

SWINDON TOWN

- **COLIN BAILIE** Age 20. Joined the club as an apprentice and made his debut in April 1982. Established a regular place last season at full-back but can also play in midfield.
- **LEIGH BARNARD** Age 26. He spent five seasons with Portsmouth before signing for Town in July 1982. An enthusiastic midfield player always found in the thick of the action.
- **PAUL BATTY** Age 21. Doncaster-born but began his career with Swindon and made his debut two seasons ago. A central midfield player, not very tall but lacking nothing in determination.
- DAVID CALDWELL Age 24. A recent newcomer to the team having been recruited a few weeks ago from Mansfield. A capable striker who had netted 48 goals from 126 League appearances in Stags colours prior to this season.
- **PETER COYNE** Age 26. Joined Swindon last summer after spending three years with Northern Premier League side Hyde United. Originally with Manchester United for two years but made only one appearance and moved to Crewe in August 1977.
- SCOTT ENDERSBY Age 23. A goalkeeper who played for England's Youth Team whilst an apprentice with Ipswich but didn't appear in a Football League game until after his transfer to Tranmere in July, 1981. He had actually played in an F.A. Cup tie at the age of 15, for Kettering Town. He signed for Swindon in August 1983.
- **SIMON GIBSON** Age 20. 6'2" former Chelsea apprentice whose League debut came after he joined Town in November, 1983. He played 34 games last season at the centre of defence but has not retained his place this term.
- **COLIN GORDON** Age 21. A tall, agile striker taken from local football in the Birmingham area. Made his debut for Robins against Scunthorpe earlier this season.
- MIKE GRAHAM Age 26. Previously with Bolton Wanderers he moved to Swindon in July 1981 and has since played over 140 games. Generally regarded as a central defender but has also played at full-back and in midfield.
- NIGEL GRAY Age 28. An experienced central defender having played 261 games for Orient with whom he began his career. He signed for Swindon in July, 1983 but had a disappointing season and spent a period on loan to Brentford. Another adaptable player who has operated at full-back and in midfield.
- CHARLIE HENRY Age 23. Ex-Town apprentice who quickly established his right-back spot following his debut in September 1980. A popular hard-tackling player who has made over 140 appearances for Robins.
- **DAVE HOCKADAY** Age 27. Began his career with Blackpool during 1976-77 and made 159 appearances before a transfer to Swindon in August 1983. Best used as a right-winger but can also play as a central striker.
- LOU MACARI Age 35. Former Celtic player who was signed by Manchester United for £200,000 in January, 1973. He went on to make 311 League appearances for United, plus numerous European and domestic Cup appearances, and also gained 24 Scottish Caps.
- GARRY NELSON Age 24. Started his League career with Southend five seasons ago and played 115 games before joining Swindon in August 1983. An old-fashioned left-winger who likes to attack the full-back.
- CHRIS RAMSEY Age 22. Played in Brighton's F.A. Cup Final team in 1983 but made only four appearances last term and apparently didn't fit into Seagulls future plans. Surprisingly no other club showed interest in this competent full-back until Swindon signed him early this season.
- ANDY ROWLANDS Age 19. Played nearly 200 games scoring 70 goals for Bury before joining Town in September 1978. He continued to bag goals but the past couple of seasons have seen him playing regularly as central defender. He has also been used as emergency goalkeeper. He recently completed his 300th game in Town's colours.

SWINDON TOWN

Tonight we welcome the Robins from Wiltshire together with their well known manager Lou Macari who has experience of playing games at the highest level with Celtic, Manchester United and Scotland. Macari took on the role of player-manager last summer after the post was offered to Liverpool defender Phil Thompson.

Last Saturday's victory at Peterborough was Swindon's first away win since 3rd November ending a run of nine away games which had yielded just one point. In contrast to their travels they have won ten and drawn two of their previous twelve matches at the County Ground and this is mainly responsible in maintaining their mid-table position.

This season is Swindon's third in the lower divisions since dropping into the bottom section in 1982 for the first time in their league career. Founded in 1881 Town first played at the County Ground in 1984 and were elected to the Football League's Third Division in 1920. They gained promotion to the Second Division for the first time in 1963 and then, after relegation, were promoted again in 1969. The Robins came close to First Division Football during 1969-70 but eventually had to settle for fifth place. Relegation to Division Three followed in 1974.

Assisting Macari with managerial duties is former Manchester United goalkeeper Harry Gregg who began his playing career with Doncaster Rovers in 1952.

Two seasons ago Swindon left the Old Show Ground pointless after goals from Cammack and Lester helped United on their way to the Third Division. This season's meeting at Town's County Ground in November ended goalless as the Iron came away with a hard-earned point.

DID YOU KNOW?

Some interesting facts about our Visitors

Fullback John Trollope established a Football League record for most appearances for one club when he played his 770th game for Town during the 1980-81 season. Previously, at the age of 29, he had become the youngest player to complete 500 league games. He also gained a League Cup winners medal in 1969 and was awarded the MBE in 1979.

A Third Division (South) game in 1949, between Swindon and Southend, saw six goals disallowed — all for offside — four of which were netted by Town.

Robin's striker Keith East scored five times in his club's victory over Mansfield in November 1965. This is a Third Division record he shares with several other players including the Iron's Barrie Thomas.

The first ever occurrence of twins scoring in the same League game was for Swindon in 19l46 when Alfred and William Stephens go the goals in a 2-0 win over Exeter.

Trevor Anderson hit a hat-trick of penalties for Swindon against Walsall in April 1976.



Successive home wins in four days against Exeter and Northampton brought particular delight to two United goalscorers, for varying reasons. Steve Cammack's 96th and record breaking goal was greeted with continuous applause from the United faithful and Cammy quickly brought the "100 milestone" a little nearer with his 97th for the club. Three days later Dave Hill scored his first goal in the football League and the delight was there for all to see. The red-haired midfield dynamo, who has gained a regular place in the side this year, has endeared himself to the Old Show Ground fans with his 100 per cent effort and consistency and the crowd seemed as delighted as the player himself when that first goal finally went in. It is goalscorers who always seem to claim the headlines but United's tremendous run over the past couple of months has been due to some outstanding displays throughout the entire side - teamwork being the key. Surprisingly, one man who has not found the net in 1985 is Mike Lester yet his form of late has been a delight to watch and who says there are no characters left in the game? Midfield colleague Tommy Graham has been finding the net however and like Steve Cammack also bagged a 'brace' in the demolition of Exeter. Tommy celebrates his birthday this Sunday, hopefully with another goal this evening providing an early birthday present!

Continuing the 'goals' theme United's current HOME LEAGUE goals total of 43 is the clubs best since registering 44 in 1965-66, nineteen seasons ago! (and there are still five home games left!) The club record of 52 home goals which was achieved in 1961-62 when the Iron finished fourth in Division Two now looks in severe danger of being bettered by United's free scoring side. Ten goals in five games will beat that total and it would be a great achievement if the current squad could treat 'home' fans to the best goalscoring spree ever seen in 35 seasons of League soccer in the town. Ironically United's 'record breakers' look likely to be watched by the clubs lowest ever average home crowd. The current low is an average of 2,213 for the re-election campaign of 1981-82. This seasons figure is presently 2,089. So much for those critics who say attacking football with lots of goals will bring back the fans!?!? — UP THE IRON







LOCAL SCENE

Slight change of format this week as we attempt to jog the memories of our older supporters by relating episodes of two seasons from the distant past, but the question is which seasons?

Members of the Humber and District Football League were South Killingholme Rovers, Ulceby United, Bratts (Brigg), Kirmington, EAst Holton United, Killingholme Haven, North Kelsey, Grasby United, Barnetby Athletic, Goxhill Athletic, Barrow United and New Holland United, for this honour each club paid a subscription fee of 7/6d whilst referees fees were set at 5/-, a reduction of 1/- from the previous seasons First Division but a 1/- rise for the Second Division.

The First Division championship game of the Barton League was held at Barton Towns ground on 31st March between Normanby Park Reserves and South Killngholme Rovers, each side was to provide a linesman to assist referee Mr C. H. Craven of Grimsby.

The annual Barton League v Scunthorpe League encounter was to be held at the Manor House Ground, home of Brigg Town, kick off was at 10.45 a.m. and players were to provide their own kit, excepting jerseys which were provided by Brigg Town.

The oilmen of Pratts (Brigg) celebrated their inaugural year by winning the Barton and District Second Division, also finishing as runners up in the Humber and District League. The championship trophy was presented to skipper Foster by Mr Joe Kitchen, a native of Brigg in Sheffield United's 1915 FA Cup Final win, he also had three nephews in the victorious Pratts side.

Dragonby were ordered to pay their opponents 9/- for not fulfilling their fixture and Foxhill Athletic were fined 2/- for cancelling their away fixture at Scunthorpe Celtic without first obtaining the league management comittees permission.

The South Killingholme v Dragonby Institute Barton League Challenge Cup game was abandoned 20 minutes from time due to bad light, as the delay was caused by the Dragonby side, the tie was awarded to their opponents.

Long time member of Scunthorpe United's press box, Mr Bill Sumpter finished the season as top scorer for Pratts (Brigg), hitting 32 goals in 33 games for the club.

My thanks to Joe Kitchen of Brigg for the loan of his ancient scrapbook which enabled me to compile this column. The seasons? I'll let you know in my next column.

COLLECTING NOW

PROGRAMME SURVEY - Season 1950-51 — An improved, slightly larger programme was produced for the new season and contained 12 pages with much more reading than previous years basic issues. There were programmes for each of United's 46 league games plus their only FA Cup game at Hereford. A normal programme was also issued for the Lincs Cup game at home to Boston United. A series of 'Festival of Britain' friendlies were also played which involved United in home fixtures against Tottenham, Transport of Ireland, and Sligo Rovers; programmes being produced for each game. Programmes exist for some home Reserve games and it is thought that programmes were issued for all the Reserves' home games. There was also a four page issue for United Juniors v Youlgrave. Another publication produced during the season was a 44-page Club Handbook which contained information on players, directors and club officials.

Because 1950-51 was United's first season in the league their home programmes, and also to a lesser extent their away issues, are nowadays valued more highly than other clubs programmes of that time. Of particular significance are the home-away issues of Shrewsbury (it was also the Shrews first season in the league) and similar issues involving New Brighton form whom it was to be their final league campaign. One particular rarity is the programme for the Cup game at Hereford.

MEMORY LANE



Don Welbourne

Don Welbourne was one of a rich crop of young players who made good through United's excellent Youth Policy in the mid 1960's. He was from a local family of sportsmen, (brother Duncan formed an established career at Watford). With this sort of background United had high hopes that the early potential shown by Don would blossom into First Team material. Indeed, the seeds of success were shown in 1966 when the youngster was given his chance in the senior side, but a 7-1 crashing at Grimsby in his second game ended his elevation for over a year. Supporters will recall Freddie Goodwin blooded a number of teenagers prematurely in that match, much to United's cost.

The 1966-67 season was not without success for Don Welbourne and the rest of United's youngsters. Don was one of the Iron's Youth Team who won through to the F.A. Youth Cup semi-finals. After a string of victories the lads met Sunderland

in a two legged semi-final tie, eventually losing on aggregate. Nevertheless several of the team, including Welbourne had shown their potential.

It was not until the 1968-69 season when Welbourne was given a real chance of an extended first team run by Ron Ashman. Initially he was used as a left-sided midfield player, although occasionally moved across to centre-half. His first taste of big time football came when United met Arsenal in the League Cup, but the Iron were given the run around and suffered a heavy defeat. Games like that were to hold Don in good stead for the future and just over twelve months later he played a full role as United handed out a beating to a First Division side. The team in question was Sheffield Wednesday, and Don was part of a solid midfield and defence that saw United through to the fifth round of the F.A. Cup to meet tonights opponents Swindon Town.

As time progressed the dark haired Welbourne became an established part of the Old Show Ground scene. The crowd had come to love his tough tackling and honest effort. Many considered that he was probably the best half-back in the Fourth Division and it could only be a matter of time before he left for pastures new.

Fortunately for the home crowd this did not materialise, although a number of scouts continued to plot his progress. Instead he was on hand to see Scunthorpe win promotion back to the Third Division in the 1971-72 season. During that period the defence only conceded 37 goals, which spoke volumes for the back line players. Unfortunately Don's efforts were restricted in that campaign to the first half of the season. In the game at home to Chester he suffered a leg injury which was to limit him to a solitary substitute appearance for the rest of the season.

Despite the set back Don Welbourne was soon back in harness at the start of the '72-73 campaign. United had been promoted but there were not the resources to strengthen the team so the club had to rely on the efforts of the promotion squad. Welbourne was one of a few who were good enough for the Third Division, but despite his efforts United went back down. Eventually Don settled down and was to finish his career in the Fourth Division. This popular player ended his contribution at the Old Show Ground in 1975 with a move into local football. Don's record of almost 300 appearances is a fitting tribute to his ability as a League player. The only question never to be answered is why he was never bought by a more glamourous club?






