





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Match Review

After the heights in the performance against Chester City our fortunes have certainly sunk in the three matches since against, Halifax, Darlington and Plymouth.

Consolation must be foremost in our minds and certainly it is too early in the season to start writing Swindon Town off. Naturally the comfort of a good start is useful in forming a strong base for the season. However, a good start has not been much help in the past two seasons.

We have a good squad of players here at the County Ground, and, given a fair chance to blend will produce the goods. Regrettably in "Soccer 1983 style" this does not happen — success is the name of the game.

The Halifax match was a big disappointment, even bigger when it followed hard on the heels of the 4-0 success against Chester City - a big win achieved largely through the growing confidence and efforts of the last half hour of the game.

Against Halifax a 2-0 half time defeat was justifiably greeted with jeers from the 3,600 crowd. This feeling quickly evaporated when Dave Hockaday, with another well headed goal and Andy Rowland equalled the score.


Strangely the Swindon bubble quickly burst and Halifax went on to nick the three points with a goal in the 70th minute owing much to slack defensive marking.

At Darlington Ken Beamish was confident that the squad was in the right frame of mind to get back on the winning trail. However, the reshuffled team lost by the odd goal in a largely even match which was only decided by a controversial penalty awarded against Nigel Gray.

The unhappy hat trick of defeats was completed with the Milk Cup defeat at Plymouth. Our 1-0 lead from the home leg was proved to be a fragile one as an impressive Argyle (a good bet for promotion this season) turned on a devastating burst in the second half to sour Swindon Milk Cup hopes for another season.

Gary Nelson provided the lone Town goal near the end but the big lead, aided by two identical goals from free kicks, had been established before then.

Todays match will be an important step for us as we attempt to live up to our promise, certainly an improvement on the 3-3 draw of last season when Dave Hockaday netted one for the Tangerines will be the order of the day.



Today we welcome the Players and Officials from Blackpool F.C. They, like us have enjoyed better times and we all remember the wonderful F.A. Cup Final when they beat Bolton by 4 goals to 3 in 1953, the great Stanley Matthews, then over 40 years old being the architect of this exciting victory.

Since my last notes, we have lost two league games and so our start to the season has been a disappointment to everyone at the Club and I'm sure our supporters too.

The game on Tuesday against Halifax was exciting and I felt that after getting the 2 goal deficit back so early in the second half that we would then take command and score again to win the game but we seemed to go "off the boil" and allowed Halifax to score the winning goal.

At Darlington, on a very cold wet and windy day where good football was out of the question, a draw would have been a fair result as we had a good goal disallowed yet conceded a penalty which all who saw the game, thought was a very harsh decision.

So our first four league games have produced but 3 points which is nothing like as good as the start to last season and I know the manager and the team will do everything they can to bring about victories so badly

needed to bring back the fans and get us climbing the league table. No one likes to lose but I would remind you that in previous years when we've started so well and gone to the top of the league, we've often finished up half way down or lower.

I've had a very good response to my call for suggestions and criticisms. Most of you have complained about the state of the toilets and I can promise you that this problem will be rectified within the next week or so.

To those who wrote with suggestions I thank you sincerely, every suggestion will be given due consideration and I will reply to every letter. Even in todays climate of lower transfer fees, Clubs in the lower Divisions cannot afford to buy players and our vigorous youth policy can and will produce the next generation of First team players.

I am very pleased to report that Mike Lewis, our new Commercial Manager has settled in very well and last months figures from his competitions showed a marked increase. Mike is full of new ideas and we can look forward to increased profits from his operations, without which the Club could not survive. Mikes notes are a few pages later in the programme. 
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Behind the scenes

Today I would like to bring to your notice some of the forthcoming events taking place on the County Ground. Firstly, on the 5th November next, the Swindon Lions are to stage a Firework Spectacular here at 7.30 p.m. As most of you will know the Lions have, for many years, presented their firework evening on the Polo Ground and such has been the success of the venture that the support has outgrown the old venue. We received a request to present this year's show and, as it is a worthwhile charitable occasion, we were more than pleased to agree.

A number of acts will be presented including a high wire act and, a gentleman diving from a tower into a tank of water and, of course, a grand firework display. The full programme will be brought to your attention in due course. The admission prices will be Stands £1.60, juniors 80p and terraces £1.00, juniors 50p and it is hoped that Stand tickets will be on sale in one weeks time.

1984 is the year in which the Wiltshire County Football Association will celebrate it's Centenary and to recognise the occasion the Association are to stage a Centenary Cup Competition. We open the Competition by playing the Wiltshire F.A. XI here on the County Ground on 11th October 1983 at 7.30 p.m. On the same day Trowbridge Town play Salisbury. The remainder of the cup programme is as follows:- 15th November — Salisbury v Wiltshire and Trowbridge Town v Swindon Town. 6th December — Salisbury v Swindon Town and Trowbridge

Town v Wiltshire F.A. XI.

The competition will be run on a league basis with two points to be awarded for a win, one point for a draw, the two Clubs with the highest number of points shall play a Final match to determine the winners. In the event of three or more Clubs being equal on points, goal average shall determine the two Clubs to play in the Final.

Now a date for your 1984 diary. On Saturday, 14th April, 1984 we are to stage the Under 19 Schoolboy International, England v Scotland and this, of course, will give us great pleasure. Talking of Schoolboy soccer, on Tuesday next on the County Ground, Swindon Boys are playing Newport Boys in the Cabot Cup at 6.00 p.m.

On Tuesday of last week our Youth team met A.F.C. Bournemouth Youth in the Preliminary Round of the F.A. Youth Cup and they came away from Bournemouth the victors by two goals to nil, Andrew Wollen and Mark Payne being the goal scorers. On Monday next, on this ground, the Youth meet Abingdon United Youth in the First Round Qualifying match of the F.A. Youth Cup at 7.30 p.m. and your support of this talented team will be appreciated.





DAVID BARDSLEY

Defender — Manchester born. Graduated via the clubs 'A' and reserve teams to make his first team debut in 1972. Soon made the right back position his own.

JOHN DEARY

Midfield — Progressed to a first team debut at the age of 17. Born in Ormskirk, is a tough tackling player who loves to press forward and get among the goals.

BOBBY DOWNES

Winger — Signed during 1972 close season. Previous clubs include West Brom., Watford, Barnsley and Peterboro. An experienced attacker with an effective left foot.

PHIL FERNS

Midfield — Close season signing previously with Bournemouth and Charlton Athletic. Hails from Liverpool, his father is a former professional player.

COLIN GREENALL

Central Defender — Blackpool's youngest ever League player who made his debut at Huddersfield two season's ago. Turned in some impressive displays for England in Mini World Cup.

STEVE HETZKE

Central Defender — Tall, strong player who signed for the Seasiders in 1972 from Reading. Wiltshire born, he had a spell with Vancouver Whitecaps in the North American Soccer League.

DAVID McNIVEN

Forward — Signed in 1972/73 this diminutive Scot previously played with Leeds United, for whom he scored on his debut. Also played with Bradford City and scored many goals in their successful promotion year.

KEITH MERCER

Striker — Stocky, all action forward signed during close season from Southend. Previously with his new boss at Watford.

GARRY PIERCE

Goalkeeper — Signed from Barnsley in the summer. Gained a wealth of experience with his previous club, Wolves, for whom he played in 1973/74 League Cup Final.

KEITH PRITCHETT

Defender — A stylish fullback signed in 1972 by Sam Ellis with whom he was associated at Watford. Born in Glasgow he previously played for Wolves, Brentford and Q.P.R.

BILLY RODAWAY

Midfield/Defender — Liverpool born, he joined Burnley as a schoolboy at the age of 15 and spent twelve seasons with that club before signing for Peterborough. Snapped up during the close season, 'Pool hope his experience will be a telling factor in helping gain promotion.

DAVE SERELLA

Defender — Signed from Walsall in 1972, he had a first division experience with Notts Forest. A strong all rounder particularly good in the air.

PAUL STEWART

Forward — Manchester born. Joined 'Pool as an apprentice and made his debut in 1981/82 season. Shows great promise with strong attacking ability.

DAVID WINDRIDGE

Midfield — Close season signed from Chesterfield. One of a select band who have scored twice on Football League debuts. Loves to get up in support of the attack. Previously with the 'Blades' which could account for his sharpness.

SURVEY ON DIVISION IV by Dave King

At a recent disciplinary ruling two fourth division clubs were fined £500 for their record of last season, Northampton and Mansfield. Last seasons champions Wimbledon were punished with a heavier fine of £1,500 with half suspended, they were the only club amongst six hauled up last season to re-appear.

With the new season only thee days old misfortune struck Bristol City defender Alan Nicholl who broke his leg in a Reserve match, this seems an unlucky period for City because Town fans will recall that at an identical time last season Russell Musker suffered the same fate in a League Cup match here at the County Ground, he has now recovered despite setbacks and resumed in midfield for City, Nicholls is expected to be out of action until Christmas at least.

We now have a manager in this Divison with a unique record of managing during a 18 month period in 1980 and 1981 clubs in all four divisions - Wimbledon (third and fourth) and Crystal Palace (first and second) his name new Crewe manager Dario Gradi.

The only goalkeeper sent off in this Division last season for deliberately handling outside the penalty area was Neil Freeman of Northampton, he is now well within the law leaving soccer to become a Police Officer.

On September 3rd Trevor Senior Reading striker wrote his name in the record books by scoring the third fastest hat trick in a League match against Stockport in 4 minutes 12 seconds, in a 6–2 home win. Wrexham set a record on the same day with their lowest ever attendance 1,680 in a 2–2 draw with Peterborough.

Dave Serella of Blackpool had mixed fortunes in their away match with Colchester scoring for each side in a 2-1 defeat at Colchester.

Hereford and Halifax played the divisions first goalless draw before 3,188, Hereford previously hitting 7 goals in a four day spell with 4 at Aldershot and 3 in a home win in the League Milk Cup match with 2nd division big spenders Portsmouth.

The second Saturday of the season saw Doncaster, York and Colchester the only three clubs with a 100% record, and Hartlepool, Darlington, Mansfield and Stockport still seeking their first point. Three players scored a brace of goals, our own Alan Mayes in our home win over Chester, Lawrie Madden in their 2–1 home win over Bristol City, and Alan Clarke with 2 in their 2–2 draw at Wrexham.

On the second Saturday there were 7 home wins, 2 away wins and 3 draws, the highest gate was at Hereford where 3,188 watched, whilst Wrexham's gate of 1,680 was the lowest, Reading 6 Stockport 2 being the highest aggregate score, there were 35 goals scored in the division trailing the third by 4. Goals abounded more in the lower divisions than the second with 30 and the first who totalled only 23.

A technical error in the contract of Colchester's 25 year old striker Ian Allinson allowed him to move to Arsenal for free. He had made 308 League appearances scoring 69 goals, in the past two seasons he had scored 43 of these, a good move for Allinson but Colchester must rue the day, they would probably have asked a six figure fee for Allinson, now they have neither player or fee. There were several praiseworthy efforts by Division IV clubs in the Milk Cup 1st leg against opposition from higher divisions, besides our 1-0 home win over third division Plymouth, Aldershot beat third division Orient 3-1, Blackpool winning 2-1 at home to Walsall, Bury winning 2-1 at Wigan, a fine performance by Chesterfield winning at second division Middlesbrough 1-0, probably the highlight of the 1st leg sharing comparably wit with Crew's 1-0 home win over Burnley, and Hereford's 3-2 home win over Portsmouth, also Torquay's 3-2 win at Newport, as well as Grimsby's 1-2 defeat by York City. Creditable draws were obtained by Hartlepool 0-0 at Rotherham, Doncaster 1-1 at Scunthorpe, and finally Bristol City at Oxford United 1-1, with this really being half time in the tie it will be interesting to see how many of our divisions clubs have survived to enter the next round of this weeks draw which this season is seeded from the next round.

News of two of our former players, goalkeeper Mark Stevens who made his solitary league appearance in our final match of last season home to Bristol City, has signed a 1 year contract with Trowbridge Town in the Alliance League making his debut in the Bob Lord Trophy match with Barnet, strangely he was in goal for Birmingham City Reserves in a football combination match at Hambrook versus Bristol Rovers Reserves conceding 2 goals in a 2—2 draw 3 days later.

Interesting press reports of Paul Rideout's appearance in the Birmingham Senior Cup Final when he came on as substitute in the pre-season local derby. The 'Sunday Mercury' reported: 'Villa brought on Paul Rideout in the second half as a replacement for the injured Mark Walters. He was an immediate hit.' The Birmingham Post wrote: 'Villa . . . looked better after the break when recent signing Rideout joined the attack in place of the injured Walters." In his programme notes for the first match of the season Villa manager Tony Barton wrote: 'Paul Rideout was bought as an understudy to Peter Withe. He is only 19 and is raw in terms of First Division experience, but he has been in the first team at Swindon Town for more than two seasons and was their top scorer for two years. That is a good achievement by any standards. He was playing in a very hard division and now its up to him to prove himself at a higher level, we are confident that he can do it and his form in pre-season was certainly very encouraging.

Paul scored his first competitive match goal in a Central League match in Villa's 2-1 home win over Stoke City Reserves, England player Tony Morley was the other scorer, last Saturday he made his first team debut in their 1-0 home win over Norwich City after being substitute for the first three matches of the season. Andy Rollings is now on loan at Torquay from Portsmouth.

Last Saturday saw our third defeat in four matches, for the sceptics who are forecasting no chance of promotion I would draw comparison to the four opening matches for the promoted clubs last season

Ray Hankin, Peterborough's new £5,000 signing from Middlesbrough, celebrated his debut with 2 goals in their 5-0 home win over Torquay, other players to score twice in their matches were Chesterfields John Clayton, and Rochdales Vernon Allott. Last Saturday saw the first away wins of the season for Bury, Northampton and Crewe. The only dismissal of the weekend matches was Torquay's John Impey at Peterborough. 
