professional, but won his place in the First Team at the start of the last season. His performances made the left back spot his own. He was voted the Robinson Barley Water young player of the month during last season.

From the Tranmere Rovers Archives

Tranmere Rovers Football Club celebrates its centenary next year. It owes its existence to two cricket clubs, Belmont and Lyndhurst Wanderers, who sought to popularise the use of the larger ball on the Wirral peninsula. Disputing the title of premier club in Birkenhead with Rock Ferry. Tranmere soon progressed to the Central League where they remained until being invited to form the Football League Third Division North on March 8 1921. A 2 - 2 draw with Manchester United Reserves had enabled Rovers to finish in seventh place in their last season in the Central and so it was with great optimism that they embarked upon their new career on August 27 1921, when Crewe Alexandra visited Prenton Park. Tranmere were represented by:

Bradshaw; Grainger; Stuart; Campbell; Milnes; Heslop; Moreton; Groves; Hyam; Ford; Hughes.

Milnes, Stuart (from penalty spot), Ford and Groves all scored in a satisfactory 4 - 1 victory. Rovers' progress in the F.A. Cup in 1921, however, was far from satisfactory, the club being defeated 4 - 2 at home by Altrincham (yes, they were at it over sixty years ago!) in a Fourth Qualifying Round replay. And they fared no better twelve months later when suffering a knock-out blow at Wellington St. George's, although Tranmere's final league position in 1923 had improved marginally from eighteenth to sixteenth. In 1925, Rovers were forced to seek re-election, despite the presence of one William Ralph Dean, who scored almost half of their 59 goals. 'Dixie', as he was to become known, had made his League debut as a raw 17-year old on January 12 1924, but it had been no fairy tale start

as his side were soundly beaten 1 - 5 at Rotherham County. It was only after a five-goal display with the reserves, in a Cheshire League match against Middlewich, that young Dixie was recalled to lead the attack against Wolves, the new Third North champions. Despite Dean's transfer to Everton (where he was to achieve that monumental 60-goal haul in 1927-28), Tranmere finished seventh in 1926 with goalkeeper Arthur Briggs as ever-present. Briggs was to come to Swindon several years later, but in his last full season at Prenton, 1930-31, he saw the Rover's attack hit 111 goals - and still Tranmere ended up behind Cheshire and Lincoln when the final table appeared. Arthur's successor was Welsh International Bert Gray, who arrived about the same time as Robert 'Bunny' Bell. Thirteen goals came from Bell in his first eleven games for the club, which he followed with thirty-five in 1933-34 (still a Tranmere record) and nine in one game in 1935 - an incredible 13 - 4 win over Oldham on Boxing Day. Tranmere achieved promotion in 1938 but it was to prove a disastrous excursion into the Second Division. Rovers suffered eleven home defeats - including a 3 - 9 thrashing by Manchester City - and picked up only one point out of forty-two away, at Nottingham Forest. Seventeen points was all that Tranmere could manage before a swift return to the Third North. Perhaps the only bright note was the league debut of Abe Rosenthal who was to become a post-war favourite at Prenton Park. Abe, who owned an ice-cream factory, played the game for the love of it. A glider pilot during the war, he made a dozen guest appearances for Swindon in 1945-46.

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They come in all different ages, shapes and sizes but they all have one thing in common. They are part of the team behind "The Team".

"The Team" of course is Swindon Town. John Trollope and his men appear to have got things sorted out on the playing pitch. At the time of writing, seven games without defeat must be good by any standard.

That success and we hope the continued success of the Club has not only been

achieved by the team itself but also with the help of these people acting as agents for the sale of Lottery and Bingo Tickets. Their collective contribution is just as important as any goal scored or saved.

Town through time

Wingers by paul plowman

The steady influx of Scottish talent in the mid-fifties continued with the signing of Hamilton Academicals' JOE MILLER in the summer of 1956, although it was to be an all too brief encounter with English League football for the Glaswegian. After just a dozen appearances at number eleven, Joe found himself unwanted when new manager Bert Head arrived during that October. Mr Head quickly acquired the services of Lancastrian ARNOLD DARCY, who had made 39 League appearances for Accrington Stanley as an amateur before settling with Wigan Athletic, then in the Lancashire Combination. Darcy was to become a familiar figure on the left to touchline, retaining his place in the Town side for almost eight years. Yet another Scot to appear on the wing was DUNCAN CAMERON. Signed from Scottish junior club Lonehead Mayflower, Cameron made even fewer Third Division South appearances than the unfortunate Miller with just two, in March and September, of 1957. Miller had since moved on to Yeovil Town.

Following two dismal seasons, Swindon were in need of some experience in attack, in an effort to avoid the new Fourth Division in 1958. Manager Head found such a man in 30-years old ALAN MOORE from Coventry City. Born at Hebburn in County Durham, Moore had started his career with Sunderland in 1946 but, unable to break into the League side at Roker, he signed for Spennymoor United. Chesterfield brought Alan back to League football shortly before Christmas 1948 and he spent two-and-a-half years at Saltergate. A brief spell at Hull, just six months, was followed by two years with Nottingham Forest- for whom he made 100 League appearances and was top scorer with nineteen goals in 1953/54. Another 1957 signing was Swindon-born JOHNNY SKULL, an England Youth International who had gone to Wolves as a seventeen-year old in June 1950, but had arrived back to play for his home town club from Banbury Spencer. Skull made his Town debut at number seven in a 5 - 1 home win over Northampton on September 21, ten days before loanee BRIAN DONALDSON - from Chelsea - made his one



solitary League appearance for Swindon. The summer of 1958 saw the departure of Duncan Cameron to Bridgewater Town and the arrival of JOHN STEPHENS from Hull City. Stephens, who preferred not to use his first name William, had been capped once by Wales at Under-23 level during his six seasons at Boothferry Park.

The appearances of DAVID CORBET in September 1958, at just 18 years and five months, signalled the beginning of a new era - one in which youth was to take the ascendancy. MIKE SUMMERBEE was to follow Corbett at number seven in March 1960 - and when both men occupied the wings for the first time, on October 1 of that year, they both scored an emphatic 6 - 0 win over Port Vale. Another Welsh under-23 cap, FREDDIE JONES, made his Town debut on New Year's Eve 1960 - but behind the scenes Swindon were putting the seal on the signature of one of the most important captures in the club's long history.

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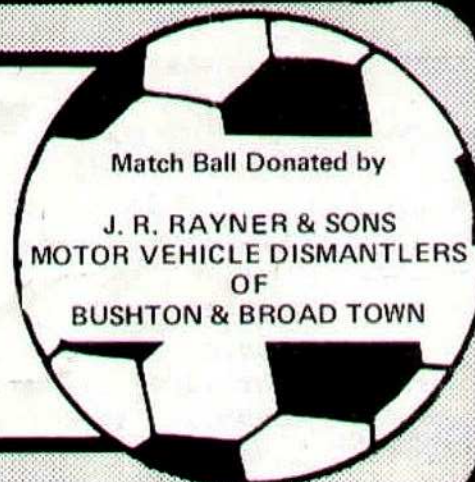
