

# Memorable Matches

DIVISION THREE— 4th September 1974 ALDERSHOT 2 : PLYMOUTH 3

This 3rd Division fixture between two evenly matched sides was an exciting spectacle from start to finish and kept the crowd on their toes for the full duration. The Plymouth attack caused some early anxious moments for the Shots defence, but after weathering the storm, the home side broke the deadlock in the 27th minute, courtesy of Ray Dean, who powerfully headed home a corner kick taken by Ronnie Walton.

Back came Plymouth and within four minutes the visitors had equalised. Harry Burrows, the former Stoke City winger, whose left wing trickery was to provide a constant threat, was allowed acres of room and he gratefully took advantage of the space before thumping the ball home from fully 35 yarads.

Having scored, Burrows now became creator and provider, laying on crosses for first, centre forward Rafferty in the 39th minute and then defender Green three minutes later, to score two simple goals taking advantage of some slack marking in the home defence.

However, if Shots were deflated at the half-time whistle, Tommy Mac's "gee-up" during the interval worked wonders, as Shots proceeded to play out of their skins in the second period. The half was only 5 minutews old when the deficit was reduced by a brilliant goal by Murray Brodie. John Harley's corner kick appeared too high and wide, but Brodie took off and volleyed the ball from shoulder height into the roof of the net, past a stranded John Furnell.

The crowd's belief in their team's revival noticably got through to the players as Shots now mounted attack after attack. Richard Walden continuously pushed forward whilst the back line became watertight, giving ever-increasing confidence to Shots cause. Walton nearly made it 3-3, showing awareness in a tight situation, but his lob was well saved by the 'keeper. However, the scoreline was realised just minutes later when Howarths aerial power laid on a goal for Dennis Brown. With victory now in sight, but with the minutes ticking away, Shots climaxed a miraculous recovery. Howarth won possession, Brown struck his shot towards goal where Walton flicked it into the net much to the delight of the Shot's supporters in the 3,756

# SWINDON TOWN

Swindon Town, one of the original members of the Third Division when it was formed after the First World War, have been in the lowest division only since 1982, while during the middle 1960s enjoyed two terms in Division Two.

This was a decade of some success for the Wiltshire club as they won the League Cup in 1969 and followed it by taking the Anglo-Italian trophy.

Currently in charge of the club is Lou Macari, who has combined the duties of player and manager in his first term at the County Ground. Recently he was reinstated after a brief period out of office.

Recent arrivals have included David Cole, a central defender transferred from Swansea in February while there have been a succession of players on loan from other clubs.

The transfer of Jimmy Quinn to Blackburn Rovers earlier in the close season caused a problem in attack, but this has been offset by the form of Colin Gordon who is in his first season at Swindon and Peter Coyne brought back from the obscurity of non-league football by Manager Macari.

Coyne's last league club was Crewe Alexandra and he has responded to the challenge of another chance in the competition. He was on the books of Manchester United and previously moved out of the League circle to Ashton United.

Another recent arrival has been right-back Chris Ramsey after a loan spell from Brighton. He was in the south coast club's FA Cup runners-up side in 1983 and was formerly on the books of Bristol City.

Left-back Colin Bailie (sic) is a native of Belfast and has become a regular choice in the Swindon defence in the last couple of seasons. So has Charlie Henry, formerly on apprentice forms and now nearing 150 League appearances for the club.

# VISITORS

Andy Rowlands who made his name originally as a striker has been converted with success to central defence. He was on the books of Derby County at first and has also played for Bury in a career of over 400 League games. Former Southend United striker Gary Nelson is in his second term with the club as is David Hockaday, a midfield player formerly with Blackpool.

Leigh Barnard was with Portsmouth for several years and also had a spell on loan to Peterborough before linking up with Swindon while goalkeeper Scott Endersby who is in the Guinness Book of Records as the youngest ever FA Cup debut during his teenage days with Kettering, was a regular choice last season.

Endersby was also with Ipswich and Tranmere Rovers and is still only in his early 20s.

Midfield player Paul Batty, a local discovery, was on apprentice forms with the club and is nearing 100 League games for Swindon while Mike Graham was given his initial chance in the League with Bolton Wanderers.

At the start of this season, there was a different look about the side, with last campaign's top scorer Alan Mayes figuring prominently among the scorers.

Mayes, who began with Queen's Park Rangers and later played for Watford, Northampton (on loan) and Chelsea, is in his second term with Swindon and has scored over 100 League goals.

Others who were among the early Swindon sides of the present season included two former apprentices. Mike Payne and Mark Gardiner. The former was given his chance this season while Gardiner made his initial outing in 1983-4.

Andy Wollen and Gary Fulbrook are two other youngsters who have graduated through the reserve ranks. Swindon's reserve side plays in the Football Combination.

Last season we achieved a rare double over our opponents winning at home and away. Another item of interest concerns Swindon's highest-ever victory which was achieved against Farnham United Breweries in an FA Cup tie in November 1925. They won 10-1.





# **PROMOTIONS**

The Board are pleased to announce that as from 11th April 1985, Mrs. C. Carver has been promoted from Promotions and Lottery Manageress, to Commercial Manager.

THERE IS no issue in football currently more contentious than the televising of Canon League and Milk Cup games.

To straighten the record and correct many misconceptions this is what the chairmen of the League clubs did and did not do at their meeting in London on 14th February.

### They did NOT:

1. Accept the television companies' offer for a four-year package.

### They DID:

- Prefer to retain the current package of 10 live Canon League matches plus a recorded package of a minimum of 76 Canon League matches each with a minimum transmission time of 15 minutes, on both channels.
- 2. Accept a Milk Cup package of recorded matches, including replays, in rounds two to five plus two live semi-finals (on Wednesdays) and the Final live.
- 3. Agree to give flexibility to the television negotiating committee to secure the best price, subject to a much improved offer (the television companies' offer was a four-years contract worth nearly £17 million for 16 live Canon League matches an increase of six and live Milk Cup semi-finals and Final an increase of two live matches plus recorded matches as detailed in (1) and (2).
- 4. Prefer a contract for only two years.
- 5. Give the negotiating committee discretion if they wished to invite separate tenders from the television companies.
- Wish the League to invite separate tenders from interested parties for overseas rights and to use discretion in negotiating on cable and satellite rights.
- Accept that if the requirements of the packages are not being met then the negotiating committee would have the authority to discontinue negotiations.
- 8. Add to the negotiating committee Ken Bates, Robert Maxwell and Irving Scholar, the chairmen of Chelsea, Oxford United and Tottenham Hotspur respectively.


So who says Soccer is losing out?


A recent survey by Target Group Index, the national research company, suggests that there are nome so far out of step as the soccer "knockers".

Using attendances as the yard-stick, T.G.I. discovered that 5.7 million adults will watch a football match compared with its nearest rival cricket with 1.7 million. With over 20 million Canon League and Milk Cup attendances last season, many spectators obviously attend regularly.

T.G.I. then turned their attention to soccer itself. Including recorded matches, 14.9 million watched it on television, 9.9 million read reports, 8.7 million bet on football pools and 5.7 million attend all types of football matches.

That's not all. The average attendance of 22,468 in the First Division of the Canon League for 1983-4 was exceeded in the First Divisions of the leading European countries only by Italy and Spain.





First Division attendances this season, up to the end of January, showed an increase of 12%, and Milk Cup figures, excluding the Semi-finals, were up by 4% to an average of 10,300 per match.

# Know the laws

### REFEREES (continued)

He shall:-

- (f) Allow no person other than the players and Linesmen to enter the field of play without his permission.
- (g) Stop the game, if, in his opinion, a player has been seriously injured; have the player removed as soon as possible from the field of play, and immediately resume the game. If a player is slightly injured, the game shall not be stopped until the ball has ceased to be in play. A player who is able to go to the touch- or goal-line for attention of any kind, shall not be treated on the field of play.
- (h) Send off the field of play, any player who, in his opinion, is guilty of violent conduct, serious foul play, or the use of foul or abusive language.
- (i) Signal for recommencement of the game after all stoppages.
- Decide that the ball provided for a match meets with the requirements of Law 2.
