


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## Talk of the Town Chairman

Todays game is important as it could have a bearing on the subsequent outcome of the Fourth Division championship. Unfortunately we are no longer in contention, but I am sure that Hull City will remember our visit to them earlier in the season when we held them to a draw after having to play the second half with ten men.

Hull City have experienced over many years the ups and downs of the Football League and have had their share of the financial problems that beset most clubs of today. Their stadium is worthy of top class football and was one of the grounds chosen to present some of the World Cup series in 1966.

The Football League today is in the process of negotiating a contract that will bring more money into the game either through an arrangement with the Television Companies or the latest idea of video films, a system which entails screening our games in Pubs, Clubs and institutions that would be interested. I think that most people would prefer to watch football on television to having to go to public places to watch it, but the League Clubs feel very strongly that we have sold our game too cheaply for too long and now we have come to the crossroads.

At the same time clubs are considering ways and means of reorganising the different divisions in an attempt to present a more entertaining structure to the leagues. How far this will be possible will depend on the individual clubs and their willingness for change. If the existing rules are changed to allow each club to keep its own gate money instead of having to pay to the visiting club 30p for every adult and 15p for every juvenile, then clubs will be able to make changes such as encouraging the young future supporters to come to games, which they now cannot afford. The income to clubs, of course, must be maintained but each club would plan according to its own income. If we are to keep to the high standards which we would all like to attain, then we must find sufficient income to pay our way, without getting involved in extravagancies that we cannot afford. We are all looking for a benefactor such as the recent happening at Minehead, which will enable the club to start without debts again, but until that day comes we must all work hard for our club.

We have had several short discussions at the club between some of our supporters and members of our Board to try and understand one anothers points of view. We feel that it is much better to meet and discuss than to write to the local paper and get only one side of the picture.



My appointment as Caretaker Team Manager being of a temporary nature at this moment of time, is obviously creating a great deal of more pressure upon me than perhaps if the position had been on a more permanent basis for I have to prove myself in a relatively short period of five week's. However, I can readily understand the thinking behind this decision and relish the prospect of challenge, indeed I am enjoying it immensely.

So far the results have gone very well, drawing two very difficult games away at York and Wimbledon, winning at home to Aldershot and losing away to Peterborough, the latter game displaying fight and character by our players in coming back from a 4 - 1 deficit at half time to 4 - 3, a game we could quite easily have won ultimately.

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

## From the Hull City Archives

Hull City was once in the embarrassing position of having just been elected to the Football League, but having no ground to play on! The club had been formed in 1904 and for one season played only friendly matches, using Hull Rugby Football Club's Boulevard headquarters for their home fixtures. A number of League clubs were entertained and City also recorded a 10-3 victory over the Coldstream Guards who had journeyed all the way from Wellington Barracks in London. Inspired by their early successes, the club applied for election to the Second Division in May 1905 but were not at first accepted, Leeds City and Chelsea having gained more votes. Hull were granted a place, however, when the division was extended to twenty clubs, Clapton Orient, Stockport County and Burton United being the other successful candidates. But within weeks, City were told to vacate the Boulevard. The Northern Union Rugby League banned its members from sub-letting to clubs which charged admission prices and the 'Tigers' had to move to the Cricket Ground in Anlaby Road, City's opening game in the Football League was against Barnsley on September 1 1905 and their eleven lined-up as follows:

Spendiff; Langley, Jones; Martin, Robinson, Gordon; Rushton, Spencer, Wilson, Howe, Raisbeck.

The match ended in a comfortable 4-1 win for the Hull men. The opening goal came from Spence, the former Reading and Southampton man, while David Gordon - who was to stay with the club for nine years - scored twice. At right-back was manager Ambrose Langley, a former Wednesday player. He remained in charge at Hull until April 1913 when he handed over to another old Sheffield player, Harry Chapman. Forward George Rushton, the ex-Burslem Port Vale

man (pictured in our Port Vale programme earlier this season) was to sign for Swindon in 1907. It was in that year that Hull first obtained the services of the Cambridge University, Corinthians and England international E.G.D. (Gordon) Wright, who was attached to the Hymers College in the city. He served the club consistently from the wing until he emigrated to South Africa in 1913. Had matches been broadcasted in 1910/11, it would have been a commentator's nightmare if Hull City were featured for they had on the payroll at that time three players by the name of Browell, three by the surname of Gordon and four Smiths! In addition to the aforementioned David Gordon, there were Don and Eddie, while the Browells were the three brothers, George, Andy and Tom, who came from the miners team at Walbottle. The four Smiths were Ernie, Wallace, Jacky and Joe (named 'Stanley' because he came from West Stanley in Durham). Tom Browell, although just seventeen years of age, was top goalscorer that season with sixteen. Had he, and City, scored more at home, the club might have won some of the ten matches at the Cricket Ground that ended in draws - and improved upon their final League position in 1909/10. when they failed to gain promotion to the First Division on goal average from Oldham Athletic. On February 21 1914 nineteen thousand arrived for the local 'derby' with Leeds City, a record at the time, but a few weeks later - on Easter Monday - the grandstand was burnt to the ground. Being only partially insured, the fire cost the club twice the £530 gate receipts taken at that match. City stayed at Anlaby Road until 1946. One of the last League games played there was against Carlisle on January 14 1939 and ended with Hull's highest ever win, 11-1.

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### From the Commercial Office by Mike Lewis

Earlier this week a gift of £100,000 from an unnamed benefactor saved lowly Southern League Minehead from going out of business.

It is fortunate for the game of football that such incredible generosity exists even in these difficult times. However, it does prove quite conclusively that a strong depth of feeling still runs through the veins of the nation. Harnessed correctly the game can regain a stronger financial grip once more. Of course this is on the basis of people returning to watch the game in bigger numbers once more.

A number of clubs have nearly 'gone to the wall' in recent years but significantly none have, mainly due to fantastic last ditch fund raising activities. Our Fourth Division friends at Hartlepool are the latest club to hit dire problems. Apart from support through the turnstiles it is the responsibility of the Commercial Department of clubs to raise the revenue to ensure that the finances stay in a healthy state.

Sponsorship and advertising are both important money raisers but the 'bread and butter' is obviously the lottery. Here we are in a fairly reasonable state with both of the lotteries we operate but further growth is essential if the club is to get back in the black and operate from a sound footing.

Amazingly, the solution is fairly simple, if 500 of you regular supporters sold just 50 lottery tickets each week not only would you earn yourselves a few bob but the weekly loss situation the club is currently facing would be resolved. HOW ABOUT IT?

### Town through time A match to remember

NUMBER 9 SWINDON TOWN 4 SWANSEA TOWN 0 May 25 1940

If you were an ardent follower of the Town either side of the last War, then the visit by Swansea in May 1940 might well have been a match to remember - for it was to be the last staged at the County Ground for more than five years. The declaration of War on Sunday September 3 1939 had brought proceedings in the Football League to an abrupt halt, with clubs having played just three games. Fixtures were suspended and used again for the 1946/47 season. By mid-October 1939 a number of regional Leagues had been drawn up and Swindon Town went into the South-West grouping, along with Swansea, Cardiff, Newport, Bristol City, Bristol Rovers, Torquay and Plymouth. Clubs played each other twice at home and twice away and up to five 'guests' could be invited to play in any one match to compensate for those 'called up'. On this particular occasion two players. Jimmy Kelso of Cardiff (who actually signed for Swindon in 1945) and Cyril Williams of Bristol City, were summoned to assist the Town. Regular goalkeeper Frank Wildman was unavailable and, being unable to commandeer a suitable replacement, club trainer Harry Martin offered to stand between the 'sticks'. He had last played in a League game nine seasons earlier for Rochdale and was now in his 48th year! What was even more remarkable was that Harry was playing at the County Ground some 28 years and four months since he first appeared here, for Sutton Junction in the F.A. Cup. The two teams lined up that afternoon as follows:

Swindon Town: Martin; Lawrence, Kelso; Cousins, Parkhouse, Day; Jones, Painter, Fowler, Williams, Hedley.

Swansea Town: Harris; Davis, Mears; Fisher, Hanford, Paul; Payne, Richards, Davies, Allen, Comley.

The Town inside-right, Eddie Painter, was still only eighteen. Sheffield Wednesday centre-half Harry Hanford was guesting for the club he was with for over nine years. Earlier in the season, the former Welsh international had assisted Swindon four times.

EDDIE JONES was first to cut the ice for Swindon in the 35th minute, when he cut in from the right flank to beat Harris from an acute angle. And barely before the keeper had recovered, he found himself stranded as little ALAN FOWLER coolly lobbed the ball over his head to make the score 2-0. It was mid-way through the second half before the game - which the South Wales Evening Post called '. . . . a rather curious mixture of sparkle and scrap . . . . ' - sprang to life once again. FOWLER scored what was to be his last ever goal, capitalizing on confusion amongst the Swansea defensive ranks. Four years later, in August 1944, Alan was killed whilst serving with the Dorsetshire Regiment in Europe. Swindon thus chalked up their first victory in thirteen games - and the last before the Government intervened.
