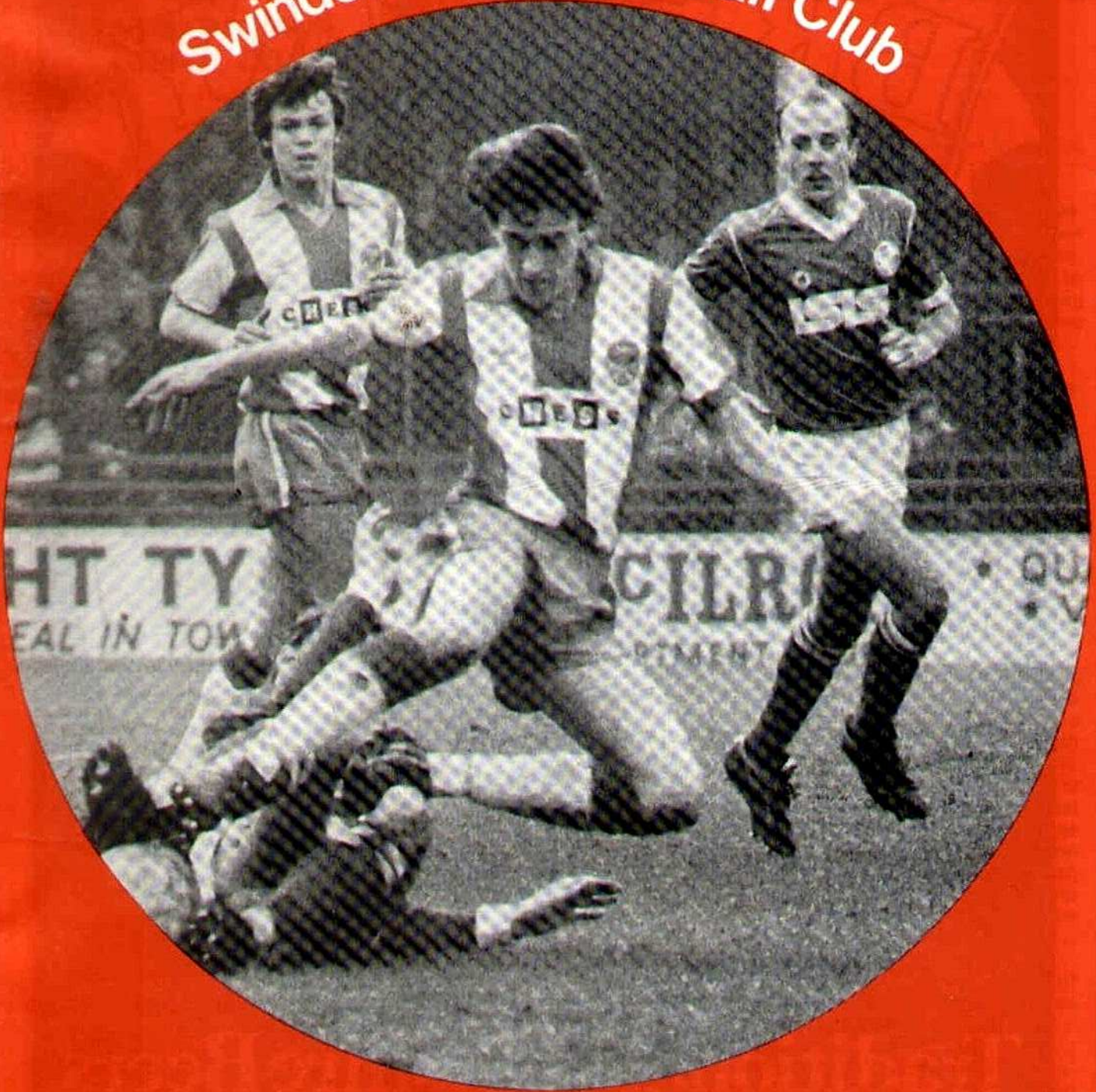

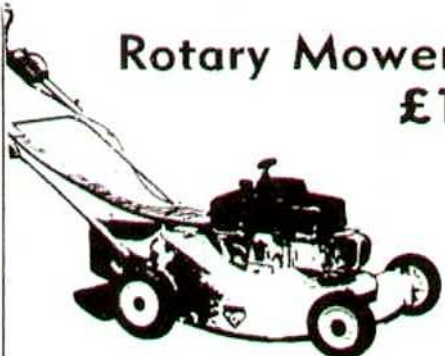

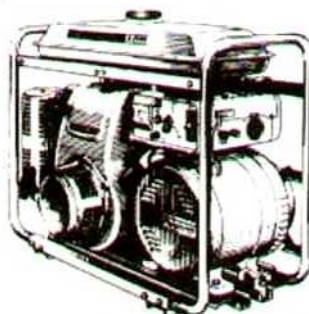

DARLINGTON

BILL ELLIOTT (Manager) Before joining Darlington, Bill managed Sunderland Football Club during the 1978/79 Season, and narrowly missed promotion to the First Division by one point. For five years prior to this, he was in charge of Norwegian side Brann of Bergen, leading them into European football. After his playing days, he became a fully qualified F. A. Coach in 1960, and in 1972 gained a Managerial certificate. In 1973 he was Coach to the Sunderland Team that defeated Leeds United in the F.A. Cup Final. This is Bill's Fourth Season in charge at Feethams.

GEORGE HERD (Assistant/Coach) George joined the Club midway through the 1980/81 Season, having previously managed Scottish Club, Queen of the South. A former Sunderland player, and Scottish International, he is also in possession of a full F. A. Coaching Badge.

PAT CUFF (Goalkeeper) Height 6'0"
Weight 12st 4lbs. Previously with Middlesbrough and Millwall football clubs, Pat signed for the Quakers in June 1980 on a free transfer from Millwall, and this Season will be Pat's third with the Club, Pat was ever present during the course of last Season, and remains first choice 'keeper for 1982/83 England Schoolboy International.

FRED BARBER (Goalkeeper) Height 6'0"
Weight 11st 10lbs. Is now the Club's recognised deputy to Pat Cuff, and at the commencement of Season 1982/83, Fred still awaits his First Team call up. He has, however, shown outstanding promise whilst playing for the Youth Team last Season, and remained ever present between the sticks. Trained with the England Youth Squad late 1981.

TIMOTHY GILBERT (Defender) Height 5' 9½"
Weight 11st 10lbs Tim signed for the Quakers during the close Season, and has had previous experience with Sunderland and Cardiff City.

GAVIN LITTLE (Defender) Height 5'10½"
Weight 12st 7lbs. Gavin made his debut for the Club last Season v Bury, on the 20th February, 1982, and has since played in a defensive role for the Club in excess of a dozen times since. A former Apprentice with Hartlepool United.

ANTHONY McFADDEN (Midfield/Forward) This coming Season will be Tony's second with the Club, having previously played with Reyrolle F.C. in the Wearside League. Made intermittent appearances for the First Team last Season.

ALAN WALSH (Forward) Height 5'10"
Weight 12st 8lbs. A former apprentice of Middlesbrough, Alan joined Darlington from his neighbours Middlesbrough before transferring to Darlington on a free transfer of £15,000 in October 1981. A prolific goalscorer, Alan is the Club's top Player.

JOHN STALKER (Forward) Height 5'10"
Weight 11st 0lbs. John signed for the Club on a free transfer from Peterborough in October 1979, and made his debut for the Club v Peterborough in November 1979. Scottish born, John has a better goal tally than any other player in the Season 1980/81.

Weight 11st 2lbs. Alan is currently enjoying
 his third Season with the Club, having signed
 on a free transfer from York City in June
 1980. A regular and reliable member of the
 Squad last Season.

KEVAN SMITH (Defender) Height 6'3"
Weight 11st 10lbs. 'Smudger' as he is nick-
 named by his team mates is now in his
 fourth Season with the Club having signed
 in September, 1979. He made his League debut
 at Torquay on the 29th September, 1979,
 and has remained in the First Team squad
 since that date. Born locally, Kev previously
 played in the Stockton & District League.

HARRY WILSON (Defender) Height 5'9½"
Weight 10st 12lbs. Harry joined the Club at
 the early part of Season 1980/81 on a free
 transfer from Preston North End, having
 previously played for Burnley and Brighton,
 where he gained First Division experience.
 Debut for Quakers, v Wigan Athletic, 13th
 September, 1980.

DAVE McLEAN (Midfield) Height 5'8"
Weight 11st 0lbs. Signed for Darlington in
 June 1979, and made his Club debut v York
 City on the 21st August 1979. Dave was
 formerly at Newcastle United, appearing a
 number of times in the First Division, be-
 fore moving on to Carlisle in May 1978.

ROGER WICKS (Midfield) Height 5' 11"
Weight 11st 8lbs Roger made his debut for
 the Club v Mansfield Town on 15th
 February, 1981, having previously played
 with non League Netherfield. Made occasio-
 nal First Team appearances last Season.

BRIAN HONOUR (Midfield) Height 5'7"
Weight 10st 7lbs. Brian made his debut for
 the Club on 4th April, 1982 v Crewe

 game throughout the 81/82 Season. A

From the Darlington Archives

Last weekend just 952 people paid to see Darlington in action – the club's lowest ever League attendance. The 'Quakers' were attracting five and six times that figure even before they came under the Football League's umbrella in 1921 – and some nine thousand witnessed Swindon's visit to the town for a Third Round F.A. Cup battle in February 1911. Members of the North Eastern League at the time, Darlington had already beaten First Division Sheffield United away and Bradford Park Avenue of the Second Division and had high hopes of reaching the quarter-final stage. Southern League Swindon, recognised at the time as one of the strongest elevens outside the Football League, stood in their way – and Darlington doubled the admission price from 6d to one shilling (5p) for the pleasure of seeing them! The two teams lined up that day as follows:

Darlington: R.G. Brebner; Jackson, Taylor; Hanlon, Bannister, Hisbent; Donnelley, Fraser, Cornock, Wilkinson, Dodds.

Swindon Town: Skiller; Kay, Walker; Tout, Bannister, Silto; Jefferson, Fleming, Wheatcroft, Bown, Bolland.

Joe Hisbent had already tasted victory over Swindon as he was in the team of Plymouth fishermen known as Green Waves who had inflicted a shock F.A. Cup defeat on the Town back in 1904/05. Another man to have opposed Swindon, but more recently, was winger Jack Dodds, a new signing from Reading. But Swindon proved much too strong on the day and goals from Tommy Bolland (who was Darlington born), Harold Fleming and Bob Jefferson gave them a 3–0 win. Darlington won the championship of the North Eastern League in 1912/13 and again in 1920/21. Some 6,500 gathered at Feethams (where the club had moved during 1918/19) to watch them clinch that second title with a double over Chester-le-Street. Amongst the goalscorers in the 5–0 aggregate win were wing-half Dickson and inside-forward Hooper – and it was Hooper who was to score in the first minute of Darlington's first ever Football League game in the following August. Dickson, with a penalty

six minutes from time, ensured that the club started their new career on a winning note. Halifax Town were the victims that day, although they soon took revenge with a 5–1 victory at the Shay a week later – but Darlington bounced back to hit Chesterfield for seven in their next game at Feethams. The club finished second to Stockport that season but, as only the champions went up, they had to wait three years until 1925 before gaining promotion to Division Two. Darlington achieved it by finishing five points ahead of closest rivals Nelson and New Brighton. They conceded just 33 goals and only twice was ever-present goalkeeper Crumley, who had guested for Swindon during the First War, beaten more than twice in a game. Even Cup finalists Cardiff City found it hard to break down the tough northerners. In the First Round Darlington forced a draw in Wales and a then record 19,184 packed into Feethams for the replay. Cardiff finally won 2–0 in a third game in Liverpool. DAVID BROWN, who died very recently, followed his 27 goals in 1923/24 with another thirty-nine in the promotion campaign. His departure to Crewe, followed by that of Mark Hooper to The Wednesday midway through the 1926/27 season, did not help the Quakers' cause and they soon found themselves back in the Third North. Brown's 74 League goals for Darlington remains a club record – although Alan Walsh looks set to pass that total in the near future.

Town through time

A match to remember

Swindon Town 8 Newport County 0
December 26 1938

On Boxing Day 1938 few of the 9,023 who filed in through the County Ground gates would have dreamt that Swindon could have crashed twelve goals past the Division Three leaders in three hours of football. The Town had briefly topped the table at the end of September but had since slipped to fifth place, while the club that now sat proudly at the top was Newport – and their record up to that time was formidable. In nineteen League matches they had conceded only ten goals and just three had gone past keeper Alex Ferguson in eleven games since the beginning of October. A vastly experienced 34 year old, Ferguson had seen service with Wigan, Gillingham, Swansea and Bury since coming south from Glasgow in 1924 – and he was to assist the Town for a short period some nine years later! By the end of that dull December afternoon he had been beaten eight times, with one shot passing him with such venom that it tore a hole in the net! There was a mixture of snow and slush on the County Ground pitch as the following teams lined up:

Swindon Town: Wildman; Parkhouse, Butcher; Cousins, Morrall, Diney; Jones, Francis, Morton, Lucas, Barraclough.

Three of the visiting teams – Jack Webb, Norman Low and South African Lance Carr were all soon to 'guest' for Swindon during the 1939/40 season, while Albert Derrick was to sign for the Town on a more permanent basis in January 1946.

Some twenty minutes had passed before ARTHUR BARRACLOUGH, the tall former Chelsea winger, started the goal rush. Ben Morton supplied him with a perfect pass and he unleashed a terrific drive into the corner of the net. MORTON, a record signing from Torquay a year earlier, added the second seven minutes later. Eddie Jones beat Webb on the right and his centre was nodded home. Jim Olney, who was to tragically lose his life during the War, initiated the move which led to goal number three in the 35th minute. His throw-in found BILLY LUCAS and the Welshman did the rest with a great solo run. Five minutes before the change of ends MORTON made it 4–0 following a fine end to end move. A Dick Parkhouse clearance was taken upfield by the right-wing pair of Jones and Francis and the powerful centre-forward smashed the ball past Ferguson and clean through the netting! The keeper was given some respite for twenty second-half minutes but then he suddenly found himself retrieving the ball from the back of the net four times in just five minutes! BEN MORTON completed his hat-trick with another header from Jones' corner on the right and the number seven added a sixth goal with a delightful chip over Ferguson's head. CLIFF FRANCIS completed the keeper's day of misery with two more in the 71st and 72nd minutes, sending the County men home totally bewildered. As for the Town, they found that the goal feast was far from over, scoring four times at Somerton Park on the following day but still ending up 6–4 losers! Billy Lucas, who had done so much of the damage with his clinical passing on that memorable Boxing Day, was to join Newport in December 1953.

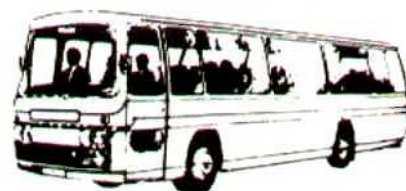

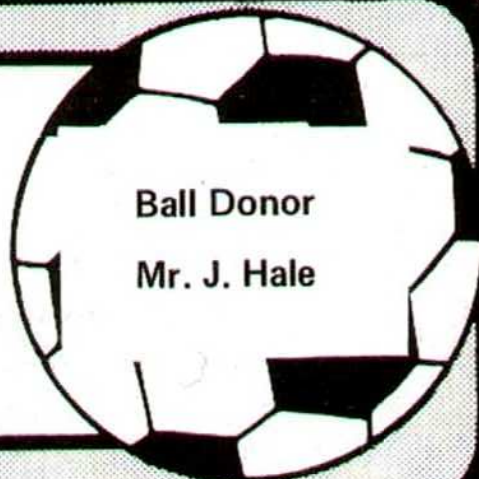
