Chairman's Comments

This evening we welcome to the County Ground Directors, Players and Supporters of Dagenham Football Club for this replay in the first round proper of the F.A. Cup and the eventual righ to play Peterborough United at home in the next round. When visiting Dahenham last Monday I was very impressed to find that the standard of facilities such as changing rooms, bars and offices were to a high standard and although the ground itself and accommodation was small it was kept in very good condition and a credit to everybody connected with the Club and whatever the outcome tonight we wish them well in the future. The other attraction to smaller grounds such as theirs is that when you have an attendence of 3,000 people a much better atmostphere is created than when only that number of people are in a much bigger stadium and players actually find it easier to raise their game when an atmostphere is created and the crowd get behind the players.

Last Wednesday evening here at the County Ground, our Youth side defeated Newport County by a margin of 8-1, in a First Round Replay in the F.A. Youth Cup Competition, with Mark Gardiner getting four goals in the first half and Mark Hughes three and Sheldon Lee one in the second half. The game, which was played under atrocious conditions, was a credit to both sides and we wish our lads well for their

visit to Plymouth Argyle in the next round.

Next weekend we face the long trip to Darlington for a game on Sunday afternoon, this we agreed to because of their willingness to play on a Sunday late in April. Whilst on the subject of Darlington, it is nice to see them enjoying a position at the top of the table, a situation they have not been in for some years, and their position indicates the task facing us.

Finally here's hoping you enjoy tonight's game and that we can progress to the next round to face Peterborough United here at the County Ground.

Welcome to Dagenham

We should not be surprised by the visit of Dagenham and the neccessity of a first round replay for in the 1st round of the F.A.Cup. In 1982-83 they were only defeated by a solitary goal away to Gillingham, the previous season Millwall only scraped home by the odd goal in a second round tie by 2-1 and last season the daggers held Brentford to a 2-2 draw at Victoria Road, before succumbing again by the odd goal in a 2-1 defeat at Griffin Park in the replay.

Dagenham have reached the first round proper, by their fourth qualyfying round victory over Aveley, by 1-0. A goal ten minutes from the end of the match ensuring their first round tie with Swindon.

Currently in sixteenth position in this seasons Gola Alliance League with a playing record of six wins, two draws and eight defeats, losing the last League match 3-0 away to Runcorn.

They compete in six competitions, the Gola League, Bob Lord Trophy, F.A. Cup, F.A. Trophy, Essex Senior Club, Capital League, these along with five pre-season friendlies ensure there is no shortage of soccer for the Victoria Road Club. Former Sunderland and Orient Manager Ken Knighton has the following players at his disposal for tonights first round replay:-

Goalkeeper LLOYD SCOTT was 23 last month, made two League appearances for Blackpool in the 1982/83 season, a former club mate of Dave Hockaday's at Bloomfield Road, he joind Dagenham in October 1983 formerly on the staff of Watford and Orient.

Defender ROGER WADE was a former England Schoolboy International who gained seven international caps while playing for Blackheath, 27 year old Roger was formerly with Tottenham Hotspur, after leaving White Hart Lane, where he appeared in the combination reserve team. He later joined Ilford, and Enfield from whom he joined the Victoria Road Club in 1981, played in the F.A.Cup matches with Millwall in 1981 and last seasons two cup ties with Brentford.

A product of the Club's reserve team defender GARY CRAMPTON is twenty two, and was substitute in the fourth round qualyfying tie with Aveley although he did not appear.

Now is his third season with the Club is central defender ALAN CAMPBELL following his transfer from Barnet, Alan was with Hendon and Finchley previously, he will be 31 on December 10th next, he was second to Joe Dunwell in total appearances last season.

Twenty nine year old STEVE OLIVER was signed from Enfield in August 1983, played in the two F.A.Cup matches with Brentford last season previously with Tottenham

Hotspur, Barking and Barnet.

Club Coach JOHN WATSON is one of the most experienced players of the Gola Alliance League. It was John's 80th minute goal at Aveley in the fourth qualifying tie that earnt Dagenham their place in the first round proper, this was 31 year old John's second goal of the season, his other goal was at an important time for after trailing Gillingham 2-0, he scored the third goal in the fightback the Victoria Road Club made in their Capital League match. Much travelled John has seen service with West Ham United, Durban City, Charlton Athletic, Wealdstone, Barnet and Scarborough. Involved in some substantial fees in non-league football, John who has captained the England Semi Professional team in 1982, joined Dagenham during the from Alliance season champions Maidstone United who had paid £6,000 for his services to Scarborough in

the summer of 1982. In 1980 Scarborough had paid Wealdstone £12,000 to acquire his services, he scored in the 6-0 win over Holland for England in the Four Nations Tournament for Semi Professional Clubs in 1982.

Midfield player BARRY LITTLE was a former Charlton Athletic apprentice, played in two League matches while at the Valley scoring on his debut at Loftus Road against Queens Park Rovers on March 22nd 1983 in a 5-1 defeat. Joined Dagenham during the summer, Barry has scored three goals this season, the last in a Gola League match with Boston United on October 13th at Victoria Road in a 2-1 defeat.

Leading goalscorer 20 year old LES WHITTON has scored thirteen goals this season, he joined Dagenham from Isthmian League side Croydon in January of this season, for whom he scored 80 goals in three seasons, his latest goal came in the 3-2 home win over Gillingham in the Capital League, his eighteenth since joining the Club.

Twenty two year old STEVE SCOTT signed from Leytonstone/Ilford during August 1983 in a player exchange deal, scored ten goals last season, played in both cup ties with Brentford last season, has scored two goals to date this season, both in the Gola Alliance League.

The Club's longest serving player and Club captain is JOE DUNWELL who will be 33 on December 2nd, Joe was signed form Chelmsford City in 1975, previously he was with Tilbury. Played for Dagenham in both their F.A. Trophy Final teams of 1977, and 1980. This experienced player has played in all of Dagenham's F.A. Cup ties with League Clubs in recent seasons, scoring in

the Victoria Road match with Brentford last season. Joe made 64 appearances for Dagenham last season, ten more than Alan Campbell who was next in the Club's total appearances for the 1983-84 season. Joe has scored three goals this season, the most recent, a first half goal in the 2-1 away victory over Barking in the Essex Senior Cup second round match.

Members of our reserve team who played against Leicester City in a football combination match here on February 9th last will have good reason to recall the name of ROBERT CODNER who scored a hat trick that evening in City's 4-0 win, the other goal coming from our former player Peter Eastoe. Bob moved to Dagenham during the summer on a free transfer, so far he has scored two League goals for his new Club, nineteen years of age, he was born at Walthamstow.

Three recent additions to the squad of players are TOMMY HORAN now in his second spell with the Club rejoining them from Leytonstone/Ilford. Also rejoining the Victoria Road Club for this third spell is midfield player LINCOLN MANDERSON from local Junior Club Leyton County, played in both Cup matches with Brentford last season. While 19 year old ERROL DANIEL, a forward, has had trials with Orient and Watford. Scored his first goal for the Club in the recent 3-2 home win over Gillingham in the Capital League.

Twenty year old midfield player STEVE PAGE is a product of the Club's Youth team, had a spell with Barking before rejoining the Club has usually occupied the substitutes role this season.



In 1970 and 1971, they reached Wembley only to lose in the F.A. Amateur Cup Final on each occasion. In 1973 they were elected into the Isthmian League, they won the Second Division Championship in the first season, and followed this by finishing runners up in the Premier Division in each of the next three seasons. They again reached Wembley in 1977 again losing this time to Scarborough in the F.A. Trophy Final.

In 1980 they reached Wembley for the Fourth time, but this time they won defeating Mossley and winning the F.A. Trophy. They started their first season in the Alliance Premier League in 1981/82, finishing in fifth position, but in the last two seasons they have finished in the

lower half of the League.

During the summer they appointed Ken Knighton the former Orient and Sunderland Manager to hopefully lead the Club to better fortunes. Ken had a well travelled career as a player in the football League, he was born in Barnsley of February 20th 1944, spotted by Wolves as a schoolboy, he for most opponents. joined the Molinuex Club as an apprentice place and with only sixteen appearances in proper they drew 2-2 with Fellow Alliance



two goals.

In total Ken appeared in 349 League games, scoring 30 goals for his six League Clubs, after his playing career ended Ken was appointed Coach to Sheffield Wednesday and later Sunderland. In 1979 he was appointed Manager of the Roker Park Club and led them to promotion in the same season when they finished runners up to Leicester City, failing by one point to clinch the championship. Ken left Roker Park in 1981, and was appointed Manager of Orient. In two seasons with the Brisbane Road Club Ken saw the Club relegated at the end of the 1981-82 season and left the Club in 1983. Ken is no stranger to one of our defenders Nigel Gray, for he was Manager of Nigel in his spell with the London Club.







A look back at games Swindon have played on 26th November.

Not surprisingly, of the twelve games played on this date by the Town, seven have been cup-ties, and with only one being lost this points to a favorable result tonight. The story is much the same for League encounters, three being won and two drawn, and it is in the League that we start, way back in 1921, when an Arthur Metcalf goal gave Swindon a point in a 1-1 draw at Home to Millawall. Six years later came the first cup-tie, with a first round trip to Newport. That prolific goal scorer Harry Morris saw the Town into the next

round, 9,600 being present.

Dulwich Hamlet were the visitors in 1932, but posed no problems as they went under by four goals to one thanks to Jack Starsmore, Syd Brooks and Cyril Quinn with two, and it was another non-League side that came to the County Ground in 1938. 10,816 watched a rather one-sided game as Lowestoft Town sank without a trace after Eddie Jones, Billy Lucas(2), and Ben made it six without reply. A Morton (3) rather more modest score line was recorded eleven years later when Maurice Owen gave Swindon a single goal victory over local rivals Bristol Rovers, again in the first round. The crowd of 19,640 represents our biggest on this date.

1955 brings us to the Second League game on this date, a local derby at Reading, resulting in another single goal win, Bob Edwards doing the honours after 14 minutes. Back to the F.A. Cup, 1960 paired us with Shrewsbury in the second round. Having already met them three times in the League Cup and once in the League, and still to record a win, 11,910 saw Swindon suffer again, going down 1-0. Six years later, with a capacity crowd of 8,000 at Horsham, Don Rogers gave Swindon the interval lead, Dennis Brown and Mel Nurse adding another two at the start of a Cup run that wasn't to finish until a 5th round 2nd replay with Nottingham Forest at Villa Park.

the promotion season of 1968-69, November 26th saw us catching up with some of our League fixtures by making the midweek trip to Northampton. After being 2-1 up at half-time through John Smith and Don Rogers, the game turned into a rout with a further five goals, ending up as a 6-2 victory for the Town. Don Heath, Roger Smart, Peter Noble and, of course, Roger completed Swindon's account to leave us in second place. A further nine years elapsed before Swindon again saw action on this date, a trip to North London saw us take on Boreham Wood. Only 2,242, some 300 short of capacity, bothered to turn out to see a goal-less draw, but David Moss and Ray McHale completed the job three days later.

Although that was the last cup-tie on this date until today, we have played a further two League games since then, the first being two seasons ago, our first in the Fourth Division. Gary Emmanuel and Andy Rowland netting to give us a 2-1 on a Friday nigh visit to victory Stockport, 2,197 being present. One year later we were on our travels again, this time to Mansfield were Jimmy Quinn scored twice, once in each half, to give us a share of the points.

BEHIND THE SCENES

Should this evening's game result in a draw after ninety minutes extra time of thirty minutes must be played. If the result remains a draw at the end of the extra period a further replay will take place on the ground of the Club winning the toss of a coin, the toss taking place at the conclusion of this evening's match. Incidently the rule goes on to say that should a further game be necessary this will take place on the ground of the Club losing the toss of the coin. This procedure will be repeated until a winner has been determined.

Although it is possible to trace the original village team back to 1894, the present Dagenham Football Club was formed in 1949.

Dagenham had two seasons in the Metropolitan League followed by six in the Delphian League. During this eight year period, they won the League Championship on four occasions and were runners ups on the other four. In 1957 they were elected into the Corinthian League. When the shake-up of non-league football in the south occured in 1963, Dagenham were elected into the Premier Division of the Athenian League.

Dagenham's first real impact on the national scene was in 1967 when they forced an away draw against Reading in the F.A., forced an away draw against Reading in the amongs F.A.Cup second round, only to lose the replay 0-1 and thereby an away match with five p Manchester City in the third round. During its this season (1967/68) the Club won the Associ London Senior Cup, Essex Senior Cup, the P London Charity Cup and the Mithras Cup; could and were finalists in the London challenge money.

Cup, losing to a strong West Ham United side in the final.

Dagenham reached Wembley in 1970 and 1971, only to lose in the F.A. Amateur Cup Final on each occasion.

In 1973, Dagenham were elected into the Isthmian League. They won the Second Division championship in the first season, and followed this by finishing runners up in the Premier Division in each of the next three seasons. In 1977 they reached Wembley again, again losing this time to Scarborough in the F.A. Trophy Final.

In 1980 they reached Wembley for the fourth time - this time defeating Mossley and winning the F.A. Trophy.

Dagenham started their first season in the Alliance Premier League in 1981/82. They finished fifth in the first season, and in the next two finished well down.

* * * *

I am often asked how the proceeds of F.A. Cup matches are distributed. After paying the travelling expences of the visiting team, the fees and expenses of the match officials, the expenses of the match i.e. gatemen and steward, advertising, printing, posting, police charges and floodlights and V.A.T. the proceeds are divided as follows:-

In the first and second rounds the net proceeds are divided equally between the competing Clubs excepting replays when five percent of the gate is forwarded to the Football Association. In the third to the sixth rounds thirty three and a third percent of the net proceeds are allocated to the competing Clubs and to the Football Association Pool but in replayed matches in these games five percent is sent to the F.A. and thirty one and two thirds to each club and to the Pool. In the Semi Final ties, for those lucky enough to take part, the division is twenty five percent to the F.A., fifty percent to be divided equally amongst the four Clubs competing, both gates being lumped together, and twenty five percent to the Pool. In the Final Tie its twenty five percent to the Football Association, to each competing club and to the Pool. Would it not be great if we could become involved in that kind of




