Welcome to Halifax

Halifax was the site of the last execution by beheading in England, in the football sense Mick Bullock was 'Given the Chop' following a 1-0 home defeat by Darlington. Since that day in October under the guidance of Caretaker Manager Billy Ayre they have lost only two of their last seven matches in the League.

The Halifax board of Directors have done well to keep soccer alive in the Yorkshire Town, cost cutting has meant the withdrawl of their Northern Intermediate year. Leaque Team this A sponsorship deal with the D.I.Y. company Madeleys, part-owned by the former Leeds United and England player Paul Madeley. When they applied for re-election last year they were the only Club to receive full support. Goalscoring is the problem for the Shaymen with twelve goals in their Seventeen League matches to date.

Highlight of their season was the 3-2 aggregate win over Chesterfield in the first round of the Milk Cup which brought Totteham Hotspur to the Shay in the Second Round, the inevitable occurred with a 9-1

deficit in the two leg tie.

Halifax have completed the double over us during the last two seasons and the looking to repeat squad this again includes:-

Eire international PADDY ROCHE who has been capped seven times, the 33 year old Dublin born goalkeeper began his career he with Shelbourne, attracted attention of Manchester United who paid a £15,000 fee for him in 1972. In nine seasons at Old Trafford, he made 46 League appearances. Paddy joined Brentford in 1982 to appear in every League match during the 1982/83 season, after 71 League matches with the Griffin Park Club, he joined Halifax this season and has played in every League match this season.

Full back CECIL PODD has missed only the away League match at Colchester since signing from Bradford City this summer. Born in St. Kitts 32 year old Cecil played

502 League games for the Valley Parade Club, in fourteen seasons there. Made maximum appearances during 1981/82.

Joining the Club from School, 18 year old MARK GREENWAY made his debut at Reading on December 2nd last year in a 1-0 defeat, Mark made 11 League appearances scoring his only League goal to date in an match to last weeks visitors Colchester United. Has made only four League appearances this season before last Saturday.

Another former Bradford City defender is 29 year old GARY WATSON signed on a free transfer this summer, after 263 League matches with City, and twelve seasons at Valley Parade, made his debut for Halifax in the opening day match with Blackpool this season, up to last Saturday Gary has made 12 League appearances this season.

Player/Manager BILLY AYRE joined the Shay Club this season from Mansfield Town after 67 League matches at Field mill, this is his second spell with Halifax, for after 63 League matches spanning the 80/81 and 81/82 season Bill joined the Stags for a £15,000 fee in the summer of 1982. Originally joining Halifax after 141 League games for Hartlepool 32 year old Bill was originally with Scarborough, missed only the first match of the season against Blackpool.

Until joining Halifax from Southampton this summer 20 year old ALAN KNILL had never played League soccer, but the Slough born defender has been present in all of Halifax Town matches this season.

Former Club apprentice PAUL KENDALL established a regular place last season with 39 League apearances, scored his first league goal in their 3-2 win here last season. Played in the first fourteen League matches this season to take his career total to 76 League appearances. Halifax born Paul, has yet to add to his two League goals of last season, both against Swindon.

In the Shay Club's recent away match at Crewe 29 year old ALAN LITTLE made his 374th League appearance. The former Aston Villa apprentice played in three League matches for Villa, before joining Southend United on a free transfer in 1975 after 103 League games at Roots Hall he moved to Barnsley in 1977, playing in 91 League matches at Oakwell, before a £30,000 transfer took him to nearby Doncaster Rovers. After 85 League matches, Newcastle

born Alan moved to the South Coast to join Torquay United in a player exchange deal. deal. Joined Halifax after fifty one League matches at Plainmoor. Scored three goals from his 27 League matches last season. Netted his only goal this season on Sept 8th in the home match with Aldershot, from his fourteen League matches.

Another player with no League experience before joining Halifax for this season was SIMON LOWE who will be 22 years old on Boxing Day, made his League debut v Blackpool on Aug 25th scored his first goal for the Club 3 days later in the Milk Cup Tie with Chesterfield, repeating the act in the return leg seven days later. His first league goal came on Oct 26th in the 3-1 away win at Colchester. Scored twice in the Shay Club's last home match with Port Vale.

Everpresent this season is last seasons top goalscorer with 14 League goals is 23 year old Bradford born BARRY GALLAGHER. The former Bradford City apprentice made 71 League appearances at Valley parade and 3 on loan to Mansfield Town before joining Halifax in the summer of 1983. Scored in our 2-1 defeat at the Shay last season, has scored 3 goals this season to take his career total to thirty nine.

Former Brighton apprentice STEVE WARD has now made 183 League appearances for Halifax after joining the Club on a free

transfer from Northampton Town in 1980, played in all 46 League matches last season. Derby born Steve has made 14 League appearances this season, scored the only goal of the game at Crewe on Nov 23rd.

Joining Halifax on a free transfer from Lincoln City this summer, 19 year old CHRIS MOYSES made his League debut on Aug 25th in the home match with Blackpool, has made 8 League appearances so far this season, yet to score in first team football!

Scoring on his League debut v Chester on Feb 14th last season was 19 year old Dewsbury born STEPHEN THORNBER, with ten appearances in League matches this season to add to his five of last, the only other goal Steve has scored was the winning goal of the Club's 1-0 win at Northampton on Sept 15th this season.

Former Stoke City and Plymouth Argyle striker JEFF COOK has only the winning goal from the home match with Mansfield Town on Nov 10th to his credit this season from 10 League matches, 32 year old Jeff scored six goals from his 25 League games last season his first for the Shay Club. Was the subject of a £25,000 fee when leaving Stoke for Plymouth after 30 matches in the League for the Potteries Club scoring once. Sixty two League games followed at Home Park with 26 goals before his free transfer to Halifax.

when Irish eyes were smiling

The World Cup of 1958, held in Sweden, are among the memories most vivid to Harry Gregg, for incredibly Northern Ireland reached the last eight.

Northern Ireland set up their headquaters in a luxury hotel overlooking a sandy beach at Tylosand, near Halmstand. Arriving unsung and unheralded, in stark contrast to the publicity afforded 'England, Scotland, Brazil and 1954 winners West Germany, and host country Sweden.

After the first match they were demanding re-appraisal, showing skill and determination they defeated Czechoslavakia

1-0, with a goal from Wilbur Cush.

Down to earth, the following match with a 3-1 defeat by South American Champions Argentina, followed by a 2-2 draw with West Germany in Malmo. Twice in the lead with goals from Peter McParland, when eleven minutes from time Harry who had turned in the performance of a lifetime was beaten by West German striker Uwe Seeler, the draw saw the Germans through to the last eight, that meant a play off between Ireland and Czechoslovakia, who had defeated Argentina 6-1.

Efforts to stay in Malmo for the decider failed, a tiring 100 mile journey back to Tylosand followed, where their fans - two of whom arrived from Ireland on a motor scooter - had set up tents in the hotel grounds. The Irish took over the 'Norre Kat' the local night club after each match celebrating in victory and defeat.

Harry, his ankle badly swollen after spraining it in the West German match, bathed it for hours in cold water and for two days repeated the proces, but he failed to make the deciding match.

The Irish needed to win and former Swindon Town keeper Norman Uprichard then of Portsmouth took Harry's place. Returning to the scene of their triumph over the West Germans, they were a goal down in 17 minutes, but they equalised seconds before half time through Peter McParland.

Early in the second half Uprichard damaged his hand, he was to learn after the match he had broken a bone. Furthur misfortune followed when Bertie Peacock collided with Uprichard and the Czech Zikan, with a damaged knee he limped on the left wing for the remainder of the match. After 90 minutes the score was level, dusk fell on the stadium as the match went into extra time.

Making most of the running, McParland put the Irish ahead in the tenth minute. With twenty minutes left the Ulster fans were singing 'When Irish Eyes are Smiling'. In the time remaining the Czech Bubernik an Ice Hockey International spat in the Referee's face and was sent off, the Irish held on and at 9.21 it was all over. Those Irish immortals were cheered all the way back along the tunnel by jubilant fans.

There were fantastic moments after, some, when glory like grief needs no audience. The players savoured that glory when Manager Peter Doherty told them privately, 'Well done boys, you were

magnificent.'

Northern Ireland had reached the quarter finals but the mounting injury list proved insurmountable. That night they drove back to Tylosand, and the next day travelled 10 hours in a bus across Sweden to Norrkopping, there on Thursday June 19, they lost 4-0 to France.

Harry, still not recovered, was drafted into the team in place of Norman Uprichard whose hand was encased in plaster, it was asking too much for a team that had already reached a peak beyond their

'wildest dreams.

Irish hearts were heavy that night, so too was that of 13 year old Bengt Jonasson from Tylosand who had been adopted as the teams mascot.

The players thought so much of Bengt that they brought him to Belfast the following October for the British Championship match with Scotland and he was given the full V.I.P. treatment.

To put that achievement in its right perspective, it was a success to qualify for the final series and even more remarkable that they should finish in the last eight. Against terrific odds that lengthened with every injury and no country earned such glory from ultimate defeat.

The people of Sweden will always remember Northern Ireland, and that night in Malmo when they made History against the Czechs. At that time Irish football had reached a pinnacle, that they lost in the quarter final could never diminish their achievement. We know now of the equally meritous performance of the Northern Ireland team in 1982 World Cup in Spain. But their predecessors of 1958 were the fore runners of a World Cup series that provided a lot of happy memories for Harry.

After a brief period with Chesterfield former Arsenal, Spurs, Notts Forest, and Scotland under 23 International Willie Young has left League leaders Chesterfield to concentrate on his business commitments, he failed to make the Saltergate League side due to consistency. After leaving Norwich City last season 33 year old Willie has failed to find a League Club until recently joining Chesterfield.

After appearing in several of our reserve team matches this season Dominic Genevese has now joined Gola League Boston United, scoring from the penalty spot in their recent 1-1 draw with Gateshead on his debut for the Lincolnshire Club who are currently in third position.

In a recent award for the month of November the fourteen most consistent performers were named as follows Tony Lowery (Mansfield), Steve Emery (Hereford United), Eamonn O'Keefe (Port Vale), Paul (Scunthorpe), Mick Smith (Aldershot), Mike Salmon (Stockport), Ally (Port Vale), John Williams (Tranmere), Joe Jakub (Bury), Lee Dixon (Chester), Geoff Thomas (Crewe), Billy (Blackpool), Kevan (Darlington) and Simon Lowe of todays visitors Halifax Town. Both Paul Gregory and Mike Smith were loaned from Doncaster Rovers and Wimbledon respectively.

What a start for Hereford United's on loan signing from Shrewsbury Paul Tester, on his first morning he reported late for training and was promptly fined. Said Manager John Newman 'I treated him as I would have done any of our own players. Anyway he got his money back when he made

his debut for us.'

Paul laid on the winning goal in a 2-0 win over Blackpool which earned him a welcome win bonus to cover the fine.

Welcome and farewell! Welcome to Chris Ramsey who joined us last week from Second Division Brighton and Hove Albion. Chris spent two loan periods with the Club earlier this season making nine League appearances, upon his return to the South Coast Club he found that he did not figure in Albion's long term plans and unable to regain the first team place he began to establish in 1982/83, he will be hoping to establish a League career here at the County Ground. Chris was born Birmingham on April 28th 1962, he first joined Bristol City failing to make their

League team he joined Brighton and his League appearances for them since read 1980/81 3, 1981/82 0, 1982/83 23, 1983/84 4, Chris has made one Milk Cup appearance six F.A. Cup appearances which includes his Wembley F.A. Cup final appearance against Manchester United when clashing with United's Norman Whiteside he suffered a leg injury which kept him out of the subsequent replay and impeded his progress with the Sussex Club.

Farewell to former Chelsea and Scottish International Simon Gibson who joined the Club in November 1983 for a fee of £15,000, when signed by former Manager Ken Beamish after two months on loan from the Stamford Bridge club. Twenty year old Simon made thirty one League appearances scoring three goals, one apearance in the Milk Cup, with six F.A. Cup appearances scoring one goal, and in last seasons Associate Members Cup he scored one goal from his three appearances. He joined Third Division Preston North End for a small fee, after a watching brief by the Deepdale Club's Coach Tommy Booth who was an interested spectator at our recent Football Combination match Southampton. Simon scored on his debut against Brentford last Saturday.

With the proposed exchange deal with Third Division Reading for their midfield player Lawrie Sanchez finally petering our after three- weeks of talks, Sanchez finally signing for Second Divison Wimbledon for a reported fee of £25,000. It's certainly been a period of patience for Lou Macari for at the time of writing he was waiting upon a yes or no from former Bath City, Bristol Rovers and now City striker Graham Withey. Interested in returning to his native West Country he had been the subject of interest since returning from a months loan in Hong Kong from Plymouth Argyle, Bristol City, Peterborough United and

Lincoln City.

Although Peterborough United have now Southend United signed striker Grea Shepherd, the former Norwich City player cost a fee of £8,000.

Newly appointed Aldershot Manager Ron Harris is not happy with what he found at the Recreation Ground Club saying 'The Club has lost its ambition, there are only 15 professionals, no reserve team, no youth team and the fans have been watching visitors like Darlington and Hartlepool



for so long they don't even dream of anything better.' Ron went onto say 'I never liked losing when I was a player and that's something that becoming a Manager doesn't change,' adding I professionals with the same dedication and determination I had. At Chelsea I had eight or nine Managers, and none ever accused me of giving less than 100 per cent. I will demand the same from the Aldershot players.'

His immediate aim is to build for the future by establishing a youth side and strengthening the present team by adding

to his playing staff.

'My first game in charge I had 12 fit players available. Where is the incentive or the motivation in that? And where is the chance for local youngsters if you

don't have a youth team??

Last week Tony Spencer joined Aldershot on a months loan from Ron Harris' last Club Brentford where he was Coach until two years ago, a defender, 19 year old has made nineteen appearances so far for the Griffin Park Club.

On loan to todays visitors Halifax Town, 19 year old Aidrian Shaw from Notts Forest had the misfortune to head past his own goalkeeper in the Yorkshire Club's 3-0 defeat at promotion seeking Hereford

United last Saturday.

An eventful match which enabled former Walsall striker Ollie Kearns to score one of the quickest ever goals at Edgar Street after 31 seconds. It was immediate reward for a well above average crowd attracted to the match by offers of vouchers for next months F.A. Cup clash with Arsenal.

It was a match which saw Hereford United striker Stuart Phillips set up a record when he made his 95th

consecutive League appearance.

Darlington moved back to the top of the table by virtue of their tenth match away from Feethams without defeat, and with only one defeat all season they have, along with Chesterfield, the impressive record in this seasons Fourth Division.

Swindon Town v Halifax Town

Full Football results:

When Halifax came to the County Ground in April 1962 both Clubs were hovering around a mid-table position, giving no indication as to the one side encouter that was to follow. halifax included future Swindon players Peter Downsborough and Frank large (their leading scorer) in their side, but only the former was to feature in the game with any prominance.

Swindon started strongly, taking just seven minutes to register the first goal when Bobby Woodruff blasted home a first time shot from outside the area following a cross from Mike Summerbee. Downsborough was beaten by the pace and power of the shot, and three minutes later was beaten again, this time by Jack Smith. Woodruff and Bill Atkins combined well to send Smith away and score with a well placed angle shot. Swindon were by this stage in total control and attacking at every possible moment, and within a minute it was 3-0 to the Town. Downsborough totally misjudged a cross from Arnold Darcy, allowing the ball to drop over his head and into the net.

Not surprisingly the scoring rate slowed after this hectic five minute period, the next clear chance came in the 25th minute. A long throw from Woodruff caught out the defence, but Ernie Hunt could only hit the bar with his headed effort. Woodruff had a further two chances before Swindon got the fourth in the 38th minute, hunt scoring with a close range header from a Summerbee free-kick, and in the 44th minute Darcy surprised Downsborough again, scoring direct from a corner.

Any hopes of a continuation in the second-half failed to materialise as Halifax tried to salvage some pride. Although 5-0 down they started to put some attacks together, but lacked in finishing power, their best effort coming in the closing minutes when phil Roscoe's crashing shot was turned over by Mike Turner. Swindon added the sixth in the 77th minute when Mike Burgess was

Swindon were strongly pushing for promotion, being in second place with four games to play, whilst Halifax were already relegated following their 3-1 defeat at Wrexham on the previous Wednesday. However it wasn't to be as Swindon gave one of their worst performances of the season, only managing to salvage a point with nine minutes left.

The Town, trying to play it tight in attack, lacked any sort of planning which, together with Halifax's packed defence, managed to frustrate the team, and the harder they tried the worse it got. Halifax, although not coming forward in any consistancy, were always favourites to score, with Swindon's defence tending to back off rather than tackle. But Mike Turner was never in any serious trouble until the 52nd minute when Bill hooper's point blank shot was beaten out, only for Bill Holden to score on the rebound.

Swindon, going from bad to worse, were further handicaped by injuries to Arnold Darcy and Bobby Woodruff, but were unlucky when John Stevens, having rounded Downsborough, saw his shot cleared off the line by Eric Harrison. Then came that lucky break when Phil Roscoe brought down Mike Summerbee in the area, Ernie Hunt converting the penalty to keep Swindon in second place, and thankfully promotion rivals Coventry lost at home.

Have an enjoyable afternoon and let us hope that the result adds to our enjoyment of the festive season.




