Ten days have passed since our Littlewoods Cup exit and I still find it difficult to understand how we failed to gain a convincing win here at the County Ground against Southampton in the Second Leg.

Rarely can a team have dominated any match to the extent that we did in that match and have nothing to show for their effort.

A talking point among you all about that match was the missed penalty by Chris Kamara. Several of you could not understand why either Peter Coyne or Dave Bamber did not take the kick. It was really a case of Chris grabbing the ball and taking the kick. Why did he miss? According to Chris, he changed his mind as he ran up to take the kick. That is something that probably happens to a lot of players when they face Peter Shilton.

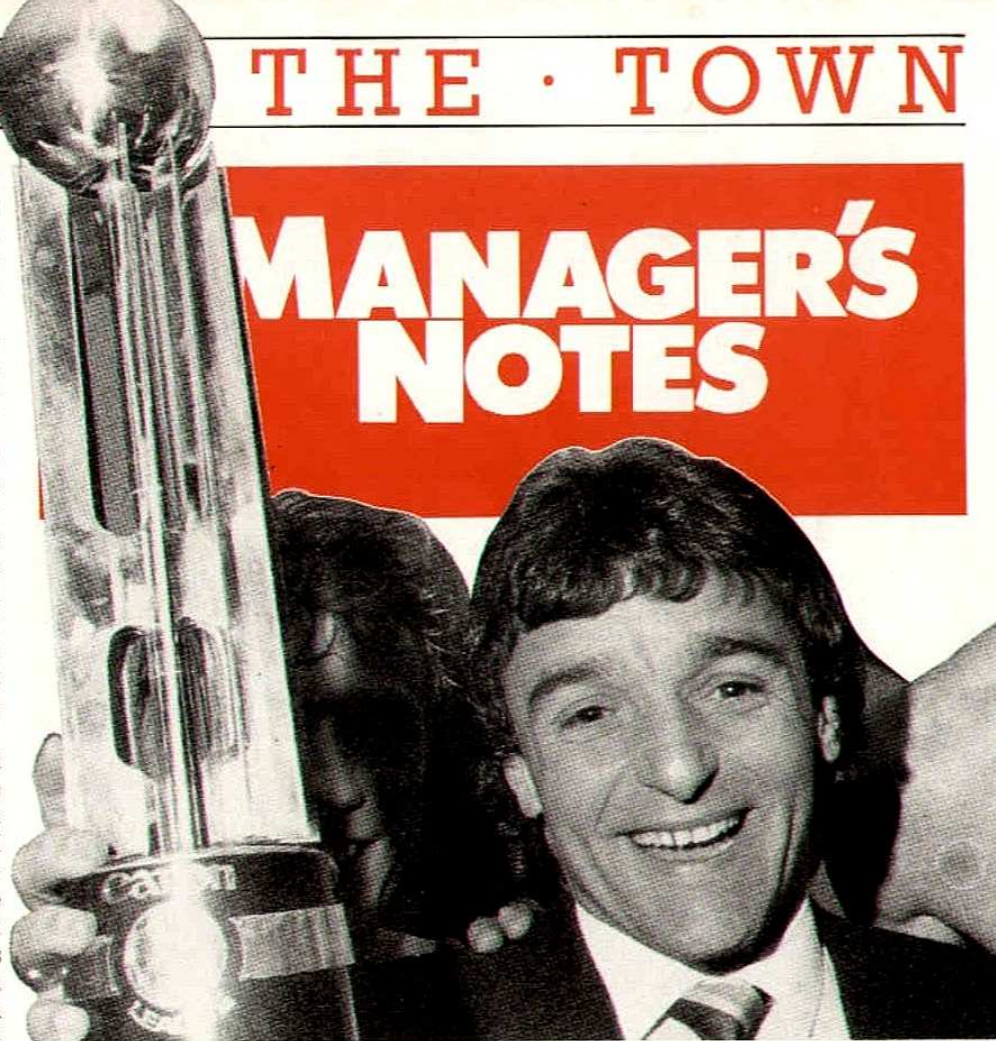
We hit the woodwork three times, had numerous shots blocked or kicked off the line and there is no way that you can account for those happenings. Overall, I thought my players performed marvelously on the night. It is always reasonable to assume that a repeat of that form in league matches would guarantee us promotion. Those wiser heads among you will know that players rise to the occasion against better opposition or when a match is of vital importance and it would also be beyond human comprehension to expect that high level performance for each match.

It would be convenient and also enough to produce a percentage of that performance to allow us to move up into the Second Division.

We had to turn our attention back to League Soccer following our Cup exploits. We received a double blow, twenty-four hours before we travelled to Fulham, when both Tim Parkin and Dave Hockaday reported unfit.

Tim had been suffering from a rib injury following his departure at half-time from the Southampton match. While Dave was injured in training the day before we travelled to London to meet Fulham.

Such is the strength of our squad at present in certain positions that we are able to call upon players to do an adequate job. When you consider that both of our regular centre backs, Tim Parkin and David Cole were out of contention for the first team, Charlie Henry came into the team and filled the void admirably.

Alan McLoughlin filled in for Dave Hockaday with a sound performance and we were able to collect three points at Fulham.

I was pleased to collect three points and gain a win away from home following our Cup match. Often there is a let down after playing in such an atmosphere that was generated at the Southampton match.

Despite the fact that we lost Peter Coyne with a knee injury we were able to bring on the experienced Steve White who scored our second goal and put the result beyond doubt.

I would like to take this opportunity to praise the efforts of our new groundsman Geoff Warren. When he joined the club we were going through severe problems with our pitch. The effort and work that he has put into putting the pitch to right, has been tremendous. We can all see the value of the experience Geoff gained while working for Birmingham City and Bristol City.

Since I have been with this club, I cannot

remember seeing so much grass in the goal area before. You really have done a great job, Geoff. Players find it much easier to play on a good surface. Given a couple of years and I am sure the players at this club will be playing on one of the best surfaces in the Today League. That is the measure of the confidence that I personally have in the improvement I have seen this season instigated by Geoff Warren.

Following this afternoon's match with Chesterfield, we shall be nearly a quarter of the way through our League fixtures. (Sorry, "Today" League fixtures). Time to pause and take stock of our progress, there appears to be no team in this division that can say they have the credentials to make Swindon Town fear them.

Of our fixtures to date we have lost points to teams in the top half of the table, Middlesbrough (1-0), Blackpool (2-6) and Notts County (1-2). Matches where, apart from the Blackpool fiasco, we should have collected four points. The rest of the teams we have faced are currently in the lower half of the table. We took maximum points from Fulham (2-0), Wigan Athletic (3-1), Bolton Wanderers (2-1) and Rotherham United (2-0). A point was taken from drawn matches with Chester City (1-1) and Newport County (2-2).

Apart from one or two positions

we seem to have a squad of players who are capable of more than holding their own in the Third Division.

Middlesbrough, lost their unbeaten home record last Saturday when they were beaten 3-1 at Ayresome Park by fast improving Blackpool. Former Bristol Rovers favourite Archie Stephens scored Boros' consolation effort in front of 11,470. Two goals from Taylor and another from Stewart emphasised the visitors superiority.

Complacency almost cost Wigan Athletic a price in their home match with Bristol Rovers. With just nine minutes left for play, Athletic were leading 3-0. Graham Houston with two goals and David Lowe along with Ian Griffiths had scored one apiece. After being outplayed until the final ten minutes Rovers hit back with two goals from David Mehew and one from Rovers player-coach Terry Hibbitt.

seventeen-year-old, Ian Stringfellow, struck his third goal in consecutive matches to give Mansfield Town a 1-0 win over Brentford and stretch their unbeaten League run to eight matches!

Our next opponents Port Vale snatched victory over today's visitors, Chesterfield, with three late goals. The Divisions leading goalscorer, Andy Jones, weighed in with two of those three goals, while Paul Maguire scored the other late goal. Earlier goalscorers had been Phil Brown and Dave Caldwell for Chesterfield and Robbie Earle for Vale.

Pity poor Rotherham United, they crashed to a club record eighth defeat in succession when they lost 5-1 to Notts County at Meadow Lane. County skipper, Steve Sims, got himself on the goalscoring charts with two penalties, one in each half.

Formidable Bristol City came to life in the second half of their match with York City at Ashton Gate. Two goals from Alan Walsh and one from Steve Neville were enough to see the Minstermen return home both pointless and goal-less.

Newport County struck in the dying seconds of each half to enable themselves to salvage a point from a 2-2 draw with Chester City. Winger John Kelly had twice put the visitors ahead. Former Town player Roy Carter scored one of the Welsh clubs goals on the verge of half-time and Mick Vinter grabbed a goal in the dying seconds of the match to give the Somerton Park club a point.

Bottom of the table Walsall figured in a high scoring draw with Bolton Wanderers at Fel-

lows Park, sharing six goals. The Midlands club should have taken the maximum points, for the highly rated David Kelly missed a penalty in injury time and allowed Bolton to take a point. Walsall were two goals down at half time but bounced back after the interval with goals from Kenny Mower and Craig Shakespeare. David Kelly scoring the third goal from the penalty spot!

Harry Gregg's Carlisle United had to thank defender Wes Saunders for their home win against Darlington. It was his 6th minute goal that gave the Cumbrian club their narrow home win.

Doncaster Rovers rugged approach at Bury resulted in four bookings. Two late goals from new signing Liam Robinson gave Bury ample revenge.

September saw few transfers in the Third Division Keith Oakes who opposed us for Fulham, joined the Craven Cottage club from Third Division Gillingham. Rotherham United as well as signing John McGinley from Lincoln City, also took Winston Campbell from Yorkshire rivals, Second Division, Barnsley. Wayne Turner, the former Luton Town midfielder moved to Brentford from Coventry City.

Further to our manager Lou Macari's scouting missions of late, you may see some transfer activity at the County Ground in the next few days. Lou is not the type of manager to let the grass grow under his feet. Providing he has not already been active!



OUR LAST MEETING

Champions of Division 4 the season before Swindon Town achieved that feat, Chesterfield last visited the County Ground on New Years Day 1985. Swindon certainly started an eventful year in superb fashion, demolishing the then 5th placed promotion contenders 4-0.

In front of a crowd of 3,575, the "Town" took no account of league positions as they turned in a fine performance to wholly justify the result.

It was not until the 40th minute however, that Andy Rowland broke the deadlock to shoot Swindon into the lead.

His effort was followed on the stroke of half-time by a fiercely hit Colin Gordon shot which whistled past Marples to put Swindon in total control at the break.

The second half brought no reason for thinking that the "Town" were ever in danger of relinquishing their lead. A 52nd minute penalty save by Scott Endersby further emphasised the determination of the home side to hang on to a vital three points.

Four minutes later Colin Gordon snatched his second, following up after a Colin Bailie header had been clawed out.

Andy Rowland's 74th minute header really rubbed it in to the eventual champions, who must have left Wiltshire hoping that this would be their last visit for some time.

The Away fixture on 9th April 1985 came in an already documented

period of turmoil for Swindon Town. Suffice to say that John Trollope picked the side that day, a team which seemed consumed with spirit and pride, an outlook reflected in their performance at the end of the 1984/85 season.

Once again Swindon outplayed the Saltergate club who by that stage of the season were well on course to Division 3, but this time Chesterfield came out on top.

After performing well and looking to be heading for a deserved point, Walker broke through the middle to shoot under Scott Endersby and clinch a 1-0 victory.

Two days later though, Swindon Town's history took an upturn with the re-instatement of Lou Macari, a move which has at last brought reward to Wiltshire. Our steady progress up the table this season will receive a considerable boost if we are to repeat our mean away performances at home. The Southampton game's performance of lung bursting energy is not possible every week, but that commitment spread over a whole season will surely consolidate our league position.

Chesterfield famous for its 'crooked' spire formed its football club way back in 1866. 25 years later they turned professional and in 1899 were elected to Division 2. However, in 1909 failed to seek re-election and were cast back into the non-league wilderness. 1921 saw them become members of the now defunct Division 3 North which they graced for ten years, when at the end of the 1930-31 season with a total of 60 points they were promoted as champions to Division 2.

Two seasons later though it was back to Division 3 (N) but the spireites were denied an immediate return to the higher level by just one point - finishing runners-up to Barnsley in 1933/34. Champions of Division 3 North again in 1935-36 with a margin of five points to spare over nearest rivals Chester and Tranmere. Chesterfield then established themselves at last in Division 2. Season 1946/47 saw them finish in 4th place their highest ever Football League position. Four years later they were relegated again - the last time they were to play in Division 2.

Since then they have fluctuated between the Division 3 North, 3rd and 4th Divisions.

Twice they have won the 4th Division crown. The first time being in the season 1969-70 and the last just a couple of seasons ago. Present manager John Duncan has been with the Spireites since June 1983 and few of his fellow Division 3 colleagues deserve to succeed more than he does.

His managerial career began with the unsavoury experience of building a team of promotion contenders at Scunthorpe in 1982/83 only to be sacked to make way for Allan Clarke with United in the top four. After a very short spell at Hartlepool, he moved to Saltergate and within two years led Chesterfield to promotion. Last season his side finished 17th in the league and to date are just hovering around the same position.

Recently, Mr Duncan created a piece of soccer history by giving Ollie Bernardeau his debut. Midfielder Ollie became only the second post-war Frenchman to play in the Football League.

John Duncan (Manager)

A regular goalscorer for Dundee and Tottenham, John started his managerial career with Scunthorpe, a team he built up to be promotion contenders in 1962-3 before he was sacked to make way for Allan Clarke when United were in the top 4. Then had a short spell at Hartlepool before moving to Saltergate in June 1983. Led the Spireites to Division 4 honours in 1984-5 and this season he will be hoping to improve on last seasons 17th position.

Jim Brown (Goalkeeper)

Experienced former Scottish international keeper currently in his second spell with the Club, having re-joined the Spireites in 1983. He started with Albion Rovers before originally signing for Chesterfield in 1972. Sheffield United then signed the keeper and whilst with the Blades, Brown won a single Scottish Cap. A spell in the USA followed 170 games for United before returning to the Football League with Cardiff City. Played for non-league Kettering Town before moving back to Saltergate. Was appointed Commercial Manager of the Club in 1985.

Chris Marples (Goalkeeper)

Signed full-time in July 1984 after spells in non-league football with Sutton Town and Gooie. Made his league debut in October 1984 and that season went on to keep a Club record 21 clean sheets in 38 games as Chesterfield won the Division 4 title. Last Season Chris lost his place to Jim Brown in the spring just before rejoining Derbyshire County Cricket Club where he is the wicket-keeper. Currently the only pro footballer-cricketer in the country. Born in Chesterfield, Chris was a staunch supporter of the Club before signing for them.

Jamie Hewitt (Fullback)

Teenager who played 17 League games at the end of last season and showed enormous potential after originally joining the Club on a Youth Training Scheme. Made his debut in the home victory over Derby County in February 1986 and kept his place after that.

Charlie Williamson (Fullback)

Signed on a free transfer from Sheffield Wednesday in the summer of 1985 after playing 62 games for the Owls. Last term had to wait until the latter part of the season before earning a regular spot in Chesterfields side. Also played on loan for Lincoln and Southend whilst at Wednesday.

Brian Scrimgeour (Defender/Midfield)

Central defence is his favourite position, but the clubs reigning player of the year can perform equally well at full-back, in midfield or as a striker. He even deputised as goalkeeper for his previous club Dundee in a local derby with Dundee United! Currently in his fourth season with Chesterfield. Brian combines playing with running a busy town centre pub. Last season he scored 9 goals in 45 League games

Gary Bellamy (Central Defence)

Signed full-time for Chesterfield in July 1980 after completing his apprenticeship with the Club. Played 142 League games for the Spireites before the start of this season, last term he appeared in just 12 matches at the end of the campaign after being out of action for 15 months with a serious pelvic injury.

Andy Kowalski (Defence/Midfield)

Rejoined Chesterfield in the summer of 1986 after spells with Doncaster and Peterborough. Born in Mansfield, moved to Saltergate from Worksop Town in 1973 and went on to play 365 League matches for the Spireites in the next 10 years, 9th in the all time list of Chesterfield appearances. Played 52 times for Doncaster and last season appeared in 35 games in Division 4 for the Push, where he was team captain.

Bob Bloomer (Midfield/Defence)

A Sheffielder who played 6 League games in midfield last season whilst on a non-contract basis. In pre-season games this term Bob showed he could play at full-back also and he could do a good job in either position if required by John Duncan.

Oliver Bernardeau (Midfield)

A Frenchman signed by John Duncan during the close season after spending last season as a non-contract player with Leeds United. Currently in his second year at University where he is studying Computer Sciences. A quick, skilful player, 23 year old Ollie played for Nantes in France, and he becomes only the second post-war player from that country to play in the League. Didier Six (Aston Villa) being the first.

Tony Coyle (Midfield)

Another summer signing, he joined Chesterfield on a free from Stockport, where he had spent seven seasons. Joined Stockport from Albion Rovers in 1979 for £23,000, still a record fee for County. A fast, attacking midfielder, with an eye for goal.

Mick Henderson (Midfield)

The Club Captain. He joined Chesterfield in January 1985 on a free transfer from Sheffield United. One of the Spireites most consistent performers last season,

scoring 5 goals in 43 League matches. Born in Gosforth, started with Sunderland, making almost 100 appearances for them, before going on to play for Watford and Cardiff City. Originally a full-back.

Tony Reid (Midfield)

Currently in his second season with Chesterfield. Nottingham born he started his career with Derby County at the same time that his current boss John Duncan was a player there. After 26 games for the Rams and a loan spell with Scunthorpe, moved to South Wales with Newport County. He played 76 times for them before moving back to Derbyshire.

Phil Brown (Striker)

Former apprentice who at the start of this season had scored 19 goals in 77 games for the Club. Made his debut at the end of 1982/83.

Ernie Moss (Striker)

Veteran striker now in his 19th season as a professional. At the start of the season Ernie had scored 154 league goals in 450 games for Chesterfield in his 3 spells with the Club. In all, has scored 263 goals in 782 games in league and cup in a glittering career which has also seen him play for Peterborough, Mansfield, Port Vale, Lincoln and Doncaster. Has experienced promotion on 5 occasions, including 3 in consecutive seasons. As well as playing, he runs a sports shop along with Geoff Miller, the England and former Derbyshire cricket captain.

Dave Caldwell (Striker)

Joined Mansfield as an 18 year old in 1979 from Inverness Caledonians. Established himself in the Stags line-up in 1980-81 and in 1983-84 he scored 21 goals. Played on loan for Carlisle and Swindon before joining Chesterfield in the summer of 1985. Injury kept him out of the side for much of last season.

Derek Walker (Striker)

Signed for Chesterfield in the close season after a successful trial period. A Scot from the Perth area, played in junior soccer after spending time as an apprentice with St. Johnstone. Aged 21.

Now imagine you are about to face a 'Keeper rated by many to be among the worlds best. The thought of Peter Shilton facing you is enough to put you off. I am sure that was a factor in Kammy's thinking and understandable.



You all accepted the miss and that showed you knew the difficult task facing whoever took the kick.

The Littlewoods Cup is now behind us for a season and it was back to League Soccer at Fulham last Saturday. As far as I was concerned it was more important that we defeated Fulham than Southampton. Some of you may have been expecting a reaction following our Cup Match but you have to remember we did not get a result. We lost the tie to Southampton.

It was important that we did not concede a goal to the London club because we felt that we would score ourselves. That confidence was confirmed after only ten minutes play. We played tight at the back and did not give anything away. Again we had a penalty and this time Coyne had no hesitation in taking the responsibility. He never gave John Vaughan in the Fulham goal a chance.

Fulham were a poor side and 'the Gaffer' was right when he told us that as long as we battled we would collect the points. Whether

it was a hangover the Fulham players were suffering from following their match with mighty Liverpool I do not know, but they were hardly competitive. I think you would agree that sides have a battle on their plate when they face Swindon town these days.

Martin Ling left the club this week after the briefest of stays at the County Ground. Disappointing when you consider so many of the clubs in the First and Second Division had taken such a lot of interest in his career before he moved to the County Ground. Martin was injured in our pre-season tour to Malta and appeared to carry the injury since and that certainly did not help his cause. I am sure he will be disappointed that he has had to drop down a division again.

Martin is only very young still and I am sure that he can make his way back to where so many believed his talent would lead him eventually. He will be entering an environment that is more to his liking among the 'cockneys' for Southend is like a second home to so many Londoners.

There is little to say about his time at Swindon, except to say that Martin did not seem quite so strong as most of the lads here, but as I have said, that pre-season knock did not help him. On behalf of the lads he left behind I am sure we wish him well wherever he goes in the future.

I am sure 'the Gaffer' intends to add to his staff in the coming weeks, he has room to manouvre with Martin's departure. He may well have done so by the time you are reading this programme.

Rovers have featured in some high scoring matches in the Third Division this season. A five goal match with todays visitors Chesterfield was followed by seven goals at Wigan Athletic last Saturday. Town versus Rovers matches have a reputation of not only being entertaining but also high scoring. We could be in for a treat that evening. David Mehen has been in fine goalscoring form in recent matches. The former Leeds United apprentice joined Rovers

last season and immediately became their leading goalscorer in the Reserves. Given a first team opportunity in recent weeks he has begun to find the net with increasing regularity. With the departure of so many established and seasoned professionals recently, the Tiverton Park Club are forced to turn to local talent in the hope that they will be able to maintain the current status of Bristol Rovers. Tim Carter the young Rovers goalkeeper looks the best of bunch in the opening weeks of the season.

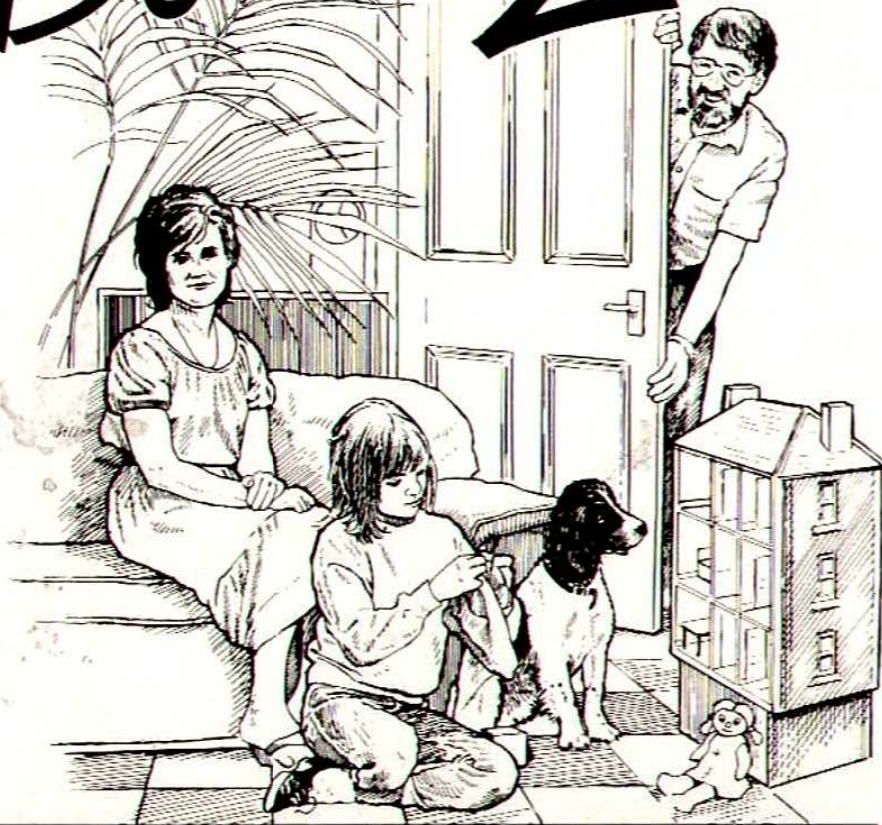

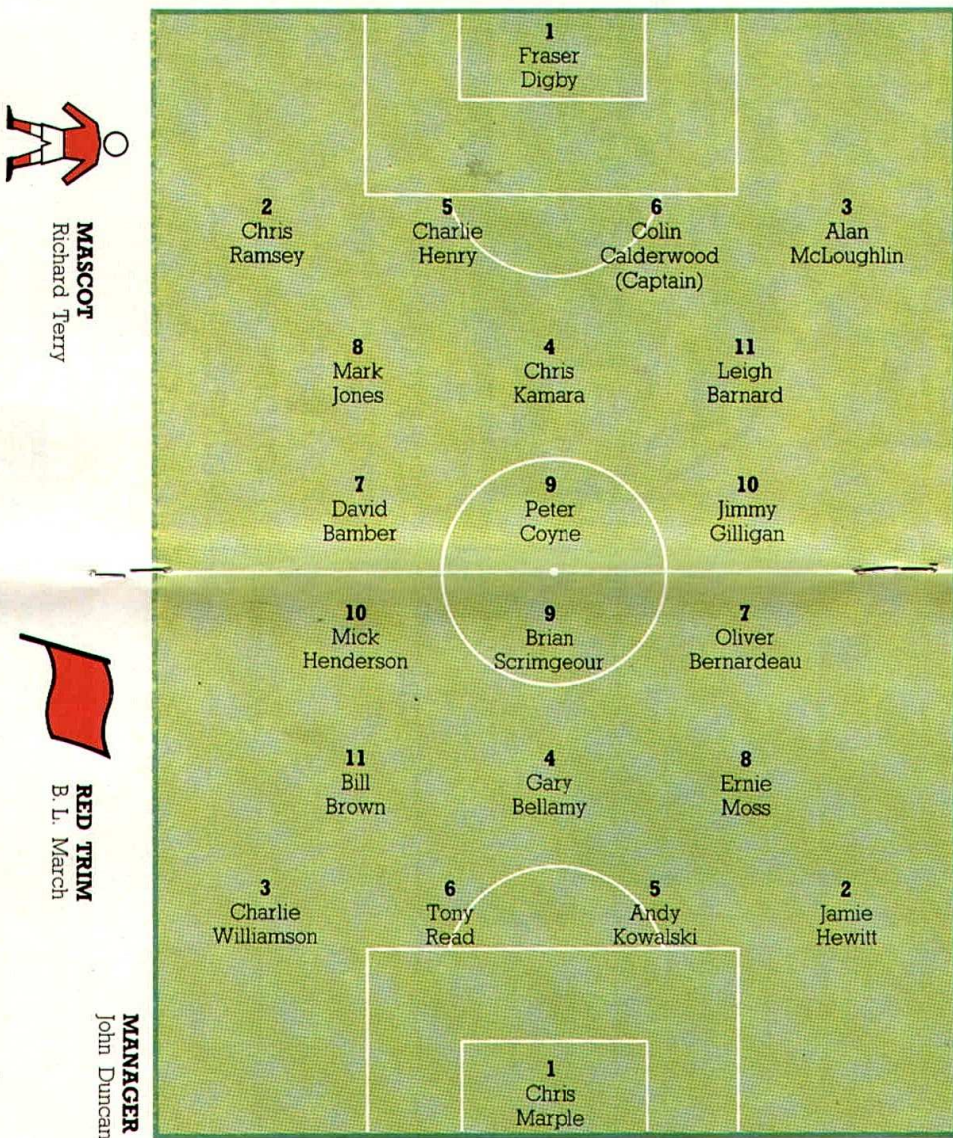

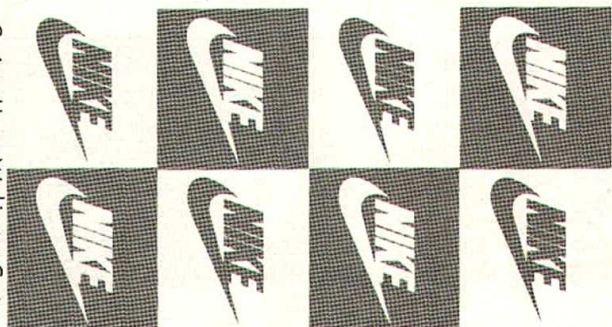

INTERVIEW



Vince Farrar, is the latest in our series of meeting the staff who work behind the scenes at the club. Vince who was born in Bombay, India, is the Club Accountant and linked up with Swindon Town in July this year.

Vince came to this country at the early age of four years, and along with his family he has lived in England since. 'I am what you could describe as a dark English Gentleman'. The jovial Blunsdon resident made that statement with a twinkle in his eye. Those who have come into contact with him will know that a sense of humour is never far from the surface.

In his formative years, Vince, attended schools in London and it was at the age of thirteen years that he first came to Swindon. Life was difficult in those early years as he explained. 'It took me time to settle in Swindon, and I returned to London as quickly as possible when I was old enough to leave school'.

Early days were unsettling for Vince and one of his first occupations saw him working in the insurance business for the infamous Dr Savundra of Fire Automarine Insurance Company. For several of his teenage years, Vince admitted, 'I found it difficult to settle between Swindon and London'. Eventually he found the answer! 'Linda, my wife provided that, we were married at what you could describe as an early age, we now have five children. Linda is a Swindon girl and comes from five generations of Swindon folk and she provided a settling effect for me'.

For a period Vince was self employed. 'I owned my own Road Haulage business but the recession that set in, really destroyed any high hopes I had of becoming a millionaire'.

Accountancy came into Vince's life when he decided to study at college, 'I passed seven of the ten subjects that I took and eventually took a position with Swindon Work Opportunities Programme. It was a situation I enjoyed, until Winterbourne Construction made me an offer I found hard to resist and then I spend a happy period with them'.

Vince has definite views on football, 'I have a son who I want to be interested in the game, in fact he loves it, but not unlike anyone else, there is no way decent families seem to be able to attend some of the grounds these days without being confronted with the scourge that has blighted our game. Everything seems to have deteriorated as regards standards of behaviour and England is far removed from the accepted level that was once the norm. If only we could achieve what Spain and South America have done, then football would attract the families back to the game'.

Today's match is of significance to Vince as he explained 'The county of Derbyshire will always have fond memories for me because of the time I spent at Derby Technical College studying for a computer diploma, so I have a soft spot for any connection with the County. I will have mixed feelings today but Swindon are my club and therefore we need the three points'.

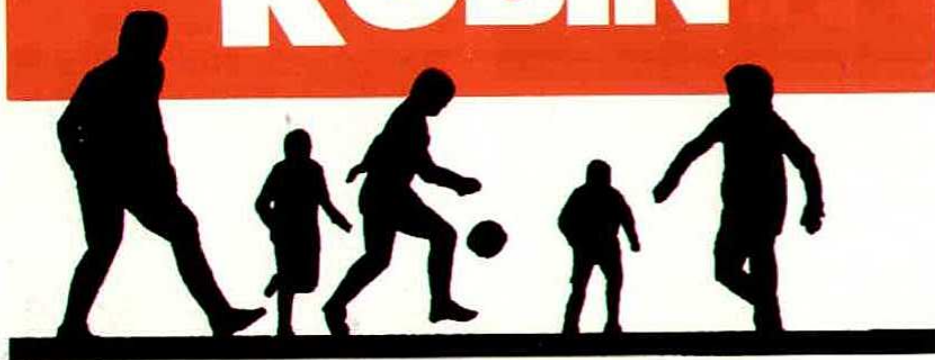

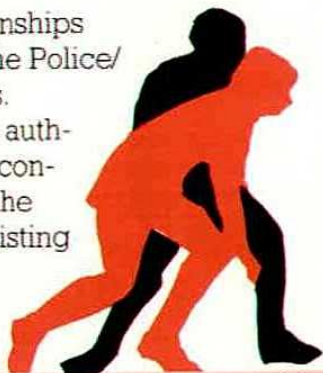
Family Side of Football
