TOWN HOT SHOTS

We shall not know for a few more weeks who will finish the season as our top League goalscorer. Whoever joins the following will certainly join some well known players who made their mark here at the County Ground, and in some cases elsewhere. The following players have finished as the Clubs leading goalscorers since the end of the second war.

MICKY BULL. Born April 3rd 1930, at Twickenham, signed from Brentford in June 1953, Mick scored fifteen goals in sixty nine league matches, scored 12 goals in 1953-54 to finish top goalscorer in league matches.

BOB EDWARDS. Born November 20th 1942 at Guildford, signed in July 1955 from Chelsea, Bob scored 64 goals in 173 league games here at the County Ground from 1955 to 1959 before joining Norwich City in a double transfer with John Richards for £3,000. Also had a brother Leslie who played for Bristol Robers. Scored 26 league goals in 1956-57, was also joint top scorer again in 1958-59 with 9 league goals.

JOHN RICHARDS. Born at West Bromwich on June 14th 1931, played for the Club between 1955-59, serving in the R.A.F. for some of this period, scored 37 goals from 104 league games with Swindon before joining Norwich along with Bob Edwards. Scored 16 league goals in 1957-58.

JIMMY KELLY. Born on June 4th 1933 at Bellshill, Jim came to the County Ground from Preston and scored 14 goals in 30 league matches before joining Walsall in February 1959, after one year at Swindon. Scored 9 goals in 1958-59 same number as Bob Edwards.

DAVID 'BRONCO' LAYNE. Born in Sheffield on July 29th 1939, joined the Town from Rotherham in June 1959, scored 28 goals from 41 league matches moving onto Bradford City in December 1960, netted 20 goals in league matches during 1959-60.

ERNIE HUNT. Born in Swindon on March 17th 1943, joined the Club as a junior, going onto appear in 213 league matches scoring 81 goals before moving to Wolves in September 1965, was leading scorer for the Club in four consecutive seasons in 1960-61 with 14 league goals, in 1961-62 (18), 1962-63 (24) and in 1963-64 with 12. Now lives at Ledbury.

MIKE SUMMERBEE. Born December 15th 1942 at Cheltenham, joined the Club in March 1960, scored 39 goals in 218 league games before joining Manchester City, gained eight International Caps for England scored 13 league goals in 1964-65.

KEITH EAST. Born at Southampton, on October 31st 1944, signed from Portsmouth in May 1964 scoring 21 goals in 42 league matches for the Club, scored 19 in 1965-66 to finish leading scorer in league matches.

DON ROGERS. Born at Paulton on October 25th 1945, Club apprentice, high scoring winger with 150 league goals from 412 league matches, in a two spell period with the Club. Four hundred coming in the first spell before joining Crystal Palace for £150,000 in November 1972, finished top scorer in league matches in three consecutive seasons in 1966-67 with 24 goals, 1967-68 (25), 1968-69 (22), also finished top league scorer in 1970-71 (16).

ARTHUR HORSFIELD. Born in Newcastle on July 5th 1946. Joined Swindon from Newcastle in June 1969, between 1969 and 1971 scored 41 goals in 108 league matches, before joining Charlton. Was leading scorer in 1969-70 with 18 goals in the league.

PETER NOBLE. Born August 19th in 1944, joining the Town from Newcastle in January 1968, played for the Club in 216 league matches scoring 62 league goals, before joining Burnley in 1973. He scored 14 goals in 1971-72 to finish leading goalscorer in league matches.

RAY TREACY. Eire International, born in Dublin on June 18th 1946 scored 16 goals in 55 league matches, after joining Town from Charlton in June 1972, moved onto Preston in December 1973. Scored 13 goals in league matches during 1972-73.

PETER EASTOE. Currently with West Brom in Division 1, born on August 2nd 1953 Peter joined Swindon from Wolves and scored 43 goals in 91 league matches, before moving to Queens Park Rangers. Peter was twice leading scorer in league matches during season 1973-74 with 8 goals and again in 1974-75 with 26 goals.

TREVOR ANDERSON. Northern Ireland International, born in Belfast on March 3rd 1951, joined Swindon from Manchester United in November 1974 playing in 131 league matches for the Club scoring 34 goals, before joining Peterborough in December 1977. Was twice top scorer in league matches during 1975-76 with 15 goals, and 1976-77 with 14 goals.

DAVID MOSS. Now with Luton Town, was born at Witney March 18th 1952, joined the County Ground staff from Witney Town in July 1969, played in 230 league matches for us scoring 60 goals. Joined Luton in May 1978, scored 16 league goals in 1977-78.

CHIC BATES. Now with Shrewsbury, born November 28th 1949, signed from Shrewsbury January 1978, scored 13 goals in 63 league matches, before joining Bristol Rovers in March 1980. Scored 13 goals in 1978-79 in league matches.

ANDY ROWLAND. Still with the Club, signed in September 1978 was leading scorer in league matches in 1979-80 with 20 goals, and in 1980-81 with 12 goals, born in Derby on September 8th 1954, Andy joined us from Bury for a fee of £80,000.

PAUL RIDEOUT. Born Bournemouth, August 14th 1964. Former Club apprentice, Paul scored 14 league goals in 1981-82 and 20 last season 1982-83, signed for Aston Villa in June 1983 for a £200,000 fee.

The the present, Alan Mayes is this seasons leading goalscorer in league matches, whoever finishes this season with most goals will join some of the most prominent names to have finished the Clubs leading hot shot.

INTRODUCING... FROM PLAINMOOR

Since David Webb took over from Bruce Rioch as manager of Torquay United there has been a lot of activity, and changes, at Plainmoor home of the South Devon Club.

David, who was the former manager of Bournemouth, numbered six Clubs during his playing days, commencing with Orient and moving on to Southampton, returning to London to enjoy a period of success with Chelsea, where he gained an F.A. Cup winners medal in 1970 against Leeds, scoring the winning goal in the replay win at Old Trafford, and in the same season a European Cup winners medal in another replay with Real Madrid played in Athens. After leaving Stamford Bridge Dave had spells with Queens Park Rangers, Leicester City, Derby and finally with Bournemouth. All of his experience is now brought to bear on the task of rejuvenating the football club of this famed seaside resort.

An indication of the change Dave has brought about can be judged in the fact that in the last eleven matches no fewer than twenty one players have been utilised. The change in playing personnel, with dealings in the transfer market coupled with an insurgence of youth given a first opportunity has been the main reason behind such a large number of players appearing since Dave's appointment.

Those changes have affected among others our former midfield player Brian Hughes who joined United last summer; with his contract cancelled by mutual consent, he is now a non-contract player with the Club, other departures include Keith Curle who joined Bristol City for a fee of £10,000, John Sims joining nearby Third Division Club Exeter City, goalkeeper John Turner moved to Alliance League Club Weymouth. To replace these players Dave added a mixture of youth and experience and in their 1-0 away win with last Tuesday evenings visitors to the County Ground, Darlington, in their last away match there were seven newcomers since the departure of former manager Bruce Rioch. These are the squad of players Dave Webb has at his disposal:

Goalkeeper Ken Allen is one of the newcomers, signed from Peterborough last month, Ken was with Dave Webb at Bournemouth moving to the continent last year after 169 appearances with the Dean Court Club, whom he joined from non-League Bath City, now 32 years of age.

The Plainmoor Club's back four usually contains Derek Dawkins another newcomer, originally a Leicester City apprentice, after 3 games for the Filbert Street Club he moved to Mansfield making 73 appearances before joining Bournemouth.

Central defenders Paul Compton and John Impey are also former Dean Court defenders. Paul left Dean Court for Aldershot earlier this season, but after a brief stay playing 15 matches for Aldershot he rejoined his former Bournemouth manager at Torquay. Joined Bournemouth for a £10,000 fee from Trowbridge Town making over 80 appearances at Dean Court. Although John Impey was a former Bournemouth player, it was former manager Bruce Rioch who signed him last summer, after 312 appearances for the Cherries, John made only 23 appearances for his first Club Cardiff City, joining the Ninian Park Club as an apprentice.

21 year old Colin Anderson a former Burnley apprentice only played in six matches for the Turf Moor Club before joining Torquay, has now made over 80 appearances at Plainmoor.

Ian Arkwright is a 24 year old midfield player on loan from Wrexham signed just before the transfer deadline by Dave Webb, Ian cost the Racecourse Club £100,000 from Wolves where he had made 4 appearances for the Molineux Club after joining them as an apprentice, has made over 100 appearances for the North Wales Club. Another newcomer is David Wakefield an 18 year old free transfer signing from Darlington where he failed to gain a regular League position.

Another loan signing is Derek Hall from Coventry City, the Highfield Road apprentice has only made a single league appearance for the Sky Blues.

In comparison the vast experience of former England International Tony Currie compensates, Tony was playing non-League before Dave Webb persuaded him to join Torquay, he had returned to this country from Toronto Blizzards. His last League Club had been Queens Park Rangers for whom he had played in 79 games after moving from Leeds, Tony had made 102 appearances for the Elland Road Club, originally a Watford protege he made only 18 appearances at Vicarage Road before moving to Bramall Lane to join Sheffield United, it was with the Yorkshire Club that he played the majority of his League games, 313 in total, before joining Leeds. Tony played in seventeen Internationals for England.

Mike Squire is a signing from Dorset League Club Hamworthy and has made an immediate impact with the Plainmoor Club, has now made a dozen appearances scoring twice.

Steve Cooper cost Torquay £5,000 from Stourbridge and has proved a sound investment scoring 90 goals in nearly 250 matches. 29 year old Steve is now the Club's leading scorer with 8 goals now that John Sims has left the Club.

Colin Barnes joined Torquay from Alliance League Club Barnet, in his first season in League soccer, Colin has scored 4 goals to date.

David Carr, a 27 year old defender, was signed from Lincoln, a former Luton Town apprentice, he made 48 appearances at Kenilworth Road, before a £20,000 transfer took him to Sincil Bank where he made 192 appearances for Lincoln before joining Torquay.

SURVEY ON DIVISION FOUR

The recent Sunday fixture between York City and Doncaster Rovers produced the seasons highest attendance when a crowd of 11,297 watched two of this seasons successful Fourth Division teams draw 1-1. Easter is regarded as the traditional stage of the season when promotion and relegation issues are settled, it is not strictly true, but they do have a lot of bearing on the final outcome. In past seasons it was usual practice to have three matches in a four day period but now it is customary to spread the Easter matches over a longer period, another factor is the timing of Easter, this season it is at a later date. While fixtures played at this holiday will influence final issues it will definitely not settle them.

If you recall we stated that the promotion positions would be claimed by Clubs who have not lost more than thirteen matches when we reviewed promotion prospects at the last holiday period of Christmas and the New Year. A look at the current League Table shows that several of the leading Clubs are well within this limit. The number of losses among the front runners of our Division are York City with 6, Bristol City 12, Reading 8, Doncaster 6, Aldershot 11, Blackpool 11, Tranmere 9. This is usually the most reliable way of forecasting whether any Club has genuine promotion prospects, whichever Division you scan all the leading Clubs are below this figure. For instance in Division 3, Oxford United have lost 7, Sheffield United 9, Wimbledon 10, Hull 6, Walsall 12. In Division 2 Chelsea have lost 4, Sheffield Wednesday 4, Newcastle 8, and Manchester City 9.

It would appear that all managers pre-season either have to assemble an outstanding team or develop an early season difficult to beat attitude, for six defeats in the first twelve matches for instance leaves very little leeway to transform his team into a situation where he would only lose a further six matches in the following thirty four matches!

It is now an accepted view that York City are by far the most superior team in the Division and virtually promoted, the intriguing question is who accompanies them. With several matches left between the contenders, some of these matches will be regarded as virtual three pointers, but often these matches are so closely fought that they end as draws, such as the recent clash between York and Doncaster.

Forecasting or predicting the final outcome is always a difficult prophecy even with as little as six points available, but also it's easy to sit on the fence and hedge your bets. Most soccer supporters are fairly wise and most opinions this season have thought that York City, Doncaster Rovers and Reading would eventually prove superior, and that is the way that the season has unfolded.

This leaves one place to fill, with Bristol City, Aldershot and Blackpool really to finish in that coveted fourth place ahead of a late run from Tranmere Rovers. With Bristol City having a points advantage in comparison to a game in hand by Aldershot and Blackpool with four, it's usually an advantage to have the points. Close scrutiny of each Clubs remaining fixtures show that City have the easier matches on paper, but no matches are won on paper and it will be interesting to see if the recent adverse publicity of Bristol City's match at Reading and the vowed intention of Terry Cooper to consider his position with the Club at the seasons end, will affect morale on the pitch, and equally on the terraces, will remain one of the seasons still to be answered questions.

If Aldershot can overcome the more difficult programme of the Clubs involved they will rightly claim that fourth spot while Blackpool have a deficit of points to overcome to bring their contention closer, providing Bristol City overcome the adverse publicity they should claim that position so it would appear that come next month York City, Doncaster Rovers, Reading and Bristol City will be looking towards the summer issue of next seasons Division 3 fixtures, but who knows, there is still some way to go.

An interesting observation is that of last seasons promoted Clubs from Division Four, the Clubs who filled the first two positions Wimbledon and Hull City, are close to promotion again, while Port Vale and Scunthorpe are desperately trying to avoid the drop back into next seasons Division Four.

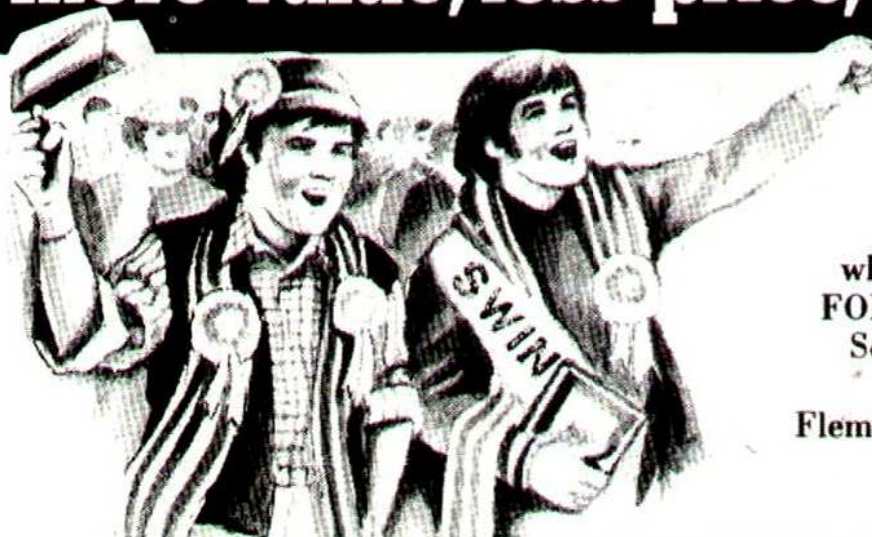
It is a thought, that come May 5th the highest crowd in the Division Four programme could watch our match at Ashton Gate for if City require points to ensure promotion the figure of 11,297 will be in jeopardy, that was set in the recent York and Doncaster fixture.

While there is a desperate shortage of goals at first team level, how opposite for two of our younger youth team players, who have had a most rewarding season, but the recent injury to apprentice Mark Gardiner must have come as a inconvenience in his bid to eventually finish the season with a half century of goals. At present Mark is on 41, with 35 for the Youth Team and 6 for the Reserves, all from 38 appearances! His partnership with Mark Hughes who has netted 19 goals in Youth matches and 5 in Reserve games from 38 appearances also, has produced a staggering combined total of 65 goals, let's hope they progress to reproduce this form one day in League football.

Mansfield's on loan signing from Southampton, striker Ian Juryeff, scored the eighteenth hat trick by a Division Four player this season when he scored three in Mansfield's 7-1 home win over Halifax, the third hat trick for Mansfield this season. They have been involved in matches with four hat tricks this season, two of the highest scoring matches having been on the receiving end of a 7-1 scoreline at Aldershot when Glenn Burvill scored four of the Shot's goals. Ian Juryeff has now scored five goals in his first four matches for the Stags, while Mansfield made it eleven goals in two matches, having won the previous match at Stockport 4-0.
