



Backtrack by MIKE SKINNER 1975 1965 1955

Tonight sees us play hosts to Sunderland for the first time in eleven years, although our first encounter was more than seventy-two years ago. The occasion was an F.A. Cup third round match at Roker Park on 22nd February 1913. The equivalent of to-days fifth round, Swindon, then still in the Southern League, had qualified to reach this stage by beating Rochdale (2-0) and second Division Huddersfield (2-1), both away. Sunderland, on the other hand, were among the front runners of the First Division, having disposed of Clapton Orient (6-0) and Manchester City (2-0) in the first two rounds. However, Swindon's attempt to emulate the previous seasons semifinal appearance was thwarted by the 4-2 score-line in favour of the home side. A crowd of 24,865 saw Sunderland take a 3-0 halftime lead before Harold Fleming and Freddy Wheatcroft reduced the deficit, but to no avail. Sunderland went on to beat Newcastle and Burnley before losing in the Final to Aston Villa by the only goal of the game at the Crystal Palace. They also finished the season as First Division Champions.

Fifty years later we met on equal terms, for a Second Division fixture on 21st September 1963. Swindon, unbeaten since promotion the previous season, were leading the table by a point over second-placed Sunderland, and, not surprisingly, the game drew a crowd of 26,049. Swindon maintained that top spot through a Roger Smart goal after 33 minutes, but it was to be a different story for the return at Sunderland the following February. By then the Town had slipped to fourth place, whilst the home side were still second. Even so, the 6-0 reversal came as rather a shock! Sunderland took full advantage of the strong following wind to score four times in the second-half, to add to their tally of two at half-time, watched by 41,334. With Sunderland gaining promotion at the campaigns end (as runners up to Champions Leeds), and Swindon being relegated the following season, our paths didn't cross again until 1970-71.

The home game, on 29th August, brought that famous incident when one of the goal posts broke, holding the match up for a

quarter of an hour. But more importantly goals from Arthur Horsfield, in the 13 minute, and Tony Gough six minutes from the interval sent most of the 17,060 home happy. But again the return, on April 3rd, produced a high scoring win for the home side. Sunderland were five up before Joe Butler managed to reduce the arrears two minutes before halftime. Don Rogers got the Town's second three minutes from time to make it 5-2. The following Septembers game at Roker Park produced a more respectable score-line, Swindon losing by just one goal to, nil in front of 12,811. That seasons encounter at the County Ground on 25th March saw Sunderland gain a point in the 1-1 draw. Peter Noble got ours that day with 12,102 present.

The season of 1972-73 was rather a successful one for Sunderland. Although they only managed sixth position in the League, they did walk off with the F.A. Cup. So perhaps it was no surprise when they took three points off us, starting with a 3-2 win on 2nd September. After a goalless first-half, Ray Tracey's 51st minute effort gave us the lead, but we failed to capitalise even though Don Rogers added the second. For the return at Swindon on 20th January Joe Butler gave us a half-time lead, but Ian Porterfield replied to force a sharing of the points in front of 7,010. The following season Sunderland completed their only 'double' over us, although, in view of our form that year, it wasn't hard. A 4-1 away defeat in November (Tommy Jenkins getting the consolation) was followed by a 2-0 defeat here on 25th March 1974 with a crowd of just 6,178. That defeat kept us in bottom place and, not surprisingly, we ended up being relegated. That was the last time we met until a fortnight ago, when goals from Andy Rowland and Peter Coyne leaves us very much in the running for a third round place.

Bob joined Sunderland along with Alan Kennedy from Liverpool in a deal worth £285,000. Unable to displace the consistent Bruce Grobrellar at Anfield Bob is looking to play regular league soccer again after failing to appear in the Liverpool League Team during the last two seasons. Previous to his move to Anfield for £125,000 in 1983 Bob had only missed three League matches in the previous three seasons. The twenty-seven-year old keeper made his debut for Sunderland against Swindon Town on September 24th in the Milk Cup.

ALAN KENNEDY

Alan joined Sunderland from Liverpool in September 1985 making his debut against Swindon Town for the Roker Park Club in a Second Round Milk Cup Tie. Alan has won honours at all levels for his country at Under-23, 'B' International and Full, a regular member of the successful Liverpool team of recent seasons winning League Championship medals, Milk and League Cup Honours.

BARRY VENISON

Barry is a former England youth cap who established himself in the under 21 side last season, winning his sixth cap at that level in Finland in May. A one-time Sunderland apprentice, Barry made his league debut against Notts County in October 1981, and was a member of our Milk Cup Final team last season.

GARY BENNETT

Gary was a reserve player with Manchester City and it was after moving to Cardiff on a free transfer in 1981 that he got his chance in league football. He soon established himself at Ninian Park and it was during the 1984 close season that he signed for Sunderland. Another member of last season's Wembley Eleven.

REUBEN AGBOOLA

Reuben was signed from Southampton for £150,000 last season. He served his apprenticeship with the Saints and made his first league appearance against Manchester Ukited at Old Trafford in November 1980. In his last couple of seasons at The Dell he developed into an outstanding sweeper.

SHAUN ELLIOTT

Shaun had the misfortune to miss the Milk Cup final because of a suspension. He is another former Sunderland apprentice who was undecided as to whether his best position was in midfield or defence at one point in his career. He made his league debut against Leicester in January 1977 and quickly established himself in league soccer. Shaun played for the England B side on 3 occasions and now looks back on more than 250 league matches for Sunderland.

NICK PICKERING

Nick has been a member of the England Under 21 side for 3 seasons and picked up his 10th cap against Finland in May. Nick completed his apprenticeship at Roker Park and he played his first league match at Ipswich on the opening day of the 1981-2 season. He won himself a permanent place immediately. In March 1983 he moved south to West Ham for £200,000 and in the 1983/84 season finished their second top scorer. He spent most of last season out with a serious injury and joined Sunderland in August 1985 to add power to the Sunderland forwards.

Road he was a member of the FA Youth Cup
winning team. He went on to establish himself
as a firm favourite with the Ipswich crowd
and played in the Ipswich team which won
the EUFA Cup in 1981.

DAVID HODGSON

David was signed from Liverpool for £125,000 during the early weeks of last season and was in the team against Norwich at Wembley. He began his league career with Middlesborough in 1978/79 and commanded a £450,000 fee when he moved to Liverpool in 1982. He has been capped seven times by the England under 21's.

HOWARD GAYLE


Howard was signed from Birmingham for £75,000 shortly before the start of last season and was called on as substitute against Norwich in the Milk Cup final. 





'Barney Rubble'

Sunderland born, Alan Kennedy returned to his home town to make his debut for the Roker Park Club in our first leg 3-2 defeat after making 243 league appearances for Liverpool.

Alan wore the No. 3 shirt for the Anfield Club with distinction for seven seasons following his £300,000 transfer from Newcastle United in 1978. The former St. James Park had made one-hundred and fifty-eight appearances in league matches for 'The Magpies' before his move to Anfield.

The thirty-one-year old full back will always be remembered for the two spectacular goals that he scored on two big occasions — a right foot blast that beat West Ham's Phil Parkes in the 1981 league cup final at Wembley and that unforgettable left foot shot that flew into Real Madrid's net in Paris to clinch Liverpool's third European Cup win in 1981.

Alan — or "Barney Rubble" as the Anfield fans affectionately nicknamed him after the character out of the "Flintstones" TV programme — could hardly believe that he had scored with his right foot at Wembley. "It was the first goal I had scored with my right in a competitive game," revealed the England defender.

"The only other one had been in my debut for Liverpool against Celtic in Jock Stein's testimonial match in Glasgow. But I had been practising with my right when I was in the Reserves and battling to get back into the First team after injury."

Until that glittering strike in the 82nd minute of the European Cup Final, Alan rated

his Wembley goal as the greatest moment of his career. But then came Paris. Weeks of worry over whether he would be fit enough to play at the Parc Des Princes after breaking his wrist in the home semi final leg against Bayern Munich were climaxed by unbounded joy as he seized on a throw in from his namesake Ray Kennedy and smashed a left foot shot beyond Real Madrid keeper Agustin.

Said Alan: "When I got the ball I said to myself, "Why not have a go?", so I did . . . You can't believe the feeling I had. Even when I woke up in Paris the next morning I thought it had all been a dream."

"It had been quite a season for me to score a goal at Wembley and then hit the one that won the European Cup".

Lou pays tribute to Jock Stein

The sad death of Jock Stein the Scotland Team Manager following the recent World Cup qualifying match between Wales and Scotland at Ninian Park, Cardiff, brought the following tribute from our Player Manager Lou Macari.

'Having spent the early years of my playing career under the management of Jock at Glasgow Celtic, his death came as a sad blow. It must not be forgotten that while Scotland and the world of football grieves at the immeasurable loss to a great game, my first thoughts are for his wife and family. In the glare of publicity that surrounds the sport, it is often forgotten that behind the personalities concerned there is a private life. Therefore my first thought was for his immediate family and I would like to express my sincere condolences for the loss of a HUSBAND and FATHER'.

'To me personally Jock was first and foremost a man of the terracing. A man who thought about everything, what was either right and wrong and the correct way to do things. I will remember him as a man who was never really at ease, his mind was constantly active, a most perceptive person. It is very difficult in England to appreciate the fervour and passion surrounding the two Glasgow Clubs, Celtic and Rangers. The religous aspect of a man like Jock who was a Protestant being manager of a predominatably Catholic Club like Glasgow Celtic appeared strange to some. Such a thought never entered his mind. I recall on one visit to the Republic of Ireland, two priests entering the dressing room. In a country where religion was more important than football, he unceremoniously removed them both insisting that they were interfering with football!'.

'Jock was not a manager who would put a lot of emphasis on tactics, he believed in hard work and genuine effort. It may come as a surprise to say that Jock would probably not have survived in Club management in recent seasons. He would more than likely have walked out rather than live with the attitude that exists today. Football was a twenty-four hour job for Jock'.

'It will always be remembered that he won nine championships with Glasgow Celtic along with the European Cup in 1967. With teams that cost little or no money in transfer fees. I recall his disappointment at certain players work rate even after a convincing victory! Jock was a dominant personality, who would stand no nonsense from players. When I first joined Celtic I had to travel one and a half hours by train and then catch a bus for a further fifteen minute ride. I can recall sitting in fear of my connections making me even five minutes late for training!'.

'I must admit I did not like Jock's training methods but in hindsight after I joined Manchester United I was more appreciative. His A to Z knowledge of players was impressive, but he always stressed that we would play the way we wanted to. The post of being Team Manager of Scotland probably kept him alive longer, the continual daily involvement may have taken it's toll if he had continued in club management'.

'Jock was a teetotaller, a man who shunned the games back slappers. His passing will leave a void, it may not show in any forthcoming Scotland World Cup results, for according to the opposition you meet, results will always vary whoever is Manager of Scotland'.

Lou paused, a sadly pensive expression on his face, concluding our interview by saying, 'I will always retain a happy memory of Jock Stein who unconsciously instilled in Lou Macari a pride of purpose and a discipline within, pride that every man should have. For that I will always be grateful'.





Welcome to the County Ground for this Second Round, Second Leg match in the Milk Cup Competition against that Club of renown, Sunderland. We are all aware of the excellent chance that the Players have made for themselves in the first leg at Roker Park to get into the next Round but of course there is still this evening's match to get over. Of course, your encouragement of the players throughout the whole period of the game is of paramount importance, so cheer them from the start to the finish.

May I remind you of the rules of the Competition that apply to this evenings game:
